FROM THE COMMODORE

As we finish the year the major international SCIRA events for this year, which started with the World Junior Championships for the summer vacation period followed by the European Championship, World Masters, and Western Hemisphere Championships are behind us now, and winter is upon us.

How was your sailing this past year? I trust that everyone's hard training paid off with good results. Also, I hope that this year was enjoyable and good for each of you with the increased experience of racing, many new Snipe friends, and some good travels to foreign countries and/or new sailing locations.

On behalf of the officers and members of the Class, I wish to thank everyone at all of the host clubs who planned and implemented these happy projects. Your hard work really paid off!

Incidentally, I think it's about time for your new Rule Book to arrive. I sincerely thank the people of the administration as well as all who participated in compilation of this wonderful book which has been totally revised. Let me urge each Snipe sailor to read it carefully, especially the Rules for Conducting Regattas and the Sailing Instructions.

Let me also thank Commodore and Mrs. Colin Callender, Mr. George Kelly, Ms. Dianne Holowesko and the other volunteers and members of the Royal Nassau Sailing Club for hosting the 1992 Western Hemisphere Championships. Also, thanks to the National Secretaries of the nations who participated in this event which helped commemorate the 500th anniversary of Columbus' discovery of the New World. Also, my personal congratulations to all of the competitors!

Looking forward to next year, the hosts for the 1993 Worlds, Clube Dos Jangadeiros, were kind enough the change the dates to November. This was in consideration of the desires of many of the Northern Hemisphere nations. I appreciate this change and sincerely hope that this does not present too many problems in planning and preparation, especially for the sailors of the Southern Hemisphere!

People in different situations always have different ideas, however I am grateful to the host club for understanding the circumstances and for looking at the issue from the viewpoint of a member of the global Snipe family. This is a great indication that our organization is young and flexible, not a hard-headed bureaucracy, incapable of change and compromise.

Looking further into the future, I am happy to see that there is strong bidding to host future Championships, and that many of these decisions have been made. This is due, in part, to the positive and cooperative stance of the European nations at the meeting in Kokkola, Finland, this past summer. Then, in addition, I have received a report from Mr. Luis Alberto Carluccio, the General Secretary of the Western Hemisphere, that in South America they too have already selected sponsoring nations for various events up to 1996. I am glad and encouraged that the activities of the Snipe family thus continue to thrive and expand.

I have also been informed that the South American Games (ODESUR) may include the Snipe as part of their 1994 Games in Panama. I do hope that this will be successfully implemented.

Unfortunately, our attempts to include the Snipe in the Asian Games, scheduled for 1994 in Japan, were unsuccessful. Nonetheless, it is my hope to use the 1994 World Snipe Festival, which will be hosted by Japan and which will include the Masters, Women's and Junior World Championships, as a springboard for further efforts to spread the Snipe throughout the Aisian Nations. This is the first step to becoming a part of the Games.

Let me ask each member of the Snipe family to help promote the Snipe and to write or speak with officials and organizers and request that they consider the Snipe in their plans.

For Japanese Snipers under 20 years of age there are virtually no chances to have interrelations with young Snipers of other countries except for the occasion of participating in the Junior World Championships, which are held only every two years. It is my hope to somehow give these youngsters a better chance of widening their experiences of the world through the common language of Snipe competition. I feel that my experiences in the Snipe Class are valuable for those youngsters who live here in these isolated islands.

One possible idea for expansion in this area would be to initiate a Pan Pacific Championship. This would be held in alternating years, on the odd years when World Juniors are not held. This event would include Snipers, including juniors from the Asian and Oceanic regions. To implement this idea we must first get some fleets started in Australia, New Zealand, and the other nations of the western rim of the Pacific.

Let me urge each of you to continue to promote the Snipe at all levels. Your personal work in bringing just one new Sniper into your fleet is crucial to our continued success, for this is how things must be done, one boat at a time. For those who are able, continue to promote the Snipe at the national and international level. We are known throughout the world of sailing, but we can and must do more to spread our message and our boat.

As I write this, your nominating committee, chaired by Past Commodore Means Davis, is searching for those who will follow the Flag Officers and Board Members whose terms are expiring. These new officers will be central figures as we seek to expand and thrive.

On this occasion I wish to express my heartfelt thanks to everyone who has guided SCIRA in the right direction and performed lots of volunteer work. Let me especially thank those who helped make my year successful. At the same time I urge all of you, new members and old, to look forward to a great Snipe year in 1993

1993 U.S. NATIONAL SITE/DATES SET

Mentor Harbor Yacht Club and Snipe Fleet 042 will host the '93 Nationals. Mentor Harbor is in the Cleveland, Ohio, area, and at one time was the largest Snipe fleet in the world. Now, a revitalized fleet under Fleet Captain Ted Pinkerton has stepped forward and accepted the challenge of hosting our nationals. We hear great things about this place and are looking forward to visiting. The dates are August 18th through 27th; that's what we know now, but will warn you that this schedule is subject to fine-tuning, as you will recall was the case with the dates for the 1992 Nationals. KEANE AND KEENAN OF U.S.A. ARE WESTERN HEMISPHERE CHAMPS

John Keane and Ted Keenan are an experienced team, having sailed together at Harvard, and that experience showed as they won a light-air, seven-race Western Hemisphere Championship, but the real story, from the viewpoint of team strength, has to be the super performance of the U.S.A.'s District One representatives, who took three of the top six spots. Bryan Fishback and Lorie Stout took the first race win on their way to fourth overall, while their Annapolis teammates, Hal Gilreath with Will Glenn crewing, took the win in race four and ended up in sixth overall. Argentina was just behind, team-wise, taking second, third, and seventh overall.

The week got off to a great start with the Opening Ceremonies. Among the highlights were speeches by Bahamas' Minister for Tourism, the Minister of Sport, and finally, the Prime Minister himself. After the flags were raised the party started, an early indicator of just how adept the Bahamians are at mixing competition and fun.

Those who might have expected conditions similar to those reported from the Winter Circuit were surely disappointed, as it was a different time of year with totally different conditions. Serious hiking winds were rare, making tactics the determining factor. One need only look at the

record of seven-time Gamblin winner Jeff Lenhart to see that experience gained in the month of March meant little or nothing in October and while some hometown spectators talked about local knowledge, Jimmy Lowe's second place finish in race six was the only Bahamian placing in the top five of any race.

Annapolis veterans Bryan Fishback and Lorie Stout got things off to a good start, taking the win in Race #1, with Argentina's John McCall and Sergio Ripoll in second, their only serious showing of the week. Keane and Keenan were third, followed by Brasilians Pepe D'Elia and Anders Schmidt, and Antonio Leme and Marcelo Maia in fourth and fifth, respectively.


Race two gave Keane and Keenan a chance to show that they were the team to beat as they took the win, followed by Pan-American Gold Medal winners, Manso and Lorenzo of Cuba in their best result of the series. Third was Ivan Pimental and Gustavo Farah of Brasil with Japans' Yoshikazu Itabashi and Mashiko Ota in fourth.

Day two started off with almost no wind. In the day's first race the Argentinean team of Cristian Omar and Alejandro Andres came rocketing (ghosting?) off the pin end of the line and had a horizon-job lead at

the first mark. As the race progressed several boats made moves to reel in the leaders, but all were unsuccessful. Meanwhile, back in the pack, Keane and Keenan were having a very hard time. They had apparently fouled someone at the start and after doing their turns started in what appeared to be last place. They managed to keep their cool, and picked off boat after boat to record a very impressive come-frombehind seventh place.

Race four was more light air, in fact at times it was a drifter and District One's Hal Gilreath, with crew Will Glenn, was up to the challenge, taking the bullet as the Autumn sun was setting. Second was to Guillermo Parada and Gonzalo Martinez, giving them the overall lead with a record of 6-6-3-2. Leme and Maia backed up their race two third with a second, putting them into contention with finishes of 5-9-2-3, no surprise for this team. Keane and Keenan faded to 11th, causing some to wonder if the light air was more than they could handle, or maybe if Keenan was a little to "beefy" to be paired with John.

Those doubts were put to rest on day three of the racing as the boys from Boston took a second in race five and backed that up with a bullet in race six. The action in race five was some of the week's

best, featuring a three boat shootout between 1991 World Champions Axel Rodger and Jorge Quiroga of Argentina, 1989 World Champion and defending champion of this event, "Ricky" Fabini and Ivan Guicheff of Uruguay, and Keane and Keenan. The final leg was really exciting with Rodger in the lead, trying to decide who to cover while the two followers gave up a tacking duel to concentrate on boat speed in the dying breezes. Finally Keane eased-

off and began to foot away from Fabini. When he tacked to port he easily crossed the defending Champion in an "in-your-face" move that sealed his claim to the Championship.

Perhaps this would be a good time to note that Fabini was sailing with a broken leg, the result of a bicycle accident in Miami. Ever his cheerful self, and despite a knee-length cast, he and Guicheff managed to finish eighth overall. If he was disappointed he never showed it, reminding this observer of Harold Meerhoff's spirit after a last race breakdown cost him and his skipper the title at the 1990 Junior Worlds in Spain. For those of you who are new to the Class, Harold crewed with Ricky in Karatsu, Japan, when they won the 1989 Worlds. These continuing demonstrations of sportsmanship on the part of the Uruguayans are refreshing and indicative of the secret of our Class's success.

The final race of the Championship belonged to Argentina's Fumagallo brothers, Eduardo and Mario. They were followed by Fabini in second, and Gilreath and Glenn in third. Meanwhile, back in the crowd, Keane was keeping in touch with Parada and Rodger, and sailed to a throwout twelfth.

The Awards Banquet was another indication of what a great event this was for all who participated. A large power catamaran took everyone out an island where a large pavilion was the scene of the final fling. Check out the size of the bottle of Champagne that was presented to Keane and Keenan. That gives you some idea of what a fantastic job the hosts did all week long. Some other highlights of the social week were the soiree hosted by Commodore and Mrs. Colin Callender at their beautiful home, Winton Crest, and a fabulous poolside fashion show featuring the beautiful Girls from Brazil. As Honorary Vice Commodore Katsumi Hirata remarked from his runway-side seat; "I appreciate beauty!".



damage caused by Hurricane Andrew. These picturesque boats, traditional and yet modern, their enthusiastic crews, and the on-shore festivities must be experienced to be believed.

As a native of a Mardi Gras city, I thought I had some idea of what Junkanoo would be like, but never in my wildest dreams did I expect the fantastic, wildly colorful costumes. And then there is the Junkanoo rhythm, relentless, pounding, hypnotic, pulse-quickening, and driving are adjectives that come to mind in a rational moment. To be standing on the street surrounded by

the deafening cacophony is another matter, as the parade continues around and around through the heart of old Nassau town until sunrise. To borrow an old cliche, you had to be there.

From start to finish, top to bottom, this event set the standard for great ones. Great parties, great Race Management, great hosts and great parties, how many times can you say great? Special thanks go to Regatta Chairman George Kelly. This man is a pro and it shows. Also, Diane Holowesko deserves special mention as do all of the RNSC officers and members who volunteered their time to make this such a special Championship.

BARTMAN!! HACKWORTH AND ROGERS-1992 U.S. CHAMPIONS!

Bart Hackworth from Tiburon, CA, teaming with crew Jon Rogers, captured the 1992 Snipe U.S. National Championship sailed at Alamitos Bay Yacht Club in Long Beach, CA, during August 3-8, 1992. Hackworth bested 32 other Snipes in the championship Heinzerling series with one throwout allowed. The experienced Snipe team of Hackworth and Rogers sailed a very consistent series with only one finish in double digits (which became their throwout). A previous winner of the competitive Snipe Midwinters circuit, a National Champion in the Santana 20 class, and a winner of US SAILING'S Championship of Champions, Hackworth added perhaps his most prestigous trophy to his collection with the Snipe National Championship.

The Snipe Nationals have traditionally fielded some of the finest sailors in the United States, including such Snipe champions as Dave Ullman, Mark Reynolds, Dave Chapin, and Craig Leweck, to name a few. The 1992 U.S. Snipe Nationals once again boasted a very deep and talented group of sailors. A total of 92 Snipes raced

at the 1992 Nationals, including a fleet of 15 Snipes racing Junior Nationals, 33 Snipes racing in the Heinzerling (championship flight) series, and 44 Snipes competing in the Wells (consolation flight) series. A varied group of Snipers from throughout the United States, coupled with the immensely active California Snipe contingent, provided challenging competition in what has turned out to be the largest one-design championship hosted in Southern California this season.

Kicking off the Snipe Nationals at Alamitos Bay Yacht Club were the Junior Nationals. The Snipe Class prides itself on being very "growth" oriented and hence a Junior championship acts as a great incentive for bringing younger sailors into the class. Two separate fleets were held at the Junior Nationals including a Junior skipper and crew fleet and a Junior skipper and Senior crew fleet. In the Junior skipper/crew fleet of ten boats, Mark Ivey with crew Kevin Richards came in first place. The son and father team of skipper Lucas Diaz and crew Augie Diaz from Miami, Florida, handily won the Junior skipper/Senior crew fleet of five boats with all bullets.

Following the Junior Nationals were the "Senior" Nationals. The first two days of racing consisted of the Crosby Series (named in honor of William Crosby, who designed the Snipe in 1931!). All 77 competing Senior Snipes races in the Crosby series with the top finishing 33 boats later to race in the Heinzerling series and the

44 remaining boats competing in the Wells series.

The Crosby series was sailed in uncharacteristic light winds of 5 to 8 knots in the

ocean waters off Sunset Beach. Coupled with the light wind was moderate chop which put a premium on boat tuning and handling. Olympic-style courses provided

long and tactical legs for the competing Snipes. After two days of the Crosby series, previous class champion Craig Leweck, sailing with his wife Lisa, bested the other 76 entrants to win the Crosby Memorial Trophy.

Two separate race courses managed by Alamitos Bay Yacht Club hosted the concurrent Heinzerling series and the Wells series. Heinzerling race action took place in the open ocean waters off Sunset Beach and the Wells series was held inside Los Angeles Harbor.

The typical Long Beach weather pattern filled in for the final three days of championship racing with southwesterly winds of 9 to 12 knots the norm for the first early afternoon race, followed by a more robust 14 to 18 knots in the second race each day. Long Beach's infamous "favored right side" certainly proved valid for the Snipe Nationals. As is typical with the highly competitive Snipe fleet, several general recalls took place each day as the aggressive sailors fought for the favored right side.

Winners in the consolation Wells series were Snipe veterans Mike Bartell from Long Beach, California, and crew Gary Davidson. A strong field of 44 Snipes raced in the Wells series providing an intense level of competition rivaling the action seen in the Heinzerling fleet. The 1992 Snipe Nationals were an "open" championship (e.g. no pre-qualification required). As a result, the regatta attracted a very strong field of 77 boats during the Nationals.

Snipe sailors are well known for combining skillful sailing with fun social activities, and the 1992 Snipe Nationals provided not only top flight racing, but a week loaded with fun post race activities. Social coordinator Lynda Fox from ABYC orchestrated numerous evening events, including a live reggae band, Karaoke singing, evening barbeques overlooking Alamitos Bay at ABYC, and a lovely sit-down awards dinner. Snipers are also known to show a good sense of humor, and this was demonstrated appropriately at the awards dinner. The dinner invitation stated that coats and ties were required for the gentlemen.

A group of younger sailors happened to be short the required necktie apparel and jury-rigged duct-tape ties, much to the delight of the other sailors.


