Forty-one boats battle on Pensacola Bay Steve, Connie Suddath Are District IV Champs

Pensacola Yacht Club's Steve and Connie Suddath rode a four regatta winning streak to their first District 4 championship, winning the Seavy-Roberts Trophy over a 41-boat fleet on Pensacola Bay, Pensacola, Florida, June 5th and 6th. Steve and Connie's finishes of 1-2-6 netted them a 13 point advantage over Joe Blouin and Tommy Harris of the new Southern Yacht Club fleet, who had 6-4-4. Marc and Anne Duvoisin of Privateer Yacht Club were third; Gonzalo and Ana Diaz, Miami, 4th; and Means and Peggy Davis, Atlanta, finished 5th.

Tough competition and shifting winds and tides took their toll on the fleet, and only the top finishers avoided at least one disasterous race. Greg Gust got the hard luck award, having finished first in the last race, only to learn he had been disqualified for being over the line at the start.

The season's first threatened hurricane had died in the Gulf just the day before the races, leaving a good 10 to 15 mph wind for Saturday's two long races over the same Olympic course. Although the winds were shifty, the tides were the major factor in the first race. Lake sailors Means and Peggy Davis solved the tide first, getting to the windward mark with a huge lead. They were challenged by only one boat; and lost out to the invincible Steve and Connie, who finished first. The Davis team was second, and "Old Man" Gonzalo, with Ana, was third.

The second race had a definite port tack advantage on the start, with many

starboard boats trapped at the pin end, with no place to go. Southern Yacht Club's Danny Kileen was never challenged in that race, but Steve Suddath got a second, with John Potts of Southern Y.C. in third.

On Sunday, the start was delayed waiting for the wind to settle down, and the fleet had their only general recall, further delaying the race. The wind held out of the same direction as the day before for the start, but shifted and died as the race continued. Boats which failed to make the first mark in the first wave were left at the mercy of a dying wind and a foul tide. As the wind shifted, making the second beat into a one tack, close reach, the committee shifted the course, to make a new windward leg to the finish. Places changed with the shifting of the wind, and with Gust's disqualification, Marc Duvoisin, who had worked into second place became the winner, over his father Pete Duvoisin, in second, and fellow Privateer member Buzz Lamb in third.

Tarasa Davis of Atlanta Yacht Club repeated as winner of the District IV Junior Championship. Her crew was Bruce Davis. *Marge Lamb Privateer Fleet 142*

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The Lighter Side Of Keeping Score

Lou Joline introduces a new handicap system.

Again this year the national authorities that govern the sport of sailing have chosen to ignore my proposal for a five percent handicap advantage for those who sail with their spouse as crew. The authorities point to Earl Henthorn winner of the Star Class Championship in 1922 with his wife aboard. Careful research reveals however, that because of light air conditions the championship came down to a single race. In that race the 12 leading boats finished in the wrong direction. Henthorn who was busy disengaging his wife's hair from the main sheet block, inadvertently drifted over the finish line in the correct direction to win the race.

Other critics of my proposal claim that a five percent handicap is too inflexible; there are those who are only slightly affected, and there are those who are really hamstrung. To satisfy such criticism, I have developed a new handicap system which is directly related to the actual damage caused by the spouse during the course race. The tables below award various amounts of time for each occurrence of a listed incident: AT THE DOCK

- Drops jib shackle in lake -1 min. Drops sailbag in lake -3 min. Lets go of main halyard -4 min. Capsizes boat -5 min.
- AT THE 5 MINUTE GUN Left watch ashore - 30 sec Still eating breakfast - 3 min. Asleep in bed - 16 min.

AT THE STARTING GUN Fixing hair - 15 sec Talking to next boat - 20 sec Talking to skipper - 45 sec



WINDWARD LEG

- Discusses poor start -3 min. No mention of starboard tacker -3 min.
- Makes tactical suggestion 20 sec Skipper takes suggestion – 8 min. ROUNDING WINDWARD MARK

Asleep on deck – 1 min. Still fixing hair – 2 min. Sets pole on wrong side – 3 min. Breaks out beer while rounding – (-30 sec)

- ROUNDING LEE MARK Pole still up -30 sec Board still up -1 min. Jib sheet under bow -1 min.
- REDUCTION OF HANDICAP Pushes other boat away - (-30 sec) Pushes other boat back - (-20 sec) Gives other boat wrong course - (-30 sec)
- Works on strapless tan (-2 min) VARIOUS AND SUNDRY

Travel the regatta circuit without breaking your budget

Two can't live "as cheap as one" (as in the old argument for marriage); unless one of them doesn't eat. Neither can two boats go to a regatta as cheaply as one; but they can come closer. The following is a compilation of obvious advice for getting more mileage for the money.

TRAVELING

1) Double decking two (or three) boats; one goes on top of the van, and two on the trailer. McLaughlin's 5-boat trailer can take a whole fleet. This requires extra care in packing boats and equipment for each one, and requires extra muscle for packing and for unpacking at the regatta site.

2) As an alternative, take a smaller car for one boat. A Rabbit will pull a Snipe – slowly.

3) Slowly, as mentioned above is important. Fifty-five miles an hour saves gasoline as compared to seventy-five miles per hour. It can save time and money also, in avoiding the expense and time required for a speeding ticket.

HOUSING

1) Camping: many clubs throughout the U.S. (at least) allow camping on the club grounds during regattas. Where no camping is allowed at the club, there may be a nearby commercial campground. Be sure to take sleeping bags, pillows, air mattresses, etc.

2) Sleeping in the van is sometimes allowed even where no camping is allowed. Practice discretion here; ask the local fleet captain or regatta chairman if this is allowed.

3) Some clubs have limited housing available with fleet members. For this option you should ask in advance. Write or call the chairman listed in the sanctioned regatta section of the BULLETIN. He will let you know if housing is available. Again, take pillows and sleeping bags, as sometimes space is available to those who require only a place to throw a sleeping bag. Those who require private baths etc. are harder to fit in.

In all the above situations be discreet. Be quiet, polite, and police your own trash. You want to be invited back.

FOOD

1) Do take your own peanut butter, soft drinks, and beer. This takes care of lunch at the regatta, and munch on the road.

2) You don't have to sign up for the meal package that usually goes with the regatta registration, but it is nice to at least sign up for the Saturday night meal and party, featured at most regattas. The cost is usually as reasonable as the host fleet can make it; and if you are going to take advantage of the cocktail party food, it would be nice of you to pay for the meal.

3) Complimentary Sunday morning donuts and coffee are offered at many regattas. Enjoy, but don't pig out.

The starting lines were kept a little short on purpose. The format was accepted enthusiastically, and may be an alternative to the marathons we now run. Shorter courses, more starts, throw-outs, close tactics, variety of courses, and shorter lines all seem to sharpen one's sailing skills, and eventually give more people a chance to score well. In this regatta, only 10 points separated fourth through ninth places.

Bob and Glenda Blomquist came on Friday, toured the wineries, then concentrated on sailing the rest of the week-end. Guy Lovejoy from Keuka sailed well and garnered second place. Joel Zackin of Quassapaug, CT, finished third. Chuck Fox of Newport, NY, nabbed fourth, and Russ Cook nailed down fifth for Keuka.

The winds were moderate on Saturday, and shifty. On Sunday they went from very light to medium in the first race, to heavy in the second. Dave Haggart and Mike Schmidt were casualties in the last race.

Homemade soup and sandwiches were served at lunch time, and hors d'oeuvres and champagne punch followed by a steak roast capped a delightful day.

By the time the two survivors in the B Fleet rounded the final course buoy, the committee boat was back on station complete with a finish line. Chuck Bartsche and Pat Hicks took first and second in the B Fleet. The A Fleet race was protested successfully and the race was thrown out.

Two races on Sunday were sailed in a nice easy-going breeze which didn't scare

anyone and everyone stayed upright. Schmidt continued his winning ways for the perfect score with Phil Tanski of CYC and Hand leading the A Fleet. Hater, Bees and Bartsche led the B Fleet's third race.
