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

#### Association Island Racing Conditions

Wind every day is not an absolute certainty - two scheduled race days in 1974, and four in 1975, were lost due to no wind or too much wind - but the probability of usable wind is so high that the area can be counted as one of the world's "wind machines". There is a small current, caused by Lake Ontario's water either being pushed toward the east by wind or barometric pressure, or being allowed to shift back by absence of pressure, or diminution of the wind forces. Generally, the current runs northeast or the opposite - southwest. There is no salt in the water. The water temperatures are high enough for personal comfort. Motor-boat traffic is almost non-existent. On the average, days are sunny.

The wind offers enough variety to be interesting, both in direction and velocity. The most likely direction is from somewhere between south and west, and often is around 240 degrees. In 1974, direction was within the southeast quadrant 70% of the time.

As to speed, plan on anything from 0 to 30, but highest probability is between 5 and 15 knots - about 67% of the readings fall within that range.

What shifts to expect? Stu Walker's article in YACHT RACING (July 1975) on the winds at Association Island offers observations of one of sailing's most careful wind-watchers. In the morning, chances are that the wind will shift clockwise if it is from the south and light. If it is reasonably strong, and from 240 or 245 already, it will shift back and forth around that mean.

To sum it up - chances of wind are good. Do not count on either light or heavy air; i.e. be ready for either, or medium air. Check the current direction before starting, by studying the flow at a mark. Check the compass before the start and during the weather legs to get a feel for shift behavior.





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

# Van Wesley Romps in Snipe Midwinters

Van Wesley of Chattanooga, TN, defeated an international field of Snipe sailors at the Snipe Midwinter Championship, Feb. 28-Mar. 2 at Bay Harbor Inn, Tampa.

Wesley edged Paulo Paradeda of Brazil for the title, with Harry Levinson of Indianapolis third and Jeff Lenhart of Newport Beach, Gold Medal winner in the 1975 Pan American Games and '75 Nationals champ, taking fourth overall.

The regatta was characterized by dramatic fluctuation in placings by top sailors. Frequently, a 20th place would be followed by a 3rd, with Wesley being the only sailor to escape roller-coaster finishes. Wesley's worst race was a 14th, which was discarded in this best-five-of-six series.

The practice race on Saturday afternoon furnished the 49-boat fleet with a taste of the light airs that would prevail throughout the regatta. Tom Nute of San Diego won it in a westerly breeze of 5-8 knots.

Winds under 10 knots continued for Sunday's two official races, Lou Dixon of Springfield, Ill., emerged with a 2-3 scorecard and a big lead on the fleet. Most sailors, though, were either grim or happy – there was no inbetween; Lenhart had a 1-9, Earl Elms a 19-1, and Harry Levinson a 20-2.

The fleet sneaked through a morning race on Monday, and then waited until 4 p.m. for a matinee race as the westerly sea breeze up to 12 knots filled in over the Old Tampa Bay course. At the end of four races, Wesley was in firm command and Dixon had dropped to fifth.

Wind was no where for the 10 a.m. start on Tuesday. Then gradually as the sailors stripped from wet suits to bathing suits under a hot sun, the breeze set in — southerly at first with a shift to the west. Wesley slumped to a 14th in the opener, then followed with a fourth to take the title by nearly eight points ahead of Paradeda who was amazingly consistent after his 29th place in the initial race.

The regatta was sponsored by Clearwater Fleet 46 with cooperation from the Bay Harbor Inn staff. Maj. Phil Blair served as regatta chairman.

## Hite Wins District III Regatta Competition

Don Hite of Lake Angelus, Mich., again outdistanced all other District III sailors in winning the combined regatta finishes for 1975. This is the 6th time in the last 7 years that Don has won this competition. Consistently high finishes seem to be his answer since of the 9 regattas he entered he won 3, had 2-2nds, 3-3rds amd 1-4th.

Harry Levinson of Indianapolis

entered 3 regattas and compiled a 1-24. Terry Timm of Ann Arbor, Mich., sailed in 7 regattas and finished with a record a 1-1st, 2-2nds, 1-3rd, 2-4ths and 1-8th.

Although the sailors were entered in different regattas on many occasions, and did not sail the same number of regattas, by using this system each can be compared with the other.

The final scores are weighted to reflect the size of the regatta and the number of "hot shots" entered.



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
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## **EQUIPMENT LIST FOR '75 WORLDS**

## IT PAYS TO ADVERTISE!

And advertising is free (if you know where to ask and what to ask for). A primer in publicity.

If you want the world to know about vour regatta:

Local newspapers, TV, and radio are always on the lookout for colorful activities to use for feature material. Regional and national magazines depend on sailing activities for their existence.

A press public relations committee is a must for your regatta. The following suggestions may be helpful. LOCAL:

Contact the local paper(s), radio, and TV. It pays to know the sports editor, although your contact may be with the "Outdoors" editor. (Sometimes sailing, to the uninitiated, ranks somewhere between horse shoes and croquet as a sport - but sailboats make a colorful display for an otherwise dull mid-week issue.) Remember, the sports desk has its own problems - and one of them is to sell papers. The editor may lavish a whole feature section on the regatta if he has the space. Call him a month before the regatta. Better yet, keep him for a year round friend of the fleet.

Prepare a press release for a week before the regatta and one for the opening day. Remember the obvious: WHO, WHAT, WHERE, and WHEN. Is the national champion coming? The commodore? Last year's winner? Ted Wells? Offer celebrity interviews, but be sure to make arrangements with both the press and the star, if you have one. How many are coming? and from where? Papers like numbers, and locals are more apt to be impressed with far away places.

Have a motor boat available for the press. Have a SAILOR in charge of the boat. (If getting a picture involves getting in the way of the start, you had better forget it.)

REGIONAL, NATIONAL, and INTERNATIONAL MAGAZINES:

Here, you have a different problem, since you will be the reporter. All have some of the same requirements: WHO, WHAT, WHERE, and WHEN are still the basics. The first paragraph of your report should give the name of the regatta and where it was held, along with the date and the number of boats competing. Who won? Why did he win? Was he the favorite? Who else was there? What were the wind and water conditions?

Pictures: Good ones are really worth more than a thousand words. A clear back and white photograph of either the action or the people is your best bet. Everybody likes to see his picture in a magazine, and the "knee-cap gallery", ten top place winners in A and B fleets with skippers standing in back and crews kneeling in front makes 40 people happy - if it is printed. But, after being printed about a million times, such scenes tend to lose their freshness, and national magazines just don't print them. Contrast those pictures with the one Paul Polgar took of Mid-Winter Champion Van Wesley studying the score board with stubby pencil in hand. That picture is a winner because it tells the story better than words would.

There are some differences in reporting for each type of magazine: REGIONAL:

These magazines cover their own region i.e. southeast, midwest, Southern California, etc. They are always eager for stories within their area, and may be able to send a reporter to cover the event. They will almost always print regatta results, and may be able to use fuller coverage than the national magazines.


One of the best of the regional magazines is SAILORS' GAZETTE. published and edited by Snipe sailor John Weber. The Gazette covers the same area as SCIRA District IV. Address: Sailors' Gazette, 6727 First Avenue South, Suite 107, St. Petersburg, FL 33707. Another Snipe sailor, Earl Purtee, is going into print shortly with INLAND SAILING, 517 South 21 Street, Richmond, IN 47374. This publication will cover District III's general area. District II's southern section is covered by SOUTHWIND, Suite 104, 1730 Nasa Road One, Houston, TX 77058.

There are others which cover almost every section. Find the one in your area. NATIONAL:

Sometimes national coverage magazines don't have much space and prefer the larger and more prestigious events to the small local ones. Their requirements are for accuracy, and brevity. Please send the results, by race, for the top ten. After that, they may not want the 40 or 50 others who also sailed.



#### MOVING MARKS

There was considerable discussion involving a situation in one of the races in the World Championships at Punta del Este. Since it covered a situation which could well arise again, it is worth explaining.

The wind backed 90° prior to the start of the final beat, and the windward mark was moved accordingly. Following the "Rules for conducting Major Championship regattas", a boat fired the necessary two guns, flew code flag "C" and hailed the lead boats advising them of the move. Which brings up a good point — what should the boats do?

All but one boat circled the leeward mark before heading on the next leg. One boat merely came close, then headed for the finish. He was protested but the protest was denied. My personal opinion is that as soon as "C" was signaled — tail end Charlie could have headed for the finish from right where he was, without going any closer to the leeward mark.

The rules say "a yacht shall sail the course so as to round or pass each mark on the required side in correct sequence, and so that a string representing her wake from the time she starts until she finishes would, when drawn taut, lie on the required side of each mark".

The string bit complicates the case when boats circled the mark but they didn't violate any rules — they left the mark on the required side, but there is nothing to have prevented a boat from going straight from the old windward mark to the new one, if the skipper had had the courage and foresight to do so (starting before "C" was signaled if he wanted to).

Since windshifts of this type can occur again, and since the

course would be very bad without a beat to the finish, there should be a way of salvaging the race without a hassle — and there is. The solution is to fire one gun and fly code flag "R" at any time after passing the former windward mark, and before firing two guns and flying "C". Flying "R" says "sail the designated course in the reverse direction", which in this case translates into — leave the next mark to starboard instead of port, then go to the new windward mark.

Back when we' sailed nothing but triangular or windward leeward courses, and before we had code flag "C", use of "R" could sometimes salvage an otherwise sad race after a wind shift. Since the racing rules imply that you can fly "R" at any time. I don't think any specific mention of it is necessary in the sailing instructions, although it would possibly avoid some surprises if it were mentioned.


In case of sanctioned regattas or point score races not being sailed under the Rules for Championship Regattas, the use of code flag "C" should be covered in the sailing instructions.


#### TUNING TIP

Hassles from protests on ooching, pumping, rocking until there are some more clarifying decisions.





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
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
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"The last leg" - paddling to the ramp at Atlanta YC. (Weber photo)


