

Per-Ole Holm Is New Vice Commodore

Per-Ole Holm's sailing life began with a fisherman's boat some 45 years ago and has included such boats as 5.5 meters and Stars. But since the late 1950s the Snipe has been "his boat."

A highly successful businessman, Holm is the managing director of Auto-Haro, a large Volvo dealership and M. Rauanheimo 4B, a shipping company. The combined staff of these two businesses numbers 250. Yet despite his business responsibilities, he has found the time to become one of Finland's sailing leaders.

Per-Ole founded the Kokkola Snipe Fleet #570 in 1962 and was Fleet Captain for 10 years. When his yacht club, Gamlakarleby Segelforening, celebrated its centennial in 1972, Per-Ole led the festivities as commodore, a position that he held for 15 years. He is now the "Commodore of Honor." He has been a vice president of the Finnish Yachting Association since 1979.

After being asked to serve on several protest committees he bagan studying the rules and in 1982 he became an IYRU International Judge. He has served as president or member of the jury for several high level international regattas, including the Snipe Worlds in 1979, 1981, 1985 and 1987, and the 505 Worlds in 1985 and 1987.

Per-Ole has served on the SCIRA board

(1982-1985) and was rear commodore for 1986 and 1987.

He and his wife, Gunvor, have three children, Peter, Gunveig, and Markus, all of whom have become Snipe sailors.

Per-Ole's other interests in life include music and sports in general. He is also an avid cross-country skier.

How can one man find the time to accomplish so much in life? Maybe the key lies in his personal philosophy:

"I think that complaining is a painful way of shortening your life. Instead you should be active, work hard, and leave the rest to God."

Roger Nylund Joins Board

Finnish National Secretary Roger Nylund's first boat was a Snipe which he bought in 1976, even though he had little prior sailing experience. By 1979 he was crewing with Rikard Bjurstrom, and together they finished 10th in the 1979 Finnish Nationals. Since that time he has sailed in many of the major championships of Europe, Scandinavia, and on the International Circuit. He admits to crewing in the occasional long distance big boat races but he limits this to weekends when there is no Snipe racing scheduled.

He is currently the vice commodore of his club, Airisto Segalsallskap i Abo, and as the Junior team leader he has a steady supply of young crews, insuring the future of Snipes in Finland. He has served at all levels of national administration, including editor of the Finnish Snipe Bulletin, member of the board of SCIRA Finland, Finnish team leader at the Worlds in 1987, and of course he has been the Finnish National Secretary since 1986. He has also served at the top levels of international regatta administration and juries.

The office manager of his family's envelope manufacturing business, Roger and his wife, Wiccy, have a five year old son, Andreas.

Due to the recent drought, the water level was down again creating a picturesque island geographically dead center on the course. Plus, the weather was sunny and warm, and nary a leaf fluttered — not your typical fall weekend.

clubhouse that survived an overenergized all night party though it was littered with torn decorations, smashed pumpkins, an empty fire extinguisher, and an array of weird costumes still wrapped around semicomatose bodies.

True to form, the Saturday night-Sunday morning party was the smashing hit of the weekend. The costumes were sensational, the decorations were irresistible, and the organization by regatta co-chairpersons Marianne and Don Hackbarth was flawless.

Tampa, FL — Charlie and Michele Bustamante of Miami won the Florida State Championship for the second time in two years at Davis Islands YC

on Tampa Bay.

The sailing conditions were also almost a repeat of last year's. The three races scheduled for Saturday were reduced to one sailed in very light winds with four races being sailed Sunday morning in blustery conditions. Ethan and Trudy Bixby of St. Petersburg finished a close second with Paul and M.J. Gillis, now from Melbourne, Fla., taking third place.

Saturday's race was sailed in 0 to 5 mph winds with a slight current running counter to the wind. As a result five or six boats were over early and not all heard their number to return. Mike Gable of St. Pete led for the first lap but at the finish it was Mike Toppa of Clearwater in first followed by Charlie and Paul.

Due to the delayed start and the continued lack of wind the rest of the day's races were cancelled in favor of trying for four races on Sunday.

Sunday's races were held back-toback in winds that started at 12 mph and increased to almost 20 mph during the morning. The temperature was in the 70s with a chop building up. John Jennings of St. Pete won the first race, Ethan the second, and Charlie the third and fourth to win the championship.

Saturday night's dinner at the Cactus Club was well attended and all enjoyed some excellent Mexican food.

SNIPES SHARE HOLIDAY FUN AT LONG BEACH

Long Beach, CA — Twenty-four Snipe sailors passed up barbeques and beach parties to bash it out at Alamitos Bay for the Labor Day Regatta on September 5-6.

The fleet had a number of new faces behind the wheel of many Snipe mobiles. Let's welcome Jeff Merrill (back from his 12-meter fling with Heart of America), Andy Pontious (leaving his Georgia behind), Bob Little (trading his Segerblom crew job for a tiller of his own), Neal Baker (keelboat madman who has joined the party), and Greg Lowe (taking leave

from his J-24 career to check it out).

A clerical error (no weather mark) by the race committee caused the first race to be abandoned. Lido 14 veteran Charlie Cummings blasted out of the blocks to lead the first real race wire to wire. Mike Segerblom was hot on his heels but to no avail. Jim Grubbs, fresh from his deuce at the Nationals, finished in third.

Craig Leweck regrouped after a first race ninth (badly overstood first weather mark) to set the pace for the rest of the weekend. Despite Jeff McDermitt leading at the weather mark, both Leweck and Sego blasted by him on the two speed reaches to finish with Leweck, Sego and McDermitt in that order.

The wind was now up (13-16 knots) and the chop was messy — kind of a typical Alamitos Bay day. The third race (seemed like the fourth due to abandoned race and numerous general recalls) started late in the day, and the fleet aimed to the usually favored right side. Again it was Leweck and Sego who headed the pack, but Leweck lost his big lead at the leeward mark when he got caught in the Cal 20 fleet. Sego got through the mess unscathed to take the lead and finish first with Leweck in second and McDermitt in third.

Going into the Mexican fiesta party Saturday night at the ABYC it was Segerblom with 5.75 pts., Leweck in second with 11.75, and Grubbs hanging in third with 12 pts.

The competition at the party was heated throughout the hors d'oeuvres and cocktails, but the racing slacked off at dinner time due to inflated meal prices. A post-party at Segerblom's led the crowd through the night and into the next day.

Sunday arrived on schedule, as did most of the racers. Grubbs made his bid for the regatta lead by finding the head of the pack. Jeff Lenhart took advantage of the long Olympic course race to eventually reel in Grubbs. McDermitt was his steady self in third, with Leweck coming back to fourth after a starting line foul forced him into a 720° spin.

Race number four was Segerblom's downfall, where a misjudgement on a reach leg put him deep enough to want to call it a day. Folks, he was back there! Anyway, the last race saw Leweck sprint to the lead for an eventual bullet. After a poor start, Grubbs fought his way back to third (behind Gregg Morton). This gave the event to Leweck, with Grubbs second and McDermitt third. Showing new competitive life was Charlie Cummings who stayed steady to land in the fourth spot. J-24 sailor Greg Lowe was borrowing roommate Steve Bloemeke's boat to slide into fifth place. (Results, page 14).


