
With the help of Vince Cassalaina, a thorough tuning video was produced that begins with the unwrapping of Snipe number 29672 after shipping and shows how George and Eric:

- added necessary rigging,
- rigged the pole launcher,
- straightened the mast,
- measured and tweaked their spreaders,
- tuned the mast both off and on the water,
- marked and measured the boat for easy duplication of sail settings,
- use the main controls in different wind strengths.
- move the jib lead and jib sheet with changes in the wind and waves,
- play the jib halvard off the wind, and
- roll tack and roll jibe.



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COMMODORES COMMENTS

Be an Ambassador for the Class...

For many parts of the Snipe world, this is the time of year to prepare for another sailing season. This will be a very big year for SCIRA. The 1999 Snipe Class World Championships will be held in Santiago de la Ribera, Spain in September. The Junior World Championships are also being held in Spain during the month of August. The European, South American, and North American Championships are all being scheduled and organized, and regional regatta schedules are being carefully constructed.

Typically, SCIRA governors, fleet captains, and other volunteers conduct key meetings and complete SCIRA business at these major championships and the majority of SCIRA work is accomplished this way. While this works well and will continue, there are also drawbacks. SCIRA governors are also sailors and competitors and there is a regatta schedule going on. The SCIRA meetings are competing for time with the competitive schedule and social events. The result is that there is not always the amount of time we would all want for careful discussion and study of issues and actions at these meetings. This is the reason that much SCIRA Board of Governors business is executed throughout the year on a quarterly agenda of business issues. The SCIRA Board of Governors is, in fact, a "working" board with board motions being brought forward and acted on throughout the year.

This past month, through the hard work and instigation of two past commodores of SCIRA, Buzz Levinson and Terry Timm, a productive SCIRA meeting was held in Atlanta, Georgia. The attendees composed a virtual braintrust of SCIRA past commodores, board members, US district governors, and interested Snipe sailors. Snipe boat builders and sailmakers were also invited to understand their viewpoints and perspective. All attendees devoted a weekend of their time to focus

on the relevant issues facing the Snipe class today (Thankfully it rained all weekend so this group of sailors didn't have to wistfully stare at the beakoning puffs on a sunny Allatoona Lake). The focused agenda covered issues such as boat, blade. and spar standardization; cost of new and used boats; the future of the Snipe Bulletin; restructuring of SCIRA membership and dues; better cooperation with boat builders and sailmakers; and how we can grow membership and promote the class. Based on the success of this meeting, I suggest that this event is repeated every other year and that similar meetings are held on each SCIRA continent with minutes sent to the SCIRA office.

The common theme of the weekend centered around how we can promote the class, grow membership, and continue to thrive in an evolving sailing world. There was much discussion about changing the boat in various ways. This discussion will continue and there are some things which should be done. It became clear, though, that the critical issues facing our future are not with the boat itself. The Snipe is a great boat as it exists today, although we will continue to evolve it slowly and carefully as SCIRA has in the past. SCIRA already has a great product to offer to the sailing world! The issue is how we package it and offer it to new potential customers in a volunteer organization with modest marketing budgets.

As we all watch the new sailing season evolve, I ask all SCIRA members to consider what you will individually do this year to be an ambassador for the Snipe class. We all must do our part to promote and market this great product that we all love. Everyone's ambassadorship will take a different form, but I ask everyone to do something individually to promote the Snipe class this year. Write to the Snipe Bulletin and tell us about it.

As a final teaser on the subject....what exactly are you and your fleet doing for World Snipe Day May 5th?

50th BRAZILIAN NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

January 24 - 30, 1999

The 50th Brazilian National Championship was hosted by fleet 159 from the Iate Clube do Rio de Janeiro. As traditional the Fernando Avelar Trophy was raced on Sunday, 24 first day of the Championship as a more of "get to know the course" race. Sailing on the Guanabara Bay of the lovely Rio de Janeiro is a privilege, The Sugar Loaf and The Christ, with open arms welcoming all sailors. The winning team was: Leonardo Priolli and Eduardo Neves (the last World Champion crew). 74 Snipes signed up so the organising committee divided the fleet into 4 groups: yellow, white, purple and green. Each group sailed 6 races (one colour group against another) in 3 days, until after a drop race, the first 37 (half of the fleet) were classified as the Gold group and the rest as Silver group.

Day 1: The two first races started with an extremely hot day with winds of 12-15 knots, outgoing tide and high waves. The Race Committee made a very short starting line and several starts had to be made as most of the fleet had an early start. Both races were Olympic course.

Day 2: The day started hotter than ever, very mild winds so the Race Committee waited over 2 hours to start the first race. This time the starting line was longer, but not enough. When the first race started sailors were already tired of waiting. With winds at 8 - 10 knots the Race Committee chose a windward-leeward course. Day 3: Lots of clouds and less heat was the weather of the third day. Winds were good 10 to 12 knots. Both races were a windwardleeward course. The starting line was long enough (sailors comments) only one boat of both races had an OCS. The fish were flying over the Snipes, and Fernando Garrafa the Brazilian measurer "fished" one, and as in the evening the club offered a bar-b-q his dinner was guarenteed.. With these 6 results and a drop race, the fleet was divided into two groups: gold fleet and silver fleet. By now the leading team was: André Fonseca / Rodrigo Duarte followed by Paulo / Ricardo Santos and Ivan Pimentel / Rodrigo Lins.

Day 4: From now on the first start was for the gold fleet with the silver fleet starting 7 minutes later. The course chosen for the first race of the day was the Olympic one as winds were 15 to 18 knots. The tide was strong and many sailors had a certain difficulty in sailing. One of them was Kurt Diemer, the new Brazilian Snipe Constructor, who got to the first mark to realize that his skipper had fallen off the Snipea meter back and he was sailing alone. Ivan Pimentel, winner of the gold fleet of both

races that day, used all his skills and knowledge of being used to sailing in Rio and won the first race with a great advantage over the second. The winners of the silver fleet were: Bruno Motta/Bruno Gauer (a junior team) who won both races too.

Day 5: The 9th race was organised for this day. It was a difficult day for the sailors. The race committee took 2 hours to decide what kind of course, where to put the marks as the winds were not constant. Tempers were high and most of the sailors were starting to get really nervous. Finally the chosen course was the Olympic one and as the wind was mild and with the tide, slowly going out, the race was over in one hour. The winners were: gold fleet Andre Fonseca, silver fleet again Bruno Motta. Day 6 and last day: By this time Andre Fonseca had one point less than Ivan Pimentel so it was going to be The D Day. Nothing worked. First the winds were strong coming from the northwest and which meant having a start against the outgoing tide so the race committee decided to postpone and wait at the club. After over one hour the wind had changed to south-east

the Race Committee went out and so did most of the sailors. As most of the sailors reached the course, the weather changed, winds started to blow strong, over 30 knots. Those who were out on the course went for shelter. Sometime later the wind stopped blowing. With no conditions to sail and no more time, the race committee had no other option and cancelled the race. As some were being brought in by some rescue boats another storm approached. It is the third time in a row that there is a storm and damage to Snipes on the last day of the Nationals. We hope it is not going to become a tradition.

In the evening the Iate Clube do Rio de Janeiro hosted a memorable party, good food, lovely prizes and the best - a dance which went late into the night, everybody having great fun and relaxing after a week of tense races.

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The Strategy of SCIRA Europe

Many people ask me; what will you do as the new SCIRA European Secretary? Good question! I can answer like this: develop the class; bring young people to the Snipe.. but this is basic and obvious!

The first item is to develop SCIRA Europe. Currently rules pertaining to SCIRA Europe don't exist. So, following the plan originally conceived by Antonio Roquette, I have proposed an amended European Statute. This will provide Europe with some administrative rules and guidelines. For example, the election of the European General Secretary, Northern and Southern Secretaries and the other European officers; meeting schedules and other items pertaining to the administration of SCIRA Europe. This work is currently in progress and I hope the new European Statute can be approved at the 1999 Snipe Worlds. There are some rumors that the Europeans seek to divide themselves from the rest of SCIRA. This is absolutely false! We all work together and work well as SCIRA International to keep our Class strong around the world.

The second step is to produce the European calendar. Normal? Not this year! It's the first time that we actually have a European calendar. My goal is to increase the exchange of regattas between the different countries. Our European Championship is held in even numbered years. What do we do in the odd numbered years? Only a few crews from each country go to the Worlds, but it should be important to find other competitions for competitors for those not attending the Worlds. Currently we have the European Cup and the Northern and Southern European Championships. We must find a way to increase participation at these regattas.

We also have to look at the European Championship. This event must become more important in the sailing world, as we need more attendees, we need better race committees and we need better organization. In the last two European Championships, for example, the race committees didn't follow the SCIRA rules. SCIRA Europe must be very strong to ensure compliance of our rules at championship regattas. We also have a Junior European Championship in which we must also place increased importance.

Today SCIRA is represented in many European countries, but this is not enough. We must increase our strength in important countries like Germany. And we have opportunities in all the countries of Eastern! In many of these countries the Snipe is the ideal boat.

We must market the Snipe through exposi-

tions, advertising and newspapers and promote the Class in Europe from the junior to the National Sailing Federation levels.

So you see, we have a full agenda and we are open to your ideas and input. We have a good team in the European officers; André Callot, Vice Euro Secretary; Pedro Pons, Southern European Secretary; Ola Nygard, Northern European Secretary and Alexei Fomin, Eastern European Secretary. These gentlemen have a wealth of ideas and are ready to work for the Class, so I believe you will be hearing from Europe in the coming year!

SINGLEMAN'S **MODEL BOAT WORKS**

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Sailing The Christmas Cracker

I had reason to be in England during most of December 1998 and new I would miss one of our mid-winter regattas on the Richmond Riviera, so I wondered if I could get a ride sailing Snipes in England. I had noticed the English winter regatta reports on the Snipe mail server, so I fired off an email to Richard Lambert the author of the reports and asked if there was any chance they could accommodate me. Richard promptly replied that indeed they could, their Christmas Cracker regatta was December 20th and they were expecting about twelve snipes. I was amazed at how simple this was. Richard and I traded emails a number of times as my departure to England approached and Richard had indeed confirmed a snipe for me. I couldn't believe my good fortune and to top it all off the Snipe was actually a brand new Devoti and I could be the first American to sail one. I was duly impressed.

I stayed in contact with Richard after I arrived in England and got directions to Richards house with instructions to be there by 8:45 am. Everyone I met in England carried a road map of the whole country, as the road system has evolved over centuries and is not exactly intuitive. The route to Richards was not made any easier by the roadwork and detours, but I got there on time. It turns out Richard and his wife Nicky were at the Worlds in San Diego having qualified for the English team. They said what a great time they had in San Diego, and what a great job everyone had done to make them feel welcome. After they loaded their car with all manner of foodstuffs we were off to the regatta. The Blue Circle Sailing Club is located in an industrial area of Kent next to the Thames estuary, very much like our venue at Lake Washington in Sacramento. Richard and Nicky it turns out were one of the main organizers of this event and we arrived first to unload all the food they had prepared for the regatta. For the first time after my arrival in England the sky was blue the sun was out and it was not raining, yeah, but it was cold, the temp must have been hovering around 38 degrees, brrrr. As we waited for the other competitors to show up I helped Richard uncover some of the Snipes kept at the club.

My ride arrived along with Ian, Richard, Phillip and Mr. and Mrs. Marshall. The Marshall's own two Snipes, Ian and Richard usually sail their new Devoti and Phillip and his junior crew sail their Skipper Snipe. I was going to be paired with Richard Marshall in the new Devoti and Ian and Phillip were going to sail their Skipper snipe. We quickly got the boats rigged and we bent on the sails I had brought from the States. I thought it would be cool to have a USA sail number on the lake.

The skippers meeting described the course as sort of "T" shaped with all marks left to port. There were snags down the center of the lake marked with poles with just two gates to pass from one side of the lake to the other. There was a windward leeward leg in the main body of the lake with a reaching leg through the gates to the other side of the lake and back. In all there were about five marks to negotiate to make a lap. We wrote the marks down and taped the sequence into the boat where Richard and I could both see it. I had so many layers of clothes on I felt like a penguin, with about the same dexterity and mobility. We hopped in the boat and took off for the start area. After we had convinced ourselves we could go upwind and downwind in the 12 knots of breeze, I made a mental note of the new names for various items in the boat i.e. centreplate for daggerboard and kicker for the vang.

We had what was for me a great start about a third of the way down the line from the favored committee boat end, going fast with clear air to weather. There had been plenty of heated conversations at the start we had managed to avoid. Richard took over the tactical chores while I settled down in the unfamiliar Devoti and concentrated on driving the boat as fast as I could. We rounded the top mark in fourth place right behind Richard and Nicky Lambert. Our first few mark roundings were a little sketchy, nearly capsizing rounding the bottom mark when the mainsheet cleated. Thankfully Richard kept the boat right side up and I made a concerted effort to keep the mainsheet out of the cam cleat. After the first lap was complete I confirmed with Richard we were finishing, he said no we have four more laps to go, What! you have to be kidding was my response. Four more laps I repeated incredulously. Oh my god this was going to be a long day. The fleet gradually divided up into a distinct "A" and "B" fleet with Richard and I bringing up the tail end of the "A" fleet with a growing gap to the "B" fleet. Mercifully the Race committee shortened the race to three laps and Richard and I finished a respectable fourth in the Snipe

What followed would turn into a pattern repeated after every race. We would all sail back to the dock, furl the sails, march into the club house and have a hot cup of tea, very civilized and very British. Considering how cold it was I was not complaining, the hot tea warmed me up. Mr. and Mrs. Marshall were encouraging, they told us our tacking improved as the race wore on, they had been observing our efforts from the cozy confines of their warm car parked next to the lake.

After another race committee briefing where they explained the new course, shortened by one mark and a couple marks left to starboard, we left the dock for race two. The wind had picked up to about 14-15 knots so we made a few upwind sail adjustments. We were in good shape about a quarter of the way down the line with twenty seconds to go when we found ourselves being hailed to come up by a boat fast approaching from leeward and clear astern. We accelerated and bore off into a gap to leeward then came back up onto the wind as the gun went off and we had another good start. It was chaos at the top mark, we approached on the starboard tack layline ready to round to port then realized we needed to round to starboard, oops! We dodged the first two boats that rounded and bore off in front of us, starboard we cried, as we bore off to make the mark with the rest of the fleet on port scrambling to give us room. I think we rounded in third or maybe fourth, but we were subsequently rolled by boats in the passing lane on the way to the bottom mark. We were now planing on the reaching legs, I was amazed at how quickly the Devoti planed, certainly not in my McLaughlin back home with similar wind strength and crew weight. We had a terrific race with another Snipe for fifth place, we would positions on what seemed like every leg. The racing was much closer in this race with no discernable separation into an "A"or "B" fleet. Richard was terrific he always managed to keep us in clear air and out of trouble upwind. Praise the Lord the race committee had again shortened the race after three laps and we were coming into the last bottom mark right on the tail of our opponent. We had a great rounding and were going fast on the beat to the finish. We traded tacks with our opponent and gradually we got ahead and managed to hold them off to take fifth in the Snipe fleet. The Devoti was impressive upwind too.

Back to the docks and the club house for more hot tea and the hearty lunch prepared by Richard and Nicky. We had jacket potatoes slathered with your choice of cheese, beans or chili, yum. It was way too much for me I was only able to demolish about half of my more than generous portion.

The third and final race of the day turned out to be a bust and we took it as our throw out. After fouling out not once but twice in basic port starboard infractions it was obvious I was getting tired. The blue skies were suddenly replaced by menacing black clouds and the wind suddenly picked up to a solid 20 knots and I was not having any fun. The reaches were now very exciting but the spray coming off the bow was like someone throwing buckets of ice water in your face, capsizing was NOT an option. With my aversion to the mainsheet cam cleat I was having trouble holding onto the mainsheet with only one ratchet block taking the load, I told Richard I had reached my threshold. I know Richard could easily have carried on, but he gamely called it a day too and we headed for the dock and a jump on getting the boat out of the water and packed away. Putting the boat away on its very trick dolly-trailer combination was a snap. The trailer itself never has to be put in the water to launch or retrieve the Snipe, you simply roll the dolly on and off the trailer. The Snipe lives on the dolly which is locked into the trailer for towing, very slick item.

After a hot shower we all retired to tell our war stories in the club house with of course more hot tea. The hospitality of the Blue Circle Sailing Club was second to none, they repeatedly refused to let me pay for anything like registration, any of the numerous cups of tea or lunch. Ian and Richard Marshall refused to accept any fee for chartering their new Devoti, just think of it as a Christmas present, they said. Thanks guys I had a terrific time sailing with you all, it was fun and I would like to extend an invitation to any of you and the Snipe community in general to sail with us in San Francisco if you ever find yourselves in the neighborhood.

And Crewless in St. Pete

The first Snipe event of the New Year was graced with good breezes, hopefully a positive omen for the coming year for all Snipe regattas! The festivities began with the annual fireworks party aboard the Welch's boat on New Year's Eve. The evening was cool, keeping the partiers, headcount about 50, inside watching sailing videos, catching up with each other and merry making in general. But at midnight, we all crowded onto the upper and aft decks to watch the fireworks display provided by the City of St. Pete, just for us! Most of the revelers were gone by one a.m., some in anticipation of the Third Annual Competition for The Captain Bligh Admiration Cup, the single handed Snipe regatta aptly named "Crewless in St. Pete".

New Year's day dawned with light breeze, make that very light breeze, which is just perfect for single-handing your Snipe. There is quite a bit to do in a Snipe on short courses, when you have to manage it all alone. It does get busy! Twelve Capt. Blighs made it out to the course to start the race. Several others elected to use the day to practice for the real thing, and many others arrived just in time for the noon skipper's meeting (this is not the sort of regatta you rush into at early hours) but not in time to get rigged and splashed for the races. The dirty dozen who lined up for the first start included seven locals, one Canadian competitor, two Japanese competitors, one Viking, and one more Lone Ranger from out of town, Captain Bligh JibeTech. Last year's Champion, local Captain Klotz, took race one, sporting ten year old sails that appeared brown compared with the other solo sailor's gleaming whites. Captain Uchida, the 1997 Champ, made it across eighth, still getting to know his charter boat. However, Captain Pimental, quite familiar with his vessel, finished second, with his crew for DOW standing by in the photo boat complimenting his well executed roundings and tactical decisions. Local Captain Welch finished third, followed by The Viking. Race two was captured handily by Capt. Pimental, with Capt. Klotz taking a second, and Capt. Uchida finishing third, followed by a very determined Viking. Race three saw a change of characters. Capt. Pimental, perhaps wanting to give his crew a taste of the single handed experience, or perhaps just wanting to catch his breath, invited Capt, Carol Newman Cronin to take his vessel for the third race. She swapped places with him without hesitation, and went on to have a dandy pin end start, and to win the race quite handily. The Viking, beginning to get used to this crewless stuff, took second, and Captain Sawada, just beginning to get the hang of his chartered boat, grabbed third. Capt. Klotz slipped across the line in fourth. The last race saw the original cast back at the helm, fully rested, after a ride in the photo boat. Captain Sawada, now fully familiar with his chartered craft, took the number one position at the finish, The Viking snagged another second, with Capt. Klotz of the brown sails finishing third. Captain Pimental collected a fourth place after his rest in the Whaler, which was good enough to win him the High Honor of the 1999 Captain Bligh Admiration Cup, which he will gladly share with Co-Captain, Carol Cronin! Trophies were awarded later in the day at the famous New Year's Day party, hosted by Matt and Laura Bryant.

Saturday, Jan. 2, 1999, began as a perfect day for sailing on Tampa Bay and stayed that way. In spite of a general recall to start off the day, three good races were completed, with the breeze building slightly throughout the day, giving the photos boat some nice photo opportunities on the reaches. The Pimental/Cronin team started off hot with two firsts. The Norwegian team of Birger Jansen and Liv Ulveie looked very strong with two seconds, as did the Canadian entry of Kneulman/

Brown, with two third places. The Japanese team of Uchida/Oka showed promise with two fourths. The last race of the day went to Birger Jansen, with Andy and Carol taking a fifth, Dirk Kneulman nailing second, and Shinichi Uchida earning third; at the end of the first day of racing the standings were Jansen, Pimental, Kneulman, and Uchida, with the Plines and the Bixbys tied for fifth position. Spirits were good after a great day of racing, and the fleet retired to the St. Petersburg Yacht Club for cocktails and dinner.

Day two of racing began rather slowly with light air, and a postponement to give the competitors time to get to the starting area in the light conditions. The breeze picked up as the last of the boats to make it out to the course, and two more races were completed in good time and with good wind. The trophy places didn't change in spite of two more races, and the tie between the Plines and Bixbys was settled in the Bixby's favor. Boats were packed up, trophies were awarded, and good-byes were exchanged until next time, which for many of us will be the Midwinter Circuit. Hope to see you all there!

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
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


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
