

In 1969-71, I crewed for Didier Poissant, well-known Snipist. When Didier left his Snipe, I took the tiller again, but now with my sister-in-law


National Secretary for France from 1975, I was elected South European Secretary at the last meeting of the European Secretaries at Valencia, Spain, August 1978.

JEFF DOES IT AGAIN!

Jeff Lenhart wins 1978 Snipe North American Championship at Annapolis.

The North American Championships for the Bernie Mills Memorial Trophy was first sailed in 1973 at Oakville. Don Hite won that year. He, and every winner since, except Augie Diaz, competed this year in the 89 boat fleet at the Severn Sailing Association at Annapolis, Maryland. This was the largest event the Severn Sailing Association has hosted in its 20 year history.

By the way, Augie couldn't come but he sent his Dad (the Ole Man) who finished third, and his brother, who finished sixth.

By race time Friday, after a full day of weighing and measuring on Thursday, over three hundred sails had been verified.

The late September weather in Annapolis offered a full range of conditions for the racing. The first day of racing on Friday, September 22nd, contained a frontal passage, so two races were sailed in 10-12 knots building to a gear busting third race of 25 (+in gusts).

Two experienced Snipe sailors were our Race Committee Chairmen, Dick C.

Bartlett and Rob Donald, and our club International 14 fleet provided our rescue boat crews. Berta Swanson watched us for SCIRA, and Judy Barber scored.

Four fleets were used to permit manageable starts of forty-some boats. That third race really cleaned them out — less than half the competitors finished. Those who got in early were grateful for the warmth of a lee and hot coffee. By cocktail party time, all were fully operational. We eventually ran out of everything except ginger ale.

On Saturday morning, the North Easterly had subsided to 18 knots and eased all day. Two races were sailed in shifty winds bringing out the best (and worst) in sailors. The ebb current created some challenging conditions. A glance at the results quickly tells you that the top finishers were consistent in their performance and evaluation of conditions.

We had quite a few sails, hulls and rigs to see in action. Mike McLaughlin delivered several new boats, and Ron Fox had two new Phoenix in the series. You all know who's who so you can read your own sail results. Rigs also ran the gamut, including several new Proctor sections.

As series go, we drew well too. There was a large contingent from Canada, and the Annapolis Fleet's special relationship with Bermuda showed well with five boats from the Patch. Carlos Bosch sailed - but it's unfair not to mention everyone, so ... Torkle Borgstrom came from Argentina, and we got a Coors shipment, or at least a lot of Californians. While our district was well represented. I think we had someone from every District, Atlanta and Miami fleets sent strong teams, and so did New England and the Mid West. Swansons and Levinsons seemed to be having family reunions - Commodore Bruce Colyer flew in, and Gail drove up with the boat. Dr. D. & Jane came, but the first team had to be in school. Oh well - you should been here.

The Saturday night dinner at the Fleet Reserve Club — on the City Dock on the downtown Annapolis waterfront — drew a hungry, thirsty and seasoned crowd of sailors, who exercised other nautical skills — some 'til quite late I'm told.

Fortunately, perhaps, Sunday proceeded to be an extension of Saturday with the breeze continuing to die. It was clear that the Race Committee had been wise to keep that tough race Friday to give us a series. The Sunday race had to be abandoned after the first triangle could not be completed by the second fleet. Jeff and Peggy Lenhart had already won the regatta with a total of 11.7 points.

The Annapolis Snipe Fleet was pleased at the turnout for this year's North Americans. Many of our sailors have traveled the Snipe Circuit for years but we haven't hosted a major event since the 1971 Nationals. The opportunity to reciprocate the hospitality we have been shown was a terrific reward for our fleet. It has helped our fleet too. Since the N. As, a number of people in our club have expressed interest in racing Snipes, potentially adding strength to our 36 boat fleet.





Gancedo, Llamas Rule European and African Championship

59 entries represent 11 countries in title sailed at Spain.

The European and African Championship was celebrated at The Real Club Nautico de Valencia, Spain, the week of August 21-27. 59 boats from 11 countries participated in the event.

After the resolution of a problem of daggerboard handle measurement, the championship proceeded with the flag raising ceremony.

We began the regatta with Felix Gancedo the favorite over Denmark's Brosted.

First race: With the wind from the South East, force 1-2, and no problems with the starting line, it was evident that Gancedo was the favorite for the championship. He won followed by Zendrera and Cella, both of Spain; Anderson of Sweden; and Jan Persson of Denmark. Brosted finished 8th.

Second: In the second race, Arturo Delgado led at the windward mark, but was passed by Armada, who won; Brosted, in second; and Persson who finished 3rd. Felix in 7th had his worst race, and gained the 13 points which he kept for the championship.

Third: The third race went to Gancedo in 1st, followed by Brosted, Masso, Norway's Finn Hansen, and Persson. The race was in very little wind.

Four: The fourth race, in equal condiitions finished as follows: Gancedo, Armada, Nils Larssen of Denmark, Neal Martin of England, and Costas of Spain.

Five: In the fifth race Gancedo won again, and appeared unbeatable for the Championship. It had become a Spanish Festival, since all the first places had gone to home boats. Masso gained second, Brosted 3rd, Larssen 4th and Carlberg of Sweden 5th.

Six: The sixth race made the Championship history: Winner, Gancedo; second place for the championship, and third for this race, Brosted. Zendrera had a second

for the race, Petterson of Sweden was 4th and Norway's Kjendlie was 5th.

Seventh race: For the last race, in which Gancedo did not take part, the wind was force 3-4 from the South East, and Costas of Spain dominated the whole race, finishing first, followed by Finn Hansen, Fernando Masso, Gustav Kraft of Sweden, and Portugal's Borralho.

The race committee work by chairman Paco Balaguer, aided by Pepe Sanchez and Pedro Arribere, was perfection, with good lines and courses. The jury chairman was Carlos Pena.

Henry Davis Retires Missouri Valley Trophy

Positioning Crew Weight In A Chop

You probably know that the length of a wave between crests is equal to five times the period (in seconds) squared ($\lambda = 5T^2$) so a wave the length of a Snipe would have a period of about 1.75 seconds. The wave velocity is three times the period (V = 3T) so this wave would travel at 5½ knots.

What is the natural period of your boat? For some really old boats it's probably 9 years, just as some older diesels fire once an enlistment. Nowadays, though, I would expect a competitive Snipe, with crew friendly and close, and very near the center of gravity, to have a natural pitching period of about two seconds (2^s) or less. That's really close to the period of that wave.

How much can moving crew weight alter that pitching period (and moment)?

We all answer this practically, by moving crew weight and altering course to break that harmonic system when wave and boat want to dance together, and you come to a crashing stop. To a lesser extent, and therefore harder to perceive, this happens whenever you go to windward in a chop, although the wave and

boat systems are not in complete synchronism. You're still slower, especially if you delight in going to weather and point high. Even if you drive off as you should, with maximum drive from your sails, a near synchronous condition can make you just enough slower than the more perceptive to lose that edge.

Just for fun, I ran some numbers for that effect of crew moment of inertia on the pitching period of the boat — just to get a feel for what can be done. Since competitive boats tend to have crews whose total weight is under 300#, the two examples are based on a 150 pound skipper and 100 pound crew (let's call that crew A, = 250#), and a 180 pound skipper and a 140 pound crew (crew B = 320#).

For a boat with a test period (time for one full cycle in the Moment of Inertia Test) or a natural period of 1.75 seconds (about like 20,000 series Chubasco I think):

Light crew:

Crew A — each one foot from boats' center of gravity adds 0.25 seconds

Crew A – two feet from CG adds 0.9 seconds

Heavy crew:

Crew B — at one foot from CG adds 0.4 seconds

Crew B — at two feet from CG adds 1.04 seconds

These are significant changes in period (time).

Since the drumbell effect of a boat heavy in the ends is part of what helps her crash stop in a chop, it still looks like concentrating weight, with the lightest crew that can hold the boat down, and altering course to break synchronism is the best solution (Bear off). You can break this synchronous pitching with a rapid weight shift opposing the pitch, just as you can break synchronous rolling off the wind by opposing the roll suddenly. But unless you alter conditions causing the pitch (or roll) somehow, it'll just start again. Since few of us can still the waters. I suggest that a course change is the only real option we mortal sailors have to break the grip of synchronous pitching in a chop, with crew weight movement as a fine adjustment.

We'll ask some good "chop sailors" to share their technique with us.

Strong Winds for Paraguyan Open

It is a little late — but never too late, just a few words about the 2nd Open Championship for Snipes. It started July 22 and finished July 26, 1978 and was organized by SCIRA del Paraguay and the Yacht Club Ypacarai with fleet 749.

We chose the month of July for the strong winds which prevail at that time of the year. Fortunately we were right, every day we had good wind from the north with sunny skies. On the third day we cancelled the two races because the wind was too strong. Only the last race was with little wind from the north.

We were 15 boats on the line; 7 Brazilians, most from Sao Paulo, thanks to Vice Commodoro Flavio Caiuby; one Argentine well represented by Wilson Pereira and Andres Perez; and 7 Paraguayans.

Brazil is the best at the moment, so they came here to give us a nice lesson. The first three places were taken by Brazilians, the fourth by Wilson Pereira, Argentina, and the 6th place was the first Paraguayan: Carlos Gorostiaga and Luis Cordi.

We did six races (two per day) out of the seven predicted; all Olympic triangle plus legs. Renato Machado de Almeida and Paulo Fontes, Flavio and Pricilla Caiuby, and Wilson Pereira and Andres Perez were always in the three first places. Joao Borges Fortes and Danilo Grussner improved throughout the series and won the two last races. The most regular of all were Flavio and Pricilla with 4 third places, another boat was extremely regular; it was myself and Robert Burt; we always finished in 11th place.

On the evening of the 26th, we finished the championship around a table with good wine and beer, and every one had a better story than the other; Flavio teaching how to sail; Reginaldo Da Costa looking for a girl even nicer than the beautiful one he had at the same moment etc... The prizes were given at the same time. All were of Paraguayan work, except the gun shells instead of cups, which were imported many years ago. (Ed Note:
