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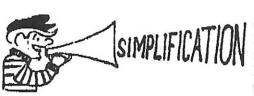

THE COMMODORE'S BULLHORN

Congratulations to Wolstenholme and Williams, winners of the 46th International Snipe British Championship. This series was sailed in a variety of conditions that challenged everyone and produced true champions. A hardy hip-hip-hooray is in order for Doug Clark and Alex Stout, the new U.S. Champions, and for John Macrae and Pam Paufler who swept the Wells series.

At the recent U.S. Board meeting Chairman of the Long Range Planning Committee, Means Davis, reported on their findings from 1989-1990. Some of their findings and suggestions are practical and others very interesting that require more discussion and input from the membership. Although inactive for a few years this committee is again functioning.

Suggestions from the LRPC that could possibly reduce costs and simplify the boat thereby making it easier to sail and sell are: standardization of the mast step-all masts could then be made the same length and be interchangeable between boats. Standardizing centerboard trunk heights would make centerboards interchangeable. Specifying one position for gudgeons on the transom and pintles on the rudders would make rudder replacement easier. One wonders why such changes have not been implemented in the past. Such changes would benefit both builders an sailors in the future.



could be built for \$3,500.00 U.S. (hopefully this is still true) if masts are not tapered (saves 30% of the cost with no difference in performance), if expensive hardware is not used, and if many of the mast and sail trim controls are left off the boat. This basic Snipe is essentially as fast as the fully rigged Snipe and much easier for the beginner to sail. These basic Snipes would be excellent for building fleets. We in fact can compete with the mass produced, production boats trying to capture the two person dinghy market. In some areas the demand for used boats is high. When used boats are not available please encourage potential Snipe sailors to purchase a basic boat and give them a suit of used sails.

A worldwide concern is the short life span of Snipe jibs. One sailmaker has suggested that the Class limit each boat owner to one suit of sails per year. Sailmakers would then be forced into producing jibs that would last at least one season. Everyone would ultimately be playing on a more level field. What do you think?

If you have any topics that should be discussed at the World Board meeting in Porto Alegre, Brazil, please contact a Board member soon with your concerns or ideas. Because of your input the Snipe is currently the premiere two person racing dinghy. DOUG CLARK AND ALEX STOUT **U.S. NATIONAL CHAMPIONS!**

In opera it is said that the program isn't over unitl the fat lady sings. For Doug Clark and Alex Stout of Annapolis, MD., it can be said that in the 1993 US Nationals, the gal sang just in time. Saving their best for last, this duo belted out a major performance on the final day to become this year's class champions. Along with the glory of the Heinzerling Trophy, they also claimed the Crosby Trophy, representative of the winner of the elimination series. It has not been since 1986 that the same team has won both prizes.

Mentor Harbor Yachting Club, Mentor, Ohio, played host to this year's edition of our class championship. Ted Pinkerton and his small but loyal local fleet along with the critical support of MHYC, successfully ran a great regatta and displayed the beauty and benefits of Cleveland. Forty-nine entrants were impressed with the first rate facilities of ample dry storage and parking, two hoists with launch ramp, sufficient dock space, pool, showers and friendly staff and volunteers.

The local wind prediction for the event was for the best breeze to be early. Really early. First start was at 8:30 a.m., bringing on a near business-like approach to the morning routine. The risk to this schedule was that if the wind was not up in the morning, the fleet would lose faith. And they did. It wasn't until the last two days of the event that the morning mission paid off. Unfortunately, the afternoon breeze never dissipated during the week as predicted so a more reasonable mid-day start time would have worked.

The entrants were divided into four flights for the four race Crosby series which began on Saturday. After a brief skippers meeting the fleet set out in light to moderate winds and bumpy seas that would be the theme for this year's championships. Day one saw close scores among the predicted favorites: Henry Filter/Nancy Green, 2-1; Craig/Lisa Leweck, 1-2; Peter Commette/Connie Suddath, 1-3; and Doug Clark/Alex Stout, 2-2. Both Leweck and Clark burst out of the blocks on Sunday with bullets, leaving a race four showdown were their respective flights would meet for one final race.

Clark capitalized on a good start and took the first wind shift across the fleet and into the lead. Leweck got stuck in the pack

behind the leader, but worked the inside route on the run to beat the group into second place. Leweck and Clark were now tied on points, but Doug managed to put a boat in between just before the finish to win the Crosby.

Calm winds greeted the fleet for the first day of the championships. Postponement flags lasted through to the early afternoon when a suddenly strong easterly landed. On the verge of a warning gun, the judges checked the weather radar and saw a fast approaching thunder squall heading for Mentor. The race officials prudently abandoned the races for the day.

Tuesday's morning breeze restored faith in the fleet and gave steady winds for three races. Andy Pimental and Carol Newman took the first bullet of the championship, but could not match the consistency of Leweck or Clark who ended the first day in first and second. Clark survived a tough start to finish second behind the team of Bart Hackworth and Jon Rodgers, with Peter Commette and Connie Suddath in third. With the Championship on the line, the final result would be determined in the last race of the series.

For Clark to win, he had to either beat Leweck or make sure they sailed a drop race. For Commette to win, he had to finish more than two places better than Leweck and better than one place over Clark. For Leweck to win he had to survive the odds. He didn't. Pimental rounded the first mark in the lead, followed by Clark and Leweck with Commette well back. Clark managed to sail over the group after the jibe mark and went on to win. The final standings saw Clark/ Stout first, Pimental/Newman second, and the Lewecks third. The top three in the standing qualify for the Western Hemispheres to be held next year in Montevideo, Uruguay.

The Wells Series saw John Macrae and Pam Paufler take control from the start and never let go. Gonzo and Gonzo III Diaz followed scored consistent seconds, with Peter Fenner and Natalie Bristol rounding out third.

A few of the Special Junior crews from the Junior Championships traded places with their "special" crews for the Senior Nationals, although Mark Ivey, Lucas Diaz and Morgan Watt decided they liked the back of the boat better and toughed it out in the big leagues.

Hats off once again to Ted Pinkerton and Mentor Harbor Yachting Club for a great National Championship series! See you in Dallas for next year's Nationals.

The U.S. Junior National Championships were sailed prior to the U.S. Senior National Championships at Mentor Harbor Yachting Club in Cleveland, Ohio, on Lake Erie. The U.S. Junior National Championships (Commodore Owen E. Duffy Memorial Trophy) and the Special Juniors, a category for a junior skipper and adult crew, sailed the same course and started together, but were scored separately. The competition was spirited with Mark Ivey of California with crew Matt Krug of Cleveland, the winners of the junior/junior competition, and Lucas Diaz, with his father Augie crewing, from the Coconut Grove Sailing Club in Miami winning the junior/seniorevent.

The first day of sailing greeted the competitors with light winds out of the northwest and the Race Committee was only able to run two races. The second day featured strong winds, as high as 20 mph, initially from the northwest. The start of the first race and the first leg was sailed in a rain storm that made visibility difficult with the sailors working had to find the weather mark. 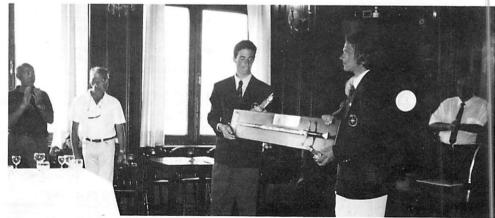

There is some concern on our tax exemption status for monies donated in name to the Perpetual Fund. The Board then voted on the following resolutions for Grants from donations: a. Kurt Mayol/Laurel Timpson-\$4,205.00 grant. b. Peter Commette—\$1,335.00 grant. m/s/p-Don Hackbarth, Dan Williams.

There was no Treasurer's report on the financial condition. Pete did receive a list of SCIRA members to date for the U.S. Nationals.

3. Rules Committee—Dan Williams

Dan requests comments in writing from Board members on his letters dated March 10 and June 1 regarding changes to the Constitution and Bylaws by September 15, 1993 in anticipation of the Worlds in Porto Alegre.

The Rules Committee recommends changes in our current rules referencing advertising per IYRU. Dan to mail recommendations.

Proposals for 1996: a. Jib cloth weight; b. Minimum paddle size; c. Bridled board vs. hooked board.

4. Nominating Committee - Jerry Thompson

Committee recommends Peter Fenner to continue as U.S. National Secretary for another term. m/s/p—Jerry Thompson, Dan Williams.

5. Long Range Planning Committee - Means Davis

Means referred to a handout the Committee had prepared regarding their efforts. The committee is not targeting issues to be done now, but in 5-10 years. The main issues are: Simplify boat; Make it cost effective for a beginning Sniper; We are an International Class.

Concern to look at: a. Rules: fixed points for Snipes. Mast step location - height; Height of mast; Centerboard trunks - consider establishing a length for boards; the three mast intersections (shrouds, jib stay, spreaders) must be within 4". This was passed at the Worlds in Norway. Other: Jib cloth weight; centerboard - bridled vs. hooked and restraint; screw stop at band for adjustable outhauls. b. Districting: formalizing communication (require District Governors to attend Nationals). c. Bulletin Committee d. Class Roster.

Summary: LRPC has no recommendations for changes in 1993. They will most likely propose ideas for 1996 on class promotion, mast step height and length and the centerboard concerns. Means wanted to thank Bill Buckles and Phil Richmond for their efforts on behalf of the Committee, and recommended continuance of the Committee. There was a motion to have Means Davis continue on as Chairman of the LRPC. m/s/p-Dan Williams, Terry Timm

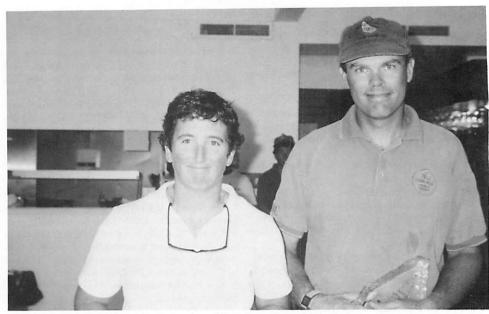

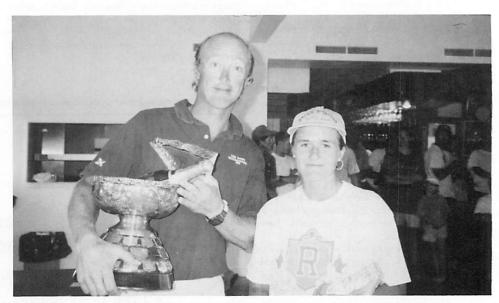

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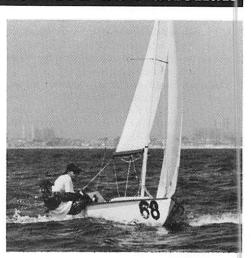


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Kurt Mayol and Laurel Timpson leading the fleet at the 1992 US Nationals. They finished 3rd overall.

EUROPEAN SECRETARIES MEETING

The annual European Secretaries Meeting, hosted by SCIRA France, opened in an aura of great expectation as the annual report outlined further progress and increased growth throughout the continent. Whereas Euro Snipe builders, spar manufacturers and sail lofts had not been noticeably added to in the run up to the 1990's, that has changed over the last three seasons. Boats are now being moulded in Denmark, Italy, Spain and U.K. with Finland, France, Norway and Sweden seriously making moved to build. Spars have traditionally come out of Denmark, with that now changing with the U.K. along having three prominent manufacturers experimenting and developing for the Snipe market. New names in sail lofts have surfaced which could possibly knock renown sailmakers off their long held perch! Class growth in Europe was now increased to such an extent that a larger commercial market has the confidence to become involved. This is to both the advantage of SCIRA and the marine market providing profit margin is still restrained to sensible levels.

European Championship bids were fully booked through to 1996. In fact, with so many countries now wishing to formulate new regattas, the race calendar is overflowing. Hope is for a European climate change to extend the season into the winter months to absorb the ever growing list!

With so much inter-country mixing at regattas, the European membership is becoming as a family with each known to each. To benefit from this close knit relationship, the Secretaries discussed and agreed that for future major race meetings a central gathering point be named on the entry form. Here competitors can meet totalk plus pass along techniques, tactics, tuning, etc.

Also discussed over the table was inflation. This is creating rising costs of regattas both to organizers and competitors. Concern was shown advising reappraisal of all costing to be possible and beneficial. All countries are to look within to cut costs. Another item to surface was the Bulletin circulation throughout Europe. It is low in

comparison to the membership strength. As the publication is the World messenger and mouthpiece, the meeting concentrated on means of increasing circulation. In self-analysis, fault was laid at lack of Euro information and race reports being submitted. Secretaries were advised to submit more Euro material for publication.

The meeting terminated with continued confidence, but the realistic realization that there is no place for complacency. Pressure has to be maintained and applied to progress and perpetuate SCIRA over Europe. The momentum must be maintained.

GET INVOLVED TO BUILD AND MAINTAIN A GREAT FLEET

Three years ago, after doing too much foredeck work on bigger boats in San Diego Bay, I looked for a boat I could afford that wouldn't keep me on the phone day and night trying to find crew and an active fleet with good sailors. With my recent lotto winnings in hand, I bought a used Snipe (never having sailed one). Since that time, I have never looked back.

I was fortunate to find one of the best fleets, of any sailboat, in the U.S. and the world. Little did I know that on any given day, for club races as well a major regattas, I would be sailing against some of the best sailors around. Past World Champions, and past and current National and North American Champions are all here in Mission Bay. How would I ever learn to sail a Snipe with this kind of competition?

In these past years, I have tried to take the initiative and get involved in the fleet. I helped on race committee when it was the Snipe fleet's turn for duty and volunteered as regatta chairman for our big (65-70 boats) Spring Invitational. This past year, I have served as Fleet Captain with a somewhat self-serving purpose.

With all this talent, why not tap into some for teaching clinics? Not a new ideas to this fleet, or others, but I tried to view the clinics from a viewpoint of what would help me improve my sailing. In the first clinic, Craig Leweck gave up about 3 to 4 hours on land with his boat and who'd us some of his gofast secrets on tuning. Doug Hart discussed the rules, along with recent changes, in the second clinic. The third clinic took to the water with Chris Snow and Jon Rogers giving lessons on teamwork between skipper and crew. In the fourth clinic, Rick Merriman and Greg Morton discussed tactics and strategy in the classroom and held a heavy air clinic on the water. It turns out that what helped me and my crew, also helped other who were beginning to sail in this fleet.

Another self-serving question: How could I learn from other crews as a skipper, and how could my regular crew learn from some of the better skippers? The answer was the "Pick a Crew From a Hat" regatta, held one Sunday during a regular club series. The Snipe fleet threw all crew names into a hat and the skippers pulled names. If a skipper pulled his/her regular crew, the name was placed back into the hat and pulled again.

Crews were rotated every race. Sailing with others as skipper or crew really adds to your perspective with new ideas on how other perform on the water.

Where is all this leading? Don't wait for someone else to help you improve your sailing; take the initiative and get involved with your fleet. Ask the better members of your fleet to help some of the newer sailors. With all the activities we have in Mission Bay, I have yet to have anyone turn down a request to put on a clinic, help with race committee, have a fleet meeting at a member's house, run a protest committee, etc. Most everyone wants to get involved, but the most important person to get involved is you!

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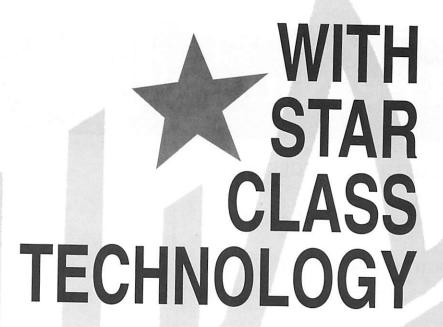
