The next weekend Keuka held its annual Champagne regatta. Master's Champion Fritz Gram, with finishes of 1,2,2,1,1, bested Chris Hains of Oakville, 3,1,1,2,2, for the Finger Lakes Wine Museum trophy.

The weather for the team race was warm and wet on Sunday. The southerly wind was under 10 mph the whole weekend, making it almost ideal for the short Olympic courses.

The District V team sailed well, covering boats that needed to be covered and springing boats clear for good finishes. They got in front early in the first race, ending up a clear-cut winner. The second race saw 3 Oakville boats cinch a sure last, finishing 8, 9, and 10. The third race featured the perfect finishes for District V, 1,2,3, ending the series in 3 races.

With racing over earlier than expected, most of the sailors trekked to KYC Commodore's Quail Hollow Farm for barbecue and fresh-picked corn, and an unsuccessful round up of two bull calves that refused to be steered – heh! heh! – by 17 Snipe sailors.

The next weekend the southerly winds filled to 15 to 25 mph, and the Snipes sailed 5 races over a double triangle course, because of the fleet of E Scows also enjoying the brisk winds.

Those of you who didn't come to Keuka, really missed it. The last weekend of summer proved to be super sailing in the heart of New York State's Finger Lakes Wine Country.

The racing was dominated by 2 Snipes, Fritz Gram and Chris Hains. The contest came down to the last race, each had to win to be champ. Fritz won and thus received the Finger Lakes Wine Museum Trophy. Tersh (Consistant) Bugbee had 5 fourths. — for third? Guy Lovejoy and Jack Pierotti tied in points, but Guy had beaten Jack in more races and garnered the 4th.

Both regattas featured fantastic Saturday night meals; steak and corn roasts, and fattening home-made desserts. The team Race had half priced drinks for happy hour, while the Champagne regatta featured champagne punch. Our new sponsors, Pepsi Cola and Bully Hill Wines, were present for the awards ceremony. Since another soft drink company got into the wine business, we had to get new sponsors. The first five Snipes received autographed Bully Hill wine bottles along with their keeper trophies.

Fred Abels with his 80-Lb. crew Maureen Varley captured third, and Keith Donald and crew Roderick McConnell took fourth. The Chairman of the Board and founder of the Call of Fall, Dr. Fred Thurston, with extraordinary assistance from David Coughlin, snatched fifth from Hawkeye Dull also from Annapolis, MD.

The high point in the regatta came in the last race on Sunday when the wind came up to 18 knots and the famous Long Island Sound "Chop" appeared. It was in this race that Dave Rogers and Todd St. Johns caught fire and began pushing the leaders. Reynolds Offers Tips On Masts and Rigging

The following two articles on masts and rigging are from the North Sails Snipe Newsletter. We appreciate permission to use them in the BULLETIN. Mark felt that it would be a good idea for sailors bound for the Winter Circuit to review the control of the bendy mast.

BENT MAST (Tips for the Cobra II mast in heavy air and other small section masts.)

Many people, including myself, have reversed their new flexible masts off the wind in heavy air. Usually the mast can be straightened and will be as good as new but there are a few precautions that can be taken to prevent the inside out mast in heavy air.

• Never let the boom all the way out to the shrouds. In heavy air tie an extra knot in the mainsheet so the boom can't even come close to the shrouds. This keeps some forward pressure on the mast to keep it in column.

• Be careful with the aft puller. If the aft puller is on tight and the boom is let out all the way, the mast will reverse.

• If you sail with a loose rig, tighten the shrouds a few holes which will keep the mast under much better control.

• When the whisker pole is up make sure to use the forward puller. This keeps the mast a little prebent so the pole doesn't push it inside out.

• Bolting the spreaders so they have a limited swing will also help. If the mast wants to reverse, limited swing spreaders may just pull off the bracket so make sure your bracket is also well secured.

Remember, the further out the boom is the more likely the mast is to reverse. The whisker pole also puts a lot of aft load on the mast. In very heavy air only use the pole when dead down wind. This way the pole is back far enough that the aft load is reduced and be sure the forward puller is on tight!

Tight vs. Loose Rigs

The big question at this year's Nationals was, which is faster — the tight or loose rig? The tight rig is usually accomplished with 1/8 shrouds set very tight and a powerful Majic Box jib halyard is used to pull the mast forward to the proper rake. When sailing, the lee shroud is usually tight.

This set-up has the advantage of being able to prebend the mast in light air to allow the main to set better. It also keeps the rig from moving around in light, lumpy conditions. These boats use the forward puller to put some sag in the jib

luff so the jib is not too flat in light air and choppy seas.

The disadvantage of this set-up is that it is slower off the wind when the pole is up and that it is much more critical to sail with making constant adjustments and precise steering necessary. The loose rig is more automatic. When the mainsheet is eased the mast gets straighter, the main fuller and the jib luff sags so the jib gets fuller. This is what is called for when encountering changing conditions in medium air. In consistent conditions the tight rig may be faster upwind.

At this year's Nationals, which were

mainly in very light air, Chapin was 2nd and Fisher was 5th with very tight rigs. Diaz was 1st and Shadden 3rd with a conventional rig set snug and Reynolds was 4th with a loose rig.

Most of the Heinzerling races were held in conditions suited for the tight rig where in the Crosby, held in 10 to 15 knots, almost all races were won by conventional rigged boats. Here at North we have been experimenting with both techniques all year and are anxious to talk to you about its suitability for you and your sailing conditions.

Anyway, the championship was a success, 6 races out of 7 were completed. We 10

had all kinds of different winds, south, north, east, and one race finished with a west wind of 28 knots. Out of the six races, Manuel and Gloria won 5; in the other one it was Bertrand Gayet and Cesar Spezini.

We congratulate Manuel and Gloria, the way they have practiced together for the last two years, it was easy to see how they know their boat and take advantage of any opportunity, especially in very little wind, but in this championship, in good wind too!

The championship was organized by the Yacht Club Ypacarai, and sponsored for the second time by Philips del Paraguay. Wybe Beekhof from Holland, who has long and excellent sailing experience was RC chairman. He was assisted by fleet captain Carlos Palazon. We thank all these people for their help and the perfect organization. The awards presentation was shown on national TV - you can imagine how popular and important are the Snipistes in our country!

Bertrand and Cesar finished second. It was well merited, since on a few occasions they controlled the race almost to the end. Roberto Russell, a new comer to Snipe, sailing Mr. Gripp, a well known boat in South America, finished 4th. For the first time we had juniors sailing with us. They were Guillome Busso Riboulat and Huge Maisonneuve.
