Henry Davis and crew, Jack Wagoner, finished first in the two Saturday races, both times with a big lead, second in the Sunday morning race and took the first place trophy back to Omaha. George Croasdale and crew, Terry Croasdale, from Kansas City, finished the Regatta with a second place, and Bruce Hurst, with Mike Axton crewing, took third.

The Wichita Sailing Club chose this Regatta-time, after the Saturday evening smorgasbord dinner at the lake, to honor Ted Wells and his wife, Marge, who have been members of the Wichita Club for 38 years. THOUGHTS WHILE SAILING

The Western Hemisphere Championship produced several protests against the race committee, and of course, there was conversation and opinions pro and con. Having had the pleasure (?) of being on the protest committee, I was impressed by some of the reactions of those concerned.

One thing that strikes me as being unfortunate, is the anamosity that sometimes builds up between members of the race committee and the competitors. Evidently, this is quite prevalent, since some state that the race committee and the competitors are adversaries. This is definitely not true, or at least, should not be.

The sole purpose of a race committee should be to conduct a race that is fair for all competitors, and in accordance with the race instructions. They can't win any trophies, but they can surely lose reputation by running a sloppy race. They are under pressure to get a required number of races completed, and occasionally this gets them into trouble. The wind does not always cooperate, and race committees frequently cannot resist the temptation to go ahead and run it anyhow. The more important the championship, the more stringent the criteria. However, even local races are important to most people and should be run accordingly. If the wind goes completely awry the race committee should consider canceling and restarting. Accumulating a large of number of races won't mean anything if they are not quality races.

On the other side of the coin, the competitors should treat the race committee with respect. Most are competent skippers in their own right and want to run the best race possible. It does take a lot of luck and conditions are seldom perfect, so remember that the race committee is not really your adversary - they are trying to get you the best race possible. If, as does happen, you are prejudiced by an action or omission of the race committee, rule 68.5(a) gives you the right to protest. Many of the protests under this rule are not valid and accordingly, not upheld. But many are valid and these should be sustained.

Which brings to mind — protest committees. They always lose! I know of no situation when someone was not

unhappy with a decision. In one instance, however, a competitor whose protest was denied came around the next day and thanked me for hearing his protest. I was so astonished, I could hardly reply. But I surely appreciated his thanks.

World Championship 1977 Set for Denmark

Dates have been set for next year's World Championship in Denmark for August 22-29. The host will be Skovshoved Sailing Club and races will be held in the sound just north of Copenhagen. The winds will be good and the weather will be delightful so make your plans to attend. If you don't make it as a competitor you will certainly be welcome as a Snipe sailor and spectator. For more information write to your national secretary.

NOTE TO U.S. A group is being formed to take advantage of favorable airline rates. The group will probably leave on August 18 and return on September 1. If you are at all interested, write Buzz Lamb and you will be put on the mailing list as information becomes available.

Bids Encouraged for 1979 World Championship

The U. S. is again contemplating submitting a bid to hold the World Championship in 1979. Any fleet in the U.S. which feels that it would like to conduct this regatta should begin to make inquiries as all bids must be submitted by June 1, 1977. The SCIRA/US Board will make its final choice at its meeting in July 1977 and the U.S. Bid will be submitted to the Board of Governors at its meeting in Copenhagen during the 1978 World Championship. 14th Western Hemisphere Championship Won Handily By Marco Paradeda

Lenhart, Altmayer follow in ten-nation fleet at Nova Scotia.

The fourteenth Western Hemisphere Championship was won handily by Marco Aurelio Paradeda and crew Luis Pejemove from Brazil. Their finishes of 1-1-2-2-3-DO-2 for a total of 14.7 points was reminiscent of Jeff Lenhart's dominance at the previous Hemisphere championship when Marco Aurelio finished in fourth place. U.S. sailor Jeff Lenhart and crew Dave Ullman finished in a good solid second place, followed by Gasto Altmayer with Mario Texeira from Brazil. Fourth and fifth places were both taken by the Argentinians, Wilson Pereira and Danny Ujvary, and Julio Labandeira with Daniel Decaro as crew.

Marco arrived too late for the practice race and furthermore, the airlines had lost his sails. He had to borrow a suit of sails from his teammate. None of this seemed to bother him as he got into the boat and went out to win the first race. He had been sailing quite a bit this year since he sailed in the Olympics in 470. Marco is Brazil's national champion for the third year in a row. He has a second and a sixth in the two previous Western Hemispheres and a sixth in last year's Worlds.

The championship was held in North Sydney, Nova Scotia, Canada. The racing was held in the harbor, only a short distance from the club. Winds were good although a bit shifty at times, mostly in the middle range, but some were light and some heavy to provide a challenge. They were always heavy enough to eliminate the necessity of a make-up race — somewhat of a rarity in recent years.

Northern Yacht Club was host for the championship and did a wonderful job. They ran the Maritime Championship and the Canadian Nationals immediately prior to the Western Hemispheres and so had a chance to polish up their procedures. No doubt it was a strain on all those doing the many tasks necessary to put on a regatta, but it did not show. The members of the club were a delightful group, always kidding, but everpresent to give a friendly greeting and a helping hand when needed.

Twenty contestants from ten nations participated in the racing. This was the second highest number in the history of the championship. The boats were identical, all new and from the same builder. Several took on water in the inner hull and on occasion this produced disastrous results — if the boat capsized with a lot of water in the inner hull it was virtually impossible to right it.

The racing began on Monday morning in winds of 12-15 knots. Lenhart took an early lead with Paradeda close behind followed by Norm Towle of the U.S. This order was maintained for the first triangle. On the second windward leg Paradeda passed Lenhart and Horacio Garcia of Uruguay took over the third position. The run and final beat produced no changes. Pedro Garra of Uruguay finished fifth.

After the lunch break, the second race was started in 18-20 knots of wind. The leeward end was favored at the start, as well as the port side of the course, for the beat. Wilson Pereira of Argentina, Towle, John Dunkley from the Bahamas, and the

two Brazilians capitalized on this and rounded the windward mark in that order. The two planing reaches were just made for Bahamian Pierre Siegenthaler. He rounded the first mark in 14th place, passed 11 boats, and was in 3rd position at the downwind mark. Towle had taken over the lead from Pereira. Gastao Altmayer from Brazil and Julio Labandeira of Argentina managed to slip by Lenhart.

At the second windward mark Altmayer had the lead followed by Towle, Labandeira and Pereira. The wind started to drop on the downwind leg and was quite light at the finish. Paradeda, who had been in 6th place, showed his style on the last leg, and won the race. Labandeira moved to second, followed by Altmayer, Pereira and Towle. Lenhart dropped to 8th, for his worse race of the series.

The second day's racing started with 15 knots of wind. This time the starboard side was favored, and Ray Pittman from Bermuda, held on that side from the

start, rounding in the lead followed by Paradeda, Lenhart, and Jim Belford from Canada.

Siegenthaler again showed his superb reaching talent, going from 12th place to 3rd at the downwind mark; Lenhart was in the lead, with Belford second. Siegenthaler's performance caused one contestant to remark that it was so dazzling he practically quit racing to watch him.

The wind had picked up to 20 knots for the second beat. At the mark, Lenhart was still leading, and Altmayer was in second. Belford had dropped to 4th, and Paradeda was 5th.

The wind continued to build to 23-24 knots for the final beat. Lenhart was not to be denied, and won the race. Paradeda had moved up to second, and Siegenthaler hanging on to 3rd. Towle took 4th, moving up from 15th at the 1st mark.

During the lunch break the wind went to over 30 knots, delaying the start until late in the afternoon. With a very cool 15 knot wind, the competitors favored the port side of the course. This proved correct, as the wind clocked during the beat. Pereira led at the mark, followed by Paradeda, Towle and Altmayer. The wind continued to drop to about 10-12 knots, but the first four positions did not change during the rest of the race. Siegenthaler finished 5th, and Lenhart took 6th.

Wednesday's race was in 12-15 knot winds. Again the port side was favored for the first leg. Pereira got a good start at the pin, and rounded first, followed by Lenhart and Paradeda. At the 2nd windward mark Paradeda had taken over the lead, followed by Pereira and Lenhart. On the last leg, Pereira, the eventual winner, held to the right side of the course, and Lenhart to the left. Paradeda apparently couldn't decide which one to cover, so went up the middle, and lost both of them. dropping to third.

There was no race in the afternoon, as all were guests of the Royal Cape Breton Yacht Club, for a delightful party. The scoring at that point put Paradeda in a commanding lead with Lenhart in second. Third place was still up for grabs with 4 or 5 competitors in contention.

The sixth race was the lightest of the series with winds 6-8 knots, increasing slightly during the race. Paradeda was

over the line early and led the whole race but was disqualified. Lenhart took the first followed by Labandeira and Siegenthaler. In the confusion of trying to recall Paradeda, Altmayer returned to the line although he was not over. He demonstrated some great sailing catching up from last to finish 10th. He filed a protest which was sustained, and he was awarded points for the average of his previous races.

At this point Lenhart could have won the championship if he could either control Paradeda and drive him down to at least 15th place or win with Marco in 4th. However, in the 12-15 knot wind, Paradeda got around the 1st mark in the lead with Lenhart in 9th place.

The wind had shifted 30-40 degrees and the race committee changed the windward mark, but the port tack was still favored. Apparently, none of the leaders figured it out, and lost much ground. Paradeda's tremendous lead disappeared, and he rounded the 2nd windward mark in 4th. Altmayer went from 5th to 1st. Pittman was the only one who really capitalized on the shift, moving from last place at the downwind mark to 6th at the windward mark.

Altmayer took the finish and assured himself of the overall third. Paradeda worked back up to second, and Lenhart finished sixth.

The races were all well run under the capable hands of Steve Astephen who was also regatta chairman. Only three protests were filed with none against competitors. As Flavio Caiuby said, "This means you have good sailors." As it turned out, whether any of the protests were upheld or not made no difference in the final order of finishes.





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Lenhart Captures Sixth Annual Champagne Regatta

San Diego's Jeff Lenhart, enroute home from the U.S. Nationals, took first place in the Sixth Annual Lake Keuka Snipe Fleet Champagne Regatta, August 7 and 8, 1976. Lenhart's lead was virtually unbeatable after he scored two firsts, a second and a fifth in the first four races.

Although registration was held below expectation by adverse weather conditions, 65 boats signed up – 50 in the A Fleet and 15 in the B Fleet. Many boats arrived on Friday afternoon and evening only to pull out Saturday morning in the rain that greeted the sailors on opening day. Many of these boats, as well as those actually sailing, had been at the U.S. Nationals at Association Island during the week previous.

Two races were sailed on Saturday, August 7. Although the winds held fairly steady, intermittent rains discouraged many of the registrants, who chose to tour nearby wine cellars rather than race. On Sunday, though still overcast, the wind shifted to the south and the rain held off. Three races were sailed in lighter but still considerable winds.

Terry Timm from Barton Boat Club and Don Hite from Lake Angelus, two veterans of the regatta circuit and previous entrants in the Keuka Champagne event, tied for second in point scores in the A Fleet. Because Timm beat Hite in three races out of five (in the last race Timm was second and Hite third), Timm took the second place silver and Hite third. Dirk Kneulman from the Canadian shores of Lake Ontario finished fourth less than one point out of second place.

He also paid tribute to Berta and Ralph Swanson for their help with the Race Committee where Berta had acted as chairman with Ralph providing support and scorekeeping expertise.

In spite of adverse weather Keuka's Sixth Annual Champagne Regatta was pronounced a success, particularly by those who enjoy competition at its best.

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

Henry Davis Masters Variable Winds at La Crosse



Silver was awarded for the first five places and crew by 1:00 P.M. Sunday, to get the many long distance travelers on their way.



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
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
