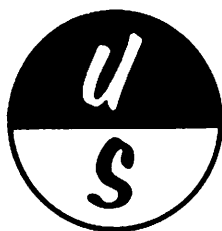

The Western Hemisphere Championship is one of the two major regattas for Snipes in 1982. The top 2 boats from each country qualify. The regatta is a round robin series and the only equipment taken from boat to boat is the competitor's sails. Ullman sails were first in six out of seven races and placed 1st, 2nd and 3rd overall. This was the 4th time out of the last 5 Western Hemispheres that Ullman Sails have won.

The same sails won the U.S. Nationals, the World Championship, Junior World Championship and the 1982 Halloween.

THE COMMODORE SAYS

After being phoned at an early morning hour on a Saturday by our Executive Secretary asking where is this month's "Commodore Quacks," it's down to writing.

Having just returned from another successful Winter Racing Circuit (SCIRA success, not my own), it was good to see such a large turn-out of boats from the Nassau fleet. It seems that all the hard work put in on the Western Hemispheres by the local fleet and sailing club members has paid off. If you ever get a chance to make a visit to the Winter Circuit, by all means do so, you will be treated to some of the best sailing and hospitality of your life.

I did enjoy actually sailing again after being on so many committee boats lately watching the "hot shots" go round and round. You would think a person would learn from watching, but once again on figuring out wind shifts, tides, etc. . . a quote comes to mind, "A probable event is something good that ought to happen but doesn't. An unlikely event is something bad that should not happen but does. . ."

We hope the U.S. Nationals this summer in Seattle draws as well as the sunny Bahamas did in March. Our spy in the Pacific Northwest informs me the sailing, which will be held on Puget Sound, offers views not to be missed. The racing will be in protected waters (no swells) and winds, while traditionally light, can offer good sailing conditions. The Northwest has a lot to offer, and we don't get a Nationals in this neck of the woods very often, so I urge you all to pack up and head out West for a regatta you won't soon forget.

Seattle Snipe Sailors Set U.S. Nationals Plans

The Seattle Snipe Sailors are enthusiastic about holding the 1983 U.S. National Championship, and are looking forward to meeting fellow Snipe sailors, holding a first rate regatta and showing off their beautiful country. The following are points to consider in making your plans to attend.

WEATHER

August provides the best weather with daytime temperatures apt to be 70-80°. Evenings are cool, 50-60°, and long, as the sun sets at about 10:00. Rainfall during August is minimal. The winds are normally light; however it is possible to have some days of 20 and over.

SAILING CONDITIONS

We'll be sailing in salt water, in the open

water of the Puget Sound. The course will be set about 3/4 mile from docks, in an area least affected by tidal currents. The water is normally smooth. Large waves and swells are unlikely. The water is also very deep and extremely cold (about 50° during August). Good foul-weather gear, or WET SUITS, and boots are recommended. Life Jackets are MANDATORY. Wind shifts are minimal, but may be a factor in race tactics. Overall conditions are very good, and racing is fair.

BOAT STORAGE/LAUNCHING

Two hoists and a wide ramp are available for launching. Adequate dock area for rigging is accessible after boats are in the water.

Storage is available within a few yards of hoists and ramp. The area is partially fenced, and a security guard will be on-site. CYC also has "Dinghy Docks," where boats may be rigged, and sails set, while on a low dock, and merely pushed into the water. Limited space is available on a first come, first served basis. There is a small daily charge for dinghy dock space.

LODGING

There are hundreds of hotels and motels within a 15-20 minute drive of the Yacht Club. These range from the beautiful downtown hotels to a number of moderately priced motels on Highway 99 "motel row." A partial list is included.

Although van campers are not specifically permitted, prudent sailors have found the large parking area adjacent to the boat storage area quite satisfactory, with

THE SCORE

Forty-three numbers were issued last month with 20 going to Spain, 16 to U.S.A., 5 to Sweden and 1 each to Paraguay and Portugal. No new fleets were chartered.

England Celebrates 50th Year Of Snipe Sailing

In 1933 Snipe was first introduced to Europe. Twelve members of Royal Cinque Ports Yacht Club, Dover, made the introduction by having a Snipe built each. It was from these first dozen that the class spread out into Europe, whilst the first British Championship was in 1936, at Strangford Lock Yacht Club, Belfast. Three Dover Snipes competed for the trophy, with the first R.C.P.Y.C. taking overall third, helmed by J. Pout. It is apparent that Snipe sailors all over Europe are so indebted to these first twelve helmsmen, that SCIRA U.K. has decided to commemorate our gratitude.

Therefore a two day International Regatta will be on MAY 14-15, 1983 at Royal Cinque Ports Yacht Club, Dover, England.

Juniors Invited For San Francisco Bay Snipe Fleet Day

In last month's Commodore Says, Doug pointed out that one of the needs of the class is programs for interesting juniors in Snipe sailing. San Francisco Bay Fleet 12 held Snipe Fleet Day at Richmond Yacht Club April 9 to get juniors and their parents acquainted with the boat, and with members of the Snipe fleet. Members loaned their boats, and were requested to act as crew for the juniors for two short races.

The schedule was as follows:

1000 — Snipes arrive, time to check out the boats. Fleet meeting. Rig boats.

1100 — Reception, introductions, movie, assignment of boats, and skipper's meeting.

1230 — Lunch — Have lunch on board the assigned boat with the owner. Get acquainted with the boats and rigging. Ask questions.

1300 — Races — Each junior should skipper in two races.

1530 — Racing ends.

1600 — Wrap up — Video tape, snacks.

1700 — The end.

Each person was requested to bring a sack lunch and a life jacket.

This is a simple, effective program for introducing juniors to Snipes which could be duplicated in almost any fleet.

Lenhart, Ed Adams win berth at Pan Am Games

Jeff Lenhart and Pat Muglia were the top team for the Snipe Winter Circuit with a first place at Clearwater, second place in Miami, and a first and second for the two Nassau Regattas. Mark Reynolds was a close second. Jeff and Ed Adams will represent the U.S. in Snipes in the Pan Am Games in Venezuela in August, as first and second place finishers at the Clearwater Midwinters.

Don Q Rum Keg Regatta

Friday March 18

First Race: Southwesterly winds 15 to 25 mph. Triangle course. Lenhart took an early lead but Reynolds passed him in the last weather leg. The finish was: Reynolds, Lenhart, Chapin, Adams and Bateman.

Second Race: Winds remained the same and again two triangles. Scott Weston from Coral Reef Yacht Club, Miami, established an early lead and kept it for a complete triangle. At the finish line it was: Lenhart, Reynolds, Scott Weston, Pierre Siegenthaler and Ed Adams.

Saturday March 19

Third Race: The fleet had to wait for the wind to settle. It was Southeasterly 15 mph. Ed Adams jumped on the lead at the first weather mark increasing the lead almost to a horizon job. At the finish line: Adams, Reynolds, Chapin, Lenhart and Augie Diaz.

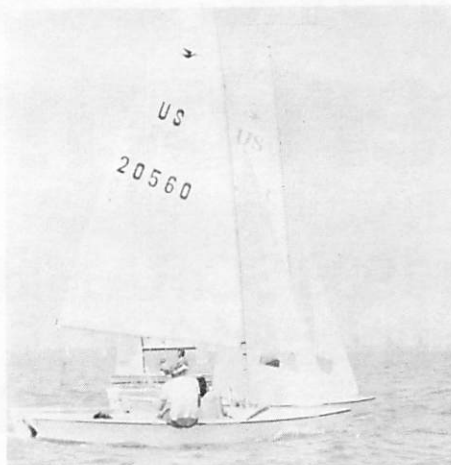

Bacardi, Gamblin Series

The Royal Nassau Sailing Club was host

to the annual Baccardi Cup and SCIRA Winter Championship held March 23-26 in Montagu Bay, Nassau, Bahamas.

Of the 41 entries 25 were from the U.S.A., 1 from Canada and 15 from Nassau. The visiting Snipes were transported across the Gulf from Miami on the M.V. "Betty K."

We were honoured again this year in having renowned Star sailor Charlie deCardenas come over from Miami to be Race Committee Chairman. He had his

hands full with the weather. It took three days to sail the three Bacardi Cup Races.

Opening day was fine with easterly winds of 12-15 knots. At the end of the day two races had been sailed over an Olympic type course and Jeff Lenhart was leading with a fourth and a first and Pierre Siegenthaler was second with two thirds.

The next day the third race was started in southeasterly winds of 20-22 knots. The wind steadily increased to 25-30 knots with gusts up to 35 knots. The race was abandoned when the leading boats had two legs to go on the two and one-third triangular course. In the meantime half the fleet had capsized, mostly on the reaches, although four boats were blown over going to windward on the second beat. For the photographers following the race it was a dream come true!

It was still howling on the third day and in the early morning, with Montagu Bay covered in white caps, it seemed impossible that there would be any racing. Just before noon much to the surprise of everyone the wind had abated and it was possible to sail the final race for the Bacardi Cup in northerly winds of 16 knots with reasonably good sea conditions. Mark Reynolds was the winner of this race and Jeff Lenhart was second.

Jeff Lenhart and crew Pat Muglia won the Bacardi Cup by three positions over Mark Reynolds and crew Eric Krebs who took second place. Third was Pierre Siegenthaler and crew Peter Greene of the Nassau Snipe Fleet.

Weather conditions dictated that the third race for the Bacardi Cup should also count as the first race for the Gamblin Memorial Series. On Friday afternoon two back-to-back races were sailed over an Olympic type course for the Gamblin Cup in North-erly winds of 16 knots gusting to 20 knots. These two races were won by Jeff Lenhart and Jerry Thompson with Mark Reynolds and Dave Chapin taking the runner-up spots.

On Saturday, the last racing day, the winds were Easterly at 20 knots gusting to 25 knots. Two back-to-back races were sailed over a two and one-third lap triangular course. These two races were won by Ed Adams and his crew Meredith Adams and Mark Reynolds. Second place finishers in the two races were Pierre Siegenthaler and Ed Adams.

Mark Reynolds dominated the Gamblin Series and won handily with two firsts, a second, a third, and a sixth. Jeff Lenhart was second and Ed Adams third.

The traditional Bacardi Daiquiri Party was held at the Club on Wednesday evening following the first two Bacardi Cup Races and was much enjoyed by everyone.

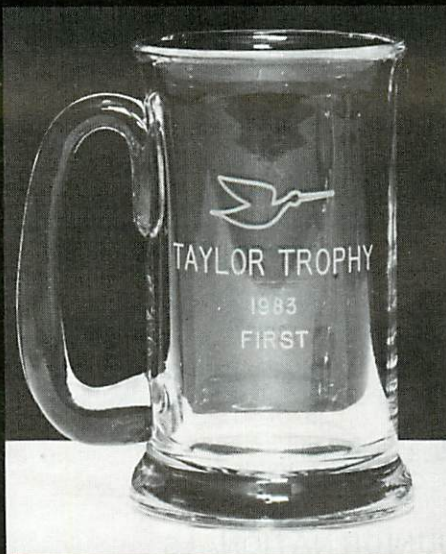
