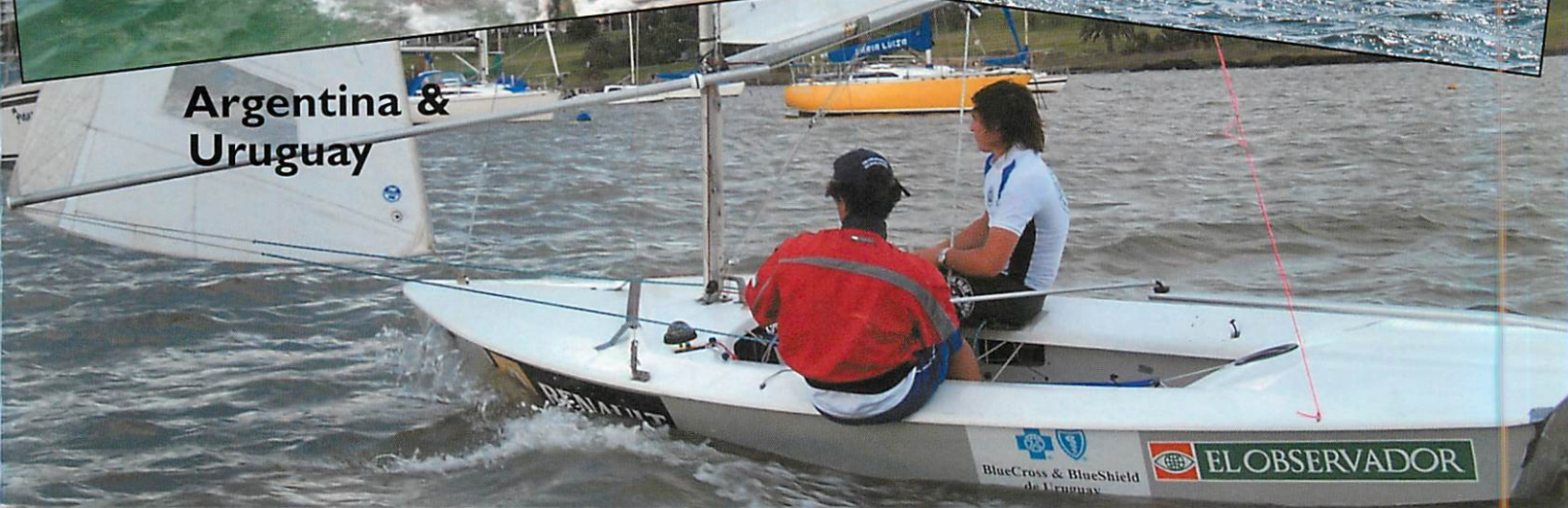

From the Commodore....

ARE WE SHRINKING?????

Over the last few months a number of major international and national Snipe regattas have been held in different countries with the following participation levels for these international events, listed below:

Snipe Winter Circuit		
- Clearwater		15
- Miami		43
- Nassau)		16
South American Champ.	- Argentina	50
South European Champ.	- Italy	21
European Masters Cup	- Spain	57
Yves LeBour	- France	7
Majsnipen	- Sweden	19

In looking at the numbers I can't help but feel that with the exception of the European Masters Cup (a new event this year which was extremely successful) and the South American Championship, that the participation level at many of the so-called major events is declining.

I wonder, why? Is it the increased cost in traveling to regattas, an organizational and/or communication problem, an aging class, growth in "other interests" or some other factor(s)? On the flip side of this, I've noticed the recent increased interest and participation in "Masters" events, something I truly applaud. However, as with any sport, the future of our class will depend largely on getting young people, particularly junior sailors, involved.

A few thoughts on how to do this are:

Schedule one day per month at your club to have your junior sailors sail in the Snipe with you. Make it fun for them at the beginning of the season and perhaps later on, get them into a bit more serious racing. A great event is a team relay race off the end of your club dock, where you set a very short course and the team members in the boat change on every lap after completing some equally fun thing on the dock, like tying a knot, hoisting a burgee, etc.

Develop smaller sails and even a shorter rig for the Snipe, so lighter weight sailors can more easily handle the boat – a suggestion currently before the Junior Committee.

Don't sell your older boats. Try to keep them in your fleet. and make them available to young adults who cannot afford a boat at an extremely attractive charter fee for a specified period, say six months or even a year.

If not already established, introduce a junior sailing program at your club in an easy to sail, safe boat for the kids, such as the Optimist dinghy. This is the perfect boat for kids between the ages of 7 and 15 to learn how to sail and is by far the largest junior class in the world.

We've done all of the above, with the exception of # 2, in the Bahamas and believe all will have a very positive effect on the growth of our class here. I've seen kids who might never otherwise have been exposed to sailing, participate and really enjoy the experience, as well as young adults just out of school/college get into sailing thanks to older boats being made available.

Building our local fleets is key to the growth of our class and working with our juniors and young adult sailors is an important way to do it. Sharing our interests with our children is also an important way to do things together and keep "lines of communication" open – not a bad result for doing something we love.

I am sure that many of you have your own ideas as to why our numbers in the class, overall and at regattas, have been decreasing over the last few years. You also have ideas as to how we can change this trend. We welcome your comments and suggestions on this and look forward to hearing from you about what has worked for your club and what we can do to engage more people, young and old, into "Snipe - Serious Sailing, Serious Fun!"

Rules Changes for 2006

--SCIRA Rule Changes as passed by the Board of Governors. These rules go into effect immediately.

By-Laws

Section 4. Reregistration

Boats that change hands through sale or other means, shall be registered at the earliest possible moment by the new owner who shall notify the National Secretary of such change of ownership with full information as to the new owner's name, address and where the boat will be located. If the boat's name is changed, such information should be included. The applicable transfer fee shall be paid with all ownership changes. **The letters on the mainsail shall reflect those of a skipper's country of which he is a citizen or bonafide resident for at least one year at moment of registration to SCIRA for the current year.**

The following Deeds of Gift were approved by the Board of Governors:

East European Championship Trophy

Emblematic of: Eastern Europe Snipe Trophy

Donated by: SCIRA Russia

Owned by: SCIRA Russia

Awarded to: The trophy can be awarded to any member of SCIRA of European nationality. Trophy awarded to the winning skipper.

Regatta conditions:

Sailed annually by agreement between European General Secretary, East European Secretary and East National Secretaries of SCIRA in accordance with SCIRA " Rules for Conducting National and International Championship Regattas". Skipper and crew must be SCIRA members in good standing with their fleet, country, and the SCIRA, and sailing a snipe registered to SCIRA for the current year. In case of chartered boat or loan boat the skipper shall use his/her own sails with the sail number of his/her own boat and this boat shall be registered to SCIRA for the current year.

9 or 11 races shall be scheduled. If 6 to 8 races are completed, the worst race shall be dropped, including a disqualification, if allowed by the SCIRA Official Scoring System. If 9 to 11 races are completed, the two worst races shall be dropped, including a disqualification, if allowed by the SCIRA Official Scoring System. If 5 or fewer races are completed, all shall be counted. 3 races constitute a regatta. A SCIRA scoring system mentioned in "SCIRA Official Scoring System" shall be used.

The organizing country shall provide boats with similar characteristics to the 1st and 2nd teams of those countries that have trouble in transporting their own boats, and to the defending champion.

A skippers meeting shall be held prior to the 1st race to clarify any rules. No changes may be made in borrowed boats without an approval of the Race Committee and the SCIRA Representative.

Each country can enter 2 boats.

Host country may have 3 additional entries: 1 junior, 1 for the host club or fleet, and one additional for the country.

Lodging: The same criteria as for renting boats are used. It is recommended that lodging be provided for the maximum number of participants.

Trophy Responsibility and Conditions: The National Secretary shall be responsible for safekeeping of the Trophy and its delivery with all fees paid to the site of the next Championship of Eastern Europe. The name of the winning skipper, year, fleet, and country shall be engraved at the winner's expense on a special plate.

Revision of Deed of Gift: By agreement between donor and SCIRA.

European Snipe Cup

Emblematic of: European Cup

Donated by: SCIRA United Kingdom

Owned by: SCIRA United Kingdom

Awarded to: Winning skipper

Open to: All members of SCIRA of European nationality

Regatta Conditions:

Held on alternate years with European Championship in waters selected by the European Board using "SCIRA Rules for conducting National and International Championship Regattas", "SCIRA official Scoring system" and "SCIRA official Courses".

The racing rules of the ISAF shall be used.

A minimum of 7 and a maximum of 9 races shall be scheduled depending on local conditions. Races shall be managed to last approximately 60-75 minutes. A different time used to complete the races will not be grounds for protest.

The National Secretary of the nation where held shall be the SCIRA Representative.

Trophy Responsibility and Conditions: Winning skipper is responsible for engraving, safekeeping and return of trophy to site of next competition at his/her own's expenses.

Revision of Deed of Gift: By agreement between SCIRA United Kingdom and European Board.



Ladies European Championship Trophy

Emblematic of: Ladies European Snipe Trophy
Donated by: Moscow Sailing Federation
Owned by: SCIRA Russia
Awarded to: Winning skipper and crew.

Regatta conditions:

The Championship shall be sailed in waters selected by European National Secretaries (Date, duration). The "Rules for Conducting National and International Championship Regattas" and "SCIRA Official Scoring System" are in force.

Held every 2 years in odd numbered years since 2003

Skipper and crew must be female SCIRA members in good standing with their fleet, country and SCIRA and sailing a Snipe registered to SCIRA for the current year. In case of chartered or loan boat the skipper shall use his/her own sails with the sail number of his/her own boat, this boat shall be registered to SCIRA for the current year too

The country holding the regatta must furnish an adequate number of good boats to the skippers who are not in a position to bring their own boats.

7 races shall be scheduled. If 5 or 7 races are completed the worst shall be discarded. 3 races constitute a regatta. No more than 2 races a day (in events with charter boats, first day will only have 1 race).

No races to be started if wind velocity exceeds 18 knots prior to the preparatory signal).

The research of the lowest entry fees shall be taken into consideration
Trophy Responsibility and Conditions: Responsibility for engraving, safeguarding and return of the Trophy to the site of the next Championship rests first of all with the winning skipper and with the National Secretary of the winning skipper's country.

Revision of Deed of Gift: By agreement between donor and SCIRA.

World Snipe Day Celebrated Together by Argentina and Uruguay

May 20th and 21st were celebrated together by the Argentinean and Uruguayan Snipe fleet at the second and final stage of the SnipeFest regatta, and more than a Snipe World Day, this was a Snipe World Weekend. This regatta was held at the Paraná river, at the city of San Nicolás, Argentina.

32 boats gathered for the event, out of which 25 were from Argentina and 7 from Uruguay.

During Saturday the winds were pretty low from the south reaching 10 knots in the puffs. The first regatta was won by Pablo Defazio and Eduardo Medici (URU), followed by Matias Fernandez Viña and Gustavo Merlo (ARG) and Maximiliano and Luciano Juarez Dover (ARG) were third.

The second regatta was also won by Defazio and Medici who did a perfect regatta. The South American Champions Adrian Marcatelli and Francisco Bonaventura (ARG) were second and Ariel Villalba and Marcelo Villalba finished in the third place.

Sunday's low temperatures caused the winds to be even lower than Saturday and no regattas were able to be raced during this day.

At the end of the competition, Defazio and Medici (URU) finished in the first place with 1.5 points. Marcatelli and Bonaventura (ARG) were second with 8 points, and Zabalúa and Arrollo finished in the third place with 10 points.

In the women's category, the World Champions Andrea Foglia and Mariana Foglia (URU) finished in the first place within a fleet of 6 women's boats, out of which 4 were from Argentina and 2 from Uruguay.

In the Junior category, Nicolas Capdevila and Rodrigo Nisi (ARG) obtained the first place, while Philipp Umpierre and Martin Puricelli (URU) finished second.

And in the Masters Category Oscar Jose Gonzalez and Sebastian Casadei from Argentina ended up first.

The award giving ceremony was celebrated at San Nicolás' Yacht Club and all the competitors gathered together once again as well as they did in a welcome barbecue on Friday night and a dinner on Saturday night. The Vice Commodore of SCIRA Pedro Garra thanked the Argentinean competitors and regatta organizers for the great regatta and their hospitality during Snipe World Day.

SnipeFest regatta was finished in its first edition, but everyone became so enthusiastic about gathering both the Argentinean and Uruguayan fleet together, that Snipe Fest is set once again for 2007.

Snipe Day in Florida

Sometimes things can just happen, but more often than not, we have to help them along. It all started back in February when Peter Strong sent me an E-mail asking about Snipe sailing in Florida. Peter is the director of the US Sailing Center, Martin County in Jensen Beach. Peter said that there was interest in starting a Snipe fleet at the center and then went on to tell me about the facility

they have there. After discussing the prospects with a friend who keeps her boat at USSCMC, I decided they had a serious group and it would be well worth following up.

By coincidence, we settled on May 20th without realizing that it was International Snipe Day. It was just convenient for the sailing center and several sailors that agreed to help out and bring their boats. We had every thing set and then it looked like disaster would strike. Several people bringing boats had to cancel and "The old Man" Gonzalo Diaz, who was to help me and bring a boat had to have a cardiac catheterization on Tuesday. His Doctors and family said he could neither drive nor sail on Saturday.

Fortunately Old Man is one of those people who just never give up. He convinced Alex Ravelo to bring his boat from Miami and drive him to Jensen Beach to be with us. Alex is off to college this fall and needed to sell his boat to help with costs. Paul and Sally Gingras brought their boat from Palm Beach and with ours we had 3. By another coincidence all 3 boat's numbers ended in 23, as we had 23623, 30223, and 30323.

Come sailing day, everything went perfectly. The sun was out, it was not too hot and winds were a perfect 8-10 knots. Our group could get a good feel for the boats without being overwhelmed. Peter had 11 interested people on hand to sail with ages ranging from teens to fifties. Campbell Rich set up some short courses for us. We started by having the boat owner as crew until the people were comfortable with Snipes. We then turned the boats completely over to the sailors to give them maximum tiller and sailing time. We sailed round robin so that everyone got a chance to skipper and crew in different boats. Racing was always close and everyone had a ball. Old or new, all the boats were evenly matched which really impressed the crowd. Old Man was coaching the sailors and kept those waiting to sail entertained with stories about Snipe sailing over the years. Every time 23623 won a race, Old Man would jokingly raise the asking price.

The day ended with a cookout with burgers, soda & beer. It gave us a chance to socialize and get to know each other better. Peter bought Alex's boat then and there and several of the others are

now looking for boats. Nancy and I are an hour north of them in Sebastian and with 2 boats an hour south in Palm Beach we now have a middle ground to meet, some new friends and a great place to sail. We will follow up and sail with Peter to help build the fleet.

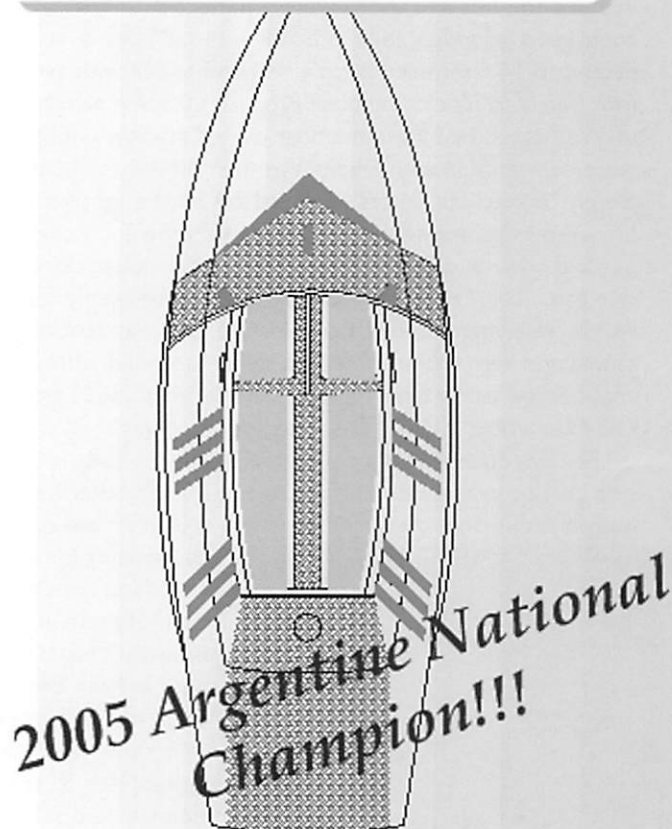

Profiles in Snipe Sailing



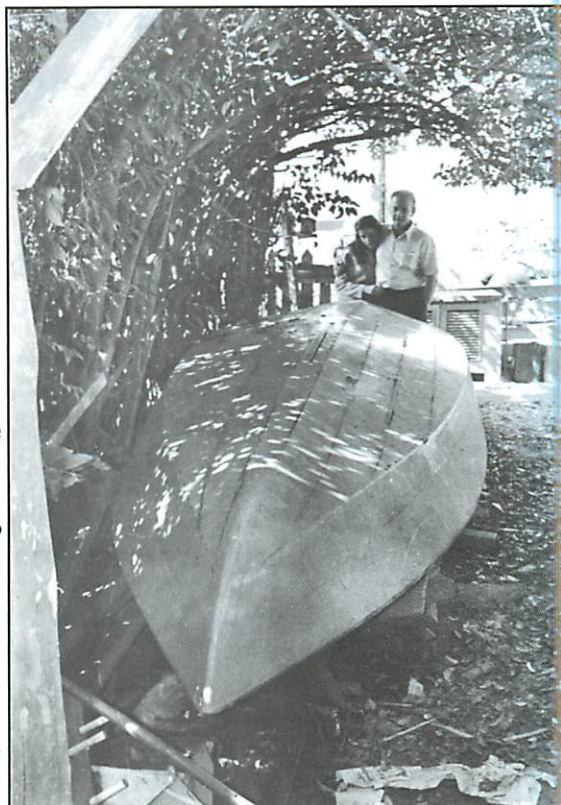
Flavio Caiuby

For anyone who has traveled the international Snipe circuit, Flavio Caiuby has been a mainstay both in Brazil and in the Snipe world. Commodore in 1979, Flavio worked his way up through the positions of Fleet Captain, National Secretary and eventually SCIRA Commodore and has continued to remain active, most recently serving as Race Committee Chairman for the 1997 Jr. Worlds before retiring from the international circuit.

Flavio has owned 55 Snipes since his first boat in 1969. As Flavio said, "I have always had a good racing boat, for instance THE 12000 (World Champion in 1959 with Paul Elvström at the helm), which I owned for 9 years. But I used to buy other good hulls, rig them with a good motor (mast & sails), win one or two races and re-sell with no profit to increase the number of competitors in the fleets.

Flavio started sailing in 1940, crewing in Sharpies, but moving into the Snipe in the 1969 Brazilian Championships in Brasilia with 29 boats. Seven years later in 1976, he managed to organize a 102 competitor Snipe Brazilian Nationals in São Paulo. "Ralph and Berta Swanson attended our Nationals with Ralph sailing and Berta on the Race Committee. Arriving from the race course, Berta already had the results completed!"

Capicua—in Spanish & Portuguese, the meaning is a number that is the same when you read it backwards and they say they are lucky numbers—Flavio had several: 22622, 22822, 25152, 23932, 29392, etc.

At 78 years young, Flavio had to miss this years Nationals on his beloved Lake Guarapiranga partly because of his reality check of his years and because his excellent crew Flavia, had to work to pay for her studies. In a fit of anger, Flavio sold his Torben hull ; but after 15 days, he could not resist buying an excellent old Snipe #11123 which he is busy rigging the "modern" way, spending 10 hours one weekend.

2006 Spanish Nationals - Fresneda & Travado Reign

**April 12-16
Vigo, Spain**

Pablo Fresneda with Cesar Travado won the Spanish Nationals on the last day, fighting off juniors Jordi Triay/José Escudero who had been leading the Championship since the first day.

Older skill prevailed with the youngsters drawing a black flag in the 8th race. Fresneda/Travado took advantage of the mistake and won the race, giving them the championship. Unfortunately the juniors finished 15th in that race, pushing them to 4th overall.

The competitors were greeted with wind changing in direction and velocity everyday. Winds from 5 knots to 15-18 knots on the last day challenged all 72 teams in attendance and placing a premium on tactics and boat handling.

2006 was the anniversary of the Snipe in Spain and the Championship was scheduled for Vigo, the site of Spain's first Snipe Fleet. In typical Spanish tradition, there were dinners and parties every night as only the Spanish can prepare!

Fran Palacios (22-23 years old) and David Martínez showed good speed and angle throughout the regatta giving them 3rd overall. Alfredo González (20 years old) and Cristian Sánchez took the 2nd in a very consistent championship.

As you can see, very young people at the top 4, new people for the battle:

- 1°) Pablo Fresneda - 27 years
- 2°) Alfredo González - 20 years
- 3°) Fran Palacios - 22-23 years
- 4°) Jordi Triay - 19 years (and could win the championship)

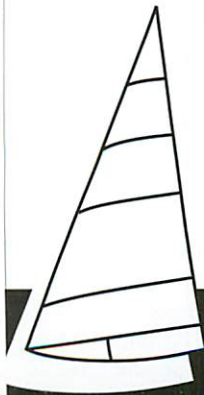

New Jib for 2006: model AR-3

The target of our designers was to achieve an easier to set and all-round sail. The shape of the new jib derives from our previous AR2, but it has a slightly different geometry; it is wider, the exit angles are flatter, whilst the entries are slightly fuller. This makes the jib easier to trim and more "forgiving", asking less concentration from the helmsman on the upwind legs whilst the wider surface area gives a little more driving force downwind. These two factors help you to increase the overall performance during the race.

TIP: The AR3 needs lower tension than the AR2-F to get the best performances. In flat sea you could go up a little with the tension to achieve a better pointing angle.

International High Point Championship

One of SCIRA's oldest trophies, the Reichner Perpetual was the original determination of the "best sailor" in the Snipe world. Before the Isaacs became truly the international World champion determiner, members wrote in to Bill Crosby wanting to test their sailing skills against other members.

The fleet point scoring system was devised to enable sailors to "race" against fellow sailors without ever having to travel. This system has continued to be calculated annually. However, the participation has dropped significantly since the 70's with the increase proliferation of the Snipe around the world and the creation of the international championships.

For 2005, 1 country reported, and within that country, 9 fleets participated with 82 competitors.
