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#### THE COMMODORE'S BULLHORN

A pressing problem for virtually every individual, family, business, and government is the lack of funds for maintaining balanced budgets, capital improvements, marketing, promotion, etc. The Snipe class has the same problem. In the mid-seventies there were 1700 U.S. Snipes. Currently there are about 1,000. Even with the increased dues there is less revenue to run the class and essentially no money for badly needed promotion. SCIRA has operated at a deficit for each of the past five years with the 1992 loss at over \$15,000. Sailboats such as the Laser, Hobie Cat and J-24 are manufactured by companies with enough funds to actively promote and market their product. They also have extensive distribution networks.

In contrast, the Snipe is built by very competent individuals running small businesses that have limited resources to establish large distribution networks, or to adequately market and advertise their product. The Snipe class, therefore, must find ways to raise the necessary funds for substantial promotional activities. In the "good old days," with fewer classes for sailors to choose from, the Snipe sold itself. However, in recent times the advertising and marketing blitz from the newer classes has been quite successful. This results in fewer new Snipes being sold and ultimately leads to well-established fleets folding, and fewer new sailors joining the class. Granted, the quality of our sailors in unsurpassed. The Snipe Class attracts many very talented sailors from the collegiate ranks, as well as from smaller dinghies such at the Optimist pram. Since large fleets enhance the enjoyment of sailing we must continue to promote the class

Several years ago, SCIRA U.S. established the Perpetual Fund to promote the class and assist Junior sailors qualifying for international events. The money donated to this fund (the principal) cannot be spent, but the interest income can. Sadly, I must report that the fund is still too small to justify the distribution of funds. Conceptually the idea is sound but the funding has been a problem. John



Johns proposed a new dues structure that was outlined in the U.S. member's February *Snipe Bulletin*, and it is our hope that U.S. Snipers will upgrade their membership status as a way of supporting the fund. Other fund-raising ideas are being discussed.

If you have any ideas or expertise in fund raising please share your thoughts with either myself or Don Hackbarth. Don is a new member of the Board of Governors and he has volunteered to design a marketing plan to promote the Snipe, which we hope will inspire the membership to contribute to the Perpetual Fund. As your Commodore, I ask all U.S. Snipers to support these efforts to ensure the future success of our class.

If it can be demonstrated that this fund is capable of successfully generating enough revenue to provide substantial benefits to the class, then other Snipe nations should consider a similar fund. Perhaps we need a SCIRA fund to assist the efforts of European General Secretary John Broughton, Western Hemisphere Secretary Alberto Carluccio and others that work diligently to promote the Snipe in nations with fledgling fleets or no current Snipe activity.

Occasionally I hear about the efforts of some of our members to promote Snipe sailing. Finland's National Secretary, Roger Nylund, and other Finnish sailors organized an exhibit for the Helsinki Boat Show in February. Here in the U.S., Darryl and Susan Waskow worked very diligently to make certain that the Snipe Class was superbly represented at Sail Expo 93 in Atlantic City. I want to thank everyone that gives of their time to help SCIRA promote the Snipe in their local areas. Without this type of enthusiasm SCIRA would be unable to continue the strong leadership role that we currently have within organized sailing.

#### SANTOS AND SILVAS TAKE MASTER'S WORLDS

Eds. note: This is the first (and only) report that we've received on this event. Let's call it "Team Finland's Masters Report."

It's a long way from Finland to Portugal, but the prospect of facing another long, dark, Finnish winter was enough for Claus Carpelan, Freddy Wegelius and I to make the trip for one last dose of warm air and sunshine. It was my intention to have former Finnish Champion Carl-Christian Trapp as my crew, but a couple of weeks before the regatta his hog prevented him from making the trip. I sent a fax to Vilamoura and asked if the club could find me a crew. While "Clapa" and Freddy chose to fly down, I made the trip alone in the car. I took the ferry from Helsinki to Travemunde, Germany, and then had a three-day drive. I arrived on Saturday and the event was scheduled to start on Thursday so we had plenty of time for sightseeing, rigging and tuning, and practice sailing.

This was my third visit to Vilamoura. At this time of the year (October) the worst tourist boom is over, so most of the restaurants were not very crowded in the evenings. We usually started with some bottles of wine, cheese and crackers at our hotel which was just a few steps from the big marina and Clube Internacional da Marina de Vilamoura.

The official events started on the social side with a cocktail party on Tuesday eve-

ning. I had the pleasure to meet several friends from the 1990 World Masters in Spain, including, among others, Carlos Wanderley, Bibi Juetz and Eduardo Freire from Brasil, John and Jo Broughton and John Love and wife, from England.

Unfortunately, my crew was unable to sail, so I met my crew, Jose Leandro, about an hour before Wednesday morning's first race. Luckily the weather was nice, so Jose had the chance to get used to the boat in easy conditions. Three Brasilian teams, led by Carlos Wanderley, topped the first race, followed by the Americans, Jerry Thompson and crew, Sherry Eldridge.

That night the Opening Ceremonies and dinner were held at the Vilamoura Marinotel. Two races were sailed on Thursday with Domingos Borralho and Jose Filipe from Portugal finishing first and Thompson second in the first race and Brasilians Paulo Santos and Fernando Silva winning the second race. They were followed by Antonio Roquette and Luis Pessanha in second. Clapa and Freddy got their Snipe swinging well and posted a fifth and a third. I had some time near the front of the fleet in the second race, but dropped to 12th at the line. That evening the program included dinner at one of the many local golf clubs followed by a visit to a local music club where the party continued.

Only one race was scheduled for Friday

and Jerry Thompson, Paulo Santos, and Clapa were 1-2-3, after some very tight competition. This was followed by another great evening with a barbecue at the Ampalius Hotel with entertainment provided by local musicians and dancers.

The final race was sailed on Saturday, and Wanderley became the only winner of two races as he finished just ahead of Carpelan and Santos.

The Awards Banquet was held at the Casino de Vilamoura with dinner, prize giving and a floor show. A warm thank you goes to the staff at CIMAV. Great memories are made of Snipe events such as this one. It was great from start to finish.

Now that the event was over I faced the 3400-kilometer (2,000 miles) return drive to Finland, and looking back I can say that I would not do it alone. Back in Helsinki it was -10 degrees centigrade and snowy. At least I had great memories of the beautiful Algarve and warm thoughts of the great Portuguese hospitality as I stopped to put the snow tires on my van.

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#### LENCE AND ROUSMANIERE TAKE U.S. MASTERS

Dave Lence and crew, Jennifer Rousmaniere, of the Winchester Boat Club won the 1992 U.S. Masters overall title by 1/4-point over Past Commodore Jerry Thompson. Norm Towle was a close third and Past Commodore Doug DeSouza fourth, in the event sailed on the beautiful "Big" Mystic Lake.

In the "Grand" Masters division it was Ken and Bill Simons of Privateer taking the title, while Carlos Wanderley of Brasil, with crew Nancy Coutts, won the "Masters" division.

The event, hosted by the joint efforts of Winchester Fleet 077 and the Medford Boat Club's Fleet 777, saw 34 entries with ten SCIRA Past Commodores among the entries from Bermuda, Brasil, Canada and various parts of the U.S. They relaxed, dined, sailed and socialized daily under the typically blue autumn skies of New England.

After Saturday's registration, rigging, and a "would-be" tune-up race, the competitors enjoyed a cocktail party hosted by Winchester Boat Club's Commodore, Berta Swanson at her (and Past Commodore, Ralph's) home. A New England clam and lobster bake followed at the WBC.

Sunday morning got off to a great start with a delightful brunch hosted by WBC Vice-Commodore Steve Boodakian and his "Galley Crew." Since there was no wind, there was plenty of time for socializing around the pooldeck. After wailing patiently for the late afternoon sea breeze to hit the lakes, Race Committee Chair-

man "Bert" and her able crew managed to get off one light-air race. Dave Lence showed the way in the Red and Yellow fleet, while Thompson did the same in the Green and Black fleet. The evening featured a keg, followed by a great steak cook-out dinner hosted by Medford Boat Club

On Monday the sailors were greeted by another beautiful autumn day. Another

super brunch and more time for swimming and pool-side chats highlighted the morning. This was followed by three races sailed in moderate winds. Lence and Simons won the first, Lence and Thompson the second, and Sherman and Towle the third. After a keg at MBC, the sailors had a free evening on the town.

So much fun and fellowship was enjoyed by all of the contestants, by the cochairmen, Ralph Swanson and Jim Fraser, and the many people who pitched in to make this event a memorable one, that all agreed to meet again in Chattanooga at the 1993 U.S. Masters. #### SNIPE A HIT AT SAIL EXPO

Many thanks to Darryl and Susan Waskow, Andy Pimental of JibeTech Boats, District Governor Hal Gilreath, and everyone in District One who helped SCIRA U.S. be a part of the Sail Expo 93.

On February 4-7, District One sailors displayed a Snipe at Sail Expo, a new boat show in Atlantic City, New Jersey. This big event featured "Jay Hawk" (an America's Cup Boat), an indoor sailing pool, and many lectures and seminars.

There was also a good mix of One Designs, which are often missing from boat shows. Classes near our booth included the Thistle, International 14, Flying Scot, Comet, and International 210. We shared our booth with the Lightning Class and met a good group of Lighting sailors from Metedeconk River Yacht Club.

Our Jibe-Tech boat had an airbrushed blue deck and neon control lines; nothing like a bit of color to stand out in a sea of white, although we were not quite as loud as the red and orange flames on the International 14 One Design.

Hundreds of people walked by the boat and we gave out 200 packets of information. Thanks to Hal Gilreath and Peter Fenner, we had information from every district. If people asked about Snipe sailing in any part of the country, we were able to offer them a schedule and the name of a contact in their area.

Popular reactions included, "That does not look like the Snipe I used to sail" and "What do all those lines do?". A number of racers who did understand all those lines took detailed notes.

Our display came off very well because we had an attractive boat, posters from events worldwide, and a detailed information packet. Our focused presentation was able to convey the strength of SCIRA as a class organization, and this strength can distinguish our boat from the other choices available.

We who focus on the Snipe may forget the many choices available for the prospective sailor. At least 15 two-person racers/ daysailers were on display at the Expo.

Phil Richmond and Susan Taylor came up from Annapolis to help run our booth. Andy Pimental brought the boat down from Newport, and local sailors Darryl and Susan Waskow, Rick and Tammy Kirby, and Mark Beaton all helped out. Darryl's other brother, Steve, and even his mom, Gerry, were also roped in ("volunteered") to help.

Some Snipers have "real jobs" in the sailing industry, and many were on hand in their company's booths, including Sue Kaufman, Alex Stout, Margaret and Steve Podlich, PJ Schaffer, and Rob and Lisa Emmet.

Among the visitors to our booth were Buddy Melges, Gary Jobson, Gary Hoyt, and Greg Fisher. Gerard Coleman gave a seminar on upwind sailing, and although introduced as a Soling sailor, he stopped by our booth to talk about his Snipe. Other Snipers in the crowd included John Marx, Bob Coyle, Jason Huggins and his dad, Jim. Many people said that they grew up sailing on Snipes or learned to sail in Snipes.

Sail Expo 93 was very beneficial for our class, as many people saw the boat and were introduced to SCIRA. One New Jersey sailor in attendance has already decided to buy a Snipe, which will certainly help our local fleet. Although it is too early to judge the full impact of the event, this kind of promotion is important for the class. If we are going to continue to grow we must continue to find ways to introduce the Snipe to prospective sailors.





#### **BRITISH CHAMPIONS WIN** BELGIAN NATIONALS

Lake Galganwcel was the venue for the Snipe Belgian national championship. Held in Antwerp on October 3rd and 4th, with three British boats competing, the event was won by the defending champions, Peter Wolstenholme and Alan William from the U.K.

The racing on Saturday was held in a shifting Force 2-3, and was close in the first race with the first four boats finishing within yards of each other. It was won by Jan Vermant, with Erwin Everaert second and Jules Wagemans third. Wolstenholme sorted out the conditions and won the second race, followed by Everaert and Vermant.

By Sunday morning the wind had increased to Force 5-6 and gusting. The conditions were difficult as the wind was shifting; everyone capsized at least once except the crew of Alex Schoenmakers/Van den Brande. The third race was won by Wim Ghijs; Wolstenholme was second and Everaert third. With the increasing wind the fleet was diminishing, with competitors preferring the comfort of the bank. The fourth race was won by Everaert; Vermant and Ghijs were second and third.

Wolstenholme saw victory again in the fifth race, with Ghijs second. David and Liz Crouch came through the fleet to take third place. The overall winner had still to be decided by the last race. Ghijs took the lead and stayed there, while Wolstenholme battled his way to second, with Everaert third. This result gave Wolstenholme and Williams the title once again.
