A great week awaits all those who travel to south Florida this summer for the Nationals. The regatta is being co-hosted by the Coral Reef Yacht Club and the United States Sailing Center. June 23-30 holds something for everyone.

Anyone who has come to the Don Q Rum Keg Regatta is familiar with the beauty and challenging sailing conditions of Biscayne Bay. The racing will take place on the southern end of the Bay so as to offer open conditions without land effects. Mean winds for this time of year are southeast at 9-10 knots. Air temperatures will be in the high seventies to mideighties. There is a seabreeze that kicks in ate morning to early afternoon, and due to the depth of the Bay there is some wind chop.

The event is being co-hosted by two very active and knowledgeable organizations. The Coral Reef YC has been involved in many one-design and offshore regattas over the years. They are the annual host of the Bacardi Cup for Stars, have held the J-24 Midwinters, and have been involved in the SORC to name just a few. Located next to the Sailing Center, their facilities (including swimming pool), will be enjoyed by sailor and nonsailor alike. They will be providing the race committee and various social functions will also take place here.

The Sailing Center, an official USYRU training site, was established in 1986. In the past two years it has been the training ground for such Olympic stars as Allison Jolly and Lynne Jewel as well as sailors in the Star, Flying Dutchman, 470, Tornado, and Finn classes. Its efficient physical layout will provide parking for boats and autos as well as measurement facilities. Actual launching and sailing will take place out of the Sailing Center. A floating dock will connect the Center and Coral Reef YC, providing a truly complete and integrated physical plant.

Of course, the great sailing is only part of the draw at Miami. Besides the great beaches and shopping, there are a number of attractions that are a must. The Metro Zoo is one of the country's finest. The Miami Seaquarium is the home of Flipper and other wonders of the sea. Vizcaya offers a look at another era of Florida's history, and there is always the Old Town Trolley for a tour of Miami.

For nighttime activities, besides those taking place at Coral Reef YC, there are being organized trolley rides to the Rusty Pelican Restaurant, a Miami landmark, and Bayside, a new Rouse shopping/restaurant complex on the Bay, and of course at least one night will be spent at Monty Trainer's, a bayside tradition for sailors in general and Snipers in particular.

Overall plans point to a great way to spend a week. Great sailing and a chance to enjoy the many varied recreational and cultural aspects of Miami. So make plans now to come to Miami in June. We look forward to seeing you then.

THE COMMODORE SAYS

As I write to you in the *BULLETIN*, I wonder who is out there reading this. What country do they live in?. How many understand English. How soon will the *BULLETIN* reach them? How well can we understand each other, as we come from different cultures?

There is one thing that I feel sure about, and that is the way that the Snipe itself talks to us. Although I feel most at home in my own boat, I also feel familiar with the Snipe when sailing a borrowed one in a foreign country.

Going back to my questions about understanding. I remember starting out as a new Snipe sailor and trying to get in touch with other Snipe people. At that time I did not know about the Snipe Association or even of the fleet organization. In my home town, Helsinki, I had sailed in the Star fleet. I got into business in Kokkola, 500 km to the north. I knew that there were no Stars there, but there were a couple of Snipes, so I bought a used Snipe and got in touch with the sailors in Kokkola. It was easy to communicate with these people because we were talking about the same things. I found wonderful friends, and understanding.

Within a year we had formed Fleet 570 and the hard work began. We met often during the winters. Sometimes we played ice hockey, or we skied, but mostly we talked of the coming summer and sailing. We planned for the pointscore races and we discussed technical and tactical improvements for the Snipe season ahead. We also competed in knowledge of the rules and how to act in different situations during a race. We spent countless hours reading aloud the articles in the Snipe *BULLETIN*, and interpreted them for those who didn't understand English.

We contacted the local schools and told the students about the Snipe, and we brought more people into the Class by inviting them to crew with us.

As our fleet grew, we suddenly found that our skills and performance were growing, too.

What was SCIRA's part in all of this? The Finnish National Secretary at the time was Aarno Walli, a dedicated Snipe sailor who served the fleets in every respect, but the SCIRA Office and the Commodore seemed distant from the activities of our local fleet. We had little concept of anything that could happen at the top that would help us meet our goals for our fleet. (Later, at the 1965 Worlds, in the Canary Islands, I became interested in the worldwide organization).

I still feel that the main work of the Class is at the fleet level, and that most of the pleasure is found in the fleet races. The top sailors and the flag officers meet at the championships. They often discuss ways to improve things but they don't always inform the locals when they return home. And then there is the problem of the fleets communicating their ideas to the officers.

The answer to these problems is the International Snipe *BULLETIN*.

I know that there are many who don't read English. I ask the National Secretaries and fleet captains to translate the items of importance and to inform the sailors about this information from the Snipe *BULLETIN*.

We must have the best communication within the many nations that make up SCIRA, and it must move in all directions. There are many Snipe newsletters, written in different languages, with news that is of interest to our members around the world. Please send copies to the SCIRA Office and we will use the material of interest to improve the Class.

This issue has the Officers Directory. Please keep it near, so you will have the addresses of your officers, so you will know how to make your feelings and ideas known. The officers at every level of SCIRA invite your input. Your time and postage will be well spent.

These are the ways that we must communicate.

THE EUROPEAN REPORT

All 10 European countries racing Snipes returned good, encouraging reports of their activities throughout 1988.

Norway has recorded an unprecedented growth over the last two years; in fact, all four Scandanavian countries have been pushing their numbers up and, like a forest fire, North Europe looks set to rage on into 1989 and onto the 1990s.

Belgium was nearly lost to the Association two years back. A past stronghold in Europe, this little country together with UK, rebuilt SCIRA Europe after the ravages of 1939-45. Eighteen months ago the Class had virtually collapsed in Belgium. Then, like a Phoenix from the ashes, Andre Callot emerged. Within a short period Andre managed to boost interest and now SCIRA Belgium stands proud of its self esteem and recapturing many past Snipe sailors, along with attract ing new blood.

In the south, Spain has neither relinquished or eased her firm grip on Snipe. During 1988 a new young national secretary was elected into office. This is a busy, responsible post to hold for, Spain has the largest membership of all European countries. Spain has always contributed so much to the Class and produced many champions.

Congratulations to Spain in her being selected to hold the 1992 Olympics. Also worthy to note, past Commodore Arturo Delgado will be deeply involved in the organization of the Olympic Sailing Program. Appreciation and respect must go to Arturo for taking on this mammoth task.

Portugal has a long Snipe history and always has been the perfect host in opening her regattas to foreign visitors. Interesting to note, she has been importing boats from South America as well as European craft.

Italy returned with a good year with a growing following. Italy does not venture north to many events, but like Portugal is the perfect host to visiting crews. Snipe is well supported by the Italian Sailing Federation and has gained much respect by that body.

France was the only Euro country that

experienced a setback during '88. In the early months of the year the situation did look desperate and much concern was shown. Their newly elected National Secretary Gilles Boisaubert had a difficult task placed onto his young shoulders. At the end of the year SCIRA France is still experiencing problems, but one can now see her slowly gaining strength. Certainly France has one or two lean years ahead but determination by her members should see a complete recovery.

One cannot let 1988 pass without allocating our Past Commodore, Jerry Thompson, a paragraph of appreciation. Jerry took up his pilgrimage into Europe while vice commodore. He spied out the continent from north to south throughout 1987, summing up the situation and potential of Europe. Then in 1988 he returned with the 'Jerry Thompson one man expedition' to discover and unravel how all these separate countries were able to put over their 10 individual viewpoints, argue out each case, negotiate, compromise, and end up with a mutual vote. Jerry did a tremendous amount of work to open up the European scene to the western hemisphere. Without disrespect to any of our past officers, Jerry Thompson went out of his way to forge an understanding between the (Continued on page 12)

NEW PLAYER

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> Ethan Bixby has joined North's One Design team to continue our Snipe research and development program. Ethan's credentials include several World and North American Championships in the 505 and Interclub classes, as well as extensive 470, 420, and intercollegiate dinghy campaigns. His winning approach is now focused on the Snipe class, so look for Ethan at the Dead of Winter, Midwinter, Don Q, and North American Championship regattas.

NEW DESIGNS

After extensive testing, our design team has developed the #5 main, an advance from the #2 main. The new radial head provides uniform distribution of leech loading for a more powerful upper section. The strip clew is even stronger than a radial and prevents the lower leech from getting too tight under high load. With a flatter entry down low, this easy-to-set-up sail provides an exceptionally clear slot and excellent performance under a wide range of wind strength.

The addition of yarn tempered inlaid clews and 4.1 ounce upper sections on both the SS2+ and SS2- jibs means these already proven designs will provide even better durability and shape retention. The SS2+ has a fuller luff curve for quick acceleration and an easy to steer groove in choppy water. It is also an excellent choice for heavier crews. The SS2- is our flat water/high wind design with excellent pointing characteristics.
