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Hot Competition Seen At Michigan State Championship

The 1979 Michigan State Snipe Championship was held at Grand Rapids Yacht Club on Reeds Lake June 9 and 10. John McAllister of Lake St. Clair's Crescent Sailing Club won first place honors, Skip Baxter of Grand Rapids took second and Tick Ticknor of Gull Lake was third. Dexter Thede of Gull Lake, after several years absence trying big boat sailing, returned to Snipe competition and commanded a strong fourth place finish. Steve Orr of Crescent Sailing Club earned the fifth place trophy.

The first of three races was won easily by Skip Baxter, who pulled away from the fleet at the start and never relinquished his lead. The real competition in this race was the battle for second place between Dexter Thede, John McAllister, and Diamond Lake's Frank Pontius. They finished 2-34 respectively after chasing each other around the entire course, with Buddy Leonard of Diamond Lake close behind.

The second race, a triangular course featuring steady 10-12 mph winds, found Tick Ticknor pulling into the lead and holding on while McAllister, Baxter, and Thede battled it out for 2nd, 3rd, and 4th places. Pontius finished 5th.

The third race on Sunday was characterized by variable 10-15 mph winds with occasional gusts to 20 mph. Baxter again was able to take best advantage of the wind and pulled into the lead shortly after the start. He maintained his lead throughout most of the race, but gave it up on the last leg when McAllister and Ticknor managed to get by him. At the finish line it was McAllister first, Ticknor second, Baxter third, Thede fourth, and Steve Orr fifth.

Sunday's race ended in a most soggy fashion as a geniune cloudburst dumped one inch of rain in a half hour, just as the last half of the fleet was rounding the final mark. The last-minute rain did not dampen the spirits of the participants, however, as strong competition, good sportsmanship, a fun Saturday night square dance, and super fellowship among Snipers guaranteed a successful regatta.

Light winds prevail in five-race series

Henry Davis Cops Title At Missouri Valley Championship

The Iowa-Nebraska Sailing Association held the annual Missouri Valley Championship Regatta July 7-8 on Lake Manawa, Council Bluffs, Iowa. The Non-Pareil Trophy was won by Henry Davis, INSA. Second place was taken by Doug Day, Missouri Yacht Club and third place went to Jack Waggner, Lincoln Sailing Club.

Winds were light both days, but the Race Committee, under the direction of Past SCIRA Commodore Floyd E. Hughes, Jr., managed to get all five scheduled races off. Ted Wells, Wichita, began the series well winning the first race. His lead was not to last, as Henry Davis finished first in the second race after a third in the previous race. After

the second race Davis' lead was never in doubt.

In the Iowa-Nebraska Championship sailed as the "B" fleet, Dr. Harold Gifford and his Crew Dr. John Thomas, INSA, took five first place finishes to win the series in their brand new Phoenix.

Even though the "B" fleet started five minutes after the Missouri-Valley Championship sailors, Gifford and Thomas were well ahead of many of the "A" fleeters at the finish in several races. Tom Hood, also INSA followed the Gifford-Thomas boat closely with a 2-3-4-2-2 series.

Thoughts While Sailing

On two occasions this summer, boats at championship events got into trouble and had to seek outside help. In each instance, the boat capsized and turtled. The board was not lost but was tied in so loosely that it slipped out of the trunk and hung down like a pendulum. The Skipper and crew were not able to right the boat and became so tired that they had to get motor boat help and fresh people in the water before the boat could be righted.

This is not meant to be judgmental, since most of us have been in the same situation. In both situations the boats were borrowed and we may assume that both skippers have their own boats properly rigged. However, this would be a good time to remind every skipper to make sure the board cannot slip out if the boat is turtled. I find the easiest way is to pull the board up and secure it in the highest position, then tie the board in with a line with just enough slack to unhook and drop the board. The bottom notch in the board should leave at least 12 inches of board extending below the keel. This is why we have Rule 26 in our rules. The best time to do this is just after launching your boat.

One other problem that boats seemed to have at both the U.S. Nationals and World Championships was having rudders pop up and float away. Many boats have toggles that slip over the pintle and this is satisfactory when they work. If the toggles become loose they are no longer servicable. Putting a rubber washer under the toggle will help the situation, but you must check it frequently. A rudder retaining clip is a better arrangement, as it engages automatically when the rudder is put on, but requires positive action to take the rudder off. Rule 28 covers this.

Keeping these preventive measures in mind may just keep you in the race and certainly should contribute to happier

1980 Championship Dates Released

Some of Snipe's major championship dates are already set for next year. Check the Sanctioned Snipe regatta list every issue for the newest schedule.

WINTER CIRCUIT: Dates are earlier next year; with the Circuit beginning March 9 in Clearwater, continuing Miami March 14-16, and ending in Nassau March 22.

U. S. NATIONALS: The senior championship will begin August 4, following the juniors August 2 and 3, on Lake Carlyle, Illinois, near St. Louis, Missouri. Plenty of camping and outdoor activity will be featured. Ray Szczepanski is Regatta Chairman, and will provide detailed information in later issues.

EUROPEAN CHAMPIONSHIP: The Espergaerde Silklub, 20 miles north of Copenhagen, Denmark, is organizing this championship August 16-23. All contestants and secretaries will be housed in homes of club members, with lunch provided at the club. National Secretaries should see that their flags are sent to the club as soon as possible. Sailing will be in the Sound, with water temperature expected to be about 160 Celsius and air temperature about 200. Winds should be good at this time of year.

WESTERN HEMISPHERE CHAMPI-ONSHIP: Dates of December 7-14 have been announced for the Championship to

be held in Montevideo, just in front of the Yacht Club Urugayo. All contestants will be housed at the Yacht Club, where all meals will be served. Boats will be lent on a rotation basis. Winds will probably be offshore in the mornings and East in the afternoons from 10 to 20 knots. Jose Luis Murguia, SCIRA National Secretary for Uruguay is chairman for the event.

Thirty-eight numbers were issued last month with 12 going to the U.S., 11 to Brazil, 10 to Finland, 2 to England and 1 to France. The Dominican Republic is our newest country and got 2 numbers for a start. No new fleets were chartered.

Board of Governors Meet At North Sydney

North Sydney, N. S., Canada, August 16, 1979.

Present: Rear-Commodore Paul Festersen who presided over the meeting, Rules Committee Chairman Ted Wells, Members Wayne Soares of Bermuda, and Ralph Swanson of the U.S., John Broughton, Great Britian, attending as proxy representative for Enrico Rosso, European Vice Secretary, and Chuck Loomis sat in to report on the Pan American Games and measuring. European Secretary Peter Davies and Executive Secretary Buzz Lamb, both members of the protest committee, arrived late in the meeting.

CALL TO ORDER AND MINUTES: Rear Commodore Festersen called the meeting to order. Ted Wells moved, and Wayne Soares seconded, that the minutes be accepted as published in the BULLE-TIN and not read. Motion carried.

FINANCIAL REPORT: This item was passed over to be taken up when Sec. Lamb arrived.

RULE BOOK: A recommendation that the rule book be published every 4th year, rather than every second year, was presented from the Rule Book Study Committee. This will coincide with the rules changes allowed only every 4 years. The February issue of the BULLETIN will contain an updated SCIRA Directory, listing names and addresses of SCIRA personnel. Ted Wells moved, and Ralph Swanson seconded, that this change be accepted. Motion carried.

DEED OF GIFTS – JUNIOR WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP: The deed of gift worked out by Bruce Colyer, and used in the most recent championship was presented for consideration by the board.

OLYMPIC SCORING AS ADOPTED BY SCIRA: A discussion at this point of the merits of changing the SCIRA adaptation of the Olympic Scoring System which was listed in the agenda for later discussion interrupted the discussion of the deed of gifts, which makes reference to the tie breaking method to be used. The motion was made by Ted Wells, and seconded by Wayne Soares, that the Class keep the present "Olympic Scoring System as adopted by the Snipe Class" with the following addition regarding tie breaking: "The skipper beating the other in the last race shall be declared the winner." To replace "If a tie still exists, the race committee shall decide how to resolve the tie."

DEED OF GIFT WORLD JR. CHAM-PIONSHIP (cont): The Olympic Scoring System as adopted by the Snipe Class will be used in scoring this championship.

The following changes in the deed were passed: A minimum of 1 race shall be required. Ralph Swanson moved that the Championship be open to two skippers from each country, with citizenship of crews not specified. Motion seconded and passed.

The rest of the deed of gift was approved as submitted.

1981 WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP: Ralph Swanson presented a bid from Alamitos Bay, California, to hold the championship in September or October 1981. Wayne Soares moved, Ted Wells seconded, that this bid be accepted. Motion carried.

TAX STATUS PROPOSAL: Wayne Soares moved that this U. S. tax matter be approved without further consideration by the board as a whole. Seconded and carried.

SOUTH AMERICAN CHAMPION-SHIP DEED OF GIFT: Wayne Soares moved that the proposed document be approved as presented. Seconded and passed.

Ralph Swanson moved, and Wayne Soares seconded, that the deed be printed in the SCIRA Rule book in English only. Seconded and passed.

IYRU REPORT: Report received that relations remain cordial.

RULES COMMITTEE: A request from the IYRU and from various SCIRA countries that Snipe Rules be translated into metric measure was reported. Buzz Lamb and Ted Wells will cooperate in completing and presenting the measurement equivalencies to one decimal place, as this will be close to the original measurement, though exact equality is difficult to express.

ELECTION OF MEMBERS-AT-LARGE OF THE BOARD OF GOVER-NORS: Ted Wells moved and Wayne Soares seconded the following second sentence to be added to Section 25: Members-at-large of the Board of Governors shall be elected by the board for a 3 year term. Motion passed. Two members-at-large shall be elected each year.

RULES CHANGES: The following actions were approved for submitted proposals (as printed in the July BULLETIN):

Constitution: Section 15, Section 18, Section 21, and Section 23, changes approved as submitted.

By-Laws: Section 5: Change approved. Section 9: Change approved with addition: "as adopted by the national authority."

Sections 11 and 18 approved.

RESTRICTIONS AND MEASURE-MENTS: 8(8) Change approved with this addition: This restriction shall apply to all boats without regard to date of manufacture

Paragraph 35: Approved with change to: 3" athwartship by 10" fore and aft. This restriction shall be effective only for boats built after 1-1-1980.

Paragraph 37 – Change not approved. Paragraph 38, 44, 45 – Changes approved.

OLYMPIC SCORING SYSTEM: Vote to retain present system with revisions recorded earlier in these minutes.

Definition of "Competitor" referred to in Snipe Scoring System: Ted Wells moved, Ralph Swanson seconded, that a competitor is "one who is registered, and who has paid entry fee required if any." Definition approved.

SAILING INSTRUCTIONS: 1.A., V, VIII, IX A, IX B — Changes approved.

XI - Change not approved.

XII — Change approved.

XVI - Change not approved.

RULES FOR CONDUCTING NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL REGATTAS: Sec. 1(c), 2(f), 4(c), 5(f) – Changes approved.

NEW BUSINESS: Discussion of concern about conflicts between class rules and policy set by Race Committees in non-class regattas. No action taken.

JUNIOR EUROPEAN CHAMPION-SHIP: John Broughton requested this championship be included in rule book. Approved.

FINANCES: Lamb reported SCIRA finances are good, with boat numbers issued to date up from last year.

SKIPPER BOAT BOARD MEASURE-MENT: Page 39 of the Rule book shall include the following approved wording: "The handle of the centerboard shall be installed in such a manner so that the aft edge of the centerboard is perpendicular to the baseline when the board is completely down."

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.

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

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Chapin Has The Worlds In His Hands!

Mark Reynolds battles to second place in hot competition at Sydney Harbor

20-year-old U.S. National Champion David Chapin defeated the Goliaths of the Snipe World Championship on Sydney Harbor, North Sydney, Nova Scotia, August 14-18, with 17.4 points; 5 points better than Mark Reynolds and De Ann Wright, who were also second to Dave at the U.S. Nationals 3 weeks earlier. Chapin and his crew Tim Dixon, both from Island Bay Yacht Club, Springfield, IL, displayed flawless tacking techniques, good boat speed, and cool poise in the face of competition from 4 continents, including the defending champions Boris Ostergren and Ernesto Neugebauer, Brazil. who finished third, and twice-champion Felix Gancedo and Carlos Llamas of Spain in 4th. Marco Aurelio Paradeda and Luiz Pejnovic, Brazil, completed the top five of 30 contestants.

Conditions were mostly moderate, but varied to both extremes for the seven race series, with the first race delayed by heavy winds and seas, and the last day's moming race threatening to drift past the time limit.

The Western Hemisphere won in their traditional Snipe class rivalry with Europe, taking 8 of the top ten places, including Takayaki Harada and Manabu Ohgushi, Japan, 6th, (Occidental by choice), Ivan Pimentel and Paulo Oliveria, Brazil 7th, Ted Hains and Bill Davy of the host country 8th, and Torkel Borgstrom and Diego Braver, Argentina 9th. Claes Gilbome and Bengt Larsson of Sweden in 10th place, made Europe's second best showing.

A massive storm front passed over the eastern U.S. and Canadian coasts during the 2 days before the start of the regatta, with high winds and a deluge of rain. The practice race was stormed out, as winds on the bay were in excess of 30 mph.

FIRST RACE

The start of the first race was delayed as left-over wind and waves from the storm made the bay unfit for racing. With a start finally posted for 4:15, and winds down to 16 to 18, lighter crews were still

having trouble getting to the race course.

Norway's Hartmann lost his rudder on an anchor line as he left the dock, but was in luck as it was picked up and returned by a motor boat. However, damage to the fitting prevented his finishing the race. C.S. Reddy of India and crew Eric Broughton capsized on the way to the start and had trouble righting the boat and did not start the race.

Defending champion Boris Ostergren led most of the first race, but Felix Gancedo, rounding the leeward mark in fifth, got a lift off the bank, which took him into the lead going into the finish. Boris, covering Mark Reynolds in a tacking duel to the finish, was 2nd, and Mark 3rd. Marco Paradeda and Dave Chapin also covered each other tack for tack to the finish, and finished with Marco 4th. and Dave 5th, his worst race for the series. Both Japanese boats finished well with Harada 6th, and Miyagochi 9th. Rasmussen of Denmark was 7th, and Pimentel, Brazil 8th. Argentina's Torkel Borgstrom was 10th.

SECOND RACE

On Wednesday morning it was raining again, but the sun was out before the

start of the race. With shifty winds of 18 to 22, the fleet was eager, and a general recall was the result. Another shift resulted in a second recall and the shifting of the entire race course. By the time the race started, the wind was down to 12 or so, and dropping.

Mark Reynolds led this race all the way, with Ted Hains dropping from 2nd on the first beat to 5th on the second beat, but finishing a strong 4th for Canada. Dave Chapin finished 2nd, and Boris 3rd. Bjurstrom of Finland was 5th, Felix 6th, and Marco 7th.

THIRD RACE

Although the wind had dropped, the race committee decided to attempt a second race for the day, with a start at about 5:50.

The wind continued to drop as the race progressed, with Torkel Borgstrom of Argentina leading at the reaching mark. By the end of the second beat, Dave Chapin had worked into a 30 second lead over Mats Gothlin of Swedin, with Borgstrom in third, and Mark Reynolds, series leader at this point, in 4th place.

A HUGE wind shift on this leg turned the race in progress into a guessing game for the committee, the contestants, and the spectators, as the wind shifted all the way — first 90 degrees; then 180; so that the run became a beat; then 270; and finally; as the first boats were ready to round — right back to its original course. Steve Astaphen and his committee held steady, and rather than changing the course prematurely, were able to continue the race, as it started, without changing any marks. Whew!

Chapin finished the race in first, with Borgstrom second, Reynolds 3rd, Sweden's Claes Gilbom 4th, and Felix 5th. Both Boris in 8th, and Marco in 10th, had their worst race of the series. At this point Reynolds was the leader without a throw-out figured in scoring.

FOURTH RACE

Thursday's race start was scheduled for one thirty and started under cloudy

skies, with winds 14 to 18. At the first windward mark the "top 5" of Boris, Marco, Mark, Dave and Felix rounded in that order, and continued that parade past the reaching mark. They continued the march around the course, only mixing their order occasionally, and finished with Boris in first, followed by Dave (now the series leader), Felix 3rd, Mark 4th, and Marco 5th.

FIFTH RACE

Thursday's second race started in winds 15 plus, with heavy seas running and the course for this race set where the beat was across part of the bay used by Sydney's ship traffic.

As the race progressed, the wind dropped, and Dave Chapin worked out an impressive 49 second lead by the leeward mark. He was followed by the two Swedish boats, the Dane, Rasmussen, and Canada's Ted Hains. The finish went to Dave Chapin, with a 1 minute 48 second lead. Mark Reynolds nipped Ted Hains at the finish for second place. Mats Gothlin was 4th, followed by Boris. Felix finished 9th.

On the second beat a large ship crossed the course, coming out of Sydney Harbor. Felix protested the race, and after a lengthy protest hearing, the decision was to give him redress for any prejudice to his position, in the form of average points for the series for this race position. No other competitors claimed prejudice of

their positions by the ship. The average points calculated at the end of the series gave Felix 6.4 points, and did not change any of the over all standings.

SIXTH RACE

The Committee scheduled a morning race to start at 10:00 on Friday, but a light and shifting wind forced a postponement, to wait for steadier winds, with the race finally starting at about 11:05.

Dave Chapin, trying for the port end,

was "buried" on the start, and in trying to cross the course to the other series leaders, was forced by starboard tack boats to tack back time and time again. His flawless tacking teamwork with his crew Tim, kept the boat moving, and they pulled into third place by the windward mark, as the wind lightened.

This was the lightest wind race of the entire series, and the boats spread out as the winds diminished. At the second

windward mark Marco was first followed by Dave, with Felix and Boris next. Marco and Dave split with Felix and Boris, and went too far to the right. Boris, sailing the rhumb line, rounded the leeward mark first, with Felix second, and Marco in third, right on top of Dave in 4th.

The wind, coming from Sydney Harbor, was threatening to turn the last beat into a reach, and Dave kept tacking into the harbor, with Marco tacking on top of him with every attempt Dave made to get away. Finally, Marco decided to sail for the finish, letting Dave go. This proved a mistake, and Dave came out of

the Harbor finally, with a lift to the finish, to take the third place, behind Boris and Felix, leaving Marco in 4th place for the race. Mark Reynolds had been caught in one of the earlier holes as the wind lightened, and had his worst race, finishing in 12th place.

SEVENTH RACE

After a lunch break, the competitors were back on the course, with Dave Chapin the man to beat, and Boris Ostergren the only one who could do it. With an 8th place to throw out, if Boris should win the race, with Dave 4th or worse, Boris would win the series.

By the end of the second beat, Dave was in first place and Boris in 6th, and an upset by the young man from Illinois seemed assured.

As the race continued, Dave, sailing a conservative race, finished in third place, with Mark Reynolds in first, and Marco Paradeda in second. Felix finished 4th, with Boris holding the sixth spot, behind Harada of Japan.

ORGANIZATION AND ENTERTAINMENT

The organization of this regatta began 3 years ago. Fired by the enthusiasm left over from the successfully-run Western Hemisphere Championship of 1976, the Northern Yacht Club recruited help from Sydney's Royal Cape Breton Club, and eventually most of the government of Cape Breton and Nova Scotia to bid for the World Championship at the Board of Governors meeting in Denmark in 1977.

Steve Astaphen and John Brennan shared the duties with club members, their wives, and local Mayor Tom Young in planning all the facilities for housing, feeding, and entertaining the champions from around the world, as well as National Secretaries, and SCIRA officials.

New facilities were being completed

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even as the first arrivals appeared on the scene, lending a special flavor of suspense to the occasion. Would it be finished on time? 
