Split Main Sheet Traveler System

Increase performance with proper trim of top battens.

Dick Mitchell, loft manager for Shore Sails, Midwest, uses this method to create a split mainsheet for his Snipe. This arrangement is his preference for mainsheet control in light to medium air, as it allows trim for aligning the top batten parallel to the boom.

The split mainsheet traveler system has proved to be a great boost in trimming the Snipe mainsail correctly for top light to medium air performance. It's best to set the mainsheet trim to as as close to upperbattenparallel-to-the-boom as possible. When the mainsheet is eased to try to achieve this trim with the standard traveler system the boom ends up too far off centerline. With the split mainsheet and the bridle set at 33" off the deck instead of the standard 26", the boom is much closer to centerline with the batten lined up correctly. In heavy winds the split mainsheet can be sucked up through the rear mainsheet block to achieve correct mainsheet trim.

The construction of one of these mainsheets is relatively simple. All that is required is a mainsheet section of 5/16" Samson or other mainsheet brands that have a large core inside. A large core is important as it makes the insertion of the traveler lines much easier. We suggest using 5/32" Marlow prestretch line for the traveler legs that will become a part of the mainsheet when sewn into the core. Most good yacht stores will carry this line, and it is a gold, black, and orange braided line that is very low on stretch. For the Snipe, you will need approximately 26' of 5/16" line, and approximately 15' of 5/32" prestretch.

Step 1. Grab the core of the 5/16" Samson or similar type mainsheet and pull it out of the mainsheet approximately 14" You will bunch the covering of the mainsheet up above that 14" mark so that you can pull the cord out.

Step 2. Cut the cord at that point, being careful not to allow the core to retreat back up inside the mainsheet.

Step 3. Take one 71/2' section of the 5/32" prestretch and stick it inside the core of the mainsheet. You'll have to loosen up the core of the mainsheet and smooth the

5/32" prestretch to a taper with a hotknife or soldering gun so that it will fit inside the core.

Step 4. Take the hotknife or soldering gun and smooth down the core so that the prestretch and core are all melted together.

Step 5. Take the other 71/2' section of prestretch and hand-sew it alongside the other piece of 5/32" Marlow prestretch so that it butts up against the prestretch and the core as they are melted together.

Step 6. Take your soldering gun and smooth all this together, melting the Marlow prestretch. Taper the second piece of Marlow prestretch into the back edge of the core. Be careful as you're melting all these pieces together not to melt them too much so they become too brittle and too stiff as they will not move easily over your mainsheet block.

Step 7. Now take some light weight handstitching sail twine and lightly sew the two pieces of prestretch together. Sew the core to the prestretch that's inside the core, and tightly wrap that all together so that it's again nice and smooth.

Step 8. Take your soldering gun and gently smooth out the hand-stitching twine.

Step 9. Now push the core back over the top of the prestretch where the core is joined to the prestretch, so that the joint will retreat up inside the covering 14".

Step 10. Sew with your sail twine through the covering, through the two pieces of prestretch at the joint where they exit the covering, and into the mainsheet. Every six inches whip it 3 or 4 times around the mainsheet and through the pieces of prestretch, until you are 6" above the joint of the prestretch and the core. At that stage you will have sewn the core to the covering also, so that the mainsheet will be one continuous piece of core, two pieces of prestretch, and covering.

Step 11. Take your soldering gun or hotknife and smooth out the handstitched whipping, and work the mainsheet back and forth in your hands to be sure you get all the hard spots broken down. This will insure that your mainsheet will be freerunning through the blocks.

Snipe sailors who had looked forward to sunshine and warm weather were greeted by a variety of conditions including cold rain and rough weather, but all races in the shortened series were sailed in the Gulf. Only four races of the scheduled races were completed and reported in the scoring.

Lake Ypacarai — Uruguay Ivan Pimentel Is South American Champ

Twenty-five boats from Chile, Argentina, Uruguay, Brazil, and Paraguay arrived at this beautiful lake hoping to win the VI South American Championship sailed March 28th-April 1st. Past champions, and a lot of young juniors were there, especially from Argentina and Uruguay.

Competitors were pleased to have the Vice-Commodore and Rear-Commodore of SCIRA, plus National Secretaries, and the Vice-Secretary of the Western Hemisphere attending. All these people gave the Championship a special value.

During Tuesday the 29th only one race could be sailed, because of the extraordinary calm weather. After a very interesting race, three boats were on the last leg with possibilities of winning: the Wanderleys (father and son), and Raul Revora. Finally, just at the line, Carlos Wanderley Sr. got the first, second was Raul Revora-Pablo Rodriguez, and third Carlos Wanderley Jr.-Francisco Perez. The next five positions were very close, with nothing guaranteed because the wind came and went, but finally Luis Martinez-Marcelo Sallovitz were fourth, and Pedro Sisti-Federico Amadeo fifth.

On Wednesday two races were completed with very light wind. The first one was won by Carlos Wanderley Sr., second Ivan Pimentel-Marcelo Maia, third Carlos Wanderley Jr., fourth Raul Revora, and fifth Alejandro Bugacov-Eduardo Ceusi. The next race, with the same wind conditions, was won by Ivan Pimentel, second Pedro Sisti, third Carlos Wanderley Sr., fourth Alejandro Bugacov, and fifth Luis Martinez.

After the race, when the weight of Carlos Wanderley Sr.'s boat was questioned, she was found to be light, and was disqualified in the third race. After some disagreeable arguments with the Race Committee, Carlos Wanderley Sr. was put away from the championship, and had to see the races from the beach.

Other problems with the moment-ofinertia had happened with Pimentel's boat, but as there was no possibility of measuring it, nothing happened.

On Thursday, the wind finally arrived, and the two races of about 10 miles were sailed. The first of them was perfectly won by Carlos Wanderley Jr., after an interesting match with Alejandro Bugacov, who finally was second. Third was Luis Martinez, fourth Raul Revora, and fifth, the defender, Julio Labandeira-Horacio Rosito, who up to that moment were absent from the first positions. In the after-

noon, the race was won by Julio Labandeira from start to end. Second was Ivan Pimentel, third Luis Martinez.

Finally, on Friday April 1st, the last two races were done, and both of them were won by Julio Labandeira-Horacio Rosito. In the morning, second was Luis Martinez, third Alejandro Bugacov, fourth Bibi Juetz-Andrea Boddener, and fifth Ivan Pimentel.

In the afternoon, second position was very disputed, and finally was won by Ivan Pimentel-Marcelo Maia. Third was Luis Martinez-Marcelo Sallovitz, fourth Alejandro Bugacov-Eduardo Ceusi, and fifth Carlos Wanderley Jr-Francisco Perez.

The final positions showed a very close difference between the first five boats, considering the very different weather conditions.

A real champion — Ivan Pimentel; a nice place — Ypacarai Lake; and great hospitality — the Paraguaians, were the most important events of the VI South American Championship.

Some considerations: lots of incidents happened, most importantly:

1st: Some boats had no measurement certificates. This is not the first time this has happened in a South American Championship.

2nd: The winner came with a new boat, not measured before the championship, with some doubts about the moment of inertia. This problem was observed previously at the championship when held in Buenos Aires, and Punta del Este.

3rd: The Paraguains had organizational problems, and didn't have measurement facilities, so it was not possible to resolve the doubts.

4th: Snipe class is the most important in South America without any doubt, and skippers really sail just thinking of fair play.

I hope next year in Porto Alegre, Brazil, all these problems will be resolved, and that we can have representatives from Peru, Colombia, and Venezuela, too.

Record Fleet Sails In Halloween Regatta

Ole' Joe was pluckier on Sunday, and the two races brought out a new leader profile for the Spooks. Evans, who had a second on Saturday, picked up a first and sixth to become regatta winner. Last year's Halloween Regatta winner, Greg Fisher, of Ohio, with an 8, 2, and 1, came in second place. Andy Fox, of Orlando, sailing the new boat which he built, came in third.

The Goblin Fleet winner was Bill Troutman of Barefoot Sailing Club's Snipe Fleet 726, who took two firsts on Sunday. Harvey Griffith of Atlanta Yacht Club placed second, followed by Means Davis V of AYC.

Tarasa Davis of AYC was the top finishing Junior and won the Pember Trophy.

Doug Goppert Captures Ramel Memorial Trophy

For the first time in its ten-year history, the Ramel Trophy bears the name of a local skipper; Doug and Rita Goppert won the regatta by a commanding margin with finishes of 2-1-2. This exciting rule has gained popularity at Lake Santa Fe where, according to Bob Fugit, it has proved invaluable in identifying boats lost out on the course. The boats are checked off as they finish, and if one fails to return after a reasonable time a search party is sent out that evening or early the next morning. By this means the number of boats lost at Santa Fe has been dramatically reduced.

Participants were treated to a sumptuous buffet at the just-completed contemporary lake home of Chuck and Judy Falkenberg. Designed by architect-Sniper Ken

Frashier, the master bedroom featured a Jacuzzi with a view of the lake (and visaversa we suppose?).

At the start of the first race the winds were a shifty six knots out of the northwest. Rick O'Brien was barely able to cross the fleet on port at the start, and went on to build a race-winning lead, with most of the fleet pinned on the adverse starboard tack.

The start of the second race was delayed by two general recalls. Norm Tanner took the lead on the first beat, but tacked away from the shore too quickly, enabling Doug Goppert to take the lead and round the windward mark first, closely followed by Bob Fugit and Tanner. Goppert held first to the end, and Tanner regained second fifty yards from the finish.

On Sunday the winds had shifted 180 degrees to blow moderately out of the southwest. Steve Sherman led from the start, and held off Doug Goppert to win the race, but the second place was more than enough to win the regatta for Goppert. Consistent starting, and outstanding boat speed enabled Goppert to win three regattas and dominate the local fleet in 1982.
