Also, we'll include the Rules for Sanctioned Regattas and/or the Rules for National and International Regattas. Be sure to ask for what you need!

All this for only \$15.00, which includes photocopy instructions for the scoring program. Contact the Snipe Office and remember: Be specific about disc sizes and formats!!!

They are currently buying used and new Snipes to be delivered to young sailors coming from the Optimist Class.

Carluccio also announced, in his official capacity as a member of the Executive Committee of PAYO (Pan American Yachting Organization), that the Snipe has been chosen for the 1994 South American Olympic Games in Uruguay, and for the 1995 Pan American Games in Argentina.

REPORT FROM EUROPE

As SCIRA Europe meets the halfway point in 1992, the status of the class throughout all eleven countries is still one of growth and enthusiasm. Taking into account the economic recession of the continent, one can only reflect and draw a firm conclusion of the strength and stronghold now established by the Class within the borders of so many countries allowing this

Also, to be understood, though I "helm the Euro ship," one must be appreciative that the strength, drive, and results come not from my office but from each individual National Secretary, along with the support and activity of the respective members. The seed of our collective growth stems from the fleets, for without their active race programs the Class would stagnate. I have always stressed the importance of fleet points racing to maintain a healthy, keen, and competitive following. An aggressive attitude to racing is the foundation of survival.

Euro International Regattas have been well-attended, commencing with the Spanish 50th Anniversary Celebration Regatta at Malaga, where highly respected Felix Gancedo celebrated his move into the Presidency of the Malaga Club along with the presentation gift of a Snipe.

Also in the south, both the San Remo and Princess Sophia Easter Championships drew crowds of Snipes from all nations, while in the north the Open and Invitational events saw congested starting lines.

By the time you read this report, the South Europeans, Scandinavian Championships, Junior Worlds, and European Championships will have been held. Judging from initial reports, each series should be marked by heavy turnouts and great competition, a factor that SCIRA Europe can be proud of. European Snipe builders are also experiencing a profitable and expanding period. Just as this is good for the builders, it also provides Snipe sailors with an expanding list of choices and options when it comes time to buy a new boat, and happy builders means good promotion of the Snipe on their part, which leads to expanded membership!

I have just returned from the French Nationals, where I experienced a show of great hospitality towards our visiting Russian Snipe crews. Accepting the French invitation, the Russians flew into Paris and were then escorted to Le Havre and hosted by the local fleet, given the use of a car, and set up with top-flight boats. They repaid their hosts by taking fifth and sixth overall! These excellent results were rewarded with great acclamation. Such attitude and generosity from one SCIRA nation to another is the secret of Euro growth. At regattas, one stands with pride under one's individual national flag, but, flying high and large above all our massed banners is the binding force...the SCIRA flag of friendship.







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PARADEDAS TAKE SOUTH AMERICANS

Forty-four crews took part in the 14th edition of the South American Championships, organized the Yacht Club Punta del Este, Uruguay; 16 were from Uruguay, 16 from Brasil, 11 from Argentina, and one from Paraguay.

As the event got underway, the teams struggled to survive the strong violence of the wind and waves, but conditions moderated as the event progressed, finishing with pleasant navigation in light breezes.

Race one started with anemometers showing terrific figures, but just under the fatal limits allowed by regulations. After a good start the fleet spread out along the Punta de Este Bay as everyone seemed to have his own theory about the best way to reach the weather mark in the lead. Brasilian Marco A. Paradeda and his crew/ son, Alexandre, chose the correct path and arrived at the orange buoy in the lead feeling the breath of George Nehm and F. Krahe (BR) on their necks. The positions remained unchanged, but during the final leg Pradeda made a mistake and Newm took the lead, followed by 1989 World Champion Fabini, with Ivan Guicheff crewing. At the finish it was Nehm, followed by Fabini, Ivan Pimental, and Andre Warlich of Brasil, with the Paradedas in fifth.

The second race showed that Warlich was very fast as he took the lead, followed by Pimental, Snipe Master Carlos Wanderley, and local sailor Alejandro Carluccio. These positions remained unchanged to the finish. Fifth was taken by Rezende of Brasil with Marco Paradeda in sixth. followed by Rafael Paradeda, and Hilton Piccolo. Fabini lost his rudder as a gudgeon was broken in a heavy collision, but managed to jury-rig it and limped home in 16th.

Winds were recorded at a steady 22 knots as race three got underway. Brasilian junior Sniper Rafael Paradeda battled with John MacCall of Argentina and Ignacio Gercar of Uruguay, the three swapping the lead around the course. At the line it was Paradeda taking the gun, followed by Fabini, Piccolo, MacCall, Gercar, Uruguay's team of Shewe/Rana, and Pimental.

Marco and Alexandre grabbed another great start in race four and led the way as locals Alejandro Carluccio and Christopher Schewe tried in vain to close the margin. At this point the winds were in the 30-40-knot range with huge broken waves. It was a real show to see the boats surfing the waves on the reaches. Meanwhile, on the RC boat, the officers had to rev up the engines to follow the fleet as the speedometer showed 10 to 12 knots. Unperturbed by the monstrous conditions, the Paradedas took the gun, followed by Carluccio, Shewe, Gercar, MacCall, Pimental, Fabini and Santa Cruz.

Winds moderated to 15 knots for race five as Paradeda and Fabini fought it out for the lead; Santa Cruz and Nehm worked on Edgardo Lozano of Argentina whose Rosendo Snipe was carrying a large patch, the result of a collision in race 4. At the line it was Paradeda followed by Fabini,

Santa Cruz, Lozano, Pereira, D'Elia and Piccolo.

Race six looked like a Brasilian competition, as most of the leaders showed "BL" on the sails. A few "U's were in the bunch, and no "A". Marco and Alexandre showed that they are good in medium winds, too, as they led the whole way. This put the Paradedas in a position where the Championship was their's to lose, as Fabini was the only challenger with any remote chance.

The seventh and final race was marked by low clouds and moderate breezes. After six days of strong winds the seas were still turbulent, and the combination resulted in excellent conditions for the sailors to show their tactical genius. The Uruguayan junior teams of Ignacio Gercar, with Argentine crew Andres Onis, Pablo Fernandez/Angel Marangos and Joaquim Berembau/Jose Romero were off to a great start and took the vanguard. It looked as though the older sailors were giving the youngsters permission to take the lead, but such would never be the case!

'Old man Pimental'' and former South American Champion Nehm tried in vain to crash the teenage party. At the line it was Gercar, Fernandez, Rafael Paradeda, Schewe, Nehm, Berembau, Fabini, and Lozano. The equipment check showed that the young Uruguayan Fernandez did not have his paddle and so he was DSQ, a cruel lesson perhaps, but necessary to enforce the rules.

URUGUAY'S GERCAR AND ARGENTINE ONIS TEAM FOR JR. S.A. WIN

The third running of the South American Junior Championship preceded the South Americans and gave a great opportunity to judge the high level of competition and talent of the continent's brightest young Snipers.

The first race was aborted by the Race Committee, as the winds at the start were a steady 24 knots with gusts to 28. Everyone sailed back in for milkshake hour with smiling faces!

A few hours later the gusts were down and the race got underway. Santa Cruz and crew, Eric Siegmann, took the lead at the start and were followed closely by Gercar and Sojo/Carrau. Santa Cruz had speed and sailed away

from the chasers. In the excitement of the battle and a lack of attention to the Race Committee, the leaders failed to see that the course had been changed from Olympic to a more comfortable Triangular one. Sagacious Berembau noted the change and took the win, followed by Gercar, Carrau/de Souza, E. Sojo/Carrau, and Gonzales.

Winds were still solid for race two, and there were plenty of breakdowns and DNFs. Santa Cruz managed to stay buoyant and won, followed by Gercar, Andre Ligick and crew, Claudio Beier of Brasil. with J. P. Fernandez in fourth.

Race three was another good test of seamanship in severe conditions and Ligick and Santa Cruz passed with ease as they fought it out for the win. Ligick was dominant and took the first, followed by Santa

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LANIER FLEET 781 CONTINUES DOMINATION IN DISTRICT FOUR

Lake Lanier Fleet 781's Steve Burke is the 9th different winner of the Van Wesley Trophy, awarded each year at the Southern Snipe Championships by the Privateer Yacht Club of Chattanooga to the previous year's most successful District 4 sailor.

With a 5th in the Southerns, 3rd in the Districts and the Battle of Atlanta, and 1st in the Georgia State Championship and the Cracker Barrel, Burke becomes the fifth Lake Lanier sailor to take home the coveted award, which is given each year to the D-4 skipper with the highest combined finish in five sanctioned regattas, including the Southerns and the District 4 Championships, which are mandatory for qualification.

The late Van Wesley was one of District 4's and Privateer's premier sailors until his untimely death from cancer at the age of 24 in 1978. In the last four years of his life, Van won the Midwinters in Clearwater and the Don Q in Miami before a broken hoist in Nassau stranded him on shore and prevented him from winning the Carl Zimmerman Trophy as the top sailor in the Southern Winter Circuit when no redress was allowed by the race committee.



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CALIFORNIA SNIPERS REMEMBER HERB SHEAR WITH EVENT

Many of you remember Herb Shear as the friendly boardsailor who wore the funny hats, was always quick to help you out with a problem, and even quicker with a witty poke or two. In his later years, Herb refused to sail "anything with a rudder!"

Local San Diego Snipe sailors remember Herb for much, much more. As a founding father of the Mission Bay Snipe Fleet over thirty years ago, Herb's sense of adventure, loyalty, spirit and wacky humor helped mold the fleet into what it is today-one of the most successful Snipe fleets in the world, as well as one of the premier fleets at MBYC.

Family, friendship, and fun were Herb's #1 priorities. Together with his sidekick, Earl Elms, they transformed the Snipe into the modern racing dinghy it is today. Herb was a revolutionary boat builder whose "Chubasco" Snipe lines are still the standard against which all Snipes must measure up to today in the form of the McLaughlin Snipe.

With Herb's passing two years ago, it was fitting, then, that the Snipe Spring Invitational be named for the man who stamped his character on our fleet forever. And so, the 2nd Annual Herb Shear Memorial/ Spring Invitational Snipe Regatta got underway May 9-10 at MBYC. You can see the winner's trophy, built by Mike Shear and Charlie Hochart, hanging in the MBYC bar. It's a gorgeous piece of woodwork which accommodates some serious silver donated by Earl Elms from his '71 Snipe World's title in Brazil.

With Easter Sunday and Opening Day chewing up the prime April slots usually reserved for this regatta, the fleet swallowed hard and went toe-to-toe with Mother's Day and the opening of the America's Cup finals. This was some heavy competition, but nonetheless 57 boats from throughout So. California turned out for yet another successful Snipe regatta at MBYC.

Regatta Chairman, Jerome Fournier, arranged for everything, including wind! After a brief delay in Saturday's start so the "Race Committee" could watch the start of the America's Cup, the fleet was off for a weekend of fun and top-notch dinghy racing. R/C Chairman, Stan Betts and his crack crew had been running races for the America's Cup Louis Vuitton Series, and they weren't about to miss the finals because of another Snipe regatta!

The large fleet necessitated dividing the group into four flights, with each flight sailing the other on Saturday to determine the cut for Sunday's heats. This allows the top half to duke it out with the professionals, while the bottom half gets a rare chance to compete for trophies.

In the Gold Division, it was pretty tight going into the finale, with SDYC's Mary Bridgen, with husband/crew Chris Snow, looking like the ones to beat, with Doug Hart, Craig Leweck, and Jack Franco in hot pursuit. Mary's been knocking on the door in the Snipe Class in recent years, but alas, both she and perennial great Jack Franco threw in clinkers which let the brilliant team of Doug Hart and Kenyon Martin take the 5th race ace and the regatta. This was Doug's first regatta since returning to MBYC after a two-year naval stint in Annapolis, and he's motivated!

Finishing second overall was the team of Craig & Lisa Leweck. This was Craig's first regatta since ending his Tornado Olympic campaign. Mary and Chris had to settle for third, but they'll be tough again at the next big Snipe regatta.

In the Silver Division, '82 Snipe National Champions Doug & Jenifer DeSouza took the honors. (A second-race breakdown gave them some undeserved points on Saturday.)

Fittingly, Mike Shear, with animated crew/daughter Bridget, took 4th place and some nice trophies!

The Mission Bay venue offers a welcome break from the often grueling ocean and harbor venues that can keep Snipe sailors on the water for 6-8 hours at a stretch. In store for regatta participants was two full days of racing, a free apres-sail keg on Saturday, followed by a barbecue dinner, and then an evening of cruising, cocktails and dancing on the Bah Belle (a paddlewheeler that tours Mission Bay on weekend evenings).

Between races, it was good to see the MBYC bar and clubhouse full of regatta participants and members alike intently watching the A.C. racing action. The club was buzzing, packed and full of life. This is what yacht clubs are all about! Sailing is alive and well in San Diego. Hopefully, other fleets can experience the fun and success the Snipe Fleet has found, which all started some thirty years ago. Thanks, Herb! Bob Bowden

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
