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

1980 marks final closed regatta

Ted Hains Dominates Canadian Championship

When Ted Hains and David Belford won the last race of the Canadian Championship at Oakville Yacht Squadron, August 18-20, it marked the end of an era in Canadian Snipe sailing. When this event was started in 1950 the Canadian Championship was a closed regatta for Canadian residents only. It remained closed for thirty-one years.

In 1981 the Canadian Championship will be open to all Snipe sailors everywhere with a new prize for the overall winner. The existing Canadian National Championship trophy, the John Leckie Trophy will continue to be awarded to the Canadian resident skipper finishing first amongst the Canadians.

Ted won this last closed regatta in fine fashion with four firsts, a second and a fourth. Junior sailors Ian Pretty and Derek Holtved were second with Chris Hains and Ian McKinnell one point behind in third. Ian Pretty and Derek Holtved represented Canada at the World Junior Championship in Spain. Chris Hains and Ian McKinnell will represent

Canada at the Western Hemisphere Championship in Uruguay.



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

Consistency Pays Off For Timm At Ontarios

There is a saying that consistency is the key to winning a series. The validity of this was amply demonstrated when Oakville Y. S. Fleet 321 hosted the 23rd Ontario Open, August 16-17, 1980. Twenty-one boats from Ontario, Nova Scotia, Massachusetts, New York State, Pennsylvania, and Michigan entered. Twenty of these competitors were shown how to win a series by being consistent.

The first race Saturday was sailed in a 10-15 mph north-easterly. John Kelley and Bob Crotty of Cottage Park Y. C. won the first race followed by John Johns with Oakville's Margaret Kneulman as crew and Terry Timm and Liza Hersey. The wind was shifting during this race and the course was shifted further out into the lake for the second race.

The wind was dying during the second race and those who went out into the lake caught a somewhat fresher wind and did well. John and Tim Walton won followed by John Kelly and Terry Timm.

The wind continued to shift and die in the third race necessitating some deft mark-moving by Id Crook in the Avon inflatable. During the race the wind completed a 180° shift since morning, but thanks to the efforts of the race committee under Don Hains the weather legs were always correct. Ted Hains and Derek Holtved won the third race followed by John Johns and Terry Timm.

The races Saturday were run back to

back to back, which made for a long day. The party ashore in the evening was somewhat more subdued than usual as a result. Jim Belford filled the "Green Can" with pinacollada and other fleet members contributed the munchables for the cocktail party.

Sunday came up with northeast wind at about 10 mph. All those who went inshore found themselves badly tanked in a replay of Saturday's races. Some of the competitors learned the hard way that in a north-easterly at Oakville it usually pays to go right. Terry Timm remembered and was first. John Walton and Fred Rozelle did too and were second and third in the fourth race.

The fifth race was a replay of the fourth and, again, those who remembered to go right did well, while those who went left went to the back of the class. It was possible to move up if one went right

on the second and third beats. In the end John Johns won, Fred Ables and Miles Doherty of Sea Cliff were second and Terry Timm third.

Third place in four races plus a bullet beats second, seventh, second, fourth and first, as John Johns discovered. John and Tim Walton finished third overall; John Kelley and Bob Crotty, fourth; Fred Rozelle and Jan Bertelsen, fifth. The visitors went off with all the prizes, which were provided by Jim and David Belford's marine supply store Dock 16 in Oakville.

Don Hains, Id Crook, Dennis McCutcheon and Julie Kroeger did an excellent job on race committee and sincere thanks to them for an expert job. Thanks to everyone who came to the regatta and contributed to the making of another successful Ontario Open. Everyone is invited to make the 24th Ontario Open and have more great racing in 1981.

Light air prevailed for the weekend. but race committee Chairman Paul White took advantage of two opportunities during which the wind did blow to get in two good races. The one Saturday race was finally started about 4 pm, and Greg Fisher started well and maintained a lead throughout with Jim Richter the only real challenger. Winds were 5-10. The sailors enjoyed a steak dinner hosted by # 409 with master chef Paul Dovey pre-

After dinner there was a panel discussion with Greg Fisher, Jim Richter, John Irvine, John Walton and Buzz Levinson. Topics included boat rigging tips (Greg), light air sailing (Jim), the Laser N.A. regatta and tactics (John W.), Junior activity (John I.), and kinetics (everyone). There was considerable interest in mast tuning and proper sail trimming. The kinetics problem is a real one, and feeling was strong against allowing kinetics. It does not appear to be as prevalent in Snipes as in some other classes, but it is affecting the Snipe Class racing results. All sailors agreed the most important racing ingredient is practice and more practice.

Sunday morning was flat until a line squall moved through and then an 8-12 northwest breeze settled in and the second race started. Greg Fisher again started well and what looked like a horizon job disappeared as the wind dropped. Doug Goppert moved well and almost caught Greg on the last beat. Third, fourth, fifth and sixth all finished within two boatlengths of each other which made the fight for second very close.

In the Call Series, the winds lightened near the finishes and the results were up and down. Jack Samuelson edged Andy Ponteous and Tran Alfrey for first. Tom Wittsitt of Indy gave up on Saturday's wind but won the second race. What if he had stayed Saturday?

A Junior race was held Saturday morning and twelve boats raced. Glenn Foster of Diamond Lake was the winner.

The Junior trophy winner in the Lilly Fleet was John Irvine, and in the Call Fleet it was Andy Ponteous.

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Rasmussen Triumphs At European Championship

Denmark's ace trounces 10-nation fleet

In the days from the 16th to the 23rd August 1980 Espergærde Yacht-club in Denmark held the 16th European Championship for Snipes.

All the yachtsmen were lodged by members of the small yacht-club — quite an achievement considering there were app. 125 persons, and the club in Espergærde has the same number of members. Saturday, Sunday and half the Monday were reserved for measuring of the 55 dinghies from 10 nations.


Boats were weighed; masts, spars as well as the placing of the centerboard in the dinghies were checked. During the measuring it was found out that some masts were too long and that some of the centerboards did not go vertically down into the centerboard-trunks. All masts and centerboards were altered and approved so that everybody could start the tune-up-race Monday afternoon. The weather had so far been wonderful, warm and sunny and very little wind.

The defending European champion Felix Gancedo of Spain had been prevented from coming, meaning that there were no favourites to this year's EC.

Tuesday at 11:00 a.m. the first race started in app. 8 meters per second (16 knots) of wind. Flemming Rasmussen/Keld Schultz made the best start up by the windward mark and were immediately up in front. Rasmussen/Schultz were so much ahead of the others that at the end they came out winners more than one minute ahead of Per Brødsted, also from Denmark. The second race, which was sailed in app. 8 seconds wind, was signally won by Ralf Casen/Bengt Holmquest, Finland, in front of Flemming Rasmussen/Keld Schultz, Denmark.

Wednesday the wind was very strong with puffs up to 15 seconds (30 knots). The first race was started in a very strong squall which caused several damages on the boats. Among other things the best Spanish boat dropped out of the race with a broken jib halliard. This weather was just what Flemming Rasmussen/Keld Schultz liked.

They reached the marking-buoy as the




Fleming Rasmussen holds the European Championship trophy aloft as his crew Keld Schultz grins his approval.

first boat, and then never left this leading position. Flemming Christiansen/Neils Kampmann from Denmark, who had so far been very modest with a 32nd and a 16th place, now also showed their force in windy weather, by coming in as 2nd boat. Strong wind the rest of the day meant that no further races took place on Wednesday.

Thursday, which was meant to be a resting- and spare-day, now had to be used for the missing race. On this day the

wind was very fluctuating and there were strong rain and thunder showers. This race was characterized by rapid changes in the first positions of the field and during an incredibly strong shower, some boats got 25 positions forward and others the same number of positions backwards. In the last cross Per Br ϕ dsted led, but on the finishing line he was beaten by Finn and Ivan Hansen, Norway, and Jorge Haenelt from Spain. Ralf Casen, Finland, ended on the 8th place and Flemming

Rasmussen got his worst placing, a 10th place.

On Thursday night boat-builder Erling Olsen and his wife arranged a big barbecue-party for the yachtmen. Big beefs were served together with equally big quantities of wine.

Gale warning all over Denmark meant that the races on Friday were scratched already at 1:00 p.m. as at this time the wind was more than 25 seconds (50 knots).

On Saturday, the last sailing day, there were to be two races in order to be able to deduct the poorest result and achieve a total of 6 sailed races.

Flemming Rasmussen/Keld Schultz had — after the first 4 races — taken such a lead compared to the next 5 boats, Finn Hansen, Norway; Ralf Casen, Finland; Dirck De Bock, Belgium; Jorge Haenelt, Spain and Per Brødsted, Denmark, that all they had to do to secure the championship was to sail safely, avoid disqualifications and all the time be among the first 6 boats. Such as the last race went on, Flemming Rasmussen/Keld Schultz did not even have to participate to be champions.

The European champions, who came from the arranging club Espergærde, were



Soltero Climbs To Top Of Rocky Mountain Championship

The 18th annual Rocky Mountain Snipe Championship was sailed on Boyd Lake, near Loveland, Colorado on July 26-27, hosted by Snipe Fleet 210. The Commodore Ed Kueck Memorial Trophy was won by Gene Soltero of Dallas, making this the 15th time in the 18 year history of the trophy that it has gone outside the state of Colorado.

There were two races Saturday and two Sunday, all sailed in steady winds of 6 to 10 knots. Soltero dominated the series, winning three of the four races but challenged at times by Castle, Sewell, and Eichelberger, each of whom had the lead at one time or another. Castle managed a hard-fought first place in the fourth race,

thus upholding the honor of the Colorado sailors. Due to an unfortunate error in timing, the third race was thrown out after a protest.

The weather was perfect, with light clouds part of the time Saturday and the Front Range of the Rockies sparkling in the sun all day Sunday. The north end of Boyd Lake is a wakeless speed area so waves were never a problem.

The Saturday evening no-host dinner was attended by nearly all of the competitors and turned into an informal banquet, with a private dining room at the Coach House Inn.

Frank Presley, recently of Alamitos Bay, served as chairman of the race committee, and George Sewell was fortunate in having as his crew another new Denver resident, Jean Bronaugh from the Privateer fleet in Tennessee.



Gavin has made the annual pilgrimage to Broadstairs for many years; and it was unfortunate that in the third race he lost out at the tussel on the weather mark, for he was not able to make up the ground lost. A higher finishing position in that race would have moved Gavin up into a much better overall position, which all the helmsmen present consider he deserved. The third race was also unlucky for another Stone Fleet entry - the junior Charles Frost, Charles had to retire owing to the whisker pole slipping out of the mast check and badly cutting the crew's

The prominent home fleet sailor, Hugh Mockett, won the Broadstairs Fleet Trophy again. So consistently has Hugh taken this magnificent trophy of a model Snipe, that he must have a standing order with the local engraver.

When the race was over Oakville had won 44½ to 41.

Saturday brought light air from the south and south west. At times the air was so light as to be non-existent. Wind shifts kept the positions amongst the leaders changing. 
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
