Qualifying For Van Wesley Memorial Trophy

The Van Wesley Memorial Trophy is presented each year to the member of District 4 who has had the best racing results for the year. This trophy, presented by the Privateer Yacht Club in honor of Van Wesley, is based on the finishes in the Southern Regatta held each May at the Privateer Yacht Club and the District 4 Regatta. 


