

Adams/O'Dowd Team Wins New Englands

Thirty-two boats showed up in Newport, RI for the 1981 New England Championship, hosted by the Ida Lewis Yacht Club. Boats were launched at Fort Adams Sailing Center, site of the Olympic Trials Regatta.

Conditions were perfect for Saturday's start, with a southerly breeze of 10-12 kts. and clear blue skies. Ed Adams and Meredith O'Dowd of host Fleet 17 got off to a good start, winning the first race on the 4.8 mile Olympic course. Jonathan Bartlett and Billy Lawson of Annapolis were second and Rob and Beth Gorman from Massachusetts were third. The second race found Adams and Bartlett again occupying the first two slots, with Ron Barber and Kurt Muffelman from Norwood, Mass. in third. Conditions remained beautiful throughout the day, allowing Race Officer Bob Conner to start a third race over the same course; and Adams once again took the gun, followed by Gorman and Sea Cliff's Fred Abels and Dave Conklin. At the end of the first day's racing Adams led with 0 points, Gorman was second with 16.7 points, and in third was Bartlett with 25 points.

On Saturday night Ida Lewis hosted a dinner party at the club, which is situated on a small outcropping of rocks in Newport Harbor. The competitors had a beautiful view of Newport, and the sight of the 12-meters *Enterprise*, now owned by an Italian syndicate, and *France III*, as they returned to the harbor following a day of practice.

Sunday found conditions similar to Saturday's except for the presence of a high, thin cloud cover. Adams once again showed the way, as he caught Freddie Abels about 100 yards from the finish line, for his fourth victory of the series. Following the second place Abels was J. Zackin. In the fifth and final race Adams and O'Dowd conclusively clinched the championship with yet another victory, giving them a perfect score. John Lally and Warren Kirby from Winthrop, Mass. got a second, and Jonathan Bartlett was third.

'82 Decals Available

1982 SCIRA racing decals are available from the SCIRA office on payment of 1982 SCIRA dues. U.S. Dues have been increased to \$20 for individual memberships, and are now due. Dues are delinquent after March 31. Co-ownership dues are \$15 each co-owner. U.S. Fleet Captains will receive fleet report forms and extra Snipe Regatta Sanction forms sometime in January.

National Secretaries outside the U.S. should already have their supply of 1982 decals.

Snipes are required to display current decals in order to participate in SCIRA races

Racing Rules Update

The IYRU has deleted Rule 60.4, "Protests under Rule 60", effective January 1, 1982. Rule 60 is the controversial kinetics rule which was passed last year, dealing with ooching, rocking, pumping, etc. Part (a) of rule 60.4 had to do with hailing before protesting and was eliminated because of the implication that one could infringe rule 60 until hailed by someone. Part (b) was deleted because no one could accept the requirement that the protested yacht was guilty until proven innocent.

Rule 60 is still in effect and the actions so described are still prohibited. The conditions outlined in 60.3 are still unclear, and we probably have not heard the last about this rule.

THE COMMODORE SAYS

The Russians Came Late For Sweden's Nationals

Karlskrona is site of perfectly-run regatta

Sweden's Nationals were held in Karlskrona, a small navy town in the south of Sweden.

The races were run together with the 505 class. (The Swedish Sailing Association wants similar classes to have their Nationals run together, so there will be less Nationals to keep track of for press and others.)

The host Club was Karlskrona Naval Sailing Club who were in charge of the races. The measurement and parties were taken care of by SCIRA and the 505-Association. The races were excellent. Steady winds, hard and light. No mistakes by the RC. The reaches were perhaps a little too short because the five-o wanted 45 degrees.

Forty-five Snipes were racing, and two things remained in everybody's mind after the regatta was over:

1. The lunch-break between the two last races. Everyone sailed to a close castle – went through a very narrow hole in the wall – and there was a harbour you never could imagine. The Fort was a Naval station during the 15-and 1600 out in the archipelago.

2. The winners, Roger Streling/Thomas Eliasson, were DSQ in the last race for unfair sailing. They match-raced against the runner-up Gutte Jansson/Peter Anderson and did some forbidden things.

Afterwards, the rules committee of Swedish Sailing Federation did sharpen that punishment, and the winners were DSQed for the whole regatta thus losing the Championship to Gutte Jansson. That was the first time this has happened, in the Snipe class. Before, no one had been DSQed for a whole regatta, in spite of the last race not being finished because of maximum time. According to IYRU-case this was the first time this has happened.



(Continued from page 8) est Swedish constructions to the today models – took part in the two-day regatta arranged by the Swedish Snipe Class Racing Association and as such, also attracted participants from Norway and Finland.

Three boats from Norway and seven from Finland showed up for the race. There were 55 Swedish Snipes, which however didn't stop the Finlanders from ending up as number two, five and six.

The regatta was won by Mats Gothlin/ Lars Dr Andersson before the two Finlanders Claus Carpelan/Freddy Wegelius. The Swedish champion 1981 Gutte Jansson/Janne Jansson ended up as the third boat.

The regatta also attracted quite a few oldtimers, for example Tom Sifvert, Swedish champion 1965 and Svend Rantil, Danish champion 1952, to go for a race; while Oscar Plym, 70 years old and the first to build a Snipe in Sweden, restricted himself to watching the race from the shore.

In between the two-day regatta the participants came together for a big anniversary celebration at Grand Hotel in Stockholm.



1ST & 4TH 1981 WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP



Endura Race Initiated At Mission Bay


