THE COMMODORE'S BULLHORN

Although SCIRA is financially sound, there are many things we could do to promote the class if we had more resources. Don Hackbarth and Darryl Waskow have spent considerable time putting together a comprehensive marketing plan for SCIRA. There are a few things that can be done which require no funds. We could invite collegiate sailors and sailors from other classes to participate in a regatta without paying SCIRA dues. A special regatta could be organized and recent college graduates invited to sail in borrowed boats with experienced crews against some of our best sailors. Youths sailing in junior programs should be utilized as Snipe crews as often as possible. Youths and other potential Snipe sailors should be invited to attend seminars about racing and the advantages of sailing Snipes could be emphasized. Numerous articles should be written for publications that elaborate on the quality of our sailors and the organization. Ed Adams recently published an excellent article in Sailing World on the technical aspects of the Snipe. We need as much free publicity as we can get. Articles such as Ed's as well as publishing race results from our numerous championships worldwide give us valuable exposure without any cost to the Association.

There are other fairly inexpensive things

sailing. The Snipe Bulletin can be periodically mailed to various sailing clubs for display in their clubhouses. Bumper stickers and posters can be inserted in the Bulletin for display by members on automobiles, at clubs or at marinas. Newsletters can be mailed to intercollegiate sailors and members of selected classes like the Optimist, the Laser, or the Sunfish. More promotional items such as videos, pamphlets, and informational sheets about the boat, sailors and fleets should be developed and widely distributed.

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
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SAFETY FEATURES

How to Release your Bridled Centerboard when Turtled


Recently, there has been some discussion as to the relative safety aspects of releasing a bridled centerboard vs. a hooked centerboard while turtled. This discussion has led to some ingenious solutions from Snipe skippers that are well worth sharing with the Class.

SCIRA Board member Don Hackbarth has reversed the usual arrangement of a rope bridle retracted by shock cord. His set up, shown in pictures 1 & 2, used 3/8 inch diameter shock cord to hold up the board and 1/4 inch diameter line to stretch the shock cord so the



board will go down.

Gonzalo "Old Man" Diaz uses a rectangular plate, shown in pictures 3 & 4, to jam the board back against the back of the trunk. The plate is rectangular so that: turned one way, it holds the board higher for runs; turned the other way, it holds the board lower for reaches. The forward edge of the plate hooks under two knobs. and it is retracted out of the way




by a piece of shock cord when not in use.

U.S. National Measurer Brainard Cooper also uses a plate, shown in pictures 5, 6 & 7, but his is hinged near the bottom on a piece of shock cord. His

arrangement still uses a hook at the top of the board for reaches, but it uses the folded-down plate to hold the board higher for runs.


All of these set ups allow the board to be pulled upward from outside the boat, in the event of turtling, to help right the boat. The latter two solutions will automatically retract the plate, releasing the board, as soon as the load comes





off of it when the boat turtles. The latter two set ups will automatically hold the board at the proper height so that 12 inches is always in the water per Rule 26.

9th ALL JAPAN SNIPE MASTERS

The 9th All Japan Snipe Class Masters Championships were held again this year at Kaiyo Yacht Harbor, the new Harbor in Gamagori City, Aichi Prefecture, August 7 and 8.

Gamagori City, which is located inside the Mikawa Bay Seminational Park, is very famous from old times as being a scenic tourist spot, and recently it has become known as the base camp for the America's Cup. This is also where the Masters Worlds during the World Snipe Festival and the National Athletic Meet will be held in 1994.

There were 44 teams participating in the 9th Masters Championship which broke last year's record of 31 teams. This is quite a change from the 4th Championships where only 13 teams participated! However, since the boats for the Masters are all chartered, we did have difficulty in gathering the boats.

The increase in participation is due primarily to the anticipation of the World Championships, but also because young masters are starting to participate in the Apprentice Division, with the old masters considering this an alumni meeting. The oldest skipper was 83 years old and the oldest pair was 128 years old. These trends have created a new era for the Masters and are expected to support the development of sailing as a lifetime sport.

The first day began with fair winds, slightly cloudy but no rain, perfect for Masters. The day's prominent winner,

who finished 3rd last year in All Japan, was the Yoshida/Saido team which will be participating in this year's Words.

At the reception, the familiar old-timers spoke of the Japan Yachting

Association's history, the newcomers asked that they be accepted in the association, and both together pledged to develop the Masters in the new era. The center of topic was the young 83 year old Mr. Katsumi Hirata, the Honarary President of the Japan Snipe Association, also Honorary Vice Commodore of SCIRA who is not only active in sailing but also in tennis, swimming, ski, and soccer as well, and a hero adored by everyone.

The final days races began much like

the previous day but with a threat of a warm front which produced shifty winds. The top 3 finishers of the 3rd race were disqualified for PMS, and the final race saw two general recalls and 3 more boats disqualified for PMS.

We are preparing for the upcoming events of the World Snipe Festival and the Masters Worlds to be held next year, and hope it will be as successful as this regatta. --Yashushi Kuwano, Director Japan Snipe Association

The third day had only one race, and the Club served an excellent "caldero", a rice dish typical of the region. An excellent gala dinner was held with speeches from the President of the Club and from Arturo Delgado, Past SCIRA Commodore and present Vice President of IYRU.

Antonio Roquette, current President of the Portuguese Federation, offered an Iberian Trophy to be disputed next year at the same Club, but which will also be open to the rest of the world.



ROCKY MOUNTAIN REGATTA

Sandy sent the fleet out onto the Bay off of Greenbury Point for three Olympic course races on Saturday. The breeze was a wonderful 15-18 knots out of the Southwest under sunny skies. 
SCANDINAVIAN JUNIOR PROJECT

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
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
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
