JOHN NICHOLSON IS HI-POINT CHAMPION

WINS WITH PERFECT SCORE


John Nicholson, Captain of the Thames River(Connecticut) Fleet #354, walked off with the top honors for the high-point championship for 1953. He sailed in 20 races and finished first in each one for a perfect score of 1750. Five to eight boats took part in each race. It is interesting to note that the three previous winners also had scores of 1750, 1740, and 1750, so you have to sail in at least 15 races and be darned near perfect to win.

John will get the Minneford Perpetual Trophy for the U.S. High Point Championship and also the Reichner Perpetual Trophy for having the highest score for the entire world. Both trophies date back to 1932.

Carlos Bosch of the Santiago, Cuba, Fleet #360, with a record of a second place in his first race of the season and then 12 firsts in the next 12 races, takes second place, moving up from 42nd place last year. Carlos gets a pat on the back and a wish for better luck next time.



SEAVY STILL FLORIDA STATE CHAMP



SNIPES START THEIR FINAL HEAT. WINNER(6995) MAY BE SEEN IN THE MIDDLE OF

Francis Seavy of Clearwater, Florida, was the only skipper to retain his state title during the Miami Yacht Club's Midwinter Regatta March 6-7, which saw ninety-two boats participating in nine different classes.

Seavy, a veteran sailor who held the National Snipe title in 1951, won the Florida title for the second straight year as he piloted his trim "HONEY" home in front of 18 International challengers in the first two heats of the Senior race and then finished close behind Eddie Williams of Wichita. Kansas, in the third and final race.

Steve Bellows, the Miami policeman who formerly held the title, wound up second in the overall standings with 2-3-4 for the three heats as Julius Kroeger of Rochester, N. Y., finished third with 4-2-8.

Williams, who had his new Snipe flown from California the day before the race, was fourth in the final results with 9-5-1, while Bruce Colyer of West Palm Beach placed fifth with 6-4-7.

In the Junior Snipe race, sailed Saturday afternoon, Carlos Rodriguez, a 16-year-old youth from Madrid, Spain, attending the Graham-Eckes School in West Palm Beach, defeated a seasoned fleet of sailors to win the State title. Carlos won the first and third heats and wound up third in the second. The most amazing feature of his triumph was that three months ago he didn't know the bow from the stern of a sailboat. Nicky Welsh, also of Graham-Eckes School, was second with 3-1-2, while Catherine Casey, also from the same school, was third with 4-3-2.

Although there were only a few spills, boat after boat was withdrawn from competition in the various classes as a result of ripped sails, busted stays, and broken sprits, caused by choppy seas and brisk, chilling winds. The regatta attracted one of the largest Snipe fleets ever assembled in Miami.



QUALITY FROM DENMARK -



"WHAT KIND OF SAILS SHALL I BUY?"

What with moving out of an apartment in Clearwater, Florida, the first of the month to return to Wichita to a house which was supposed to be finished but wasn't; moving out of an office in Clearwater to one in Wichita which was finished but not furnished; traveling around a little to try to scare up some business for the Central Engineering Corporation (it—and I—) are in the business of weighing things with an electric load sensing cell, not recommended for weighing snipes, but if you have anything else you want weighed, I will be glad to fix you up) (if this free advertisement brings any business, I will put a \$5.00 ad in the Bulletin, assuming that the editor doesn't cut out the free advertising); plus answering several dozen letters all starting out "What kind of sails shall I buy?", it appeared for a while that Wells' Wanderings for this month simply wouldn't get written.


Judging from the letters that I have had so far on the subject of sails, it appears that I will save myself a lot of trouble from the standpoint of answering letters and get myself into a lot of trouble at the same time by giving my answer to the above question in this column. Life would certainly have been a lot simpler if no one had ever made orlon or dacron sailcloth or if the stuff had turned out to be no good. Unfortunately, it appears to me that it is very good indeed, and I am afraid there are going to be some dandy squabbles about what action the Board of Governors should take concerning its use in the future.

There is going to be considerable difference of opinion as to how much better, if any, these materials are. On a small lake, with winds which are spotty and shifty, it would be almost impossible to prove anything conclusively. Even on the Gulf of Mexico where the winds are very steady both in direction and velocity, other things can enter in, and it is probably impossible to arrive at any conclusions that won't be argued about. However, the purpose of allowing the use of these materials in regattas this year was to obtain information and experience to guide future policy, so I will venture my opinion on the subject—which is that the orion and new heat—set dacron fabrics produce sails which will make a boat go noticeably faster and that cotton sails are a definite competitive disadvantage.

So what do I tell a guy who writes to me and asks me what sails he should buy, particularly the one who says that the last time he could afford a new suit of sails was three or four years ago, who is now ready to buy some new sails and can't afford to make a mistake, as it will probably be three or four years before he can buy any more? There is also the problem of the skipper who now has two suits of cotton sails and it will be a long, long time before he can afford to buy two suits of new synthetic sails to replace his cotton sails. All of which is sad, but imagine the plight of the married skipper who has made remarks to his wife for years on the subject of new coats, dresses, shoes, and whatnots she buys when the old ones are not worn out. Just wait until she finds out that he is about to whoop off more than \$300.00 for a couple of suits of synthetic sails when his cotton sails are probably good for another ten or fifteen years, with proper care.

Suggestions have ranged all the way from relegating synthetic sails to moonlight sailing, to allowing their use for every thing immediately. Ruling them out forever would probably cause the least trouble for the Board of Governors, but they would certainly be accused of placing monkey wrenches in the wheels of progress. One suggestion which has been made several times is that, after this year, synthetic sails be restricted to fleet races (one person suggested that they should be allowed in fleet races only when the fleet unanimously approved their use) for some period of time (periods of two or three years have been suggested). after which time they would be allowed unlimited use.

My answer to the question of "What sails should I buy?" has therefore had to be that I don't know. Future action by the Board of Governors will be based on their judgment of what is best for the Snipe Class throughout the world--and their decision will be aided by hearing what Snipe skippers think.
