

BILL WICKER OF CORPUS CHRISTI WINS NATIONALS

Sailed for the most part in high winds and heavy seas, the Snipe Class National Championships were upset in the very last race when the pin holding Ted Well's tiller to his rudder plopped overboard. Up to that time, Wells had been in the lead in points, but by the time he had the tiller fixed back where it belonged he found himself in eighteenth place. This gave Billy Wicker of Corpus Christi the necessary points to be declared the winner.

Five races in all were sailed starting on August 4th. The first race was around a triangle for a total length of about seven miles with the course set in the open Gulf of Mexico off the breakwater. Wind velocity at the start was 16 miles an hour with a considerable chop of a sea. Ted Wells took the lead soon after the start but before he reached the first mark Dick Deaver of Balboa, California, took over and from then on never was headed during the remainder of the race. At the finish Wells was second and A. C. Jephson of the host club was third. Billy Wicker was fourth. Only one boat was disabled, the one belinging to Arthur Stock of Lake Fenton. His rudder cracked and he was towed in. Belford Russell, Jr., of Lake Chautauqua, beat the gun at the start and was recalled through the fleet of twenty-six boats.

In the second race, Wells definitely took over with a decisive win and Dick Deaver who won the first race, came in fourth in the second which put Wells well ahead in points. The course, again about seven miles was the usual windward-leeward with a northeaster of about 15 miles an hour. Billy Wicker came in second and Francis Seavy of Clearwater, Florida was third. Five boats failed to

finish and there were three disqualifications Danny Elliott of Long Beach Cal., got himself into a jam when he and Bill Wicker got into a collision about a minute before the start. John Hayward of Tulsa, happened to be an eye witness to the bump and after some three hours of deliberation, the Committee ruled Elliott out. A. C. Jephson of Corpus, struck a buoy and, like a good sport, disqualified himself and quit the race. "Gizz" Gozzaldi capsized within less than 100 yards of the finish line but refusing help, he and his crew righted their boat and managed to get across in 18th place. Don Ayres, Jr., from Los Angeles Harbor Fleet beat the gun, was recalled and restarted well astern of the fleet. He came in at the finish in fifth position despite this handi-

The third race saw the triangular course again and the race was sailed in a 16 mile an hour wind with considerable sea. Bill Wicker cleaned this race up in good style and Ted Wells dropped back to fourth thus making a tie for first place. Bill Jackson of Lake Merritt, Cal., was second and Francis Seavy of Clearwater was third. Only 18 of the boats managed to finish the course and A. C. Jephson who had previously been disqualified in Thursday's race came in fifth. Despite his disqualification he now stood eighth in points.

Things got tangled still further in the fourth race when Bill Wicker dropped back to seventh and Ted Wells came in Third. A. C. Jephson was first and John T. Hayward was second. This put Wells back in the overall lead again by about 288 points. This race was run inside the breakwater because of heavy wind and high seas. Bill Jackson filed a protest

against Wells but the Committee disallowed it. Wells hailed Jackson about as they were within 100 feet of the breakwater. Both boats were on the port tack heading directly for the breakwater when Wells hailed Jackson around and, according to the rules, both boats had to tack at once.

The course was about 6 miles, a wind-ward-leeward affair with wind velocity up to 18 miles an hour. Out of twenty-four starters only two failed to finish and one of these fouled out.

The last race of the series was also sailed inside the breakwater and again high winds were the order of the day. Carl D. Zimmerman of Akron, Ohio, was an easy winner with Billy Wicker in second place. Wells, with his tiller trouble, wound up in 18th position which put him definitely out of the running. Third boat to finish was Dick Deaver of Balboa and A. C. Jephson came in fourth. Wicker took particular pains to finish ahead of his nearest rivals, Deaver and Seavey and his total points made him the National Champion.

After this race, Danny Elliott again retried to reopen his protest against Billy. Wicker for the mix-up before the start of the second race. The Protest Committee, stood on its rights and refused to reopen the case and as a result Elliott may appeal to N.A.Y.R.U. However, from the testimony, there is no doubt that he was in the wrong and if it is appealed, the Committee will unquestionably be upheld. The Californian was a hard loser.

Bill Wicker and his crew Bob Vetters left for Madrid and the World's Championships on a British Overseas Airways plane on August 23rd.

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Danny Elliott of California Wins Juniors

Only eleven Juniors entered the Junior National Championships held on the first four days of the Nationals at Corpus Christi, Texas. Dave Lundquist of Lake Chautauqua, N. Y., won two races but in the third race the committee had set a limit of two and a half hours, Dave was five minutes behind this time so the Committee called it no race. This postponement was the downfall of Dave for when the race finally was sailed, there was a howling wind and considerable sea and

only two boats survived the gruelling five mile course. Danny Elliott of Alamitos Bay Cal., capsized twice during this race, but each time righted his boat and kept on to win. The only other to finish was a local boat sailed by Jimmy Gussack. Dave Lundquist needed only a fifth place to win the championship but his mast gave out and he was unable to finish. In the race that was called off he was a quarter mile in the lead at the time. Elliott had a fourth, second and first to win the crown with a total of 4490 points. Dave had only 4425 points. Ted Wells Describes the Nationals

After the third race, Ted Wells wrote the following letter which will give an interesting side light on things in general at Corpus Christi during the running of the National Championships:

Dear Bill;

The battle of Corpus Christi is almost over. And what a battle it — wasn't racing most of the time — it was a bailing and wave dodging contest, and a constant fight to stay right side up.

The winds haven't been too bad, although there is no resemblance between the official velocities given by the Naval Air Station and the actual velocities on the bay as measured by my Chet Miller special "Windicator". The difficulty is the waves kicked up on this shallow bay (7 to 11 feet deep) which are very high and usually very close together. The DNF marks on the scores will tell the story pretty well.

In the first race there was about a 17 mile wind and a fairly high sea. In the second race, the wind was about 21 and high seas. This is the only race so far in which I have been smart enough

to use some flat sails instead of my old, baggy Watts and as a result I won it by a big margin. This was a windwardleeward race and I have never seen a Snipe go so fast—I forgot to mention that this is also an "ooching" contest -which means using power other than sail if I've ever seen one. We went so fast that the sails were back-winded coasting down the side of one of these miniature Himialya Mountains that they have here in the bay, and three times we actually hopped over the wave in front of us and went on on it. In the third race the wind was supposed to be 12 miles an hour. It gradually picked up and Billy Wicker said he had never seen higher waves on the bay. After the finish we couldn't hold the boat flat even on a fairly broad reach coming home. The last two legs were both quite broad reaches, the last one being broad enough to wing out but I was the only one who did. Whether it paid off or not, I don't know but I caught a couple of boats by doing it. And the Snipe, I'll swear, went 25 miles an hour! There was one Snipe right along side of me which was all the way out of water back to where you could see the dagger board, with

the bow five feet out of water. He said mine was the same. I know no one will believe this, but it was the damnocst ride I ever had, and I don't want any more like it.

The Race Committee thought I had submerged just before the finish because all they could see was about half a mast and sails for about 100 feet—then they realized that I couldn't go 100 feet under water so they realized that I had hopped over the wave I was on and was planing in the trough. According to the Miller special, the wind after the race was 27 average and in the gusts up to 32 miles an hour.

In the Junior race, conditions were brutal and only two boats finished. The wind, according to Mr. Miller, was 25 miles an hour.


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New York State Regatta Held At Nine Mile Point

The sailors all came in for lunch and then it was voted to have a third race. Another boat was available for the committee and though high seas were still plaguing the skippers, the race was completed, making 3 for the day. Prizes were then awarded by Vin Logan. Scores follow.

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
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
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
