

SNIPE IN THE INDIAN OCEAN

"I think your readers will be interested in Snipe in Portugese East Africa as we have 3 active fleets in Mocambique now. It is the most important Snipe center in the Indian Ocean. Laurenco Marques has 2 fleets and Beira 1. All this makes 30 boats, and Snipe, as a seaworthy boat, is the most important class in the country.

Interest in Snipes started 18 years ago with 8 boats, but the really keen competition first appeared in 1961. There is now a greater interest since we started receiving the BULLETIN regularly and by means of which we know what are the trends all over the world.

All our Snipes were bought in Lisbon and are wooden. It is impossible for any country to compete with Portugese builders who sell them \$650.00 FOB. As all Portugese shipping companies help water sports, we pay no freight. We also can trave at very low rates and most times with our expenses paid by ou: government through the Department of Sports, which provide tickets for most important regattas and Nationals.

Our sails are bought in the United States, We buy those currently enjoying the most popularity with the top winners so we switch around occasionally. The last 8 suits have al

been bought from one maker.

For that reason, we would like to see what sails are use by the first 6 Snipes in all the regattas you have in the United States. Thus we can see the trend and the knowledge of what the top skippers are buying in your country would be invaluable to us in deciding what to buy next."

Last month we commented on the growth of Snipe in Turkey. SCIRA was first organized there in 1955 with one small fleet, and now, suddenly, they have six official fleets with enthusiasm for Snipe running high. All were glad to see a fine Turkish contingent at the 1963 World Championship Regatta in Bendor, France, and here they are — Macit Bulug on the left, Ergun Sengun and skipper Rasit Yilmaz, the Turkish National Champions from Izmir Fleet 553 in white, and Dr. Fethi Alpdogan, official representative for Turkey at Bendor. Snipers all over the world welcome competition from these budding sailors.

Some New Officers are Chosen

In 1956, Horace Crispin succeeded Dr. F. V. G. Penman as the National Secretary for England; now, after 8 years, he announces that, at an annual meeting held January 11th, he relinquished the job to his very good friend and ardent English Sniper, Peter G. Harris. "I shall be very sorry indeed to give it up, but feel I must make way for someone with more push." Horace has done an excellent job for SCIRA in England and progress, though slow, has been steady. The new Secretary inherits a base of 8 fleets on which to build and he is known as a man of ideas and action. Send all correspondence to Peter G. Harris, "Highover", Westerham. Kent, England.

In 1958, Jean Dumas was elected to the post of National Secretary for France, and like Horace, he now feels that, after 6 years and a slight heart attack, it is time for him to hand over the tiller to another man. "Consequently, Mr. Le Bour, who was Secretary to Association Française des Snipes, has taken over as National Secretary as well as President of said Association. I am still acting as Vice President in charge of A. F. S overseas relations. In this way, things may go on as usual and I think the arrangement is wise considering my illness." Mr. Dumas has attended many SCIRA international regattas and has contributed much to their success. The peak of such activity was reached when he instigated and directed the 1963 World Championship Regatta at Bendor last September, and all who sawhim in action there were full of praise for his wise direction and capable handling of the affair. He did an outstanding job as General Chairman and this regatta goes down as tops in SCIRA history. Mr. Le Bour has had good training from an excellent teacher and we predict continued progress for Snipe in France. His address is 27 Avenue du General LeClerc, Saint-Maur, Seine, France, and all future correspondence should be directed to him.

So SCIRA loses, in a sense, the services of two very capable and valuable men, although comfort can be taken from the intent of each to maintain contact and interest in SCIRA affairs. The Officers, Board of Governors, and all SCIRA members join in saluting these two good servants, thanking them for their past accomplishments and contributions to the class, and hoping that they have many more happy years with Snipes and the men who sail them. To their successors, we extend greetings and the invitation to join our conference tables in international fellowship.

ON THE MEASURING OF FIBERGLASS SNIPES

As a result of our vote at the 1964 SCIRA Annual Meeting and a complete polling of the absent members of the Board of Governors, a decision was made that the same tolerances would be applicable to a fiberglass hull as to a wood hull. In a previous meeting, a decision was reached that this would be applicable January 1, 1965 in order to give every boat manufacturer a chance to sell hulls already manufactured and thus prepare for any changes he might contemplate or think desirable in his particular product.

Because of the long pending decision and the important impact of this decision, I will try, as Commodore of SCIRA, to interpret the meaning of this decision.

It will now be permissible - and necessary - for all fiberglass hulls to measure in under the same tolerances as do wood hulls. As far as a Measuring Committee is concerned, they should be blind as to what type of material the hull is made from. There should be no exceptions as to tolerances regardless of whether it is wood or fiberglass. Every material should be treated alike in respect to measurements and tolerances.

The feeling of the Board of Governors is that a manufacturer should deliver a finished boat with a certificate that untampered-with hulls would measure in for competing in the Nationals, since most people purchase a hull on good faith and feel that the limited number of manufacturers are experts and have an obligation to deliver a professional product that is capable of racing internationally. It appears to me that this becomes a real simple process with no complications or exceptions. It is entirely possible that someday we will be considering aluminum hulls, and, in this respect, I would assume that, from the thinking of the Board, these too would fall into the same category of measuring as in other materials. In other words, in measurements, treat all boats alike regardless of material. I feel certain that this ruling clears up a certain amount of confusion that has been pending for over a couple of A. F. This major change in the 12-year old SCIRA fiberglass policy should be thoroughly understood by everyone. So important is it considered that Ted Wells, Chairman of the Rules Committee, devotes 2 whole pages in this issue to the subject of correct and easy hull measurement. Be sure and study his article.

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
In spite of the opinion firmly held in some areas, it ISN'T impossible for the average fleet to measure a Snipe — it can be done easily, and can be fun!



When the Wichita Sailing Club has a boat to be measured, Don MacIvor, our official measurer, organizes a committee of about four and the job gets done in about a couple of hours. The fee is appropriate refreshments to make it a party (provided by the boat owner) or \$5.00 and the measurer throws the party.

Other handy aids are a long tape with stripes corresponding to mast stripes and to sail limiting dimensions, a large carpenter's square to use in checking the transom from 'the portable base line', and an ordinary roll-up scale to check the centerboard and rudder.

(1) With the boat right side up, first locate the intersection of the plane of the topsides with the deck, using a marker which permits bypassing the sheer molding. On fiberglass hulls, it is sometimes necessary to be careful not to get a false intersection due to unintended curvature in the sides of the boat.





(2) The "Portable Base Line" consists of a piece of spruce 1" x 6" planed to have one straight edge, and equipped with vertical members at the stem and at stations two and five. Here it is shown placed on top of the deck to check the width

of the boat at the sheer intersection.


This check is especially important on fiberglass hulls, as errors in the beam here can cause other errors because of the flexibility of the hull.

(3) The handy gadget being used here to measure beam at the sheer will be used later to check the location of the mast step in relation to the sheer, and with the boat upside down, to check width and height of chine and shher. Station lines are mark - ed on the "portable base line" and the crossways measuring gadget is held at right angles by a sliding clamp shown.






(4) The cross-ways measuring gadget is used here to check the mast step location. This gadget can be built by any cabinet maker. Both vertical members slide - one of the right angle pieces is fixed and the other slides. Sponge rubber is used on the slides to insure a snug fit, yet one which willnot vary with changes in humidity.



(5) A couple of bathroom scales, one at each end, give a surprisingly accurate weight. Everything is piled on top of the hull for weighing as the scales can be calibrated to be accurate through only a relatively small change.



Southern Championship Goes North

The Privateer YC at Chattanooga, Tennessee, hosted the 13th Annual Southern Championship Regatta May 16-17th on Lake Chickamauga and a couple of Ohio lads from north of the Mason-Dixon line sailed off with the top honors. The two races Saturday P. M. and the single Sunday morning race were all sailed in light and variable breezes.

Mark Schoenberger of Cincinnati, Ohio, using a crew who had never raced before, finished 1-3-2 for first overall high score; Lee Thompson of Akron, Ohio, had 4-1-6 to be the runner-up. Cliff Hogg, West Point, Georgia, sailed one of his best regattas to date and finished third.

The 1st race was scheduled on a triangular course but then shortened to a windward-leeward-windward. Home fleet skipper Lloyd Cox led around the 1st mark closely followed by John Wesley, also of Chattanooga, and Cliff Hogg. But at the leeward mark, the Ohioans took over followed by Frank Johnson of Atlanta and at the finish it was Schoenberger, Johnson, Wesley, and Thompson. Cox dropped back to 12th place.

The 2nd race was a triangular-windward finish race. Dan Williams, a local boy, found the proverbial private piff and drifted out to a nice lead at the 1st mark, only to see it evaporate as Thompson took over at the 2nd mark. Lee was never threatened thereafter. Johnson and Schoenberger took 2nd and 3rd respectively, followed by Williams.

After two races, Mark Schoenberger was in first place with 3044 points with Frank Johnson only 2 points behind him with 3042. Sunday's race would decide the regatta.

This was another triangular-windward affair. Johnson found a quiet breeze near the shore and ghosted into the lead at the

1st and 2nd buoys. Schoenberger, far back in the pack, was apparently out of contention for 1st. However, on the run to the leeward mark, the fleet spread out looking for puffs, and Schoenberger carefully worked his way into 2nd place at the mark, behind Cox. They finished in this order, with Hogg 3rd and Delkin Jones of Atlanta 4th. Johnson finished 12th, which dropped him back to 4th overall in the final standings, behind Thompson and Hogg in 2nd and 3rd positions, gained by more consistent sailing.
