FROM THE COMMODORE

I wonder what all you Snipers around the world think about Japan, which has a different mixture of modern culture in its life style, eating habits, view of life, sense of values, and tradition. Do you think our ways are the same as yours, or, in some ways, mysterious?

About 130 years ago, when the island country of the East opened to the world after a long period of closed-country policy, Japan greedily absorbed many aspects of Western culture, mixed them with the traditional Japanese culture, and built a modern nation. There are, however, many differences that are the result of our way of structuring our organizations, a way that derives from the way our government is structured.

The reason I am bring this up in the beginning is because I want you to understand that in Japan, yachting, including the Snipe, also grew and developed in a different way.

It is said that yachting in Japan started about 60 years ago, but in 1948, after losing everything in World War II, sports were seen as one way to enlighten the younger generation with dreams and hopes. As part of an aggressive promotion of this idea, the National Athletic Meet was started. This annual event has been rotated around Japan, with a different prefecture hosting each year.

In conformance with the national policy, the Japan Yachting Association adopted competition in the Snipe Class boat as the Association's official event. The Snipe was eventually chosen for the National Athletic Meet, as well as for inter-high-school, intercollegiate, and inter-company regattas. Naturally, this resulted in large numbers of Snipes being built, a trend which continues today. Visitors to Japan would find that the Snipe's popularity continues, and that Snipes are sailed throughout our nation.

In Japan, students and workers are sailing on Snipes purchased by their school, or company, in marinas that are built by the local and national government. In the Western countries, the boat is owned by the individual and the Yacht Club is privately organized and operated. Understanding this, you can see the fundamental differences between Japan's Snipe history and that of other nations.

In spite of these differences, I have been

selected as Commodore of SCIRA. At the first so chosen from Japan, I must tell you that it is the greatest honor for me as well as for the Snipe enthusiasts and all people who are connected with yachting in Japan. I can already feel the heavy weight of responsibility that comes with this honorable position.

As the Snipe family, centered in America, spreads into the world, we must address the Snipe's future in the world by correctly understanding the differences in the Snipe's history inherent to each of the respective countries, even though these differences may not be great as those of Japan. To select a Commodore from Japan at such a crucial time, when new changes are being felt, must have required much courage on the part on SCIRA officers, and I feel it is my duty to see that your will is carried out in a way that will meet your expectations.

Last year, at the Board Meeting held during the 1991 Worlds Competition at Tonsberg Seilforening, when the sponsorship and advertisement problems were discussed, I was able to understand that conditions differed between the countries, and I was extremely glad for reaching a conclusion to protect the pride of the Snipe class by allowing each nation the flexibility to manage its own internal affairs.

I am fully aware that the most important thing for understanding one another is communication. Therefore, with that in mind, I wish to positively enlarge the dialogue between Snipe nations even more.

On many of the problems, such as IYRU counter-measures, the position of the Snipe as the Olympic event, spreading of the Snipe in the future—especially with the juniors—and measures to control the increasing expense of holding championship regattas, I sincerely hope that the Snipers around the world will not just leave it up to the officers to find resolutions, but will freely discuss these problems among one another to help find solutions. In this way the Snipe, which we are all so fond of, will continue to grow throughout the world. I look forward to receiving everyone's kind cooperation in the year ahead.

I wish to close my words from Japan by wishing a glorious 1992 to all of you. Your new Commodore,

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NEW SCIRA OFFICERS FOR 1992

The results are official, and the Board of Governors for 1992 is set. Here is the listing, along with introductions of the new flag officers. In next month's issue we'll introduce our new Members-at-Large, Sean Biehl and Susan Taylor.

MATSUMOTO IS THE NEW COMMODORE

Having served SCIRA as Rear Commodore in 1990 and Vice-Commodore in 1991, Japan's Fujiya Matsumoto is wellknown to Snipers. He is a long-time Snipe Sailor and has been a key player on Japan's Snipe scene since 1951. In 1956 he participated in the organization of the Japan Snipe Association and the Tokyo Bay Snipe Fleet. He served as Japan's National Secretary from 1972 through 1986. He is highly respected in Japan's yachting establishment, and, as such, he is critical to the continued strength of the Snipe Class in the country which currently leads the world in the number of Snipes sailing. Matsumoto-san's plans for 1992 include attending the European Championships in Finland, and the Junior Worlds in Sweden.

VICE COMMODORE-**MICHIGAN'S TIMM**

A Snipe sailor since 1966, and SCIRAs Rear Commodore for 1991, Terry has served at all levels of SCIRA and was a member of the Board from 1987 through 1989. Terry is well known to Snipers, as he has sailed in many U.S. Nationals, North Americans, and Bermuda Race Week, and he has represented the U.S. in the Western Hemisphere Championships. Terry's most recent service to the class was as Co-Chairman of the 1991 U.S. Nationals, sailed at North Cape Yacht Club. Everyone who participated in this Nationals agrees that it was one of the best ever, as Terry and his committees did an outstanding job.

REAR COMMODORE-URUGUAY'S GARCIA PASTORI

The 1976 Snipe South American Champion, Horacio Garcia Pastori, is a longtime Snipe sailor; he served as General Secretary of the Western Hemisphere from 1976 through 1978. A 1954 graduate of M.I.T., Garcia Pastori was a member of the Intercollegiate Sailing Team, and was the U.S. Intercollegiate National Champion in 1954. In the 1960 Olympic Games he was the Uruguayan representative in the Dragon Class. His first major International Snipe competition was the 1962 Western Hemisphere Championships in Brasilia. He has since participated in the Western Hemispheres in 1964 (Oakville, Canada), in 1966 (Montevideo, Uruguay), 1968 (Jacksonville, USA), 1974 (Buenos Aires, Argentina), and 1976 (Cape Breton, Nova Scotia).

Garcia Pastori's first Worlds was in 1963 in Bendor, France. In the 1971 Worlds, held in Rio de Janeiro, he was sixth. He also sailed in the 1973 Worlds in Malaga, Spain, and in 1975 he not only served as Executive Secretary of the Organizing Committee of the Snipe Worlds in Punta del Este, but he also sailed to fourth place. Following his service as General Secretary of the Western Hemisphere, Garcia Pastori served as a Member at Large on the SCIRA Board from 1979 through 1981. In 1981 he was elected President of the Uruguayan Sailing Federation, a position that he held for four years. He has served as a Member at Large of the Yacht Club Punta del Este Board since 1988, and is currently the President of the Yacht Club Punta del Este Racing Committee.

PETE FENNER-**NEW U.S. NATIONAL SECRETARY**

Pete Fenner is no stranger to most U.S. Snipers. SCIRA Commodore in 1990, his most recent office was Past Commodore, and now he replaces Phil Richmond as U.S. National Secretary.

A long-time Snipe sailor, Pete and his wife, Suzan, finished seventh in the 1990 Master's Worlds, held in Spain. Pete has been sailing since the early 1950s, and he started sailing Snipes in 1966.

As U.S. National Secretary, Pete's duties will include promotion of the Snipe in the U.S., aiding the growth of new fleets, promoting interfleet and intercountry racing and shall have full charge of Snipe activities in the U.S. Pete will also serve as the Chairman of the U.S. Board of Governors.

During his tenure as Class Commodore, Pete showed that he has the drive and talents necessary to carry out the duties of this most important office.







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MARK AND DEANN REYNOLDS WIN BIRNEY MILLS NORTH AMERICANS

"They may run off and sail some other boat but sooner or later they come back to the Snipe." Overheard in the parking lot.

Taking a break from his Star Olympic campaign, Mark Reynolds proved that he hasn't lost the Snipe touch by winning the 1991 Snipe North Americans, held at the Newport Harbor Yacht Club on September 19-21. Jumping into the Snipe after what they estimated to be a two-year layoff, Mark and wife DeAnn survived long tows, fog-induced delays, a hectic social schedule, and the complete spectrum of sailing conditions to beat perennial Snipe ace Jeff Lenhart by 8 points.

The morning of Day 1 promised a stellar day of sailing as the fleet stretched its legs in the pre-race warm-ups. The visions of California sailing vanished as the fleet,


like all good little ducklings, scurried back to the Race Committee motherships as a wall of fog worked its way down the coast. After a 2-hour delay, the 52-boat fleet got underway in a light breeze and lumpy sea. Jeff McDermaid in a brand-new boat and Mary Brigden-Snow showed the fleet around the course as the Reynolds used up their throw-out with a 21st. Due to the long delay, the day's racing was limited to one race, and the fleet returned to the NHYC where many Snipers successfully consumed their entry fee in free Margaritas.

Day 2 dawned foggy (in more ways than one...) and during a rare break of sunlight the RC got off a clean start. The fog moved back in as the fleet approached the first mark and Keith Dodson and Reynolds led this time. By the second race, the clearing

westerly had begun to fill in, providing Bart Hackworth and Jack Franco a chance to show their sterns to the fleet. With dusk approaching, the fleet returned harborside to face the possibility of a three-race final day. Those Snipers needing Party Points to bring them back into the running headed off to the nearest reggae pub for a night of skanking and pool hustling and then off to Jeff Lenhart's for a dose of Neil Young.


Day 3 provided more normal California sailing conditions as Reynolds, Hackworth, and Michael Zani showed the way around in the breezy choppy conditions. Race 5 proved many a contender's downfall as the over-anxious fleet put the RC through the test with five recalls. Finally the RC pulled out the multi-colored flag, which still failed to slow down the eager starters. (One of our new NHYC mem-

bers, while on vacation on Catalina Island, ran into members of the NHYC RC and they were still talking about the aggressive race 5 start...a month later!) Jeff Lenhart showed everyone he is still a threat as he beat Reynolds and Rick Merriman in the dying breeze of the final race of the regatta.

Snipes dressed quickly for the trophy dinner and cocktail party. After the beautiful awards were accepted by the victors the post-regatta discussion turned to the right-hand-sideness of the race course. Everyone agreed that picking the correct time to go left for some clear air was crucial. As the evening wore on crews described their persuasive arguments to keep desperate skippers from going too far left. Reasoning ranged from, "If you go left I'm signing the divorce papers and taking you for everything you're worth," to "OK, you can tack, but I'm counting to ten and we are going back, so don't even sit down!", to Chuck Sink's classic; "This is your brain on the left side. Any questions?". Unfortunately, some of this Snipe experience may have hurt the 470 sailors who were trying to get some time on the same course as the Olympic Trials. Rumor has it that two weeks later, during a big 470 event, left was the only way to go!

Newport Harbor Yacht Club did a great job hosting this demanding regatta and deserves a big Snipe "thanks." Race Committee Chairman Bill Crispin and his great crew were last seen mumbling about the Race Five recalls, and the sailors certainly hope that we haven't scared off such a great Race Committee. And certainly, not least, a big "YO!" to NHYC's Race Administer, (what a concept!) Mette Masden. Somehow she was everywhere at once, taking care of everyone.

Sailing in the turning basin in Newport Harbor, the Snipe Masters were challenged with conditions ranging from medium, sunny, and crowded, to light, cloudy, and crowded.

On Saturday the early registrants headed out to the practice race where the true Masters practiced their check-in procedures. After a day battling the usual harbor traffic, the fleet gratefully returned to the NHYC front deck for the opening ceremonies. Soothed by the cool sounds of the Doc Rutherford Jazz Quartet and a few of their favorite ice-cold refreshments, the fleet introduced themselves and some even admitted how long they had been sailing Snipes.

After a leisurely buffet brunch on Sunday, the fleet scurried to make the 1:30 p.m. start. Dave and Lorraine Schibler jumped to an early lead which they never relinquished. Tom Nute and Anita Gleason chased the Schiblers to finish second in the sunny, medium breeze. Jeff and Peggy beat Doug and Jenifer DeSouza in the back-to-back second race. Many a finish was determined by the decision of staying on the left or right side of the 80+ foot yacht moored in the middle of the course. 


