Fleet 311 - Sao Paulo, Brazil

In Saõ Paulo, Brazil, we decided to commemorate the 4th of May, World Snipe Day, by inviting the local sailors of the Optimist Class to skipper a Snipe, with the owners crewing for the junior hotshots. The kids were extremely happy to have a chance of sailing a Snipe. As with all new ideas, not many of the Snipe sailors signed up for the event but just the same, 11 boats showed up on the starting line. Fleet 217 - Budworth, England

Back in 1946, a group of sailing enthusiasts from Manchester overcame all the postwar shortages of timber and fittings to build a fleet of 12 Snipes which they started to sail on Budworth Mere. Fifty years on, the Club still prospers with the biggest fleet of Snipes (27) in the UK ranging from 10325, a golden wooden oldie through 25050, won in the 1981 raffle to 28034, recently imported from Denmark.

For our 50th anniversary funday, our aim was to give friends and fellow club members who normally sail different classes the opportunity of hands-on Snipe racing experience. Fifteen owners made their boats available, acting as crews and sometimes mentors from our guests. The sailing programme was planned to be a mix of traditional races and novelty races where competitors had to pick up bottles, burst balloons, eat sticky buns and sail backwards down the final leg.

The day itself was sunny, but with a light wind, sufficient to move the boats reasonably well but not enough to frighten nervous beginners. Our guests were welcomed by National Secretary John Love who briefly outlined the history of the Class and soon all boats were heading for the start line. By late

afternoon, everyone had seen a share of the action and were ready for the evening "cook out". Two Snipes were left on the water and a match-racing competition involving eight teams was run for the entertainment of those onshore. US Nationals - Tom's River Yacht Club, New Jersey

Juniors: August 8-10 Seniors: August 11-15

Toms River Yacht Club is situated on the Toms River one mile away from the main body of Barnegat Bay on which racing will take place. Established in 1871, TRYC is a year round club which provides 1,200 feet of waterfront, three boat ramps, and two hoists.

Toms River is immediately across the bay from Island Beach, the seasonal barrier island which offers amusements and rides, access to the ocean, and boardwalk fare. Temperatures in August can be expected to reach 75 to 85 degrees F. during the day, and 60 to 70 degrees F. at night. Barnegat Bay water temperatures in August will range from 65 to 70 degrees F. Winds are typically W-NW 5 to 10 mph in the morning, and S-SE 15 to 20 mph in the afternoon.

Housing is tight, we recommend that contestants share beach house rentals. Contact Karla Griffith for housing information: 215-493-8031 as soon as possible.

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1996 Japan National Championships

SCIRA Japan held the 1996 Japan National Championship November 6-10 at Kaiyo Yacht Harbor in Gamagori where the World Masters were held in 1994. 70 skippers, who passed through selection regattas in each fleet, competed for targeting the top 4 places for those entitled to compete in the World Championships in San Diego. There was a dead heat among the top level of skippers because "San Diego" was especially appealing for Japanese sailors.

Under unstable wind conditions we held six races among the scheduled seven. The series was lead by Takamura/Takeshita team who were 7th in the recent Western Hemispheres. However, they were reversed by Ida/Yamasaki team in the final race by 1.75 points. The third place team was Morita/ Tsuda who was the 1996 intercollegegiate champion. As the fourth, a veteran team of Chiba/Hayakawa followed. These four teams are named as the National team for the World Championship in San Diego. As the recent tendency, young teams are doing very well. This is good for the Japanese Snipe circle, however, the veteran skippers shall continue to compete hard to raise the level of Japan. I hope and highly expect young Japanese

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teams will get good results in the coming World Championships in San Diego.

While most of the US Snipe world is chillin', waiting for spring, Southern California Snipe sailors continue on a slow, but steady pace. Things never really quit in this part of the country, but they do slow down. There is a variety of activity, including some sailing, to carry the fleet through the waning months of '96, the holidays, and into the New Year.

Between Thanksgiving and Christmas, Mission Bay Yacht Club holds a local weekend multi-class regatta. The event was held December 14-15 in the protected waters of Mission Bay. While the cast varied daily due to the busy holiday season, the MBYC Hot Rum Regatta was a perfect example of why we all love So. Cal! From the Birds Beak -- Letters to the Editor

Dear Jerelyn;

It has been a long time that I have been trying to get someone from Yachting to help ne locate the original Snipe plans, this time we succeeded.

Going back many years where I worked at the Refinery Del Port at Pointe-a-Pierre in Trinidad we had formed a Snipe Class club.

I went to P-a-P in 1935 and this was formed maybe in the 1940s.

The first Snipe I had was only ½ share in a boat called the "Sinbad."

Several years later I saw a chance of owning my own Snipe when I was on holiday in Barbados, a Snipe called 'Snipe" and the price suited my pocket, so I bought it.

The "Snipe" was the first of its (and only) kind every built, was built by a W. Teddy Hood one of Barbados best yachtsman and tennis players, and I knew he had done a good job in building her.

The first time I raced her as she was and got beaten seven times., but at the end of the season when all boats were hauled out of the water and stored for the hurricane season, I went to work on her and by the start of the season I had a finely tuned racing machine.

A series of Snipe Class races were held, usually 3 on a weekend, one Saturday mornng, one Saturday evening, and one Sunday
