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

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Around The Snipe World

A LOSS IN RIMINI

Fleet 048, Rimini, Italy, lost a son, and their fleet captain, Mattia De Carolis, in a tragic boating accident. During a regatta from San Remo to Casablanca, the yacht Parsifal, skippered by Mattia, sank 60 miles north of Menorca Island due to very heavy weather conditions.

Only three sailors were rescued after 18 hours (9 crew members total). Mattia died during the night due to exhaustion and exposure. The boat, a 60 foot wooden cutter (seen by many at the Rimini Worlds) was destroyed by a wave and sank in only 3 minutes during a storm that involved the other 29 boats, but with no other loss of life.

Mattia was fleet captain of the Rimini fleet and had a very important role in the organization of the 37th World Championship this past summer. Mattia was only 36 and he spent a great part of his life on the sea, competing and cruising. Mattia had scheduled to sail the Transat des Alisees regatta from Casablanca to Guadalupa and was sailing to boat to that regatta. Mattia is survived by his father, Giancarlo, whose engraving graced the August Snipe Bulletin cover.

A Tribute to Loomis/Williams

Then end of the year 1995 marks the end of an era in the International Snipe Class as Class stalwarts Dan Williams and Chuck Loomis retire from active participation in Class affairs.

Dan Williams

Williams, who began sailing Snipes in 1949 remains active racing in his home fleet #142 Privateer, in Chattanooga, TN., is many times fleet champion and twice winner of the Southern Snipe Championship. He was first elected to the Board of Governors of SCIRA in 1971 and has been there ever since. After serving as International Commodore of SCIRA in 1977 he became Vice Chairman of the Rules Committee, gradually taking on more of the responsibilities of that committee before becoming Chairman in 1985. Throughout his 24 years on the Board of Governors he has championed the integrity of the SCIRA Constitution and the interests of "average club sailors, the guys who pay the bills" when he felt their interests were being threatened. He especially deplored change simply for the sake of change and was quietly pleased that in some corners of the Snipe world he was known as "Dr. No." He was never more quotable than at a recent international regatta when, upon witnessing a competitor wetting his boat down prior to being weighed, he told the sailor, "We know how much water weighs: we want to know how much your boat weighs!"

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A Tribute to Loomis/Williams

Chuck Loomis

In many ways the "conscience of the Snipe Class" and arguably the most respected person associated with SCIRA, has sailed for 30 years with fleet #77, Winchester, Massachusetts. An avid skier in the winter months, he became the first Chief Measurer of the Snipe Class. Chuck first participated in measuring at the National level in 1971, and has participated at every US National Championship ever since. He was appointed in 1972 by "Mr. Snipe" then-rules Committee Chairman and former World Champion Ted Wells. As Chief Measurer he has administered the measuring in use worldwide which assures the buyer of a new Snipe that he has spent his money for a legal boat. In addition, his first World Championship measuring was at Malaga in 1973, and he has attend all but two of them ever since! He served as SCIRA Representative for the Pan American Games three times in addition to attending other international regattas. He has been Vice Chairman of the Rules Committee since 1985, and in 1991 was elected Honorary Vice Commodore of the Class. Often crusty. always direct, he has been quick to speak out on issues that face SCIRA and to take to task

those who do not meet his own high standards of integrity and dedication. Over 10 years ago he penned an article in the Bulletin entitled "One Boat for All?" which put "modernization" of the Snipe in a perspective that is still valid today.

SCIRA is fortunate indeed that Dan Williams and Chuck Loomis, although no longer involved in day-to-day management, remain as "honorable counselors" to their successors and to Snipe sailors around the

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International Snipe Regatta

Le Havre, France

After a season where I have sailed all the Snipe Open regattas including Budworth, the last and in terms of the wind conditions the hardest, you might have thought I was due for a rest. Imagine my surprise then, when one evening I received a phone call from Sarah Mees, one of the Snipe Class stalwarts. Amongst all the baby noises (just practising) I was able to discern the inescapable fact that the annual International Snipe regatta at Le Havre would be taking place the following weekend.

My initial excuse of being boatless was thrown out on the grounds that a boat could easily be borrowed. We told them that we would think about it and ring them back later in the week. Once we had been to the travel agent we realised that finances wouldn't be a problem and we were able to buy two return tickets Portsmouth/Le Havre for 23 pounds each. For those of you who haven't tried this crossing we recommend it. We were able to enjoy a nice sauna and a refreshing shower on the outward leg and the lovely autumn weather made sitting out on the deck an enjoyable affair.

At Le Havre we were met by Maxim Romain of Harwich fame. He said he saw us long before we saw him because my long blue Hood sailbag "sticks out" miles away. As we walked the "gang" plank an English tourist said "don't turn around now", referring to the long sails on my shoulder. As I said "pardon" I almost knocked him over the head!

Maxim and his family, who are all Snipers to a more or lesser degree, put us up at their house and proved fabulous hosts throughout the weekend.

Saturday dawned grayish with a north east force 3-4 blowing. Nine gallant Snipes took the first start gun. I felt lucky to have been lent a lovely new Persson built Snipe by Jacques Romain. Maxim's father. We had a Sidewinder mast and my own trusty sails. My crew was Stephan, also of Harwich fame. I miscalculated the first start which led to a long fight up the fleet. Our main opponent here, and in all subsequent races proved to be Rene LeBour and Pascal Blondelle an excellent team in a brand new Italian Lillia Snipe. Swapping tack for tack up the last beat we finally gained the upper hand over Rene. Anne Romain, this time crewing her own boat with Ariel, an ex-pat Spaniard, came in a close third. The second race went back to back and this time, with a clean get-away, we soon had fair winds and powered to our

second victory, with Rene again second, thus concluding a successful day's sailing for the Anglo-French team.

Saturday's evening after sail proved exceptional. The fleet sat down to a sumptuous dinner at the local bowling club. Cristina and I were pleasantly surprised to find that our halting French was not often called into use as so many of the French Snipers speak excellent English. After dinner it was change your shoes time as we all got down to the riveting game of ten pin bowling. At first we wished that we had stuck to sailing, but gradually more pins started going down and we all had a great time.

Sunday brought more wind and an immense sea. Le Havre boasts one of the biggest dinghy sailing schools in France and we shared our race area with the French Europe team and Lasers. Sunday's first race start line was shared with the 420's and we were late off again. Alain Jardain's exquisite wooden Snipe with it's 10,000 sail number made many an older head turn as he sailed a splendid race finishing in a credible 5th position.

In the last regatta the Anglo/French team mistook the yellow leeward buoy for the pin end of the start line (the small red pin buoy was hidden in the deep blue sea) so their fourth successive victory didn't count allowing Rene a meritorious first position. No sooner had the Snipe fleet reached land than the gray skies miraculously cleared and gorgeous afternoon made us all smile. Everyone lent a hand to help pack up the Snipes onto their double trailers ready for the next Snipe regatta in Paris. Afterwards we all drank champagne at the prize giving.

Cristina and I learned a lot about Normandy during our stay and even had time to visit historic Honfleur with it's quaint port forming the town square as it were, and it's lovely timbered buildings, but that's another story. We have come away overwhelmed by French hospitality and good sailing. Our advice is: when an opportunity to sail on the continent presents itself, go for it! You will come away with a richer sailing experience and, best of all, new friends.

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Brazilian Southern Championships

Paradeda/Krahe Team Up for the Win

The 1995 Brazilian Southern Championships were held at Clube de Campo de São Paulo September 7-9. The regatta attendance was up to 57 boats from the 8 Snipes that attended last year's event.

The weather was cooperative, for those who like water-skiing. It waswarm and sunny, but the wind conditions were very light, ranging from 3 to 8 knots. Due to this lack of wind, only 4 of the 7 scheduled races were completed. Since the sailing area was in a narrower part of Guarapiranga Lake, the race course had one more triangle or one more leeward and windward legs.

The first race started at 4 pm with a 8 knot Southerly. Paulo Frisch and Carmen Lindemann rounded the weather mark in first followed by Ricardo Paradeda and Fernando Krahe and Maurício Santa Cruz and Fábio Mautse in third. Paradeda/Krahe gybed in first and pulled out a bit of a margin at the bottom mark. In the third reach Santa Cruz/Matuse took the lead. The positions in the 4th and last beat remained steady. Final finishes were Santa Cruz/Matuse winning with Paradeda/Krahe second, Carlos Chaves and Nicolau Branco third.

The second race started just like the first race. Henrique de Lorenzi and Cristiano Kessler rounded the weather mark first and kept this position until the run. Santa Cruz/ Matuse entered the last beat in first and won the race with Paradeda/Krahe just behind. Antônio Paes Leme/Marcelo Maia were third followed by Felipe Etchenique and Enrico Francavilla. Fifth was Fernando Kessler and

The third race started earlier in the afternoon with a light wind from the Northwest. The starting line was just in front of the club with a windward/leeward course. At the attention signal there were many

in the club waiting for the wind to fill in the entire sailing area. It never did at this race. Positions changed constantly during the entire race as there were big wind shifts with no pattern followed by areas of no wind at all. Bruno Ruthenberg and Andre Schierz won the race with Paes Leme/Maia in second. Third was Pepe and Lucia D'Elia and fourth was Paradeda/Krahe. Only 26 boats finished the race within 30 minutes after the first crossed the finishing line.

The boats came ashore expecting some wind for a last race. When it came, the Race Committee quickly set the course. The wind came stronger than in the first race and still from the same direction. The left side paid off and Kessler/Ribeiro rounded the weather mark first followed by Santa Cruz/Matuse. Fernanda Debellian and Eduardo Neves rounded in third with Paradeda/Krahe in fourth. In the first run the wind shifted almost 180 degrees. The top five positions didn't change. In the last beat Santa Cruz/ Matuse passed Kessler/Ribeiro winning the race. Third and fourth were Paradeda/Krahe and Debellian/Neves.

Everyone returned to the CCSP after the fourth race to pack up boats. At night there were the awards ceremony and after that the club threw a big party.

Punta Indiani Fleet wins Golden Snipe Award —

Italy held its annual Fleet Captains meeting with elections of new officers for the coming year. In addition, the Italians named the winners of the Coppa Duca di Genova trophy with the team of Perini and Oselladore of fleet 399, Del Gato. Giorgio Brezich was second of 85 crews for the combined score for 1995. The Golden Snipe award, the annual Fleets trophy has been captured by Fleet 415, Punta Indiani. The Golden Snipe sums the points taken by the top two crews of each fleet in every National regatta plus the National Championships. Eighteen fleets had points this year with two new fleets being chartered for 1996. Lago di Ledro in northern Italy near Lake Garda, and Anzio, south of Rome.

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

Deciphering The Four Telltale Gears

by Dave Dellenbaugh

One of the best guides for trimming your headsail (and for steering) is the action of the telltales along the front of your sail. Below are 4 examples of telltale pairs in action (where the top telltale in each pair is on the windward side) and an explanation of how to use them:



A. Leeward telitale stalled

When the leeward telltale is hanging down, it means the air flow on that side of the sail is stalled. This is not fast. In fact, it's the only one of the four you'd never want to see in a race. You should either head up or ease the jib sheet.



B. Fast Forward

When both telltales are flowing aft, you are in "foot mode." Use this whenever you need to accelerate. In light air or chop, you might sail like this all the way around the course.



C. Standard upwind trim

Most of the time, when you're trying to get maximum VMG upwind, you should sail with the windward telltales just starting to lift. Ideally you want the telltales to act like this all the way up and down the luff of the sail.



D. Pinch mode

There are two times when you'd sail with the windward telltale lifting straight up. The first is when you are overpowered and you are "feathering" the boat to keep it from heeling too much. The second is when you need to point very high, especially in flat water.
