




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
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

Choquette Wins Otto Wiesener Memorial

The 39th Annual Tulsa Spring Opener was held on May 22 and 23. Sequoyah Yacht Club proudly sponsored the event on Lake Yahola just north of Tulsa, Oklahoma.

Mike Choquette, the 1975 defending champion, was awarded the Otto Wiesener Memorial Trophy for another year. Individual oil paintings depicting different Snipe sailing scenes were awarded to the top five skippers and their crews. First place went to Mike and Barbara Choquette of Tulsa, second place went to Scott and Rachel DeArman of Tulsa, Bill and Tracy Culp of Fort Smith, Arkansas took third, Dick Kersey and his crew Harry Livingston of Wichita, Kansas were awarded fourth place and Bruce and Irene Hurst of Tulsa took fifth place.

Saturday's races got underway in an unusually steady wind which averaged 10 to 12 mph. Three triangles and a windward-leeward-windward made up the

course. Bill Culp took an early lead and held it safely in the first race. Bruce Hurst and Dick Kersey fought for second about 15 boat lengths behind Culp with Hurst finishing ahead of Kersey. The wind remained steady for the second race in which Mike Choquette, Scott DeArman and Bill Culp finished a close first, second and third.

Sunday's races started a bit slowly as the race committee searched for a steady wind direction. They finally set a course to starboard which they later had to shorten because of diminishing winds.

The shifting breezes spirited Mike Choquette across the finish line first. Scott DeArman was just behind him with Dick Kersey following up in third place.

The Sequoyah Yacht Club was happy to have Ted Wells present in the competition. Ted and his crew Betty Danahey took sixth place overall.

BERMUDA'S SIMMONS CAPTURES RACE WEEK CROWN

Colyer, Belvin follow in 350th Anniversary Trophy Regatta at Bermuda.

Bermuda's Olympic duo, Penny Simmons and Larry Lindo, took a brief respite from their 470 training to capture the Snipe's 350th Anniversary Trophy in their usual skillful style.

Rear Commodore Bruce Colyer took second place with 15 1/2 points while Bermudian Dickie Belvin followed a close third with 17 3/4 points.

The Snipe Class once again dominated Race Week (April 25-May 1) in quality as well as quantity. Ten top American skippers competed against 9 of Bermuda's best in the international event. They raced in some of the finest and most diverse conditions Race Week has had to offer.

The week took off in fine style Monday afternoon as 22-knot winds chased 17 Snipes around the course. Local knowledge is not always a good thing — as some of the Bermudians unhappily discovered. In their haste to turn the mark, Simmons et. al., went for the International One Design mark

located 1/4 mile beyond their own. Sea Cliff skipper Dana Schnipper took advantage of a great situation and raced along to victory. Penny Simmons tried in vain to recoup the lost yardage and finished second with Bermudians Wayne Soares and Dickie Belvin third and fourth.

Rising winds whipped the sea into foaming crests in the Second Race. In the hopes of easing weather conditions or a cancellation, Snipe sailors hovered around the boat club. When neither came, fifteen Snipes reluctantly sailed through the angry seas to the start as the darkening sky opened with gusto.

It was soon obvious that this race would be dominated by a handful of skippers as the hardy little boats fought to survive.

Dickie Belvin tackled wind and pelting rain with some fine sailing to finish first. Fred Thurston (Annapolis) made up for his disappointing 7th place Monday with a second. Penny Simmons placed third while Wayne Soares remained in fourth. Dana Schnipper, temporarily the 1st place contender, finished lower in the fleet.

Conditions improved considerably for the Third and Fourth Races as skies cleared and the wind dropped to a reasonable 18-20 knots. Simmons finished first, while Colyer, Thurston and Wayne Soares finished within 10 seconds of each other.

In the Fourth Race, Wednesday afternoon, Belvin gained the lead on the first leg with Colyer, Wayne Soares and Simmons close in his wake. Thurston and Eric Purdon (Annapolis) tacked to the starboard side of the course. At the first mark, Thurston took a good lead, with Simmons 2nd, Fritz Gram (Cuba Lake) 3rd, Belvin 4th and Colyer 5th. On the windward leg, Thurston increased his lead and Colyer sailed through Simmons for 2nd.

The reaching mark was the waterloo (Continued on page 6)

for Thurston when he capsized to windward, losing his lead and damaging a few fingers on the bailer, forcing him to withdraw from the race.

Colyer breezed by the disaster to grab the lead, followed by Simmons. Some of the closest competition of race week occurred on the final stretch as Simmons and Colyer battled it out tack for tack while Belvin threatened to leeward. Meanwhile, Fritz Gram came up on leeward to take Belvin. At the height of the competition, Colyer got an unexpected lift to victory with Simmons just seconds behind him. Gram finished a close third with Belvin 4th.

The wind dropped slightly to a comfortable 10-14 knots under bright sunny skies for the Fifth Race. Simmons gained an early advantage and gradually lengthened his lead around the triangle.

The battle continued as the threat of squalls loomed in the background. Simmons rounded the 3rd mark 1 min. 40 sec. ahead of Pitman, with W. Soares, Colyer, Fritz Gram and Belvin close behind. Pitman took what looked like a flyer and pulled back into 2nd place to shorten Simmons' lead. Colyer powered through W. Soares and Pitman and rounded the mark 1 min. 50 sec behind Simmons.

Simmons again opened up a lead on Colyer, only to lose seconds at the finish line to cross 1 min. 45 sec. ahead of his competition. Pitman followed in 3rd with W. Soares 4th and Gram 5th.

Race Week closed out gently with 5-8 knot winds and warm sunshine in the Sixth Race. Simmons and his stalwart crew, assured of Race Week victory, retired from the day's sailing to watch the battle for 2nd place.

At the leeward mark, Colyer was 15 seconds ahead of Thurston. W. Soares moved into 3rd place, Belvin into 4th and Former Commodore Swanson 5th. Positions changed again on the final stretch as Belvin pressured W. Soares. Swanson split tacks with W. Soares and Belvin and caught Thurston and Colyer. Colyer broke the 3-way tie for second place with his victory. Thurston and Swanson slid across the line together. But Thurston, bandaged fingers and all, was


disqualified for his early start. Belvin moved into 3rd and W. Soares into 4th place. Behind them, the rest of the fleet spread out in their separate little contests as the wind dropped to near drifter conditions.

On land, festivities flourished — with numerous cocktail parties, dinners and a bar-b-que — a remarkable testimony to the fine planning, cooperation and organizational talents of the Snipe sailors of the Spanish Point Boat Club. Exceptional racing conditions and the warm reception from the gracious hosts makes Race Week an event that shouldn't be missed. Certainly it should be the highlight of every Snipe sailor's racing year!

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You'll Remember the Middlefork Opener!

The first weekend in May brings out the Snipes and puts them in Richmond, Indiana. Middlefork Reservoir, a small lake which usually tests the talents of sailors by providing shifty, swirling, drifting conditions, held some surprises for this year's participants. This was the kind of regatta that you remember.

Paul Hemker, noted FJ and FD sailor, set the triangle with a beat into the prevailing westerlies of 6 to 8 knots. The 33 Snipers concentrated on tactics, pointing, and boat speed with the wind holding reasonably steady with the shifts coming in cycles.

Leaders at the end of Saturday's three races were Bill Buckles, Bob Rowland, and Don Hite in A Fleet and George Howell, Larry Best, and Chuck Vreeland in B Fleet.

Sunday was a different story — just ask the survivors. The wind was out of the southwest where it's supposed to be. The velocity was 15 to 18 knots, but the 30 knot gusts made it seem much stronger and building. The X course provided a good beat, a port rounding, a short reach, a port rounding, and then the fun began. The run provided all starters with one of the wildest rides ever at Middlefork. Many boats planed almost the entire run and at the end tried to decide how to slow down enough to

on seeing Bud and Buddy Leonard capsize for the third or fourth time did the only proper thing. He capsized as he was about to reach the docks.


The fifth race was cancelled as it was felt the repair of bent masts, torn sails, broken rudders and tillers would take too long.

Start of Sunday's action at the Middlefork Opener. Jim Burdett photo.



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
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Lenhart Edges Nute for District VI Victory

It all began early Saturday morning, June 12th, with Tom Nute manning his trusty scale at the Alamitos Bay Yacht Club hoist. One by one, boats were weighed and sails measured. Tom got a little excited when at the 10:30 skippers' meeting it was announced there would be an 11:30 start. Seems that Tom had been so busy weighing boats he hadn't gotten his own boat in the water; and, you can figure on about 40 minutes to sail to the starting line. But a sympathetic race committee postponed the race to 12:00 to make sure all 24 boats would be there for the start.

The first race got underway with a nice breeze out of the west, and a huge tanker anchored right in the middle of the first windward leg. By the start of the second race the wind had swung around to its typical northwest direction at about 12 knots. Tom Nute really seemed to have it all together as he won both of the first two races. But there was another race to go - and Jeff, with a 3rd and a 4th, was ready to try something new - a different sail, of course! And so up went the sail, off went the gun, and guess who won? And so Saturday drew to a close with Tom in 1st with 5.7 points, Lou Bedford in second with 11.7, Jeff in third with 13.7 and the stubborn tanker still in the middle of the course.

Sunday was a beautiful day. The sun was out, the tanker was gone, and the wind was perfect, blowing out of the southwest at about 8 knots. And it was to be a beautiful day for Jeff, who won the first race with Tom placing third. The second and final race was to determine the Championship. Tom led Jeff at the first weather mark; however, on the downwind leg, Jeff managed to get by Tom and beat him to the leeward mark. Try as he could, Tom couldn't catch Jeff on the final weather leg. The race ended with Cutty Linsky (a newcomer to the Snipe Class) first, Jeff 2nd, and Tom 3rd. Thus ended another great district VI championship with Jeff winning over Tom by four tenths of a point. Lou Bedford placed third, Cutty Linsky fourth, and Craig Martin, fifth.

While the championship war was being fought, another battle was in process among our B fleet. It really wasn't much of a contest however, with Bob Jackman sailing to a perfect five win victory. Congratulations - Bob! Wally Jewel placed second with five straight seconds.

Uruguay's Pastori **Upsets Brazilians in** South Atlantic Championship

The 7th South Atlantic Snipe Championship was held at Yacht Club Uruguavo, Montevideo, Uruguav, April 9-16. Brazil sent 9 Snipes, Argentina 3, and 18 boats competed from Uruguay. For the first time in its history, it was won by a non-Brazilian boat, U 20335, Horacio Garcia Pastori, and Felix Leborgne. The next three places were occupied by Brazil; Altmayer, P. Paradeda, and Piccolo, and the next three by Argentina; Pereira, Sisti, and Labandeira.

After a tune up race won by Altmayer (he only finished second!), the championship began on Monday morning with a 5 knot wind from the shore. Wilson Pereira won practically from the start, with Garcia Pastori, Piccolo, Thode and Sisti following.

The second race was started after lunch, and the wind died with Altmayer in the lead when the time ran out.

Tuesday morning came and no wind. The second race could be started in the early afternoon, with a 5 knot wind, and was won by Altmayer, with Garcia Pastori, Paradeda, Camps, and Piccolo completing the five first places.

We dnesday offered better winds, 12-14 knots from the shore, and the two races scheduled could be run. The third was won by Pereira, with his compatriot Sisti second, Caiuby third, Piccolo 4th and Garra 5th. The fourth was won by Garcia Pastori, Altmayer, Paradeda, Grussner and Borges following.

Thursday morning showed a change of weather, the wind coming from the sea with 15 knots and good waves. The fifth race was won by Labandeira, with Paradeda, Sisti, Alymayer and Thode in the next places. In the sixth race, run in the afternoon in similar conditions, Altmayer won followed by Paradeda, Garcia Pastori, Borges and Teixeira.

On Friday, the weather was worse and no races could be run. The seventh race had to be started before 1500 hours on

The 27th Brazilian National Championship took place at Sao Paulo — Guarapiranga with a record 101 competitors from 11 states of Brazil.

Marco Paradeda again proved that he is indeed a skillful sailor. Although the winds were fair, for the most part averaging 8 to 14 mph, there was enough variety of wind and weather to test not only each sailor's ability to survive a sudden howling tempest, but his patience in moments of dead calm to very light breezes. There was weather for every type of sailor, but the outstanding duels remained between Marco Paradeda and Gustao Altmeyer as they frequently swapped leads in the races. Although Claus Cordes never took a first, he was consistently near the head of the fleet which paid off. Consistency also paid off for Henrique Schmitz and George Paulino. Making themselves very evident throughout the series were Waldemir Bier and Paulo Paradeda, both of whom sailed excellent races even though they missed the top.

The first race started under optimum conditions, but winds increased to a steady 25 with much stronger gusts as a tempest suddenly roared across the lake

leaving little more than half of the fleet finishing. Because of equipment damage, the second race was postponed until the following day when all the boats were out again. All in all, the competition was very close with many exciting roundings at the various marks.

The entire week was very well organized and Clube de Campo do Castelo can be proud of putting on a fine championship with near perfect race courses, very good committees in all areas, and the "tops" in hospitality.

Besides the Pimentel Duarte Trophy for the National Champion, there were two new ones presented this year — the Flavio Caiuby Trophy for the winner of Group B, and the Jose Evaristo San Roman Trophy for the Junior Champion.


