

AROUND THE SNIPE WORLD

IYRU INTERNET: SAILING ON THE WEB

The IYRU is to make a big splash on the Internet in September with the launch of an international World Wide Web (WWW) site. The web site code-named "sailing" will go on-line in September to coincide with the IYRU Nations cup Grand Final in San Francisco and provide the sailing world with daily updates. The web pages will provide a Home Page for 115 National Authorities around the world and all 52 International Class Associations. The Sailing Forum will also carry dedicated pages on Dinghy, Olympic and Offshore Racing, Team Racing, Youth Sailing, Match Raching, Windsurfing, Measurement, Handicaps and Ratings, Entry Forms for individual regattas and a photographic library of top sailing pictures, as well as IYRR published in 20 languages.

New SCIRA rules were passed in Rimini, Italy, and will be published in full in a later Bulletin as well as the National Secretaries and World Board meeting minutes. 1996 brings with it a new SCIRA Rulebook. Keep reading your Bulletin for availability.

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37 1 WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP SNIPE CLASS

LANGE/PARADA TWOPEAT WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

From the December 1993 Snipe Bulletin-In conditions covering the entire spectrum of wind speed possibilities, Santiago Lange and crew Mariano Parada of Argentina utilized superior boat speed, excellent shift hitting and a fair amount of gear shifting to win the 36th Snipe World Championships by 171/4 points. It was not neccessary for them to sail the last race.

In conditions under 12 knots, Santiago Lange and crew Mariano Parada of Argentina utilized superior shift hitting and excellent boat speed to win the 37th Snipe World Championships by 10 1/4 points. Although they competed, it was not neccessary for them to sail the last race. This was Santiago's 3rd World Championship, his other victory in 1985 with Miguel Saubidet in the front of the boat.

Guillermo Parada and Gonzalo Martinez provided the Argentine Team with 1-2 punch by finishing second with 24.5 points. United States sailors Doug Hart and Jon Rogers finished 3rd with 30 points. The rest of the top ten was rounded out by sailors from Sweden, Spain, Portugal, Japan, and Norway. Johnny MaCall and Palmo Merayo finished 7th giving Argentina 3 of the top 10 places. Rick and Carol Merriman of the US finished 10th to give the US 2 of the top 10 places.

The 1995 Championships were held in Rimini, Italy on the Adriatic. Rimini is one of Europe's biggest summer resorts with all the associated trappings. Club Nautico Rimini is located on a narrow channel, providing a short sail to the race track and some lively boathandling (and mandatory Italian discussion...) on the crowded weekends. The club hosts an excellent

restaurant and the bar staff was kept busy. The beach, with an huge array of colored umbrellas, lounges, and changing rooms, is five minutes away. Traveling sailors knew they were getting closer to the club by the increasing number of posters displayed advertising the event. A small artitsts' bazaar set up across from the club every evening and where the daily trophies were handed out publicly.

Opening ceremonies consisted of a bus ride and a short parade through the old section of Rimini. The mayor of Rimini welcomed the competitors under the Arco d'Augusto, built in 27 BC, making it the oldest Roman arch in existence. SCIRA Commodore Jimmy Lowe welcomed everyone in Italian (with a Bahamian accent!) and then everyone enjoyed a buffet dinner at the old fish market.

The first day provided one race to allow competitors a chance to make last minute changes before the bulk of the racing began. In a dying 8 knots, Parada/Martinez finished first with Lange/Parada second. The Spanish team of Saura/Manent took third and the US sailors Hart/Rogers and the Merrimans

rounded out the top five. Lange/Parada were disappointed to discover shoreside that they were scored PMS. They were reinstated when witnesses said they had properly rerounded the starting line end.

The second day proved more frustrating for everyone involved. After a long postponement due to light shifty winds, race 2 was started in 6 knots with the left end of the line looking favored. The lone French team of Frebault/Boisaubert led at the first mark followed by Lima/Pedrosa of Portugal, and two Japanese teams, Iwase/Kamiya and Shiga/Marayama. By the jibe mark, the Portuguese had pulled into the led with Shiga on their transom. With the wind backing, the second reach turned into almost a beat and the committee abandoned the race. The second race was started again in 6 to 8 knots with the pin end again looking favored. Shiga/Marayama led at the first mark with former-World Champion Richado Fabini and his brother Roberto in 2nd. The Cuban team of Manzo/Lorenzo rounded 3rd. Danish in 4th, and the Brazilians Paradeda/ Fernandez in 5th. The US team must have been thinking alike as Brian Fishback and





Lorie Stout rounded 7th with Hart, the Merrimans, and Argyle Campbell and Rod Graham rounding 11th through 13th. Shiga showed everyone a light air gear as he stretched out, leading the fleet by 1 minute and 45 seconds at the second weather mark. Unfortunately, the wind began dying and shifting 180 degrees, turning the last run into a beat and the last beat into a run. With no wind on the horizon and dusk looming the committe was forced to throw the flag.

Day 3 began more promising with the fleet scurring around, hoping to stretch hiking muscles in what looked like a perfect 15 knots. Unfortunately by the 1:00 PM start the breeze had died to 8 to 10 knots, with a heavy lump left over from the morning breeze. Parada/Martinez rounded first, followed by the Japanese Shiga/Marayama, Lange/ Parada, the Merrimans, and then Lima/ Pedrosa. By the second weather mark the eventual regatta winners were leading Parada/Martinez. Johnny Macall and Palmo vaulted from 12th to 3rd. The final results in similar breeze were Lange/Parada, Parada/ Martinez, MacCall/Merayo, and the Merrimans. Segerstrom/Terneus from Sweden cracked the top five followed by Hart/Rogers in 6th.

The breeze for the second race of the day started in lighter air than the first although with a smoother sea. The Spanish team of Borras/Magro won this one followed by Johnny and Palmo with Doug Hart and Jon Rogers finishing 3rd. Unfortunately, the PMS raised its flag this race, catching 6 teams. US

teams the Merrimans and Campbell/Graham, Japanese Kai/Ikeda, Brazilians Paradeda/ Fernandez, Santa Cruz/Florencio, and Denmark's Iversen/Hansen were all caught on the wrong side of the starting line. Santiago sailed his throw out in this race with an 11th only to discover once again shoreside he had been called over early. He was subsequently reinstated when the Race Committee realized a bow number mix-up. After three races Parada/Martinez with a 1, 2, 5 combo were leading Hart/Rogers with a 4, 6, 3.

On day 4, Santiago and Mariano began their push for the World Championships with a pair of bullets. Conditions again where light and shoreside info had Mariano losing 20 pounds in preparation for this regatta. Rick and Carol Merriman also had a stellar day with a 2nd and a 5th. It is interesting to note that 3 of the eventual top 5 finshers sailed their throw outs this day.

The final day of sailing started off in 5 to 8 knots and smooth water. After a general recall, the fleet got off into a right hand drag race. The top mark had Spain's Carlos Llamas and Javier Gutierrez rounding in the lead followed by the Merrimans. Parada rounded 3rd with the Danish brothers Per and Lars Jorgersen in fourth. Lange and Parada, with the Championship on the line, rounded sixth. On the second weather leg Guillermo snuck out and caught a rare lefty to round ahead of Llamas and the Merrimans. Santiago had sailed his way into fourth. The finish order on the water was Parada/Martinez, Llamas/Gutierrez, Santa Cruz/Florencio from Brazil,

Lange, Segerstrom/Terneus, and the Merrimans. Unfortunaetly, this race was to prove pivotal as 12 out of the 48 teams were called PMS. Prominent amoung those were Rick and Carol. With one PMS already to their credit they had no recourse but to take their case to the room and face the consequences of SCIRA's DND rule. On a more positive note, Doug Hart and Jon Rogers found themselves in leeward mark log jam and when the feathers had cleared, someone had popped their rudder off. In an amazing display of seamanship, Doug was able to get the rudder back in and sail to a finish of 13th. They were later awarded YMP points.

The last race was started in 6 knots and the Japanese team of Shiga/Marayama sprung out and never looked back. The French team rounded the top mark in 2nd followed by Norways Kristoffer Spone and Janett Krefting and Portugal's Tiago Roquette and Francisco Lino. Regatta leaders Lange/Parada rounded a conservative 10th. Shiga continued to stretch his lead as the wind continued to lighten. Top five final finishes were Shiga, Hart, Roquette, Spone, and Parada. Santiago and Mariano finished 6th and when asked why they sailed the last race the response was "to show we could have won with the PMS..."

EQUIPMENT

Snipe equipment at the top end of competition still seems more evolutionary than revolutionary. More sails from different sailmakers were seen at this regatta than

other recent international events. Six different sailmakers were present in the top ten alone. Perssons seem to be the hull of choice and their was one Skipper in the top ten. The new Perrson NordEst (built in Italy) looked just fine and the new Lillias seem faster than their finishes show. Ivan Pimental was in the hunt many times in his Ferrari yellow Lillia until a missed shift slowed him down.

Hardware wise, the general trend is to keep the crew busy with adjustments, allowing the skipper to focus on steering and mainsheet. Almost the entire fleet had

launchers, with the notable exception of a couple of the Japanese boats. Johnny Macall had a very clean, simple method of adjusting the jib lead from the weather side as did the Japanese. Santiago Lange is still using a hook to hold the daggerboard up and it doesn't sound like he plans on changing anytime soon. We should note that he sets the board with the hook and then uses a bridal to hold it back. Many people were using shock cord loaded blocks ala the Old Man's to hold up their boards. Sidewinder and Proctor masts are still popular. See the competitors equipment list for details.

The Swedish team of Joergen and Helena Rosengren were allowed to sail with an extra crew member (to-be), as Helena was competing 6 months pregnant! The youngest sailors were skippers Thomas Iversen from Denmark and Mauricio SantaCruz from Brazil. Brazil had the distinction of posting the youngest and oldest. The oldest admitted to be 56 years old, but only after half way through the trophy dinner. And no, we don't name names.

The final prize giving was held on the grand terrace of the Grand Hotel, historic in Rimini and Italy as the backdrop for numerous Federico Fellini movies. After a delicious meal (as only the Italians can offer) the presentation began. Local officials were congratulated and Vice Commodore and Italian National Secretary Giorgio Brezich was given a standing ovation for his efforts for the 37th World Championships. The Hub E Isaacs trophy was once again presented to Santiago Lange and Mariano Parada for a tremendous regatta.

Italian National Championships

Light wind and strong current marked the second year in a row for the Italian Nationals held in Sanremo on May 25-28. Only five races were sailed out of the six scheduled from the nice fleet of 46 Snipes coming from all districts of Italy. Nice fleet because everyone thought there would be less participation due to the strange period chosen for the event by the Italian Sailing Federation.

The six races were scheduled over three days, but the first day the fleet could only start in a nice 8 knot breeze, sail the first beat and do the reaches in the dying wind. At the end of the second race, the R.C. abandoned and no wind returned the entire day.

The second day three races were sailed in a light, shifty westerly wind. Conelli/Bevilacqua took an early lead of the fleet and defended it easily until the last beat, when the wind began to die, Brezich/Turazza moved to first place, Bodino/Torielli to second. Bari/Bertanzon, after an erratic first part of the race, constantly moved to the front of the fleet finishing in third.

The second race started in the same light breeze, but with a different story. Dematte/ DelFelice and Bari/Bertanzon rounded all the marks first and second, but at the end of the run the wind finished and the fleet began the last windward leg. At the end a light, very light breeze came, 60 degrees turned to the left, allowing all the contestants to finish within the time limit with Dematte/DelFelice first, Bernardis/Berrario second and Anzellotti/Longhi third.

The shifty westerly and the strong current conditioned the third race, but Dematte/DelFelice won again passing Braga/Parodi during the last beat, with the young Bodino/Torielli again at the top in third. Michel/Bolletti sailed the worst race of the day while Bari/Bertanzon did the drop-out race, 22. The locals Zaoli/Maiga lost their chances for the Worlds selection taking two bad races while Conelli, scoring 4-6-6 moved well to the top of the selections.

The third day, in a cloudy sky, appeared worse than the second, but finally the fourth race started. Bari had the lead at the first mark ahead of Alltree from Australia and maintained it to the end of the race, sailed in a very light south/easterly. Dematte/ DelFelice moved to second and Brezich to third after the PMS of Alltree, with the

juniors Solerio/Testi in fourth. At the end of the race Dematte/DelFelice had the title in his hands and only Bari or Brezich could also win, but only with a bad race from Dematte/DelFelice. Bari/Bertanzon tried it, made an agressive start and lead the race for the first lap with Dematte/DelFelice in 15th place, enough to allow Bari to win the Championship. But when the wind built up to 8-10 knots, Michel/Zoili passed Bari and Dematte/DelFelice, finishing 9th, took the title.

It has been the 5th title captured from Guiliano Dematte/DelFelice and the sixth second place for Bari, the third for crew Gianmari Bertanzon. Thanks to that win, Dematte/DelFelice becomes the fifth Italian Snipe sailors to win the nationals for at least 5 times. The best is still Giorgio Brezich with 8 titles.

After the seven races of selection for the Worlds, Brezich won followed by Dematte/ DelFelice, Bari and Conelli. As Brezich resigned, Michel became the fourth Italian representative in the World Championships.

That Annoying Centerboard Vibration

I hope someone can help with an annoying problem. When my boat gets moving in above about 5 knots of wind the centerboard vibrates. My wife likes the hum, because it lets her know we're really moving now. I am, however, mentally applying conservation of energy laws so it drives me crazy to know I'm going slower than I should. Any suggestions, some sort of flow separation perhaps? The board and boat are from 1980, 24,000 era with a rounded leading edge and a diagonal trailing edge.

Sounds like you need to do a bit of filing A on your board. The problem is on the trailing edge but you ought to clean up the front while you are at it. Check your rulebook before starting and you will see that you are allowed 1" of taper to the plate around the edges. You need a better transition on the trailing edge to stop the hum. If your "diagonal trailing edge" is not already in a full 1" you just need to fair the transition in right up to 1" from the trailing edge. I used to leave a small flat back edge with nice square edges for a clean release. If it's already flat all the way to the 1" check the width of your board at the top and bottom and see if you can make it a bit smaller so you can then taper in the trailing edge in again a bit smoother. The leading edge should be fairly sharp parabolic shape rather than a half round and also going in about 1". A few of the tools I have used are a power planner (only really needed when making a board) a sharp surform and or a good file with large straight or arched teeth (not the X teeth).

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
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Atlantic Coast Championships



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
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
