FROM THE COMMODORE

By the time that you read this, the excitement of the 1992 Olympic Summer Games will just have ended. I always find it interesting to see which nation's teams were the most successful, and then try to analyze why they found success by looking at their training programs and any technical "secrets" that they might have discovered. Another interesting activity is looking at which Snipe sailors participated.

It was only 100 years ago when Pierre de Fredi Baron de Coubertin announced his idea for resuming the Olympic Games. Just before he died, it is said that he predicted that "If I should return to life again 100 years from now I would change the form of the Olympics."

We don't know what changes he would make today but it is very clear that in the past the Olympics have been used to demonstrate national power, and today, rather than competing to run faster, jump higher or being stronger, as a matter of pure sports, the Olympic Games have become a means to make money.

Most of you may know that there have been times when the Snipe almost became an Olympic Class. While this may have produced some benefits such as increased number of Snipe nations, etc., in the end it seems that it is better that we did not take the steps to become a part of the Games. This means that we will not be spoiled by the money makers and/or professional sailors. We can continue to exist as an international Class, but one that is full of family atmosphere and friendship.

So while the IYRU busies itself with adapting Olympic sailing to attract a larger television audience, I think that it's time for the Snipe Class to put its strong will and energies into action to strengthen this family atmosphere.

In the case of the Juniors, we grownups must exert efforts to educate the mischievous and selfish youngsters, to have them become good-mannered young ladies and gentlemen, and at the same time show them through home-stays that there are many ways of thinking and living in this world. I think it would be wonderful to work positively towards exchanging children from teams from various countries for one to two week home-stays during the summer and winter vacations.

In any sports, the aim is to compete and win. That is the same with Snipe sailing,

and naturally the joy in winning is great and we exert our utmost effort to that end. I am sure that many of you have experienced the joy and excitement of being in the lead and, when looking behind you, see many of the competing boats tailing from behind, and then you would get the feeling of gratefulness to those who organize and run the races and made this possible.

During your youth, getting to know the joy of winning provided you with the overall confidence in life, which offered the opportunity to spend a wonderful life. The parents who understand this will take the trouble to have their children start by competing in small races, then after stimulating their interest, prepare programs to have them challenge higher goals.

The World Championship, the Europeans, Western Hemispheres and other International championships held by SCIRA are of the highest standard and are difficult events to qualify for. Therefore, I feel that it might be a good idea to hold various international events for those who were unable to qualify for the major events. As an example, something like the European Cup, which is open to everyone. We should have more of that kind of event, along with more promotional effort so that more people will know about such races and participate in them. What do you think about this idea?

The National Athletic Meet of Japan is held once a year at one of the 46 Prefectures, and once it makes a complete round then, from the second round, on certain events, they adopted a method to allow only teams that did not have the chance to participate in previous All Japan Athletic Meets of the National Athletic Meet to participate. If we think in terms of baseball, it would mean competing in International Competitions in the minor leagues (Triple A or Double A) instead of the Major leagues.

I sincerely believe that it would be a golden opportunity for Japan to nurture the youngster's international sense by utilizing the international Snipe language. I think it would be nice if more and more Japanese Snipers would read the *Snipe Bulletin* and start taking vacations to participate in the open races held in the Americas and Europe. As I said before, there are many ways to enjoy sailing, such as the

Women's World Championships, a Mixed-doubles Championship, Parent and Child Championships, changing the skipper and crew each race, team racing between clubs, etc., and by implementing them we can have the Snipe family continue to prosper and insure our continued success as the world's greatest one-design class.

Rather than spending a lot of money for a one-time colorful memory, it would be much better to hold many simple international events with less money. This would allow many more people to enjoy sailing their Snipes. To do this we should first think of making the boats simple and cheap so that the differences in performance between the new and old boats will be small. Announce in the Snipe Bulletin the World's race calendar as common information, so that the open events will have many participants from around the world. It would be splendid if we could include plans which will allow all members of the family to participate together in Snipe racing during the summer and winter vacations, although chartering boats would be a big problem that would need further ideas and efforts to resolve.

SCIRA Spain has announced that it would like to host the European Masters every other year. I personally think that this idea of holding some of the events in the same location at the same time of the year is worth our serious consideration.

In closing, I want to express my appreciation to all of you whom I was able to meet at the Snipe Championships held in Motala, Sweden, and Kokkola, Finland. I hope to take advantage of this opportunity to establish a closer friendship. I will share this valuable experience and joy with the Snipe sailors in Japan and Korea, and with those from around the world. I hope every Snipe sailor will someday have the opportunity to enjoy the kind of experiences that I have found in International Snipe sailing!

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BJURSTROMS SWEEP FINNISH NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP

The 1992 Finnish Nationals were sailed on waters in Helsinki in excellent conditions offering light and medium conditions with warm winds and lots of sun. The Race Committee did an excellent job of managing the shifts, and everyone who participated agreed that the arrangements, both on and off the water, were excellent.

During the past few years many new Snipes have been imported into Finland, resulting in strongly tightened competition at the top of the fleet. The Bjurstrom brothers, Hakan and Rikard, sailing the beautiful flat-black, wooden TURBO JOKER, are still Number One, but there seem to be teams that are rapidly closing in. Claus "Clappa" Carpelan and long-time crew Freddy Wegelius are a case in point. Anyone who remembers meeting them at the 1989 Worlds in Japan would have a hard time recognizing them today, as they have dropped at least 100 kilos from their combined weight and now seem almost anorexic when compared to their previous "portly" condition. This combination of physical conditioning and lots of practice has brought them to the top, not only in Finland but in Europe as well. They took second overall with second place finishes in every race but the finale, where an incident at the windward mark required a 720, dropping them to fourth.

Also of note was the third overall of Past Commodore Per-Ole Holm's oldest son, Peter, with Jan Vikstrom crewing. They sailed consistently to take a narrow margin over fourth-place Jukka Lahti and Juhani Heljo. Peter thus qualifies for a place on the Finnish team to the 1992 European Championship which is being organized by his home club, Gamlakarleby Segelforeining.

The 49-boat fleet was a deep one and the list goes on as Soling champ, Gerard Coleman (with wife, Sherry) was 6th, MBYC great Robin Gales with Jeff Baker 7th, MBYC Fleet Captain Tom Fisher and Jenny Dyer 8th, Argyle Campbell with his very "Italian"-looking Jibe-Tech 9th, and Lido 14 National Champ Charlie Cummings with pole-launcher Tom Devlin rounding out the top 10.

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DISTRICT ONE BELONGS TO PIMENTAL/ANDREWS

Ocean Pines Yacht Club near Ocean City, Maryland, hosted this year's District One Championship on July 26th and 27th with their usual generous hospitality and perfect sailing conditions. Race Committee duties were shared between the Ocean City and Annapolis fleets with Griff Hall in his debut as Race Committee Chairman and Deke Sheller as Regatta Chairman. Phil Richmond, Tom Wroten, Hal Gilreath, and Bruce Franz took care of weighing and measuring duties, while Kevan Wroten handled the registration procedures.

After one general recall the first race was started on an Olympic course at 1:25 in five-knot breezes from the Southeast. The winds stayed light, but with flat water the fleet sailed quickly to the first mark with Phil Richmond and Lisa Foulke the first to round. The second upwind leg had several shifts, allowing Geoff Schneider to take the lead with Phil and Lisa dropping to second, with John Fry in third and Pimental fourth. During the subsequent run and final beat, Pimental moved into the lead and finished first with John and Karin Fry finishing second. John Keane with Ted Keenan crewing moved from seventh at the first two weather marks to finish third.

Before the start of the second race, the wind had moved to S.S.E. and increased to 8 knots, building to 10 by the end of the race. Again an Olympic course was set with Bryan Fishback and Lori Stout taking the lead and never looking back. Alex Stout, Andrew Pimental and P. J. Schaffer battled for the next three positions throughout the race, with P. J. and crew Pat Raymond finishing second, followed by Pimental, with Stout taking fourth.

The third race was started late in the afternoon with the wind moving due south and dropping to 7 knots. Bryan and Lori were so pleased with their performance in the second race that they repeated it and won the third race as well. The battle for second was among five boats, with positions changing at each mark. To complicate matters, the wind backed to S.E. and dropped to five knots, requiring the second weather mark to be moved accordingly. At the finish it was Pimental in second followed by Keane, Schaffer, and Michael Bowers.

The evening's activities included a ribs and chicken BBQ followed by slick track competition at the local Go-Kart track. Lee Griffith claimed that Pine Beach swept these events and vowed to defend their title at the upcoming Blue Gray Regatta.

The first race on Sunday started with a general recall in 9-knot breezes that were trying to settle in from the N.E. The leader after Saturday's races, Andrew Pimental, quickly established a lead after the re-start and improved his position as the race progressed. Visiting skipper, Jerry Thompson, with Sherry Eldridge crewing, was second at every mark and held that position at the finish. John Keane, Hal Gilreath and P. J. Schaffer came from the back of the fleet on the final two legs to finish 3rd, 4th and 5th. The final race started in 10 knots out of the East which held steady for the entire race. Pimental dominated again from wire to wire. Pedro and Mimi Lorson put it together and were second at every mark and the finish followed by Thompson, Schaffer, Keane and Fishback.

The District One Championship Trophy went to Andrew Pimental and Lexie Andrews. The top 15 finishers out of 26 boats were: Pimental/Andrews; John Keane/Ted Keenan; P. J. In 1991, District Four adopted a high point competition to recognize the sailors in the District and to emphasize the importance of consistent participation as well as performance. Ten bonus points (five for small events) are awarded for attending each regatta as well as points for each boat a person beats. If a person is fortunate enough to win the race, he is awarded 1/4 point in keeping with the competitor's purpose. The competition runs for a year, ending at the District Championship Regatta each year.

To emphasize the importance of "dedicated participation" as well as performance in the overall scheme of things, the sailors of D-4 award trophies comparable to those awarded at major events to the top five sailors. In keeping with this concept, Woody Norwood, whose family has a long history of dedicated participation in the Snipe Class, has donated a perpetual trophy, a sterling silver Snipe sailboat model mounted on a base.
