You will note that a large part of world is represented to grant the widest share of opinions and reports from the countries.

During the last few months the Committee worked very hard to solve some problems that arose measuring the rudders during the last major championships. I suppose the solution we found is suitable to clarify any doubt without penalizing the wide majority of production and to enforce the existing rules. The Circular Letter is also published in the issue of the Snipe Bulletin and on the Snipe website.

The Board has taken the clever decision to fund the production and distribution of more suitable official tools. We enforced the necessity that all Snipe producers must own an official jig to measure the hull.

The intent is to have uniformity in our intent to keep the Snipe a strict one design class. Believe me that we are seriously following the matter daily as the questions and problems to

be solved are many; which can be expected of a Class and design over 75 years old.

The interest of the Rules Committee is to monitor that our rules are performed, but also to grant sailors to sail regattas with their attention focused as much as possible on the competition and less then to measurement.

September 3rd is the day before the Worlds that is reserved for a clinic dedicated to measurers, builders, sail makers, and all those interested in better knowing how the rules have to be applied and how to use the official tools.

I sincerly hope to meet many of you in San Diego for a fruitful meeting.

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CIRCULAR LETTER

February 5, 2009

During the 2008 editions of the Western Hemisphere and European Championships the measurers discovered widespread non compliance of rudders. The problem involved new as well as old production rudders.

It was difficult to understand the reasons for this non compliance. Following a very broad investigation which included the report and most helpful considerations of Commodore Pedro Garra, the Rules Committee determined the following:

- 1. Due to a an error of omission in the printing of the last two versions of the Rule Book and Measurement Sheet the tolerance for the position of the center of the radius of the bottom of the blade had been overlooked in the measurement process. The error has been corrected reintroducing the tolerance(see enclosed updated drawing)
- 2. Certain rudders are built so that the forward edge of the rudder head does not present a clearly defined straight edge which can be used as a reference to establish its parallel position with respect to the transom or the pintles are not fitted so as to hold the rudder parallel to the transom. This renders an otherwise legal blade illegal when it is set upon the template.

The Rules Committee wishes to avoid any possible uncertainties in measuring rudders by confirming the present rules and drawing particular attention to the formal reinstatement of the aforementioned tolerance regarding the position of the center of the radius at the bottom of the rudder blade. The front edge of the rudder above the water line shall be parallel to the transom between the knuckle and sheer. The pintles shall be fitted so as to hold the rudder parallel to the transom.

How's the Snipe Class doing?

We often get asked, "How is the Snipe Class doing?" especially as we watch new classes emerging and some older ones fading. So we decided to show our members the strength of the Snipe Class around the world.

Indicators of the strength of a Class is usually measured by the number of paid members. SCIRA voted in 2000 to separate the boat registration and membership and we've been tracking them ever since. The Class continues to keep our memberships strong around the world as indicated by the graph below taken over a 10 year period.

Another top indicator is the sale of new boats and sails, as these show the activity of people who are actively sailing. New numbers issued to builders remain steady which is great trend for our 75+ year old design. The sails are measured by the total number of sail royalties sold worldwide.

Bethlem and Bianchi Retain the Crown Brazilian Nationals 2009

The Snipe Brazilian Nationals took place in the fantastic city of Salvador. The championship was organized by the Yacht Clube de Salvador and everything was perfect. After all days of races there was a barbecue and cold beer waiting for the sailors ashore. It was a great week of sailing under very good conditions. The wind was always from SE changing from 12 to 18 knots. 56 boats from the south to the north of Brazil have entered the championship. There was a spot light in the fleet 662, from Salvador. This fleet has been grown since 2005 and there are 25 boats by the moment. The local sailor Matheus Tavares did a very good job being qualified to the World Championship in San Diego in his first attempt. The two first place were like in the WH&O. Bruno Bethlem and Dante Bianchi won the title for the sixth time (five in a row) and Alexandre Paradeda and Gabriel Kieling, who retain the record of winnings (7 times), were second in a tight battle. The first master was Paulo Santos and Rodrigo Inácio. Juliana Mota and Viviane Béghin won the women division and Leonardo Taboada and Mila Beckerath won the mixed. Mário Tinoco and Matheus Goncalves

won the youth category scoring an impressive 8th place overall.

After the prize giving ceremony all sailors took a rented bus and went to the Summer Festival, that is a Music Festival where more than 80000 people dance and sing famous Brazilian Music until the sunrise.

The 2010 Brazilian Nationals will be in Florianopolis on 23-30 January. The event is open for foreign sailors.

Interview with Kurt Diemar – Builder of Diemar Snipes

Brazilian builder reveals some secrets about his boat

Blu: When did you start to build Snipes?

Kurt: I started in 1992 using the Torben's molds. I built my own mold on 1996. These boats have won 8 Brazilian nations, one Pan American gold medal and the last West Hemisphere Clhampionship.

Blu: What are the biggest improvements you did in those years?

Kurt: Actually, the rules tolerances are quite small nowadays; there is very little room for improvements on the hull. We are still using the deck developed by Torben Grael in the 80's. It is a very good solution, very dry and efficient. We made some advance on the mast, but the biggest improving we did is the hull structure.



We have been working together with engineers in order to build a stiff boat. This is very important to hold the rig adjustments guys like Bruno Bethlem are using. This work led us to abandon the *sandwich* construction. Now we are using single skin reinforced at critical points. The boat is very strong and built close to the minimum weight. The boat never gains weight and lasts forever. This construction methodology is also much cheaper.

Blu: How much does it cost?

Kurt: R\$ 15.000 fully rigged without sails, about US\$ 6.250. I think it is still very expense. I also sell used my boats. I also help the new talented sailors to get a boat. Without that help maybe sailors like Mario Tinoco, current youth champion, would not be able to buy a boat. It is very cheap to have a competitive used boat.

Blu: It was different before?

Kurt: Yes. In the past there was a huge difference between boats. If you were rich enough to buy a 12000 series boat, you had a big advantage on the race course. Today you can buy 10 years old boat and be very competitive. The boats are very equal. In my opinion, the only piece of equipment that still very expensive is the sail. It is very hard for me to say that, because I have a lot of friends in the sailmaking business. I think they could reduce their margins and sell more sails.

Blu: What is the percentage of national components in the boat?

Kurt: The boat is 100% national. We have it all, aluminum alloy, fiberglass, hardware etc... The wood used comes from reforested area with a certification of origin.

Blu: Thank you very much for supporting our class!

Kurt: Thank you Blu for your job with the class.

Promoting Snipe in Boat Shows

We all know that Snipe is all about Serious Sailing and Serious Fun.

However to keep our class active it is important that we find new sailors who share our view. In those countries where the fleets are very large and activity is highly visible, new members are easily attracted. In some other countries, where sailing is not such a large sport and Snipe competes more tightly with other classes, lot of promotion activity is needed to keep the class alive and well.

Boat shows are one good promotion channel where we can have access to a large number of potential new Snipe sailors. But it is not enough to just get a boat to the show, there is also some



advance planning and hard work needed to make these events successful.

Here you are with some of the best practices that we used last February in the Boat 09 Show in Helsinki, Finland. This show is the largest boat show in Nordic countries with 80,000 visitors during 10 days.

Get a partner

We started the preparations early last year with discussions to partner with Finnish Sailing Association, to get space in their booth. As a result we shared a very nice open booth with the association and some other partners, having Snipe well visible with a Laser, 49er and a Melges 24. Sharing a booth made the arrangements easier and visibility higher. Also it reduced our costs, especially when we got some sponsoring from an insurance company.

One of the main reasons for us getting the space instead of all other available classes was that we promised to have the booth manned throughout the whole event. This meant that we needed to organize almost 30 active class members to take a turn at the booth. Having the members participate the event splits the work to reasonable pieces for everyone and also builds up proud Snipe team spirit for the coming season.

Be active

Just having a small boat in a big fair does not get much of attention. Many people stop by the booth, but if there is no help available it is too easy to just go on walking to the next attraction.

What makes the difference are active "sales" people at the stand. We prepped our crews with some simple opening words to get the visitors interested and further highlights of the joy of Snipe sailing to get our messages through. Everyone could then add their personal touch to the talks and hand over our short and simple one page Snipe flyer.

Collect names

We had a logbook at our stand. Every person who was showing real interest was logged in the book with their name and email address and a short description if they were interested to test Snipe, to buy a boat, to crew, etc. We promised to come back with further information. Having a boat show in Finland on February, means that it takes still 2-3 months before the sailing season starts. By collecting names, we can ensure that

we do not lose the contact and can help the interested people to get easily engaged with our fleets.

At the end of the show we had over 40 hot names in the logbook for further actions; juniors, parents with teenagers, keel boat sailors, couples looking for new activity together...

Follow up

We sent a follow-up mail to the visitors quickly after the fair, reminding of the highlights of Snipe sailing, giving information about how to get a boat, how to get in contact with the nearest fleet etc.

When the sailing season starts, we invite everyone to Snipe Sail Days at their nearest fleet, where they hear more about our class and have a chance to test the boat. These events have proven to be very important to activate the potential new Snipe sailors.

Conclusions

We have a great "product" to offer. Snipe is a boat that fits to many types of sailors in various phases of their sailing career. Snipe sailing is easy to start, it keeps the interest ongoing both technically and sporting wise, with no need to ever retire. 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Id Crook World Masters Championship Trieste, Italy July 8-12, 2009

Società Triestina della Vela is organizing the Master World Championship in July this summer.

STV is one of oldest Italian sailing clubs, founded in 1923 as sailing club specially dedicating energies to dinghy and small keel boats. STV has 650 members, owning 250 keel boats moored in its area and about 70 dinghies ashore. Among the members we count the Scira Past Commodore and Rules Committee Chairman Giorgio Brezich and the European General Secretary Stefano Longhi.

Junior & Senior Worlds - San Diego, California

In preparation for the Jr. And Sr. Worlds to be held in San Diego, we thought we'd give you a little preview of what you can expect as far as the conditions, social schedule and travel logistics.

2009 SNIPE WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP The one common thread for sailing in San Diego is that the wind is light. The Ocean venue, where the Snipe Worlds will be sailed: kelp is a big factor and there are larger rolling waves. You'll be sailing from San Diego Yacht Club (www.sdyc.org) and it is a long sail out or a tow is needed in the lighter breeze. Mark Reynolds gives tips for sailing here:

Wind

The wind is fairly predictable in San Diego compared to most locations around the world. The wind is from the South to the West quadrant almost 100% of the time. A typical day starts with very little wind in the morning filling in from the West midmorning, and building until the early afternoon, and then decreasing again in the early evening. The normal wind speed is 8 to 12 knots. It is very unusual to have too little or too much wind, in fact, almost unheard of compared to most places. I don't think we have ever had a day with too much wind and only a few times when there hasn't been enough wind to race.

Current

The current off the west coast runs down the coast. The current is stronger the further offshore you get and can occasionally be reversed along the shore with some tidal effect if you are sailing just outside the bay southeast of Point Loma.

Tactics

When the wind is from the West the right is generally favored. With a West wind starboard tack takes you further offshore where there is generally more adverse current. When the wind is



from the South the boats are more spread out over the course with the left usually being more favored.

Getting here: San Diego's International Airport

is Lindbergh Field, just 5 minutes from SDYC. Flights to San Diego are easy from any major city. A taxi or shuttle can be arranged to take you to SDYC from the airport. If you choose to fly into Los Angeles and rent a car, it's a 2.5 hour drive south along the coast on the freeway. There are also trains from LA to San Diego and the train station is 15-20 minutes from SDYC.

Social Schedule

Junior Worlds: a full schedule which includes the opening & prizegiving ceremonies and nightly meals is planned with a BBQ, Mexican taco night, Italian night and pizza & surf movies. One night will be open so sailors & their hosts can spend an evening together.

Senior Worlds: Between the Opening Ceremony and the Prizegiving, your hosts will offer beer & snacks after racing followed by a BBQ night, Mexican taco night and possibly a chance to view the San Diego Padres professional baseball game. Links:
