

Finland's National Secretary Attends Spain's Race Week

Hello Buzz!

Thank you for the letters I received just shortly before we left Finland for the big regatta at Mallorca during the Easter holidays. This time we were three Snipes from Finland and I handled the transportation of all three boats with my Chevrolet Sportvan (one on the roof top and two on the trailer).

I had my family and my crew in my car and the people of the two other Snipes traveled by charter flight to Palma Mallorca. We took the car ferry from Helsinki to Travemunde (Federal Republic Germany) and the 2000 kilometers down to Barcelona was no problem for us. The Spanish navy handled the transportation of the car and trailer to Palma and we flew Iberia.

The regatta started in light winds, so light that only 14 Snipes managed the time limit in the first race. The next four races were held in moderate, sometimes strong winds, and the last race again in light winds. Last year's world champions Lange/Saubidet finished first in all races and usually in good leading position.

Point Score Forms Mailed September 15

The Minneford and Reichner Trophies are among the oldest in SCIRA's list of perpetual trophies. They are presented every spring for the previous season's best scores. The Reichner Trophy is the international high point trophy, and the Minneford is presented for the highest U.S. score. All fleets are eligible to send in their fleet scores, which are based on the old SCIRA system of 1600 points for first place (found in the current rule book on page 82). The whole system is explained beginning on page 79 of the SCIRA Rule Book.

U.S. Fleet Captains will receive point score forms from the office this month. All National Secretaries and fleet captains are urged to send their fleet score results to the office. Use blanks from the office, copy the form printed here, or use 3 x 5 file cards. We can't accept lists, but we do want to include all the fleet scores.

Results will be printed in the April *Bulletin*, and must be received in the office by February 1, 1987.

1987 SCIRA Directory Changes Are Due

Changes for listing of officers, national secretaries, and U.S. fleet captains must be received in the office by December 31, 1986 to be included in the 1987 SCIRA Directory which will appear in the February issue of the Snipe *Bulletin*.

THE SCORE

Four numbers were issued during the month and all went to Denmark. Fleet Charter number 800 was issued to Emonoel Mesquita Barreta in Aracaju, Brazil. Congratulations to the new members of this fleet.

Numbered SNIPES — 26660 Chartered Fleets — 800 is a brand new lake developed by the Corps of Engineers. It is a large, clear, deep, lake fed from the Walnut Valley drainage area. Our new name is the Walnut Valley Sailing Club. We have won the sailing concession on the lake, which means we have the right to develop the sailing cove. Our cove, called Brush Creek, is ideally suited for the sailing activities... We have installed a new ramp, docks, and 40 slips... The waterfront is enhanced by new roads and a dry storage area. A shelter building is under construction...

"We did not receive access to the lake early enough in the year to make our usual regatta date feasible. However, we are anxious to have our many Snipe friends come and enjoy these great facilities, so we have scheduled a regatta this year in October...:

Try These Ideas To Build Your Fleet

At the USYRU meeting last Fall some serious consideration was given to problems in one-design sailing, and classes were asked to contribute promotion ideas in a round table discussion. (Some of these have been featured before, try them again.)

BLUE JAY: Try a fleet purchase program. (Note: this works for boats or sails. The new fleet at Marblehead started BIG with just such a program.)

WINDMILL: Invite the general public to crew for you. (Lief Zars described a "crew roster" system worked out for the Lake Canyon fleet in the *Bulletin* several years ago.)

PENGUIN: Have a well-used boat put in racing shape by fleet volunteers. It is loaned out to prospective members and sold to new or prospective members at the end of the season. (This is good junior bait.)

FLYING SCOT: Winning skippers of a fleet are given handicaps in order to spread the trophies.

SUNFISH: Fun races: blindfold the skipper, and have the crew coach him around the course, backward races, treasure hunts, etc. (Try a balloon race. Keeping them in the boat to return to shore for the count is the hard part.)

Big brother/sister program matching an "A" fleet skipper with a "B" fleeter for the season.

J/24: Run short races in light air — more people have a chance of winning. Have a cruise — a full moon wine and cheese par-

ty. Emphasize the social side for family benefit. Give special awards: Youngest, oldest, sportsmanship, etc. Call people and encourage them to come sail.

THISTLE: Raquetball tournaments, etc. (One Snipe fleet has a minature golf tournament during one regatta. The winner gets as much publicity as the winner of the races. Also have a net and volleyball for use while waiting for the wind. That keeps the crowd there until the wind does appear — and uses up some of that youthful energy!)



Tuesday the sailing continued with a little brisker 15-18 knot breeze. John and Cathy Johns sailed to a first in the first race followed by Sam Mollet in second and Chris Hains in third. The second race was postponed for awhile due to a squall that came through between races. Many boats were forced to scramble into the club, while some braved the elements and stayed out. The race was finally started and Jerry Thompson and Hal Gilreath came home first with Doug Nugent and Rob Gorman following. Tuesday evening was the official cocktail party and needless to say all the sailors were glad to have a lay day on Wednesday.

Thursday's race was sailed in almost ideal 8-10 knots and sunny skies. Fritz and Jane Gram showed that they could still bounce back by putting a horizon job on the fleet. Second and third respectively

went to Jerry Thompson and Doug De-Sousa.

The race on Friday brought 6-8 knots of breeze and once again clear sunny skies. Jonathan Bartlett and Alex Stout finally showed us that Annapolis technique by finishing first followed by Fritz Gram and Paul Levinson.

Bill and Sherry Simons Top District IV at Jax

The five race District IV series was hosted by the Florida Yacht Club in Jacksonville on June 14-15, 1986, and was attended by 38 visiting sailors out of 39 entries — a pretty good turnout considering we don't have a fleet there now (although there is a group interested in reviving the Snipe fleet).

Despite the threatening weather conditions throughout the weekend the race committee managed to get off all of the races by early Sunday afternoon. Frank and Dee Alcorn and the support people from FYC did an excellent job in running the races "by the book," on time, and in a professional manner. The FYC people were very helpful and hospitable during the weekend in opening up the club and providing services.

The Simons' sailed extremely well to win the series by ½ point over David Pritchard and Jim Harmount from LLSC. The "old man" Gonzalo Diaz took a close third over Hal Gilreath from Pensacola who was fourth, and close behind was Tom Lihan of Fort Lauderdale in fifth.

The first race on Saturday started in light air against the current. It was a tough beat with the wind dying, and the second leg downwind was even slower. The RC



watching the building thunderstorm shortened course to finish on a short beat after the third leg. However the squall hit during the third leg and provided quite a finish for everyone with many changes of position, and a wild ride back to the club. The Simons held on for the win.

After the rain the second race was started in late afternoon and was full length — in fact lasting until about 8 p.m. as the wind died. The only local boat in the regatta, Steve and Connie Suddath, won this one with David Pritchard of LLSC in second.

The RC surmised that there would be wind on Sunday morning so there we were 12 hours later back on the starting line. There may have been some groans but it was well worth it to sail in the beautiful

early morning conditions. We got in three back-to-back races in medium winds to close the series, with the last one being hit with a similar squall a leg before the finish. This one gave us about 20 mph winds and provided a mile or two planning reach back to the club. Great stuff! (for most).

The winners of the last three races were Simons, Gilreath and Suddath. The Championship hung on the last beat as Simons led Pritchard by 2½ points but was behind by a boat in the race. Bill and Sherry finished sixth with only one boat between them and David in fourth to take the series by ½ point. The Simons had a record of 1-8-1-4-6 while David Pritchard had a very consistent 6-2-5-3-4 — 19½ points to 20 points.


The following morning, winds were westerly at 5-15 mph and again close racing was the order of the day. A total of six races were staged and a one race drop was allowed.

Intimate Gathering For North/South Regatta

While the turnouts have been on the low side so far on the 1986 California circuit, there was an absolute ebb tide at this year's North/South Regatta on May 3-4 at Lake Yosemite in Merced, CA. Though the quantity was disgracefully low, the quality was typically high as the whopping nine boat fleet prepared for a weekend of puddle sailing.

The fickle winds that Lake Yosemite dished out where foreign to most in attendance, however Craig Leweck seemed comfortable (no doubt due to his two years spent on the Midwest lakes) as he confidently handled the dicey conditions to easily win the event.

The first race was guided throughout the distance by District VII Governor Warren and Mary Lynn Wheaton. His mid-line start and skillful windward sailing up the left side gave him a comfortable lead over newcomer Mike Schmidt with crew Mary Ellen Liles as they got on the first reaching leg. The Keith Dodson/Robin Garrison team made their move on the second reach leg to get by Schmidt (word has it he has a bad tendency to over-strap his boomvang), leaving him in third around the leeward mark with Jim and Lyn Grubbs in fourth and Craig Leweck with Lisa Manzer in fifth.

The wind had glassed off at this point



with a windward leg left in the course and a rain storm hanging on the course. A new puff was seen on the right shore by Leweck, who bolted over there to pass everyone but Wheaton, with Grubbs hanging in there for third, Bill Denhart with Tracy Crew in fourth and Add and Mary Ronelsee in fifth.

The rain that began pouring during the latter half of the first race intensified to a serious downpour, which was then followed by high winds that forced the RC to cancel the racing for the rest of the day.

The group retired back to the motel, where a number of private parties primed the participants for the scheduled Mexican dinner at a local restaurant and then for the traditional bowling tournament. It can be said that the city of Merced is a bowling lane type of town, with a band playing and enough lanes in the house for most of the Snipe sailors to see their balls eventually greet the pins. After the last pair of bowling shoes were turned into the front counter, the night had changed to day as the start of the second race was only a couple cups of coffee away.

Fortunately for many there was only a whisper of wind at the scheduled start time on Sunday morning, but a light, shifty breeze came in to force the fleet out for race number two. The triangle course with a windward finish was posted as the fleet slid off the start line, only to find a becalmed race area.

Jim Grubbs led Denhart into the windward mark from the left side, with Leweck leading the right side group into the mark to claim third. The fleet slipped into another hole, but Leweck and Dodson (afer being late for the start) took control of the low road when the new wind filled in from the oppostite direction. This allowed them to head the fleet into the finish in that order. Grubbs recovered to get third, Ronelsee was fourth and Packy Davis with Colleen Crew was fifth.

With the course reshifted to take advantage of the new wind, the breeze zephyred out again but the RC was determined to start the race. A severe wind shift to the left made the windward mark a port tack fetch and the start line almost uncrossable on starboard tack. Leweck got off the line best while on port tack at the favored end,

but was soon passed as Grubbs and Dodson took the high port tack road to the mark and received more favorable wind.

As this threesome made it around the windward mark, the leg to the reach mark went from a one sided beat to a dead run as a strong puff came in from the right (about a 90 degree swing) to bring the fleet back together. Dodson still had a nice lead over Grubbs and Leweck as they rounded the reach mark and tightened up their sail trim and aimed for the leeward mark. The wind had continued to clock and strengthen on this reaching leg (to a whopping seven knots), so when Dodson loosely covered Grubbs up the left side of the final beat to the finish, he found himself in trouble with the boats to his right. He was just able to get back right and get in front of Leweck and Davis who had stung it out to that side. The top three finished in that order, with Grubbs slipping to fourth and Denhart grasping fifth.

As the day was concluding the race committee decided to try for one more. The scores at this point had Leweck well ahead with 4.5 pts., Grubbs had 10 pts., Dodson had 10.5 pts., Wheaton had 13.5 pts. and Denhart had 15 pts.

The last race was all Leweck, as he took the lead off the severely favored port line to guide the fleet to the finish. Grubbs missed more than his share of shifts to ge seventh in the race, which dropped him to fourth in the standings behind Dodson who got fourth in the race (second overall) and Wheaton, who got a third place finish (third overall). Packy Davis rounded out the overall top five with his second in the last race.

The host fleet from Richmond awarded bottles of sparkling wine to all of the race committee members (better after the races than before) and charming picnic baskets stocked with wines and other accessories to the top finishers.

The North/South Regatta was one of the west coast's rare opportunities to socially gather at one of the state's smaller lakes. Although the conditions were less than ideal for much of the racing, most of the participants kept the weekend in perspective as everyone carefully loaded up their cars with gear and good memories for the drive home.
