Mast Head Flotation

At the suggestion of Sam Mollet and Fritz Gram, the Rules Committee decided to look into the feasibility of mast head flotation for Snipes to prevent turtling. The Rules Committee Chairman considers himself uniquely qualified on this subject, having spent more time in the Stable Two Position (upside down) than some of the younger skippers have spent upright.

A reasonably new (#24,747) fiberglass boat was fully rigged, sails strapped in, centerboard raised to the normal reachingrunning position and then turned over at the dock. With the top of the mast at water level, there was a 13 lb. load at the mast head. This means that we would need about .208 cubic feet or 360 cubic inches of flotation at the mast head to resist turtling. This equals a 12'' square x 1¼'' thick float on each side of the sail.

In addition, if we want to take into consideration the additional mast head load due to the wind force on the up-turned hull, we can look for an additional 10 to 11 lbs. of down force at the mast head. This would mean 275 to 300 cubic inches more flotation. We know that some other classes are adding mast head flotation or are considering it. The question before the Rules Committee is: Do Snipe skippers want to sail with 360 to 660 cubic inches of mast head flotation, and what level of protection against turtling do you want? Please let us hear from you.

Minutes of the European Officers And National Secretaries' Meeting

SUMMARY OF MINUTES European Officers and National Secretaries, Sept. 7 and Sept. 11, 1986, Real Club De Regatas, Santiago de La Ribera, Spain.

PRESENT: European General Secretary Louis Paul Lamarque, Vice European Secretary Antonio Roquette, South European Secretary and Secretary for Spain Francisco Perez Lopez, and the following National Secretaries: Denmark, Niels Kampmann; Finland, Roger Nylund (not present for the second meeting); France, Gerard Brossard; Holland, Jo Broughton; Italy, Enzo Perini; Norway, Birger Jansen; Portugal, Domingos Borralho; Sweden, Largs Angur (for Tomas Franzen); U.K., John Broughton.

REPORT General Secretary: Lamarque reported need for consolidating SCIRA Europe. Rejection of entry from Argentina, by Lamarque. Problems with the 1986 Junior Worlds. He has visited throughout Europe to gain knowledge of problems. Confident of growth in Europe. Minutes of the meeting at Palma 2/3/86 were accepted.

REPORT Vice-Secretary: Roquette will not be active for the next two years due to Olympic class involvement. His view is that Europe should push for higher voice in SCIRA affairs.

1986 EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIP REPORT: Perez Lopez, Spain, went over the race and social program.

Question raised of SCIRA rep on the Committee boat. Enzo Perini, Italy, chosen by vote for his knowledge of Spanish language.

Argument ensued for more Europeans on the protest committee. Spain agreed to compromise of one independent represen-

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Spain requested a substitute entry be allowed for the defending champion. Not allowed.

Denmark strongly objected that English is not used for this championship. Agreed that at future championships English must be the official written and oral language. Spain requested to use both Spanish and English for all information for the rest of the 1986 championship.

Vice European Secretary gave each member a copy of Snipe measurement. Recommended that the document be studied then discussed at the next meeting.

As the meeting reconvened Lamarque gave a brief review of the previous session.

Lamarque expressed strong disapproval of Spanish still being used throughout the championship. He insisted that all items in reference to the championship be in Spanish and English.

Roquette moved "In all future European Championships the official language be English. The use of other languages as secondary can be the perogative of hosting country."

MEASURING: Measurement for the championship took three days. Roquette said it is too complicated with too large a committee. Future aim should be for one day, requiring only weighing Snipe and measuring length/width. Checking mast and boom, plus sails. A measurement committee of three should be elected every two years to measure at European champion-ships.

Vice European Secretary submitted proposal for measuring at Europeans: "Nomination of a committee of three to study document presented at prior meeting of September 7. Following recommendations, or alterations, this then becomes Euro Championship measuring procedure

... Following approval all National Secretaries to provide equipment for fleet measurers to carry out procedure. A measurement data sheet then be completed for each boat, which will be open to inspection by the measuring committee. At all European championships the measuring committee shall check a basic of: 1. total weight. 2. mast and boom. 3. moment of interia. 4. sails. Should the measuring committee decide to check further items on the data sheet then that acceptable."

Put to vote. Proposal accepted with Spain and Italy against.

Selection of Measuring Committee up to December 1988: Following elected: Erickson of Sweden, Olsen of Denmark, and Santos of Portugal. Chairman to be member in opposite hemisphere to hosting country of European Championship.

Future European Championship hosting will be a minimum of one crew, plus National Secretary of each country. John Broughton will convey this information to Rules Chairman.

Problems of World Junior Championship discussed. Should be clarified at World Board Meeting in 1987. Italy will submit a balance sheet for \$10,000 SCIRA grant for the championship to the Board.

France was unable to give a definite date for the World Championship 1987. Dan Williams, Chuck Loomis, P. Bernard and the new European team will comprise the measuring committee.

Race Committee will be drawn from France and U.S.A.

Hosting extended to SCIRA officials, National Secretaries and one crew from each country.

Question of problems for various countries of early dates discussed. As France assured the July/August dates were when winds are most advantageous, then Europe had to give support. France was asked to come to a definite date without delay.

Championship dates and venues:

European Championships, 1988, Julesminden, Denmark

European Championships, 1990, Portugal

Junior Europeans, 1987, Italy.

Norway wanted to extend junior age limit. Not possible under IYRU rules. Same rules to govern measuring as newly adopted policy. Not necessary to bring in the new measurement committee.

Portugal proposed: "The Junior Europeans adopt the rules on racing, quotas, plus hosting, as ... in European Championship." Passed with two against.

European Cup, 1987. Belgium wants to host, but is not current as a SCIRA country. Lamarque will follow up with Belgium. Portugal and Spain offered to host the Cup if Belgium does not.

Recommendation that a maximum length be set for the whisker pole. Recommendation that the pole be no longer than the boom. Will be conveyed to the Rules Chairman.

Various National reports:

Belgium — no dues since 1982, but there are boats active. A new secretary may have been elected. Will be contacted.

Switzerland: Italy will maintain contact. John Broughton will continue contact with Harry Levinson.

Angola — Portugal in contact and hopeful of results.

Morocco — Interest is there. Encouragement to be given by South Europe.

Holland — Spain challenged a Dutch national secretary. Holland explained agreement with Board to try to build up country's numbers. Vice Secretary and Italy considered if no increase in one year, representing secretary should be reviewed. England objected to the secretaries' body making this decision under Rule 32 of the constitution.

ELECTION: Vice Secretary for Europe and North European Secretary resigned. Following elected: General Secretary for Europe Louis Paul Lamarque re-elected. Vice Secretary for Europe — John Broughton elected. North European Secretary — Bert Forsberg elected. South European Secretary — Francisco Perez Lopez re-elected.

Meeting adjourned after thanks from the Secretary General.

MEETING OF OFFICERS, SECRE-TARIES AND MEASURING TEAM FOR EUROPE, 12/9/86. Secretary General Lamarque introduced the new officers and the new measuring team. Santos will be the chairman for the first test of the measuring team in 1988.

There was a short review of plans for the encouragement of Snipe sailing in Switzerland by Broughton of England and by Italy. Italy will also be active in encouraging East Europe. Portugal will maintain contact with Angola. The General Secretary will try to resolve the problems with Belgium and to encourage Morocco.

There was a complaint that English was still not being used in the championship. Despite the language problem appreciation was expressed to the hosting club and SCIRA Spain for their hospitality for this championship.

Erling Olsen stated that 60 days may not be long enough to complete a measuring document. He said any delay will be a minimum. He hopes to get it right the first time. He also spoke of interest in Snipe in North Germany. He will encourage Denmark to exploit the interest.

Spain will submit a report of the European Championship to the BULLETIN.

Appreciation was expressed to retiring officers, and the General Secretary concluded by notifying all present that there seems no need to call a meeting before the world championship next year.



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Ken Simons Tops World Masters!

In a sailing career that spans 50 + years, Ken Simons wins one of his biggest honors — the first Snipe World Masters Championship. Buzz Levinson is second, Bill Buckles third.

Six SCIRA Commodores were on hand September 17, 18, and 19 as Snipe Fleet 330 and Atlanta Yacht Club hosted the first Snipe World Masters Championship in conjunction with the U.S. Masters. They were Ted Wells '54, Eddie Williams '55, Freddie Schenck '58, Buzz Levinson '59, Red Garfield '60, and Dan Williams '77.

Skies were cool and cloudy and a brisk 20 knot plus easterly breeze whipped the national flags of the participants as they were raised, and the cannon was fired to begin the first World Masters.

Six countries participated in the five race series conducted by Fred Pember and his talented race committee.

The 32 teams encountered sailing conditions that ranged from semi-survival on Wednesday, to perfect on Thursday, to magna cum patience on Friday. Regardless of the conditions, the racing was tight, with many positions gained and lost on the finish line.

Going into the final race, the leaders were Bill Buckles (US), Ken Simons (US), and Bibi Juetz (BL), less than three points apart. When the last long drifting leg was over Ken Simons emerged on top of the scoring, followed by Buzz Levinson (US) in second with two firsts on Friday, and Bill Buckles (US) in third.

At the awards ceremony the top three stood proudly on stepped risers while three American flags were hoisted as the national anthem was played. Everyone sensed that this was indeed a special occasion. Simons stated that it was 50 years ago that he had won his first sailing trophy.

Top three skippers in each age group: Grand Masters (65 and up), Richard Edwards (US) 1st, Eddie Williams (US) 2nd, and Ted Wells (US) 3rd. Juniors (55 to 65), Ken Simons 1st, Buzz Levinson 2nd, and Francis Seavy (US) 3rd. Freshman (up to 55), Bill Buckles 1st, Pete Duvoisin (US) 2nd, and Bibi Juetz (BL) 3rd.

C.S. Reddy of India made a gracious presentation of his club burgee to AYC Commodore Henry Wade, and made other presentations to Ted Wells and to Regatta Chairman John Muhlhausen.

The second race got underway with the wind increasing. Gary Lewis, representing Budworth fleet, took the line by storm and moved into a commanding position ... It was to be shortlived when his jib tore in half along a seam. As the wind increased so did the capsizes. Even the young agile French crew from Le Havre fleet, used to such rough conditions, could not avoid a ducking.

With the rising sea and strengthening wind, racing became a matter of brute force, whilst a percentage of the entries decided retirement was advisable! On the last beat Peter Wolstenholm was leading the dwindled fleet, when only a few yards from the line he capsized to let Alan Williams and Jim Law take the finishing gun, with second going to locals Doug Spooner and John Warner.

At the finish of the second race the committee called off further racing, owning to the return of the gale. It had been a good regatta, with the genuine hospitality of the club welcoming visiting crews to stay in their homes. Appreciation was extended to the French entry for making the long trip with presentation of special mementoes.

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Atlantic Coast Series Draws 57 Boats To Marblehead

Steve Callison and crew Jane Faust, of Rochester, NY, triumphed over a competitive fleet of 57 boats to win the 1986 Snipe Atlantic Coast Championship. Hosted by the Eastern Yacht Club, the series was sailed August 2-3 off Marblehead, Massachusetts.

Shifty breezes and choppy seas put a premium on consistent tactics and good boatspeed throughout the series. After strong finishes of 2-4-1-1 in the first four races, Callison and Faust had the five-race, one-throwout series wrapped up. Throwing out their 16th place finish in the fifth race, they won the championship with 7½ points.

Art and Kate Rousmaniere, of Tewksbury, MA, took the runner-up spot with finishes of 1-(8)-4-4-8 for 16³/₄ points. Ed and Meredith Adams, of Newport, RI, were close behind in third, with 18 points. The Adams team was fresh off a win at the Snipe National Championship, held at Chautauqua, NY, July 21-25. Callison's victory was all the sweeter since he had finished third at the Nationals, behind Adams and Rousmaniere.

Local Marbleheaders captured the fourth and fifth place spots. Rob and Carolyn Brodsky sailed a strong series with only one finish out of the top 10, to place fourth overall. Sandy Ray Adzick and BJ Jones sailed a more consistent series to finish fifth.

The Atlantic Coast series was sailed in light to moderate conditions. Saturday's first race was delayed by two general recalls as the shifty breeze kept the Race Committee on their toes trying to maintain a square starting line. Thereafter, the Committee made use of the provision in the Sailing Instructions allowing them to disqualify any boat over the starting line within one minute of the start — a threat which quickly reined in the aggressive fleet.

A building seabreeze and sizable spectator fleet created choppy conditions for Saturday's second race. The wind peaked around 12 knots, the strongest of the series. No strangers to those conditions, Annapolis sailors Griff Hall and Lisa Foulke won the race, just ahead of Adams.

Saturday's final race got off to a good start, but after the first 15 boats rounded the final leeward mark of the Olympic course, the breeze all but died. Callison and Faust led the top boats up the final beat in the last of the breeze, leaving the rest of the fleet struggling to reach the finish line within the time limit.

Susan and Janice Tabor, of Winchester, MA, came on strong to dominate Sunday's
