
#### A Winter Project




Fritz Gram on the hiking machine

### Local Hero Wins Norwegian Championship

The Norwegian Championship in Snipes was held in Bergen, on the west coast of Norway in July. For many years the title has alternated between Finn Hansen and Victor Sinding-Larsen. This year the local hero Totto Hartmann was the favorite. He had done well in a number of regattas in Scandinavia earlier this season, winning qualification races in Denmark and Sweden for the European Championship and taking second in the Nordic Championship.

The first day three races were sailed. The first race was won by Finn Hansen. Totto was disqualified for touching a mark, but he won the next two races, with Finn second. Totto could no longer afford to make any mistakes.

The second day two races were sailed. Totto won them both.

At Saturday night's party at the club

house the menu was chicken and beer, but there were lots of other "chickens" as well. The sailors, lacking their viking shields and helmets, did the famous Norwegian "halling past" to impress the maidens on the dancing floor.

The last day started out with no wind, but after waiting a few hours the wind showed up and a final race was sailed. This time Finn finished first, but he could not prevent Totto from being the first champion ever from the west coast. The championship was the only regatta counting for qualification for the Europeans, where Norway can take part with six boats.

#### More news from Norway . . .

In addition to the National Championship in July in Bergen, Norwegian sailors had a full calendar of activities. Just after the ice broke up in early April a few of the keenest Snipe sailors were out training, but the day after we had two feet of snow. The Viking Snipe Championship in September always draws international participants, but one of the most important Snipe events is undoubtedly the Handycup.

The Handycup held in Oslo on the 12th of June has a special race course, leading through narrow straits, covering the great part of the western side of the Oslo Fiord. To the uninformed, the Handycup might look like an informal "round the island" race. This is, of course not the case; winning the Handycup is a special honor, but the most important thing is to participate. In what way the prizes are to be distributed is kept a secret, but it always brings some surprises. After the race, the sailors go ashore to a nearby island for a social gathering.

## Fluky, Heavy Winds On Tap At European Cup/U.K. Nationals

The third European Snipe Cup, held under the burgee of Broadstairs Sailing Club June 26th through July 2nd, drew competitors from Belgium, France, Sweden, and the U.S.; a total of 41 boats.

With an eye on the economical climate, SCIRA UK ran their national championship with the Euro Cup, keeping separate scores. The project was a great success.

Following two days of socializing, measuring, and practice racing, the first official race was held midday, June 28th with a bad start for the regatta – a general recall. The one-minute rule was imposed for the second start. Unfortunately D. de Bock of Belgium, J. Ratmatron, Sweden, and D. Cranston of UK, were over, and did not return. This caused the Belgian and Swedish crews much disappointment in their finish for the day.

Beating into a force 4 wind, the fleet split in making for the first mark. With D. de Bock and Jan Ratmatron of Stockholm leading their respective groups, the wind whipped up the waves, giving competitors a rising sea to contend with. The lead boats of de Bock, Ratmatron, and UK's Stratham and P. Mason, settled into a tight bunch. By the last run, the wind

had increased and capsizes came fast and frequent. On the last beat the wind was close to the maximum allowed, with the sea getting higher. The gun went to A. Stratham. Second was P. Mason, third G. Lewis, and fourth G. Elliott – all UK boats.

As the last Snipe crossed the line, an imminent gale warning was broadcast. All rescue facilities went into action to cope with retiring Snipes still making for home; for out of the fleet, only thirteen Snipes had actually crossed the line. The emergency services of National Life Boat and Helicopter were called out to supplement the race rescue vessels. Crews were winched aloft, or taken onto rescue vessels, leaving the Snipes anchored to ride out the gale.

With the second race postponed, the afternoon was spent recovering boats. Unfortunately, many were damaged, and well into the evening the dinghy compound was a hive of activity in repairing and patching up Snipes for the next race. True Snipe fellowship spirit came to the fore. Equipment was loaned and brought in from the local chandler; the fortunate helped the unfortunate. The club commodore, John Martin, gave up any further chance of competing for the title by loaning his boat to a visitor whose Snipe had suffered considerable damage. A self appointed "expert" mast bender did great work with the aid of two suitably placed posts, whilst splicing and fiberglass skills came to the fore.

Tuesday morning brought a force 3 wind, but the aftermath of the storm had left the wind undecided in which direction it would blow. Finally it settled down, allowing the race to get underway. Unseen damage of the previous day brought equipment failure to the two youngest sailors, helm Mark Broughton 15, and brother Eric 17, who had battled the previous day's storm to finish 13th. An unlucky 13, for the strain had weakened their jib halyard, which parted, collapsing the sail on the fore deck. The first mark saw K. Dobson, US, in a clear lead, which he held to the finish. E. Everaert, Belgium, held a close second, but on the last beat lost out and finished fourth. Second came G. Lewis, UK, with Belgium's Dirk de Bock third.

That afternoon the wind was there but veered to such an extent it was not pos-

#### Hakan, Laila Bjurstrom Are Nordic Titlists

The Nordic Championships were held in Tampere on lake Nasijarvi, the site of today's most successful Finnish Snipe Fleet (skippers of their fleet were 6th, 7th and 8th in the European Championships last month in Trieste, Italy). The first races were held in very light winds (actually the lack of wind reduced the number of races to five) and the last in rather heavy winds. Finally Hakan Bjurstrom and his wife Laila won the Champion-title, they have been very close to it several times before.

## Secrets Of The Champions

An interview with Europe's premier Snipe sailors . . .

#### by Per Gothlin

The European style of Snipe sailing is somewhat different from the North and South American. Hulls are all in plastic, the layout and the shroud measurements are different; the mast is often stiffer. To get a picture of the North European style some champs in the district have been interviewed.

Instead of sneaking around their hulls trying to get a furtive glance, the BUL-LETIN here reveals their secrets: such as mast rake, what they hate most in Snipe sailing, and which characters they would want to spend a Robinson Crusoe life with, etc.

HAKAN BJURSTROM: A typical Finn; calm, silent, speaks with a singing, crystal clear pronunciation. Sails a Finnish Skipper-copy (Bjorndahl), together with his wife Laila. Has raced since 1969. As crew, second at the Europeans in '74, and third at the worlds in '75. Winner of Scandinavian Championship, and most other regattas this year.

TOTTO HARTMANN: A hardhitter who is a typical example of the new Snipe generation. Well built, well trained (sails every day), blond, will not settle until he wins the worlds. Doesn't drink anything but milk (except at some prize givings). Sails a Savante Finnish-made hull. Started 1975 and has won most of the Scandanavian regattas in 81-82.

GARY LEWIS: Has been around since God-knows-when. Shows up at every championship. A perfect example of the English Sniper — a champ in hospitality and kindness. Sails a British Martin Marin Skipper. Started 14 years ago and keeps his merits to himself. Modesty, he says.

#### Q: Why did you start to race Snipe?

TOTTO: I started to race Snipe in 1975. I knew some friends who raced in the Snipe Class. Besides, it was the largest dinghy class in the district, so the decision was easy. I have never regretted it.

HAKAN: My father was a Snipe sailor, and I grew up with Snipes.

GARY: I have raced various English

dinghies from the age of 15. I always thought the Snipe somewhat eccentric and old fashioned. However, in 1969 I was offered an old wooden Snipe at a very attractive price. I thought it would be a challenge to buy this Snipe and try to make it competitive. I soon discovered the charm of the boat and have been with the class ever since.

#### Q: What do you like best in Snipe sailing?

TOTTO: In the Snipe class you have the opportunity to travel around participating in regattas wherever you want and when you want.

HAKAN: There is good competition locally, nationally, and internationally.

GARY: As far as the UK is concerned the class is so small that you get to know virtually everybody in it. The opportunity to sail abroad is better than any of the UK classes I know. The Snipe is simple, yet challenging — and very pretty to look at.

#### O: What is worst?


TOTTO: It is worst to wait for the re-

gatta to start and yourself sitting in the Snipe for hours; it's raining all the time and no wind. And the same situation happening next day, but this time you already have wet clothes from the early morning. O.K.?

HAKAN: The boat is still too heavy.

GARY: Launching the boat in the conditions usually encountered in the UK is often difficult because of the Snipe weight. Whilst acknowledging that SCIRA probably is the best international class association in the world, the hiararchy seems remote from the sailors; despite being friendly Snipers at heart. As a body they seem conservative and slow to react to any suggested changes to the class, however small or beneficial they may be. Other dinghy sailors in the UK sometimes think Snipe sailors and their boats are a bit of a joke! But they do not know any better.

#### Q: Who is the best Snipe sailor ever?

TOTTO: Since I have just sailed Snipe for seven years it is hard for me to tell you who is the best Snipe sailor ever. It would have been easy to just mention a name of a very good sailor I have met, but it would not have been fair to all the other very good Snipe sailors I have not met.

HAKAN: Felix Gancedo.

GARY: I suppose on record it has to be Earl Elms. Of all the "greats" I've followed around the course my favorite is Jeff Lenhart.

### Q: Which is your best/worst quality as a Snipe sailor?

TOTTO: I have always tried to not quarrel and treat my crew gently. (If not I am sure I have no crew.) I am too serious and make problems out of nothing.

HAKAN: I am good at reaching in a blow. I am not very good at starting.

GARY: Worst — running in light to medium winds. Best — reaching in survival conditions.

## Q: Which three persons do you want to take along if abandoned on a deserted island?

TOTTO: A waitress and a nice looking girl that has studied cooking all her life, and another girl that is a very clever sailor.

HAKAN: My wife Laila, my daughter Marta, and Robinson Crusoe.

GARY: Someone who can brew English beer from bananas. Brit Ekland. A boatbuilder who works very slowly.

## Q: What is: Your favorite Snipe? Favorite color of a Snipe? Favorite crew? Favorite name for a Snipe? Favorite girl?

TOTTO: An old Skipper from Denmark. My Snipe should be grey inside and blue or red outside. It is just enough for

my crew that she/he is a winner, and has a little feeling of Snipe sailing. Everything else we could learn together.

I think "Hot Lips" is a funny Snipe name.

It is very hard to tell you about my favorite girl because I have not met her yet. On the other hand there are several that are very all right, you just have to tell them...

HAKAN: Favorite Snipe: the one that I always dream of, but never can afford to build. Favorite color: black. Favorite crew: my wife. Favorite name: Storken (the bird that brings the babies to the world). Favorite girl: my daughter — she was born in April 1982.

GARY: Skipper – simple, robust, totally competitive. White. "Never let a Daigo by" or "Passing Wind". I answered the next question earlier. Q: What mast and sails do you use? What is your spreader length, the measurement between tips, mast rake?

TOTTO: I use a Pistola mast from Erling Olsen (Denmark) and North or Ullman sails from U.S.A. My spreader length is about 41 cm (16") and from tip to tip about 77 cm (30"). The forward rake is about 6 m and 77 cm (22' 2".) The backward rake is about 10 cm (4") shorter.


HAKAN: I use a circular section Holt-Allen mast. I am a professional sailmaker, and naturally use my own sails, which are known as Neb-sails. My spreaders are 42 cm (16½") long with 72 cm (28½") between tips. My mast rake is 682 cm (22' 4") forward and 655 cm (21' 6") backward.

GARY: North and Shore. Cobra II. Spreaders 17" long, 22" between tips. Forward rake is 20 feet 9 inches, aft rake 21 feet 4 inches.

sible to set a true windward mark. Finally, at 18:40 the count down began. After the start the wind began to die. The lead boat was still five minutes from the first mark at the 11/4 hour time limit, cancelling the race plus any hope of re-racing for the day.

Wednesday, planned as a "lay day" to go to London, or view the historic attractions around Broadstairs and Canterbury, had to be used for racing, with the regatta two races behind schedule. The two races got underway, with the morning going to Dirk de Bock, first, Jan Ratmarton, second, and A. Stratham third. The afternoon saw local A. Tomlinson take the lead, but young Tomlinson went over at the jibe mark, allowing Dirk de Bock to again claim first, Gary Lewis, second, and Jan Ratmatron, third.

On Thursday's race five, D. Mason, D. Jones of UK, and J. Ratmatron reached the first mark together. They had nearly 100 meters lead on the rest of the fleet right up to the jibe mark. Positions began to change, and the gap narrowed, with the gun going to the young Swede, Jan Ratmatron, with David Jones second, R. Stratham third, and D. Mason, UK, fourth.

The final race six on Friday brought the now usual delay, waiting for the wind to settle. Finally it did - and in a steady force 3 wind the fleet got off to a perfect start. Directly they split, a group hugged the coast, whilst the remainder went out to sea. There was little difference in either choice, but on the second beat

conditions had changed; those picking the shore gained an advantage. First to cross the line was America's K. Dobson, second Sweden's L. Osteratrun, and third E. Everaert of Belgium.

The social activities were true to Broadstairs tradition - overwhelming. The mid-week highlight was a barn dance, held in a centuries old local barn. A fine barbecue meal was cooked by the Commodore's lady, Wendy Martin, assisted by Commodore John Martin himself. This particular evening extended into the early hours, and would have gone on - but the farmer wanted to bring the cows in for early morning milking!

Each evening the wine, beer and songs flowed at the club. The visiting overseas crews really enjoyed these traditional English after sailing evenings. The Mayor's reception, in the Town Pavilion, and the Commodore's free beer night in the club were attended in strength.

The final dinner and dance prize-giving was a tremendous night - the first time the European Cup Trophy was presented. Donated by Broadstairs S.C., this magnificent perpetual trophy of inlaid veneer, was complete, even to a traveling box to protect it. Each fleet in the UK had donated trophies, allowing all race winners to take away prizes.

The American helm, Keith Dobson, of Alamitos Bay Y.C. was the regatta winner, but Dirk de Bock of Belgium, first European finisher was winner of the European Cup. Garry Lewis was first to finish for the UK Championship.

The event was a great success. John Bean did a marvellous job, assisted by his wife Frieda, and the club officers and members. The race committee remained calm, and did a marvelous job under difficult wind conditions throughout the regatta, and all credit must go to their ability.

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
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#### Bob Rowland Wins Ohio Open/Riff Raff Regatta

the first race with junior skipper Martin Keen taking second. Martin Keen was also second in the second race, which was won by Dick Mitchell. Rowland led the third race from wire to wire with Scott Cline taking second and Mitchell third. Going into the final race, Keen held a slight lead over Rowland. In spite of a 720 on the first beat, Rowland was second around the first mark and went on to win with Mitchell and Cline taking second and third, respectively.

Gary Woodworth put four good races together and won the B-fleet, edging out Jay Antenen. Curt Koch won the first race, followed by Woodworth and Antenen. Bill Worster won the second race by a large margin and held off Antenen and Woodworth to win the third race as well.
