

## THOUGHTS WHILE SAILING


A recent article by Fred Miller in SAIL magazine describes what has evolved in small boat sailing in the past 15-20 years. It is his contention that most of the current classes are designed with a weight so light as to eliminate older and heavier skippers. He gives examples of the 470 which is so sensitive to weight that a combined skipper/crew weight of 242 pounds would be such a great advantage they could win their world championship hands down, if the wind didn't come up in the last races. Boats like this also require an agility that only youth has.

Fred feels that the "hot" new boats get most of the publicity and that from what is printed, they are the only classes being sailed. But this is not true, the time-proven classes ... "should never worry about image. Though they may lack name talent, they are never short of talent itself".

I think the Snipe class has come to the realization that our boat will never be a "modern high-performance" boat, to use the IYRU term. We have continued to keep abreast of the technological changes without making older boats obsolete. The Snipe basically is the same as it was 45 years ago. Fred winds up his article:

"There is a lot more to sailing than doing it on two hulls, from a trapeze, or planing to windward, and it is once again time for the majority of the world's one-design racing classes to take heart. For it is they who can have all the fun, while the others have their weight wars! The time has come for sailors to realize that when it comes to racing, there are some great small boats for everybody."

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
#### 1976

# BRUCE COLYER SCUTTLES NORTH AMERICAN FLEET

Rear Commodore Bruce Colyer won three of the six races and had two seconds and a 7th to win the Birney Mills Trophy for the North American Championship held at Nassau, Bahamas, May 21-23rd.

Bruce and his crew Glenn Sutter had 19 points to Pierre Siegenthaler and Richard Farrington's 30 in second place. Third place went to John Dunkley and Jimmy Lowe; 4th, Gonzalo A. (Gonzo) Diaz and Mark Williams; and 5th was Past Commodore Basil Kelly with his son David crewing.


The winds were 15 and up for all races, with the final race sailed in near maximum winds of 25 with higher gusts. There were wet beats, fast planing reaches, and breathtaking jibes, but only a few capsizes in the warm waters of Montagu Bay.

From the first, it was a battle between "Go-rilla" Colyer and "Powerful Pierre", with only one point separating them at the half-way mark of the 6-race, no throw-out series. Sigenthaler usually had the better starts, with Colyer trailing in 6th or 7th at the 1st mark. With a gain of 2 or 3 boats on each of the reaches, Bruce was fighting Pierre for the lead by the second windward mark. Bruce then made the races a test of speed over tactics, frequently letting Pierre go, and picking up distance, rather than covering, or engaging in tacking duels.

The host Royal Nassau Sailing Club, marked its 50th year of operation, with the sailing of the North American Championship. The races, hospitality, and shore facilities made this a thoroughly enjoyable 3rd annual North Americans for all who participated.

## Wind Rakes 40th Southwestern Championship at Dallas

The 40th Southwestern Snipe Championship Regatta held Memorial Day weekend at the White Rock Sailing Club by Snipe Fleet No. 1 in Dallas, Texas, was a lot of good fun, food and drink and "Wind", and I do mean wind with a capital "w". The winds were in the 20 to 30 mph range for the entire regatta, with planing, capsizing and bent whisker poles the rule rather than the exception. In fact just about the only way to keep from planing on any off-wind leg was to turn your boat upside down which many people did several times.

We did manage to have a Junior race Saturday morning before the winds got into the 20 mph range. Jim "Jimbo" Bookhout of Dallas with his sister Beverly as crew won the Southwestern Junior Championship for 1976.

Forty boats started our first race on Saturday and only 24 finished. Several of the finishers capsized also but were able to right their boats and continue the race. Keith Zars of San Antonio won the first race followed by Pete Fenner and Gene Soltero of Dallas with Brownie Horner of San Antonio finishing fourth. The second race was won by Gene Soltero with Bob Henry of Dallas second, Brownie

Horner fifth, Keith Zars sixth and Pete Fenner ninth. At the end of the first day of racing Gene Soltero and Keith Zars were in first and second place respectively with a "comfortable" lead over Pete Fenner and Brownie Horner who were tied for third. We then got around to serious eating and drinking which is, after all, what a good regatta is all about.

Sunday morning the winds had "died" to the 18-25 mph range with only a few gusts over 30 mph. Both of Saturday's winners, however, gave everyone else a chance by capsizing in Sunday's race. Gene Soltero was unable to right his boat without assistance, and Keith Zars' mast broke on a later leg after a nice recovery from his capsize. Jim Wild of San

Antonio won Sunday's race with Brownie Horner second and Bob Henry third.

The consistent sailing of Brownie Horner (4,5,2) along with a couple of very speedy recoveries from capsizes enabled him to win the regatta. Brownie also won the tune up race sailed Friday evening in 0 to 5 mph, thus, breaking the curse of White Rock Lake that prevents the winner of the tune up race from winning the regatta. Another interesting point discovered during the regatta is that Brownie's grandfather, B. J. Horner, won the 5th Southwestern Championship Regatta in 1936. Watch out for Brownie's grandson at the 80th Southwestern!

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## **Terry Timm Cops Governor's Cup**

Lou Dixon reigns as Illinois State Champion

Island Bay Yacht Club, home of Fleet No. 93, was host to 42 Snipes for its annual Governor's Cup Regatta and simultaneously took its turn as host to the Illinois State Championship.

Despite a long spell of dry weather, the winds blew and blew, with disasterous gusts. Some didn't make it to the starting line for the first race, one jibe ended it for others, some survived the first race, only to falter in the second. The scheduled 3rd race for Saturday was ruled out. At this point Terry Timm led with a 2,1; Bob Hill was close with 1,3; and Lou Dixon had 4,2. Carl Levinson spoiled a 3rd with a DNF.

On Sunday, the winds moderated a hair, the gusts were less frequent and violent, and there was more sailing and less recovering. Terry Timm hung in with a 1,3; Bob Hill had more trouble, but his 10 kept him in trophy territory, Lou Dixon had a second and a throwout, Don Hite crept up with a 3,4; Mike Zalzal finally put it all together for a first, and Dave Chapin borrowed a board and managed a 5,2.

Consistency paid off for Terry Timm who threw out a 3rd, Lou Dixon axed a 13th to take 2nd in the regatta and top Dan Wesselhoft and Jeff Evans for his second year as Illinois State Champion. Dave Chapin did well enough on Sunday to take Junior skipper honors.

In the B Fleet bunch, Dave Congdon took first, xing a 4th (with everyone reminding him of his impending promotion), while Allen Quirk nosed out James Alexander by 3/10ths of a point for second.

Every one at the steak cookout on Saturday evening had adventures and near adventures to talk about, keeping the conversation lively.

SEPTEMBER 1976

#### REGATTA WEATHER

This seems to be the year of the gust out here on the plains. Dallas started it at the Southwestern, which I missed because of moving problems, and I guess I was lucky. I don't have accurate statistics on the casualties but there were plenty — apparently not too much average wind, but very heavy gusts.

On my way to Tulsa, there was a noise which, if I had not been driving on steel belted radials, I would have thought was a blowout. It was. I looked at the spare critically as I installed it and found some wires poking out in a tread crack. Returning to Wichita to get two new tires got me to Tulsa at about the starting gun for the first race. By virtue of the committee having to move some marks and change the course a couple of times I got to the line more or less in one piece and sailed exactly as one would expect to under the circumstances — poorly. Nothing really wrong with the winds there — a bit drifty on Sunday but not bad.

Things got cranked up at Quivira, where the winds were generally completely predictable — too much or too little. The wind for the first race Saturday didn't average too much, but there really wasn't any average — except that it hit twenty every minute or so on its way from five to thirty-five and back again. Ten of twenty-five starters finished, and most of those who finished had capsized. Including me. I was in the process of rounding the jibing mark, threading my way between two capsized boats ahead of me, planing, when my crew moved over too soon, and another gust arrived simultaneously with my suggestion that he get back where he belonged. The race

committee saw the gust coming over the water and said we would have gone over nose first if we hadn't gone sideways so it really didn't matter.

I have flotation bags in addition to the 4" of foam in the bottom and one inch in the sides, but righting the boat still isn't easy, especially if both former occupants are pitched into the water and nobody is on the board. After righting, the bags do cut down on the amount of water sloshing around and the boat can be kept right side up and sailed dry a little more easily.

The first race in the Wichita regatta was a lot better than at Quivira but it was still pretty gusty and the casualty level was a bit high - which produced some rescue problems because the lake patrol officer was new on the job, and he figured that since the sailing club had been given sole use of the lake, there wasn't anything for him to do after he ran everybody else off at noon so he went to town. Even if the new so called "self rescuing" boats aren't that - they are a lot easier to rescue. I managed to stay right side up, but Keith Zars had his second capsize of the year (Dallas was the first). Bob Williams spun in when a gust hit him when he was already planing dead down wind, the nose dropped and the rudder came out of the water. He had avoided capsize trouble at Dallas by having tiller troubles. He did his down wind work with no sails and a paddle for a rudder. Safe but slow.

Sunday morning the wind was fine from the standpoint of velocity, but almost straight across the lake. Our course must have set some kind of record — it was about seven miles and consisted of ten windward legs, five reaches, and four runs.

### SEA ROOM

One argument which comes up frequently on our little lakes out here concerns how soon you can be forced back on shore after you have called for room and tacked away from the shore. We had thirty-six boats in one fleet at our regatta and I am surprised we didn't have more arguments. Especially right after the start, things get pretty complicated on occasion.

While it doesn't seem fair, I'm afraid that a boat which has gone to a port tack to come off of a shore can be forced to tack back toward shore immediately after completing his tack to port, by an approaching starboard boat, unless he can go behind the starboard boat. The only extenuating circumstance here would be if the port tack were fairly close to parallel to the shore with the result that he would be unable to complete a tack to starboard and then hail for room and complete a tack to port without going ashore. A lot of loud yelling helps in these circumstances.

represent their nation in the Western Hemisphere Championship in Canada in August.




