# **Totten Reigns As U.K. National Champion**

The 1980 U.K. Snipe National Championships were held in delightful Cardigan Bay from the South Caernarvon Yacht Club, Abersoch, North Wales from 6th - 11th July. The host club was at great pains to make the Snipe class welcome and extends a welcome to all classes to hold their championships in this delightful setting.

The Club facilities are excellent and accommodations of all kinds and prices abound in the district. The bay itself is relatively free from tidal streams and the racing is held one to two miles offshore in full view of the club which is perched on a high headland.

The Snipe week started with a disappointing lack of wind, the practice race on the Sunday being abandoned when the time limit expired and the first two races of the series being abandoned for the same reason. These two races were resailed later.

When the wind eventually filled in about noon on Tuesday it was a fresh Northwesterly Force 5-6 and 24 starters shot off on the first beat. Young Stuart Totten from Budworth S.C. crewed by Steve Rich won this first race and showed similar form for the rest of the regatta to win the championship. Totten was followed home by Peter Kay (Hamble River S.C.), Tony Statham, Gary Lewis, Colin Smith and Mark Townsend, all from Budworth S.C. In fact the battle for the championship was fought among these six crews.

The second race saw Richard Martin and Wally Hardman, both from Budworth, getting into the first six places displacing Smith and Statham. Once again the course was a hard slog to windward followed by planing reaches and runs. The hard wind was proving too strong for some of the weaker crews and on five of

the hard driven craft masts were lost.

Wednesday dawned with similar weather conditions and the previously abandoned Race 1 was resailed followed by Race 4. Once again a Force 5 Northerly enlivened the proceedings and the beats were followed by exciting runs and reaches amongst the white horses all over the bay.

After Race 4 the first six places were once again shared among the same helmsmen as in the first race. Gary Lewis now looked set to be the eventual winner with only three points at this stage. Second, three points behind, was Peter Kay although a disqualification in this race following a second general recall left Kay with little room for error if he was to gain the lead. Totten was well adrift with 11.4 points and Statham, Townsend and Martin were almost level in the next three places with 23.7, 24.7 and 29 points respectively.

Thursday afternoon saw one race, Race 5, and again the Force 5 Northerly blew steadily making for exciting sailing. The week's practice in the strong conditions had proved useful for the tailenders who were now flinging their boats around like the tyros at the front although too late to menace the leaders. A collision with Steve Totten meant a 720 for Gary Lewis and a drop to fifth place. With Totten first and Kay filling second spot the overall placings were now an incredible Kay-9, Lewis-11, and Totten 11.4. Fourth place man Townsend, with 32.7. was too far behind to worry the first three and it all depended on the last race.

On Friday morning fog and misty rain shrouded the course and for the first time the wind came from the west but still Force 4-5. A general recall followed an over-eager start and whilst waiting for the fresh start the fleet was entertained by a

school of dolphins that sported itself amongst the hove-to boats.

The second start was perfect and away went the fleet with our three leaders covering each other. In doing so they sailed themselves out of the race, for there was a great windshift that lifted those on one side of the beat towards the finish and our three heroes finished — Lewis 5th, Totten 7th and Kay 8th allowing Mark Townsend, last year's champion, his only win of the week.

The result was that Totten was able to discard his 8th place in Race 6 and won the championship by consistent sailing (3, 1, 3, 3, 1). Lewis was second (2, 4, 1, 1, 5) and although consistent had two unlucky races. Kay again with remarkable consistency (1, 2, 2, 2, 8) earned third place.

I would like to report about our 1980 U.S. Nationals at Lake Carlyle! It was just great!! Personally enhanced by the fact that my son Augie won the Nationals, I necessarily had to like it. But, I have been able to set aside that circumstance and have analyzed how good it was.

First, Carlyle Sailing Association facilities are just perfect! Truly a fine sailing center! The way a Sniper would dream about it: lots of docking space and lots of hoists. A fleet of 110 Snipes could easily go in the water in about an hour or an hour and a half.

We had wind! Completed the schedule without a big problem. We even had a good (60 to 70 mile wind) storm. For me it was the first time in 35 years of Sniping that I actually abandoned my Snipe! I don't blame myself, but that I could not argue with the skipper of the rescue boat that ordered me to do so. Plus, my crew was very fast! I never had a choice!!! It was nice to see that the fleet came out of the storm without injuries. That is important! Just a few bent masts (including Ted Well's and mine.) I saw at least one broken mast. Ted and I stood in line in front of a "good tree" to get our masts straightened.

Ray Szczepanski going around on his bike was a symbol of efficiency. He and his wife worked hard! Lots of people helped in this regatta. I am afraid to mention names and forget someone. District officers and members, race committee, members of other Snipe districts, Carlyle Sailing Association members, etc. Our heartiest thanks to all of them from all of us.

## LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

One Man's View of the Trends in the Snipe Class:

To the Editor:

Our once simple, uncomplicated boat is fast becoming a marine suppliers dream. Certainly it is not my view that all innovation is necessarily bad. The cut-down trunk, bendy masts, rolled-in decks have made the boat easier to sail. However, the

plethora of fittings, pulleys, jam cleats, magic boxes, double-ended control lines, etc. adds not only to complexity, but also to the price of the boat. I feel the class is in danger of slipping into the "development" category. Is this what the membership wants?

Kinetics work. There is no doubt in my mind, after the recent U.S. Nationals, that the use of kinetic action does help a boat get around the course faster. In spite of the fact that the U.S. Board of Governors issued a warning about the use of kinetics, pumping and rolling were particularly noticeable all over the course. Despite the hopes of the U.S. Board that "peer pressure" would cause a marked decrease of this activity, any reduction was not particularly noticeable. The attitude seemed to be, "if the other guy can get away with it — so can I".

Although the subject of kinetics is being taken up by USYRU and IYRU, it just might be advisable for the Snipe Class to take a good hard look to see just how prevalent this illegal activity is. It might be necessary to do as at least one class has done, and have jury members patrol the course during the races and protest or disqualify any violators of these rules.

The conducting of a national championship has become such an undertaking that it has to be a district-wide function rather than just that of the sponsoring fleet. Regardless of all the necessary plan-

Measuring over 100 boats in a threeday period, however, is a different proposition. This calls for a lot of work and sweat by a dedicated group of people. These people should be recruited from all over the district because very few local fleets have the manpower to complete this job.

This year people from all over the country were drafted to assist with the measuring. If it were not for Sam and Marc Butler from San Diego and Dan Williams, who accepted the Chairmanship of the measuring committee, Brainard Cooper and Scott Cline who came with Dan from Chattanooga, the measurement could not have been accomplished within the time allotted.

The lesson to be learned is that early recruitment and planning are necessary. Measuring is a tremendous job and, as such, is the responsibility of the district in which the regatta is held.

## **European Secretaries Meet In Denmark**

The following is condensed from the minutes of the meeting of European National Secretaries at Espergaerde, Denmark, August 20, 1980:

PRESENT: Peter Davies, European Secretary; Arturo Delgado, SCIRA Rear-Commodore and Secretary for Spain; Louis Paul Lamarque, South European Secretary, and Secretary for France; Nils Toftgaard, North European Secretary; and the following National Secretaries: Denmark, H. Kampmann; Finland, Matti Nieminen; Italy, Enzo Perini; Belgium, Guy Lachappelle; Sweden, Per Gothlin; Portugal (representative), Ruben Domingos; Holland, Josephine Broughton; England, John Broughton; and Norway, Gunnar Kjendlie.

MINUTES: The minutes of the previous meeting May 26, 1979, Beaulieu were approved as read.

MATTERS ARISING: (a) Those attending still favor their previous recommendation of a measurement of 1½ inches diameter for the top of the mast. This was turned down by the board in 1979. This meeting proposed that the request be resubmitted. (b) Item 6 should read "length of base line" not length of water line. (c) Number of boats per country is to be the number in the Rule Book under European Championship.

There must be 2 months notice before an event, rather than one months notice.

GENERAL SECRETARIES REPORT: Austria, Turkey, Rumania, Hungary, and Yugoslavia are reported to be either completely dormant, or at least out of contact with SCIRA.

Racing rule 22.3 was discussed as was the IYRU building fee. The secretaries will go along with proposals on these items. The vital interest of the class continuing its status as an International class, with the least possible building fees imposed, was expressed by those present.

EUROPEAN SNIPE CUP AND WORLD JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP: Thanks to Spain was expressed for their holding these two championships. Only 3 countries participated in the Snipe Cup, but as this was the first year, those present felt that participation will increase in years to come. The regatta was held on Majorca and it is felt that a mainland venue will draw more entries.

28 boats from 10 countries are expected to attend the Junior Worlds.

1980 MEMBERSHIP: The grand total European SCIRA membership for 1980 is 1,143 dues paid — up from 1,066 last year.

FUTURE CHAMPIONSHIPS: EURO-PEAN CHAMPIONSHIP 1982: Italy will hold the 17th European Championship at Excelsior Yacht Club, Venice, July 31 through the first week in August 1982. Further information may be obtained from the Italian National Secretary at Excelsior Yacht Club, Lungomare Marconi No. 58, 30126 Venezia. (041) 761915.

EUROPEAN SNIPE CUP: Lorient, France, May 27th - 30th (with a possible date change to two weeks later) for the 1981 championship. The 1982 Championship will be at the beginning of June at Broadstairs Yacht Club, Kent, England,

EUROPEAN JUNIOR CHAMPION-SHIP: Denmark made a tentative bid and will report back to the General Secretary.


THREE STAR REGATTAS: The problem of conflicting dates for three star regattas was discussed, but there was no solution. The scheduling will remain as it is now.

1981 CALENDAR: National Secretaries are making a point to schedule Anniversary year celebrations and special regattas for the 1981 anniversary year. The 1981 Calendar will include these regattas and names and addresses of National Secretaries.

NATIONAL AND REGIONAL BUL-LETINS: Those areas which publish their own Snipe BULLETINS were complimented. They were requested to send pictures and stories to the international BULLETIN.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS: The following officers were elected by the meeting: General Secretary, Peter Davies; Vice General Secretary, Enrico Rosso; North European Secretary, Per Gothlin; South European Secretary, Louis Paul Lamarque; East European Secretary, Drago Puhalovic. Nils Toftgaard was given a vote of thanks by those present as retiring North European Secretary.

OTHER BUSINESS: It was recommended that some sort of stop be required to prevent the mast being moved more forward than the 60 inches aft as required in the rules. This will be submitted as a proposed rules change.



We gathered together an assortment of mainsails and looked at how they fit our spar. What a surprise we had, that little or no adjustments had to be made to the sail. To you that means your sail should easily adapt to the CAB No. 1. The Bryant Spars staff has available upon request deflections of the CAB No. 1 compared to two spars currently on the market. We've also taken the courtesy of having these deflections available to a variety of Snipe sailmakers for your convenience.





# Southern Californians Dominate Pacific Coast Championship

The 38 Snipes that climbed to Huntington Lake in California's high Sierra Mountains couldn't have asked for better conditions in three of the four races. The mile-high atmosphere and verdant shore-line provided refreshing relief from the 110 degree temperatures in the valley below.

True to form, someone turned a switch at 10 A.M. Saturday causing the five to ten knot winds to fill in. As local tactics dictate, most skippers stayed on starboard until they reached the south shore of the lake. At that point the tranquillity of this bucolic paradise was broken by the conflicting screams of "starboard" versus "sea room". John Shadden and crew Peter Frazier worked their way to the front and held on to win over Chris Raab and crew Jack Franco and the charging team of Jeff and Peggy Lenhart.

Between races, everyone returned to the dock for lunch and to observe a local meteorological phenomenon as Mother Nature proceeded to load her whoopee cushion. It seems that prolonged heat in the valley causes rather ugly, black clouds and eventually thunder showers to develop. As we gulped our sandwiches the red-hots who had been at the lake practicing all week said not to worry . . . the clouds had appeared at the end of the lake each afternoon only to recede in an hour or two.

By the time we were back on the lake to start the second race, the leading edge of the largest cloud had lined itself up with the starting line. As the gun went off, the wind was dying and full of holes. The fleet was doing it's best to work its way up the long, narrow lake. Twenty minutes into the race my crew, Willie Friesen dared to interrupt my immaculate concentration by suggesting that I look behind us. For a moment I thought I was in the front row of a theater watching the opening scenes of a Hollywood disaster film.

The Mercurys, which had started ten minutes behind the Snipes, had their whisker poles up and were planing straight for us in a sea of white caps. Now for those of you not familiar with Mercurys, they are a fixed-keel misnomer that make the Snipes look like high performance sailboats. Given enough wind, a Mercury is just as likely to submarine as it is to plane. To see one planing toward you is scary. To see twenty five planing toward you while you sit becalmed makes you wish you had brought a change of underwear.

Some of the smarter Snipers diagnosed the situation and dropped their sails before the wind hit. Others, of questionable intelligence, winged their main and jib and waited for the worst. They weren't disappointed. Only seventeen boats finished. Many made it safely to shore. The rest, including the eventual regatta winner Chris Raab, capsized. Those that did sail on were treated to winds ranging from 0-25 knots punctuated by ample doses of rain, lightning and thunder. Steve and Neal Garland won with Jeff Lenhart catching Spencer Allen at the finish for second.

Sunday morning brought more normal sailing conditions. The black cloud loomed but it didn't unload. Chris Raab sailed well with superior off-wind speed to win both races and the regatta. John

As a result, he dropped back to fifth overall after leading the first day.

Everyone seemed to enjoy the center-board, rudder and tiller cover trophies (at least the skippers did). But speaking for myself, the most valued item I took home from Huntington was the memory of Eric Conn in the second race as he flew down the lake with his mast inverted and the tip hanging out over the nose of the boat . . . it never broke. "I do it all the time", says Eric.


Sunday's wind was lighter but steady from the north and two races were finished in time for a late lunch and the District awards.
