They were used in winning the 1969, '70 and '71 U.S. Nationals. In '71 they were 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th.


They were used by the winners of the last 2 Jr. Nationals, in '71 they were 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th.

They were used by the 1970 and '71 North American Champ (Cork).

They were 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th in the 1971 Midwinter Circuit (Nassau, Miami and Clearwater).

In 1972 we are introducing the Cobra Boom. It is very light and provides the stiffness required to keep the leech of the main tight on a reach. Bendy booms waste power.

Can you buy one set of sails to cover all racing conditions? Yes if it's an Elms. The new sails that we have been manufacturing the last part of 1971 have proved to be excellent all weather sails. Our 1971 No. 1 model seemed to get faster as the wind increased, so we went to work on it and tried to improve it's light air performance.

We were able to make them considerably faster in light air without hurting the medium and heavy air performance.

The proof comes from the World Championship in Brazil. The conditions were from 45 MPH down to a vacuum. Elms Sails consistently were the best, winning 5 of the seven races and getting 5 of the seven seconds. The over all performance for us was 1st, 3rd and 4th. The second boat used a combination of two sailmakers, main by one, jib by another.

This last year we also got our 5th straight U.S. National Championship. Together with a 4th showing, made our sails the most consistent there. This regatta was very light.

The Juniors had wind up to 20. Elms Sails got 1st, 2nd and 4th.

The Nassau Midwinters were heavy. Elms Sails got 7 straight firsts, capturing 1st and 2nd in the championship.

These sails were all 1971 No. 1's except for the 3 boats that did well in the Worlds. They had 1972 models. Their performance would warrant you buying the new all purpose Elms Sails in 1972.

We are calling them the 1972 No. 1.

Belgium's Copper Cup Won by Jan Persson

Jan Persson, Denmark, with 13.7 points, was first among the forty three entries from 7 countries competing for Belgium's Copper Cup in the 19th annual regatta at the North Sea Yacht Club, Ostend, in May.

Sweden's Krafft brothers were second with 24 points and Spain took 3rd and fourth places. Zendrera of Club Vela Blanes was 3rd with 27 points and Arturo Delgado, European Vice-Secretary for SCIRA, of Club Nautico Madrid was 4th with 29 points. Graux of HOYC, Belgium, had the host country's best finish with 35.7 to round out the top 5.

Simdinglarsen of Oslo, Norway was 6th. La Roye, Meyvis, Lachappell and DeBock, all of Belgium were 7th, 8th, 9th, and 10th in order.

THE COMMODORE SAYS

This is being composed high above the North Atlantic while Bert and I are en route home after three fantastic weeks of visiting with Snipe sailors and relatives in many areas of Sweden.

Soon after arriving in Copenhagen, we had a pleasant train ride to Espergaerde where we had an opportunity to spend an afternoon with Nils Toftgaard-Hansen, and to observe many Snipes (including a new one for me) in various stages of building.

Two days later we were in Landskrona, Sweden for our first regatta. The Snipe sailors who came from all Scandinavia to compete were truly an enthusiastic group and it was a pleasure meeting them. The warmth and hospitality of the yacht club members and sailors was most gratifying. The race committee was excellent and the available safety boats were more than adequate. Because of extremely high winds it was impossible to sail more than one race in this regatta. My admiration for these sailors is boundless, because they had had not only high winds but bitter, bitter cold air and water temperatures to contend with during this time.

From Landskrona, a young Snipe sailor, Christer Danehammer, double-decked my Snipe to Hjo on Lake Vatten in the middle of Sweden for the Midsommar Regatta which took place two weeks later. Here again, the people and sailors of Hio outdid themselves in their kindnesses to us. Lake Vatten was a beautiful lake and the weather had turned warm, with cloudless (and windless) skies. The welcoming committee pointed out that this was the first time at Hjo that the United States flag had flown, and it was quite a thrill to see it flying with the flags of the other competing countries. In Hjo, we were plagued by the opposite of Landskrona, that is, no wind at all. Several races were started and then called because of time. Again, only one race was finally sailed in this regatta. Even with the problem of weather in both places, the enthusiasm of the sailors never lessened. (Incidentally, if any of you decide to visit Sweden for sailing and pleasure, be sure to go during the

Midsummer Festival time and the time of the Midnight Sun. Both are great!)

Will also say, in our travels around, it certainly helped to have Bert fluent in Swedish.We even had a few chuckles when people weren't aware that she really did understand the language.

From Hjo, it was down to Karlskrona for two days of relaxation at Rear Commodore Svend's lovely home overlooking the water. We had a chance to see the breathtaking beauty of the Karlskrona archipelago while touring in Svend's power boat.

We enjoyed a great evening out in Stockholm with Per and Mats Gothlin in Stockholm. We first met them when they were representing Sweden at the World's in Rio. It's worth a trip to Stockholm to see the Wasa Museum. The Wasa is that magnificent warship of all times, built for the King of Sweden in 1628. She sank on her maiden voyage after ten minutes of sailing, and has been lying on the bottom of Stockholm's harbor until twelve years ago when salvage operations were started and she finally floated into the dock herself. The job of reconstruction is unbelievable

With the Danish Snipe builder producing about one boat per day, Snipes certainly are enjoying an evolution in Scandinavia. The sailors there are all eager to represent their respective countries at the World's and there are many qualifying regattas for these positions.

I am already looking forward to the time when I can go back to sail in Scandinavia again, and want each sailor there to know that he is most welcome to visit and to sail with us here in the States.

"Tack sa mycket" to each and every one of you who made this such a successful trip for us!

For The Love Of Sailing

Sailors are crazy. Absolutely, wig-flippingly out of their minds! For instance, how comfortable can you be outside in 45 to 55 degrees, rain ranging from mist to downpour, even in your 'keep drys.' Now imagine yourself padded and bulked with the keep dry layer, plus a life jacket, and trying to move efficiently about a bobbing, bouncing bit of boat. Why do people do it?

For instance, the problem of juggling an active schedule containing demands of jobs and many other interests, in order to clear time for sailing. Risking family harmony to do it, too. Have you ever heard this phrase? "Do we have to race every weekend?"

Why do some people tow their boats to a lake through mud deep enough to get really stuck, and spend hours getting help to get out of the mudhole, and never even get the boat in the water?

Or sit on the centerboard of a capsized boat and wait and wait and wait until help arrives to pull the mast out of the muddy bottom? Or spend two lovely sunny breezy days working on equipment changes and repairs and then find when they do launch that the jib halyard parts, or the bailer leaks again. Why?

Well, if you've been in any or all of these situations, and then some other perfect day, taken your boat out with a good companion and had the kind of sail you dream about all winter, you know why.

For love of sailing. And judging from the number of other devotees out on the lake this perfect day, you are not alone in your conviction that it is worth the candle. Ruth Bockelmann Fleet 309, Omaha

THOUGHTS WHILE SAILING

What makes a boat go fast? Obviously, the skipper and crew. However, we cannot subject these go-fasts to measurement rules so we have to confine our discussions to equipment. Some boats are faster than others – even when they are equally equipped and are made by the same manufacturer. Why? Nobody really knows for sure. Or perhaps everybody knows for sure!

In any case, the latest theory is what is called moment-of-inertia. If weight is concentrated in the middle, a boat will not pitch as much or as long as one which has the same total weight more evenly spread. The force of the wind will make the boat go forward and not be dissipated in up and down motion. Ever been hit by a motor boat wake? We must conclude that the moment-of-inertia theory does have some validity. The question is: How much?

There are many who feel that it is very important. Some cruising boat skippers go as far as to prohibit putting sails that are not being used anywhere but in the middle of the boat. Rod Stephens says that the big difference between stock and custom boats is the weight in the ends.

How about small boats? The Finn class feels strongly enough about it to put a moment-of-inertia measurement in their rules. A similar rule has been proposed in the Star class. And it is being studied by our newly-appointed Rules Study Committee.

Whether anything like this will ever be adopted by the Snipe Class is dependent on many things. For one thing, can a measurement of this sort be made practical? Could a jig be designed to produce uniform measurements without being extremely complicated and expensive? Could a number of jigs be made that would produce uniform measurements? These are some of the questions that are being studied and the answers could be most interesting.

November 1 Set for Rule Book Deadline

It seems funny to be thinking about next year – right here in the middle of this year. However, planning is necessary. We are going to try to get the 1974-1975 Rule Book printed and ready to send out when dues start coming in next January. In order to do this we must set a deadline of November 1, 1973. Revising a Rule Book takes a vast amount of work and time. Just to change names and addresses and add regatta winners involves many pages. The type has to be set, a proof run, the proof checked, then the finished product printed and bound. It takes nearly three months from start to finish. What this means to you is that in order to show fleet captains, district governors, regatta winners, etc. correctly, we must have this information by November 1. I am sure that many fleets do not even think about electing a captain until the start of the racing season but this will be too late for the Rule Book. We suggest that every attempt be made to have your elections at the end of this season. You will probably find the continuity of fleet activities will be enhanced as well as having the correct information in the Rule Book.






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Drifting conditions prevailed at start of one of the North-South Regatta races.

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








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Tillman Takes 'Star Studded' Southern Snipe Championship

The registration list for Privateer Yacht Club's 22nd annual "Southern" Regatta read like Who's Who in Snipe Sailing. Winner of the two day event was Major Dick Tillman. His Daughter Laurie was his crew. Runner up was Buzz Lamb, and Wife Marge (secretary's secretary) sailing his aged wooden hull "Fiddle Paddle." In third place was Earl Elms.

Other celebrities whose scores we will not mention included Ted Wells, and Commodore Ralph Swanson, and wife Berta.

The 70 boat fleet was divided into two groups, the "Stars" and the "Bars" for the Confederate Battle Flag, You all.

The "Bars" division was won by a sister team of Sue and Chris Mitchell from Clearwater, Fl. Sue also received the award for the best junior sailor in the regatta. Second place went to Mike Craig and Charles McQuilken of the home fleet. Delkin Jones and his wife Helen took third place honors.

The air was light and shifty. TVA had high water with gates open at the dam, which added more river current than normally experienced in lake sailing. In the "Stars", Tillman won the first race and was second to Bill Simons in the second race. Buzz Lamb came through with a victory in the very light air third race. Earl Elms stayed close behind all the way for a second. This pulled both skippers into a 2-3 final standing.

In the "Bars" the first place finishes were recorded by Delkin Jones in the first race, Sue Mitchell in the second race and Mike Craig in the final race.

The light and variable winds saw many "top notch" sailors far back in the pack. To save embarassment we have only listed the top 15 boats. The 43 boat "Star" division also included names like Seavy, Wells, Hite, Timm, McFadden, Williams, Davis and Swanson, not necessarily in that order.

This was undoubtedly the finest "Southern" Regatta in its 22 year history. The members of PYC are proud and greatly honored to have attracted such outstanding sailing talent from such long distances.

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

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



Rules Review


Rule 42.2 (b) is new this year and has been subject to some misinterpretations at recent regattas.

The purpose of this rule is to prevent an unfair penalty against a starboard tack boat, minding its own business and approaching the windward mark when the situation sketched below occurs.



The port tack boat P has crossed ahead of the starboard tack boat S, tacking far enough away so that it completes its tack at position P2 without interfering with S, and incidentally is just inside the two length circle. S is of course going faster than P, and under a rigid interpretation of the old rule – it would be too late to establish an overlap on P, forcing S to luff up sharply to go outside of P or to jibe out of the way if he didn't think about luffing soon enough.

Some people have mistakenly read into this paragraph the privilege of tacking from port to starboard within two lengths of the mark without regard to rule 41. Approaching a windward mark on port tack, close to the mark is still living dangerously if there are starboard tackers around. Tacking under a starboard tack boat and claiming room at the windward mark can be done only if the erstwhile port tacker completes his tack far enough away (either ahead or to leeward) from the starboard boat so it does not need to begin to alter course to keep clear until the tack is complete.



At this point - look up the definition of tacking. On a windward leg, the tack is finished when the tacking boat is on a close hauled course. (Read definition of close hauled) The crew can be standing on the jib sheets and the main can be flapping in the breeze without relevance to who has right of way over whom.

Rule 67 is brand new and I haven't heard of its being applied yet. I've seen a lot of 720's being done which may be why. The protest committee at the Nationals in 1970 must have been anticipating this rule when they disqualified Jim Hoyt because he did not protest a port boat which inadvertently interfered with him when he was on a starboard tack in a drifter, but I think they would still be wrong under Rule 67, sub paragraph 3.
