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USYRU Clinic Hones Racing Skills At AYC

Dave Perry's expertise highlights three-day drill marathon

"Papa John" Muhlhausen, Governor of District IV, wrote this critique of the USYRU Racing Clinic held at Atlanta Yacht Club for the SNIPE 4'ARD. We appreciate their sharing it with the BULLETIN.

We have just had an unique experience at the Atlanta Yacht Club, a three day USYRU Sailing Clinic.

After 30 years of competitive sailing, which was getting more competitive every year, I was due for more schooling to put it all back together again. Apparently for a variety of reasons, 13 other Snipe sailors from fleet 330 and 12 local Y-Flyers felt the same way. A time was established just before our Invitational regatta, cabins were lined up and participants were asked to prepare a hearty variety of covered dishes for the two dinners required.

Dave Perry was assigned to teach our clinic. He arrived in Atlanta Tuesday afternoon, tall, tanned and dressed like he had just stepped off a Laser. One glance and I knew I had found my man. After dispensing with the initial formalities, we got in the car and immediately lapsed into the great secrets of going fast — jib sag, windward heel downwind, roll jibing, flat sails in flat water, etc.

Wednesday morning was beautiful and crisp. At 8:30 a.m. the boats were in the water, and by 9:00 we were all learning the proper techniques of roll tacking. To perfect the timing of the crews' movement, tacking was done while both the skipper and crew stood and rocked the boat. You could not sit nor duck until the boom's movement across centerline knocked you both down. We practiced and practiced, about 534 roll tacks in all, before coming in for lunch.

White caps and a typical shifty 15 knot Allatoona wind greeted us for the afternoon "surprise drills." The lesson was on the importance of the crew. So many of us as skippers ignore our crews by making our own tactical judgments, adjusting our own sails and constantly reminding 'em what dummies they are. Blindfolding the skipper solves the problem. It is amazing how quickly the roles switch. The skippers were not only obey-

ing their crews; they were constantly asking for advice. The sensation of flogging through shifty and gusty winds totally blind must be similar to riding in the womb during a hurdle race.

For 30 minutes my outstanding crew kept me upright and avoided numerous collisions. When the blindfolds came off, so did the rudders. I hadn't sailed without a rudder in years. Through very careful boat balance and proper sail trim, it's possible to sail quite well without a rudder. It was obvious to the class that most of us use our rudders too much, drag 'em through the water and slow down.

We came in at 5 pm, had dinner and started the evening class on rules and appeals at 7. By 10:30 we, not the instructor, called it quits and rolled in the


The next two days were more of the same – drills and more drills. We practiced starts using a collegiate-type 2 minute starting sequence, sailed for one minute, switched positions with our crews and started all over again – 15 starts per hour for two hours.

Then came the unique "Cone Drill." The instructor positioned himself in a motorboat about 75 feet to windward of a very short starting line and slowly moved to windward. Imaginary lines drawn from the motorboat to the starting flags formed the cone. These lines were obstructions. When the outside boat approached either line, he hailed for room to tack in which case everyone had to respond to avoid HARI-KARI. The more narrow the cone became, the greater the need for precise tacking. Boats which were roll tacked well usually ended up on top.

Following this was another evening class, morning lectures on sail trim, drills on mark roundings and finally many short races in which the leaders were required to practice 720's.

By Saturday morning I was ready for the Snipe Solo World's. I had 36 hours of practice in 3 days and I was all jacked up, as was everyone else. You didn't have to be an expert to gain from this excellent program. Our class contained one near expert, a bunch of weekend sailors like myself and a 12 year old girl. We all learned for the total cost of about \$30 per participant. Call USYRU about a sailing clinic for your fleet or club. It's well worth it. Better yet, sign up for the one at our Nationals this summer.

And let us suppose that Mr. Mess tacks just in front of Mr. Goodboy, infringing rule 41, some 10 seconds after the starting signal of a 60-boat race. Mr. Mess recognizes the infringement and starts turning his 720°. He loses at least 40 places that probably he will not recover.

Mr. Bold recognizes the infringement and starts turning his 720°. He loses two or three places and no more because the fleet is spread at the later stages of the race.

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Thoughts While Sailing

Our "centennial" issue slipped up on us and was overlooked. Last month's issue was the one-hundredth edition since Birney Mills published his last one, August 1970. The first few issues were pure torture — rather like sailing in a 50 knot wind, you never knew how long you were going to last. They are easier now but the time between issues seems to get shorter and shorter.

Looking back over the past nine years, one can see that the class has been through some very trying times. When Birney died the class was in the throes of controversy over weight reduction. The class was almost out of operating funds and was divided throughout the

world. That the class survived is attributable to the extreme patience and hard work on the part of the officers and board of governors. It was a long pull but it appears that we did make it.

We do not have the growth that we once did but it certainly appears that we have one of the finest classes in existence. It has always been true that some fleets decline but others are growing; and the class remained viable. In time the declining fleets came back. We now have an increasing activity, exemplified by the fact that most regattas are continuing to draw record numbers.

We used to call ourselves the "World's Largest Racing Class." This is no longer true but I think we can safely state that we still have the "World's Finest Racing Class."

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
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

The Royal Nassau Sailing Club was host to the annual Bacardi Cup and SCIRA Winter Championship sailed March 21st-24th on Montagu Bay, Nassau, Bahamas.

Californians Mark Reynolds and crew Craig Martin won the Bacardi Cup, with 2 firsts and a second. He was ever so closely pursued by fellow Californians Jeff Lenhart and crew Randy Smith who took second place with a first and 2 seconds. Third was Jerry Thompson and crew Grant Hill.

Of the 25 entries 15 were from the U. S. A., 2 each from Brazil, Canada and Puerto Rico and 4 from Nassau — a truly international flavour!

The traditional Bacardi Daiquiri Party was held at the Club on Wednesday evening after the opening two Bacardi Cup Races and was much enjoyed by everyone.

March never disappoints the heavy wind sailors, although the first 2 races for the Bacardi Cup were sailed in shifting Westerly winds of 10-12 knots. Thereafter the winds piped up, reaching 22-24 knots on Saturday causing several capsizes during the last race for the Gamblin Trophy.

The heavier wind conditions for the Gamblin Series saw the 2 Brazilian entries Mike Wienschenck and Boris Ostergren move up to 4th and 5th place respectively in the overall standings. The top 3 positions remained the same as in the Bacardi Cup with Mark and Jeff sharing the 5 first places and Mark winning over Jeff by 0.7 of a point! Jerry Thompson turned in a very consistent performance for 3rd place with 2 thirds and 3 fourths.

The Charles Kelly Memorial Trophy, awarded for the second time, was won by Mark Reynolds, the skipper with the best total score for all the races in the two Nassau Regattas. The Carl Zimmerman Trophy was also won by Mark Reynolds, the overall winner of the Winter Racing Circuit.

The Trophy Presentation took place at the Club on Saturday night where there was dinner and dancing as well as what has become an annual event — a Floor

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




