What's Wrong — And What Can We Do About It

by Paul Henderson

Fellow Snipe Sailors:

I first sailed a Snipe in 1970 at the Don Q with various Diazes. Sixteen years later Martha and I have now purchased a boat and actively sail, travel, yell, etc., with the Snipe Mafia. Luckily, when in 1970 I suggested that the Snipe be the Olympic twopeople boat I was ignored in favor of the 470. The Olympic designation would have ruined a good class but my reasons were valid then and still are.

Buzz Lamb asked me to write an epistle for the newsletter on the state of the nation and especially everyone's deep concern with one-design racing, so here goes.

A major problem lies with our yacht clubs. They must get back to basics. Sailors need water and therefore our clubs were started on some of the finest real estate in the world for the purpose of going to sea to race sailboats.

The evolution of a sailing club is programmable and occurs in the following chronological order: dinghies, ramps, cranes, clubhouse, snackbars, dining rooms, yachts, power boats, swimming pools, and tennis courts. When all this happens after a few decades the members forget why the club was there in the first place. An example of what happens is that a famous Long Island yacht club, recently voted in favor of lights on the tennis courts, turning down a new crane.

We who still love to go to sea in small racing boats have abdicated our responsibilities. I have nothing against the varied activities as long as the primary activity, sailboat racing, is nurtured, subsidized and is the raison d'etre of the club.

Because I perceive or want to perceive a return to basics, in most regions we all must give this latent energy to return to solid one-design racing at home, firstly in our club, and secondly in our classes.

Clubs must ensure the following:

- Fleet policies limiting classes
- Solid racing programs geared to local participants
- Host annually regional one-design events
- Install good facilities such as ramps, cranes, drysailing
- Ensure good sailors can join and get storage, evicting sleepy boats

- Foster junior programs subsidizing all up to 30
- Insist young sailor sit on the management boards
- Have sensible classes for juniors to graduate to, which also appeal to every size and age

I have always thought that a good way to ensure that sailing clubs keep their direction is to have all meetings on an island and you must be able to sail a Snipe there to go to the meetings.

The above only works if we, the active racing sailors, are willing to serve our sport.

The second problem has been caused by the so-called modern classes with their high tech rigs, trapezes, throw-away boats, win-at-all-cost philosophies, sailing by factory or national teams with coaches, managers, etc. This has greatly effected local one-design racing because even local sailors want to be competitive.

Let me now explain the reason I voted for the Snipe as the broad based two people Olympic boat. I do not like specific sailboats at all; I like the people who sail them a lot. If you lined up the people who raced Snipes at the U.S. National they are all sizes, shapes, ages, sexes and hairstyles. To be a good club boat it must be able to be competitively sailed by all. Let's now relate that to what has happened in clubs over the past few years.

A kid joins the junior program at age eight; they basically are all the same size and basically sexless and they have a great time sailing Optimists. They then get to 13 and life changes. They become different sizes and shapes. The boats they are pushed into are single handed or have trapezes. Both boats breed freaks and exclude all but 10% of the kids graduating from the program. If you want to be a competitive single handed sailor you have to be 165-195 lbs., six feet tall and enjoy pain. To be a high tech trapeze dinghy sailor the helmsman has to be a jockey, the crew six foot tall and aneorexic and acquire a new boat like a baby, every nine months. The rest gravitate to I.O.R. boats and sit like faceless pigeons perched on the rail in misery. They finally realize that this is not fun and take up golfing (except for John Johns).

The criteria for a good club boat is as follows:

- Able to take novice and still get around course
- Top competition excellent
- Strong construction
- Boat competitive for 10 years
- Easily trailed
- Women and men equally competitive as skipper or crew
- Few strings as possible
- Tight and enforced class rules
- All up weight of crew important not where placed
- Strong class communication
- Tactical boat not technical
- Time working on boat minimal compared to time racing
- ✓ Apres race scene hospitable

Certain classes fit these criteria and seem to be the basis on which we can resurrect one-design sailing. The Snipe is certainly one.

I would be out of character if I did not make some critical observations of the Snipe. They are as follows:

- 1. The sail cloth is too light. The jib should be at least 3.5 oz. cloth. The sails should last one good season not one good race.
- 2. The whisker pole should be a regulated length, preferably shorter.

All members of the class including the primadonnas have been so helpful and in that lies the Snipe's strength.

It was a real joy to see 57 boats at Eastern Yacht Club in Marblehead for the first regatta in 25 years, the superb race committee at Chautaugua, the friendliness of Cuba Lake and Barton pond. Martha and I will see you all, including more Diazes again, at the mid-winters.

District Governor Frank Pontious Responds To National Secretary's Request For Opinions

Dear Ralph,

You asked for communication so here goes. Following are my opinions on a number of unrelated subjects.

First, let me say that I really enjoyed the Nationals this year (the last one being 1980), and the interaction with the large number of Snipers — some new faces but a lot of "older," familiar, friendly ones.

1. DUES. I would be against a dues increase to the members from the \$25 per boat. Being District Governor for the last two years has given me a new insight into the problems of numbers of dues paid Snipe members. As you know it is an up and down situation with each fleet, and hopefully you have an active enough district to stay ahead of the attrition.

In District 4, which I believe is one of the more active (with about 200 dues paid), we have 14 fleets, of which five are healthy and active, three are border line, and six are dead or dying. We have the possibility of maybe starting two additional fleets in the next few years, but I would not consider our situation super by any stretch.

So the point of the above is that any dues increase puts a dampening effect on the ability to sign up new members as well as driving out the border liners. I would much rather keep the dues low, and develop some program to increase the membership. This is hard to do and takes some real dedication as we all know. (In D4 the Davises have made some tremendous strides keeping things moving, and the Diazes have a successful fleet. They all need help and support, and there are too few that are as dedicated.)

Having said all this, I did vote for the \$5 increase with the idea that this would get us back in the black, and that with a new financial plan we could stay healthy.

I feel as do many that the Travel expense is the toughest nut to crack. It is important to support international sailing events but I personally do not see how the Snipe class can support the paying of travel expenses for more than one crew per event at the most — not unless some real imaginative fund raising scheme is in place.

In summary on this point, I feel the struggle of keeping the existing members and building the base of the Snipe Class is more of a priority than the international competition.

2. U.S. BOARD OF GOVERNORS. I

do not support the idea that each District Governor should be a member of the U.S. Board for all of the reasons discussed. However I do like the idea of each District being represented, and I would suggest a representative to the Board be a District elected position, which could be the District Governor or someone else.

Another opinion, in the interest of keeping the Board to a workable size you might automatically have those SCIRA Board "members at large" represent their Districts. With Grubb, Lenhart, Davis, Fenner, etc., you really don't need further representation from their Districts.

3. DISTRICT ROTATION. In studying the existing District system and rotation it seems that D6 and D7 could and probably should be split.

Not knowing the politics or previous discussions regarding D1 and D5 I wonder out loud whether there should really be two separate Districts here. It seems to me that D5 only has four fleets.

I would suggest the following rotation (quite obvious actually): D2 1987, D7 1988, D4 1989, D3 1990, D6 1991, D1/5 1992, etc. This would give each District the Nationals every six years — with three years between each west coast year.

4. KINETICS. I thought Paul Henderson did a great job laying it on the line before the series and obviously scared everyone into line...

That's all of the comments at this time — see you at the Masters.

Finland's Nationals Won By Jukka Lahti

Our Nationals, this year were arranged in Tampere in the lake district. Even though the schedule was rather late (after the normal vacation period, and the schools had started) we had 35 Snipes on the starting line which is a couple more than last year. Most of the more experienced people were there, and also many new Snipe sailors.

This year the 470 class for the first time had their nationals together with the Snipes and they had 28 boats on the starting line. That class is mainly concentrated in Helsinki, while the Snipe class have very active fleets almost all around the country.

The first two days (races 1-4) were sailed in mostly very light and shifting winds which caused problems even for the top crews. The last two day's two races on the other hand, were sailed in strong winds and rain, and resulted in many DNF/DNSs due to broken materials, or just longer swimming sessions. Myself, I got the boom down during the first roaring reach.

Former Champion Hakan Bjurstrom proved that a good Snipe sailor can be suc-

cessful even if he hasn't sailed Snipe for some time. This was his first race this season, and he finished second. Jukka Lahti/Juhani Heljo from Tampere won the gold medals, and the bronze medals were surprisingly won by Timo Vierimaa/Jukka Pekuri from Haahe in the north. Without

doubt they earned their medals as they have climbed towards the top very fast this season. The enthusiastic Claus Carpelan with Freddy Wegelius took a jump up to fourth with two wins in the strong winds, their own specialty.

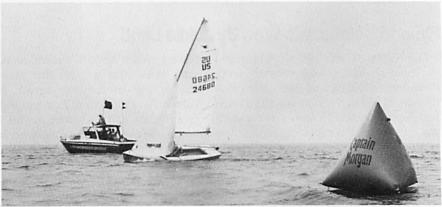

Doug Wefer Bests 37 At District 1 Championship

For those who have not 'experienced' small lake sailing, in particular the Mystic Lake in Winchester, MA, one must have a little imagination to appreciate the uniqueness of the setting.

Picture, if you will, a stock car race on a figure-8 track (I used to love watching them on ABC's Wide World of Sports). Now instead of 15 or so beat up stock cars, imagine 37 Snipes racing in two separate fleets — all on this same figure-8 course.

Imagine further (for you ocean sailors, this may be difficult) that the breezes range from 0-10 knots and just to make it a little more challenging, let's throw in a variety of windshifts, some up to 90 degrees. If you can actually picture all of this, either you are crazy *or* you have just sailed in the 1986 District 1 Championship.

This regatta was not for the faint of heart. Racing ethics and morals (typically referred to as 'sportsmanship') were often taken to the limit due to the close-quarters racing. Some new questions for the game 'Scruples' arose that would make many tried and true yachtspersons squirm. Such as 'You are preparing to round a mark on the outside of 10 other boats when the leader in the other fleet calls for room. Do you 'slam the door'?'

Another: 'You are crossing the middle of the figure-8 course in the lead, on a reach, and on port tack when you notice a wall of boats from the other fleet bearing down on you on a reach in the other direction on starboard tack. You are well on a collision course (this was my favorite part of those Wide World of Sports tele-

casts). Do you stop and wait as if you were waiting for a train to pass and risk losing some boats behind you? Or do you close your eyes and go for it?'

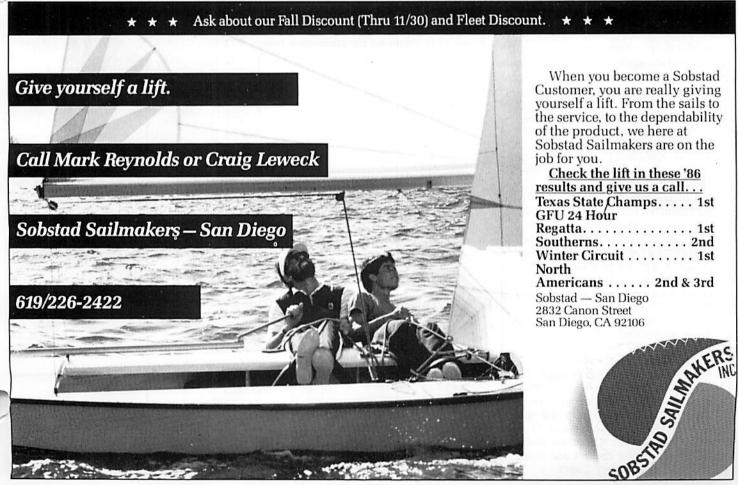

The course was laid way out in the channel and the races held in a variety of winds from very light on the first day to Force 5-6 on Sunday — thus suiting every competitor.

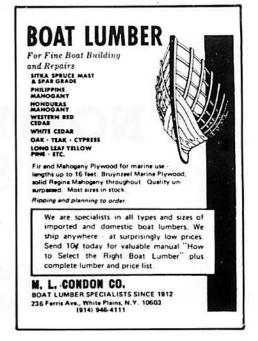
