From the Rules Committee--**Official SCIRA Rules interpretations or Circular Letters in force**

SAIL MEASUREMENT

The Board meetings held in San Diego during the last Worlds have produced a very important impact in SCIRA life especially referring to the style of conducting the races and also the boat and sails measurement. The Board decisions were influenced by the desire and the necessity to manage the Snipe Class and to adhere as much as possible to ISAF prescriptions. To reach this goal we completely re-wrote the Notice of Race and Sailing Instruction templates and are in the process of converting the Snipe Rule Book to the ISAF format that is quite different. This is a very long process and we are working closely with ISAF. To comply, the Rules Committee worked hard to maintain the intent of the Snipe Class and not to make our existing equipment obsolete.

The new measurement process was applied to the old and new sails and we discovered that our intent was not properly reached so we fine tuned the dimensions and the tolerances. We believe the final plans and measurements will be of great help to sailmakers that were not happy with the old method of Snipe sail measurement. We are now more in line with other classes and it will be easier for sailmakers to comply and measurers to use the same methods.

The new dimensions are suitable to have the old and new production comparable. The exsisting legal sails should remain legal under the new method and dimensions. We apologize for the delay, but the Board & Rules Committee wanted to get it right.

RULES OF CONDUCT FOR CONDUCTING NATIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP REGATTAS


The RoC are a very important document that governs the major events of the Snipe Class. The decisions made by the Board in San Diego 2009 were also very important for the Class.


The Race Committee now has more flexibility in managing Snipe regattas specifying how to change the course type, how to increase or decrease the length of legs, or reduce the number of legs. We changed some of the wording of the RoC but we found the wording was not concise enough and during the current year the RoC were not properly applied in some regattas. The Rules Committee has changed rule 5.3 of RoC editing two different issues, 5.3 and 5.4, to better define the possibility to change the length of legs and the number of legs.

We hope that our work will be suitable to grant better measurement procedures and regatta management.

GIRLS TAKE CENTER STAGE WITH ANNA TUNNICLIFE AND MOLLY VANDEMOER NEW WORLD CHAMPIONS

The 2010 Snipe Women's World Championship got underway in St. Petersburg, Florida, where 24 teams representing 9 countries vied for the title.

Day I

The day started off with the left over frontal breeze from the weekend. We left the dock in 10-12kts and had perfect hiking conditions. By the time the race started the wind had died to 10kts and continued to die throughout the race to finish at around 6 knots.

We had a great first beat to round in second at the first mark. We sailed a smart downwind leg and pulled out a nice lead for the start of the second upwind leg. Half way up the second beat, we began to doubt our speed, probably due to lack of time in the Snipe and this doubt got us out of phase with the puffs. We lost our lead to the three boats that were on our tail. We rounded the top mark in fourth, but managed to pass one boat

downwind and held on upwind to take third YuYu & Trixy Agusti in the race. After sitting and drifting for a little while to let the wind settle back in after a momentary lull, we finally got into sequence for the second race. The fleet had a couple of general recalls, as the current had kicked in and was pushing us all over the line. But on the third try, we finally got off a start. We had a good mid-line start and rounded the top mark in 6th. Downwind, we passed a couple of boats, but mainly we focused on our speed, and positioning for the second upwind leg.We kept our focus this time, and I think we may have passed a

boat or two by the top mark, but we made our big moves on the downwind leg where we passed into second for the most

part before losing a boat right at the leeward mark. Up the last beat we closed in on the leaders and almost got them at the finish line. But, as it turned out, they were OCS (over the line at the start) in the race which gave us the race win.We learned so much about the boats today, thanks to our coach Ernesto Rodriguez. He is helping us not only to set up the boat, but also with our main goal for the event...to improve our fleet racing tactics. We had a great time on the water today and are looking forward to at least two more races tomorrow.

Day 2

7

After a five hour postponement, we finally Aine Fretwell & Jessie O'Dell hit the water around 2pm for a 3pm start.

We sailed out in an oscillating wind that finally settled in to a



lane for the first five minutes of the race until we figured out what we needed to change to solve

the problem. Unfortunately, this cost us a bit and limited our options upwind. We worked the right side of the course as we wanted, but only managed to round the top mark in 10th place. Downwind, we held our own and then on the second upwind leg, we started to make our moves. We passed a couple of boats, but more importantly, we pulled in the pack that was ahead of us.

On the second downwind leg, we made huge gains and rounded in about 6th place. With the wind dying, the course length was shortened so that we would be able to finish the race with some breeze. This time, we shifted our focus to

the left side of the course as there seemed to be more breeze there. For the first part of the beat we made huge gains and

> caught right up to third place, before getting into a tacking frenzy and losing two boats that were right behind us to finish 6th. It was a bit frustrating, but at the same time, exciting. We chatted with our coach after the race and he said that from the second upwind on we sailed quite well, so we were happy with that. We are mad about our first beat, but know we won't make the same mistake again. There are six more races scheduled over three days, so hopefully we get a bit more breeze and will be able to finish up the all the races. Tomorrow's forecast is looking a bit similar to todays, but then Thursday and Friday are looking much better so we should get racing in those days.

Day 4 & 5 No wind- no racing.

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light south-southeasterly around 5kts. It was a long race, but we fought hard for a 6th place finish to take the overnight lead in the results.

Day 3

We arrived at the sailing center just after eight this morning, to find we were in postponement already. We did the necessary boat work for the day and tuned the rig and just as we were getting ready to sit and wait, we were told that we were postponed until 2pm. > got some work done for the upcoming winter training. After lunch, we made our way back to the sailing center to get ready for the 2pm announcement. Just before 2pm, they dropped the AP flag to send us all out.

We headed out to the race course and had about 10 minutes to tune up before the race started. We had a great start, but had a little trouble holding a

Day 6

Finally today we had just enough wind to complete three races. Although at times the wind got very light, we hung around and got the racing in. We finished with a 3, 7, 3 today and are now lying in second overall with 16 points, three points behind overnight leaders Kathleen Tocke and Kate Sheahan. Behind us in third are Kay Voss & Joni Palmer the team from Argentina, Trixy



and Yuyu Agusti with 17 points. Overall, it was a very trying day. The wind was up and down, especially in the first two races which we finished in almost drifter conditions again. In the first race, we had a great start and were in second for a

while before dropping to fifth and rallying back to 3rd by the finish.

The second race was a bit more challenging for us. We had a great start, but didn't tack up on the fleet soon enough and got stuck on the wrong side of a left shift. We fought hard for our 7th place, after being held in 9th for most of the race. However, in the last race we rallied back and despite having only a decent start, we sailed smart on the first two legs and locked ourselves into third place for the race, with most of our competition deep in the fleet. This

closed up the overall points which means tomorrow's racing will be very exciting and intense.

Day 7

We Won! It was challenging, and we definitely made it hard on ourselves, but we managed to pull it together and win the last race and the regatta. We started with the day with 10kts that quickly died to borderline hiking conditions. The first race got under way on time. We had a good start and rounded the top mark in about 6th. We sailed well and managed to draw a penalty on Kathleen Tocke, the overnight leader. This meant she had to do penalty turns and consequently, dropped back in the race. We pulled up to finish 2nd with

our closest competition behind us.

Entering the second race, we had a 2 point lead on Kathleen, and 6 point lead on Trixy, from Argentina. We had a good start, but at the wrong end of the line and got in a bit of trouble rounding the top mark in about 10th with all of our competition in front of us; one in 1st and one in 3rd. We sailed hard and rallied back to 4th, with Trixy getting 2nd in the race and

Kathleen in 5th.

Going into the last race, we were locked into the top three with a 2 point lead on Trixy and a 3 point lead on Kathleen. We had a good chat with our coach, Ernesto Rodriguez, about what to do in the next race. We got our tactics sorted out, and then focused on

> getting top three at the top mark.We achieved our goal, with both Kathleen and Trixy behind us. We sailed focusing on keeping them behind us. By the second leeward mark, the three of us were in 4th, 5th, and 6th in the race. We focused on them for most of the beat as we slowly pulled in the top three and made our move right at the finish to pass everyone and win the race and the regatta. We are so excited to win our first World championship. It was a hard fought battle, but we stuck with it and we achieved our goals. Molly and I owe a huge thanks to

Ernesto our coach. He was a huge asset in our win, and couldn't have done it without him. We would also like to thank again, Raul Rios for letting us use his boat and Tito and Renee Vargas for housing us and letting us use their coach boat. We would like to thank SPYC for their efforts in difficult conditions in pulling off good races.

Q&A with Anna Tunnicliffe & Molly Vandemoer

Was this your first experience in a Snipe?

Anna: This was my second Snipe experience. The first time I sailed a Snipe was at the 2008 Women's Worlds in Spain. **Molly:** No. I sailed Snipes a bit as a kid in San Diego. I helped with sail testing once in awhile. But never campaigned or owned a Snipe.

What made you decide to compete in the Women's Worlds?

Anna: I had a great time at the last Worlds I sailed, and Molly and I had discussed possibly sailing the event earlier in the year. We knew the fleet would be not only fun, but great sailors too and we wanted to do some fleet racing to break up all of the match racing. It was a lot of fun!

Molly: Being that is was in the US made it a simple decision there. Also, the support of the local fleets in Southern Florida made it an attainable goal to compete in the regatta in a competitive boat.

The Snipe is a heavy boat (comparable to others), what strengths if any, have you learned from the Snipe?

Anna: I think that we could compare the Snipe to the Elliot in the way that it is like a dinghy but reacts more like a keelboat when down speed. This was great for us to practice because it meant that we had to sail smart and fast all the time rather than depending on boat handling.

Molly: We wanted to build in some fleet racing tactics into our Olympic campaign. The Snipe is most definitely a dinghy, but it being so heavy makes it feel similar to the Elliott.

Did you find yourselves using some of your Match Race skills on the Snipe course?

Anna: Occasionally we thought of some of our match racing, but for the most part, it's hard because there are so many more boats that you are never racing just one boat out there.

Molly: Match racing takes all of the normal fleet racing tactics and just amplifies the urgency in which decisions are made. And in some cases, the aggressiveness in which the rules are used in your favor. We were able to use a port/starboard pick at the leeward gate, which was unexpected by our competition.

How did you find the transition from the keelboat & MR to the Snipe?

Anna: The first day was a little challenging going from big boats down to a smaller boat, but I think that we have done enough dinghy sailing in our past that we were able to adjust quite quickly.

How would you describe the tactics you sailed in the Snipe compared to other boats you've sailed?

Anna: In the Laser when I sailed that, I could use my speed and boat handling or fitness to get around boats or hike fast, but we were not the fastest boat out there this time and we didn't have the best boat handling by far, so we had to really think about where we wanted to go and execute what we wanted. It was definitely hard for us and had a couple of rough Anna

races.

Molly: The tactics in a Snipe were similar to the other boats we've sailed. The only difference was the speed in which the decisions were made. It was nice to be able to have a conversation about the wind, what the fleet was doing, what the current was doing....And THEN make a decision. It was also nice to have a boat that required some set-up for the conditions. Sailing a one design boat where you are able to play with the mast, the spreaders, the pre-bend, etc. is refreshing. It also helped to have our coach Ernesto, and the rest of the fleet to help us with any questions.

How did the Snipe help you in your Olympic training campaign?

Anna: We do so much match racing these days that we don't get to practice fleet racing ever. We thought that doing this event would allow us to practice that part of our game and it did. We are looking forward to doing more events to help us keep building on this part of our game.

Molly: We do a ton of match racing practice and regattas. It is easy to forget the basics of sailing in pressure, staying lifted, etc. We wanted to make sure to incorporate more fleet racing into our training.

Who helped you during the event?

Anna: We had Ernesto Rodriguez as our coach for the event. He was fabulous in helping us set up the boat correctly and helping us with learning how to sail it. He had a lot of patience with us for the week. He also helped us with our tactical game too since it wasn't great in the beginning.

Molly: We chartered Raul Rios' boat. Carol Cronin/Kim Couranz were incredibly helpful with any questions. As were any sailor we asked a question of. We stayed with Tito and Renee Vargas.

Do you have more plans to sail in the Snipe?

Anna: We definitely want to sail the Snipe again. This spring we are looking to do a couple of events to mix in with our match racing training.

Molly: We are hoping to sail the Don Q if our training schedule allows, and we can find a boat! And we were invited to an event in Spain in March and plan to attend.

Editors note: Anna Tunnicliffe is the Laser Radial gold medalist from the 2008 Olympics and ISAF Sailor of the Year in 2009. Currently Anna, Molly and teammate Debbie Capozzi are ranked #4 on the ISAF Match Racing circuit.

Rafael Gagliotti and Henrique Wisniewski Sweep South Americans

Algarrobo, 22th - 27th November 2010

Twenty one boats from Brazil, Colombia, Chile, Ecuador and Paraguay gathered in Algarrobo, Chile for the South American Championship.

The first day of racing was cloudy with light predominant winds from the west at 6.5 knots, decreasing to 5.5 in the last few races on Algarrobo Bay. At daybreak on the second day it was cloudy again with light winds, but after a few hours the west winds increased to 7 knots and stayed that way for the day. The third day the wind increased to 9.5-10 knots but on the fourth day it fell again to no more than 7 knots. Ten interesting races were sailed allowing for two discards. Finally after a hard fought contest, the Brazilian team of Rafael Gagliotti and Henrique Wisniewski emerged the champions leaving fellow Brazilians Mario Tinoco and Felipe Sabino second and the Chilean crew Nicholas and Mathias Robertson in third.

Immediately finishing the first days racing was the inaugural cocktail party with the president of CYA in attendance. His attendance was much appreciated by all and he and the National Secretary welcomed all foreign and Chilean crews. The next evening a delicious "tallarinata" took place and many Snipe crews shared stories of the days racing. The evening of the third day, all the crews enjoyed "Paella" always prepared by our "Official Paellero" Tony Poncell. And on Saturday, at the end of the regatta, there was the official prizegiving ceremony.

To sum up, the championship was a success for SCIRA Chile and the CYA with competitors already planning for 2011.

Hats off to regatta chairman Francisco Sanchez who made sure every detail was covered and the sailors were happy. The Snipes are hopeful we will be back again at CYA Algarrobo. !Thank you and well done to the organization team!

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Of Cannons and Grapefruit:

Clearwater Yacht Club Celebrates its Centennial Year and the Seventy-fifth Anniversary of its First Snipe Midwinter Championship Regatta

It's a cold blustery morning and the Clearwater Yacht Club (CYC) parking lot is full of cars, boats and trailers. Race Committee members roam about lugging flags, bags, guns and marks. They pause to take a sip of steaming coffee and perhaps pop a Dramamine or two - just in case. Past Commodore and Race Organizer Dick Boblenz' Flying Cloud is at the dock -Race Committee flag flying. Mermaid and her crew are ready to welcome the winners across the finish line. Bowchasers (members of one of the club's women's sailing groups) are busily hollowing out grapefruit to fill with rum when the sailors return. The excitement is palpable. The report of the cannon shot slams across the harbor to signal the start of the day's racing. All those new condo owners find out what it means to live near a yacht club with a very long and serious history of regatta management.

Competitive sailing has been a vital component of CYC's mission throughout the hundred years of its existence. The club was founded on February 14, 1911 under Articles of Incorporation that state: "the general object of the association shall be to promote social intercourse among its members, and to encourage and promote sailing and yachting." Snipe racing has been particularly important to the history of CYC. In 1934, the club decided to adopt

the Snipe as its main racing sailboat, and to build a fleet that could represent CYC in local, regional, national and international regattas. The first boat in the club's Snipe fleet was launched and christened the good ship lack Snipe in 1935 by Commodore

A decided to adopt

Taver Bayly's young daughter "Miss Ann" (Ann Bayly Cornett who later served as Francis Seavy's first crew). **Building a Snipe** fleet, however, required a bit more than launching one boat. Looking back at the early years of Snipe sailing at CYC, Guy Roberts, who built the

Jack Snipe, remembered:

"We applied for a charter but having only 3 snipes we could not get one, so we organized a syndicate and built 10 or 12 and sold them to various members of the Club. In no time we had twenty odd snipes. During the year 1935 we were granted a charter and formed float #46" (Serge Archives)

formed fleet #46" (Seavy Archives). In the 1930s and early 1940s, CYC's Guy Roberts, Commodore Ted Kamensky and Don Cochran Sr. were well known as the top Snipe sailors in the area. A newspaper article written in 1939 says of these three competitors: "wherever Snipe racing is talked the world over these three skippers are rated as tops."

CYC realized early on that holding top notch regattas is as important to a club's standing in the yachting community as is producing top sailing competitors. On January 9, 1935, a luncheon was held at the home of Commodore Bayly for the purpose of planning the club's first annually scheduled regatta series. The first regatta in the series was held in 1936 and in 1938, the Snipe Class presented Clearwater Yacht Club with the Snipe Class Midwinter Championship Perpetual Trophy. Thus began the club's longest standing tradition – the annual International Snipe Midwinter Championship Regatta (aka Snipe Midwinters). With the exception of the years during World War



race committee enough to hold regattas nor materials enough to build or repair boats, CYC has been hosting the Snipe Midwinters ever since. At the end of the war, CYC returned to the sailing circuit in a big way. The Snipe Midwinters returned to the annual regatta calendar and the sailors of Snipe Fleet #46 hit the waves again – brining home top honors. Don Cochran, Sr. won the Southeastern Snipe Championship in Charleston in 1947. Cochran's son Jimmy won the same regatta a year later. Francis Seavy (just returned from service in Algeria) started his long and stellar career as a Snipe sailor. Seavy took third place in the Snipe Nationals in 1948. In that same year, he took first place in the Florida Sailing Association Snipe Regatta in Tampa – giving CYC a 1-2-3 victory with limmy and Don Cochran, Jr. At the Orange Bowl Regatta in 1949, CYC again had the first three places with Seavy, Jimmy Cochran and J. Montanari. A third CYC I-2-3 during these years was won by Don Cochran, Sr., Ted Kamensky and Don Cochran, Jr. at the Gasparilla Regatta. Larry Roberts won the Studebaker Trophy in 1949. Francis Seavy won first place in the Snipe Nationals in 1951 and second place in the Snipe Worlds in Havana in 1952. Morris Whitney won the Snipe Nationals in the Junior Division in both 1951 and 1953. Kenneth Lippincott (1958), Bruce Cochran (1960) and Danny Flaherty (1964) also brought the Snipe



National Junior Championship home to CYC in later years.

Not only has Snipe sailing at CYC always been serious business, it has also always been serious fun. In the decades following WW II, Snipe Midwinters participants often camped out in the CYC parking lot and it sometimes got a bit rowdy. It's rumored that a member of a visiting fleet once put the big CYC cannon on the club manager's desk in the middle of the night. In the morning, the irate manager called Francis Seavy of the CYC fleet with an unprintable message. The main culprit in this escapade may have been CYC's legendary "Grapefruit Party." While the history of this party is a bit sketchy, it is generally agreed that Ted Kamensky, who owned citrus groves, provided the grapefruit. It also seems that in the early days the hollowed out fruit was filled with vodka (appropriate to Kamensky's Russian heritage). Somewhere along the way, however, the liquor of choice seems to have switched to rum. Whatever the beverage, in the early days, it appears that if you were old enough to sail, you were old enough for a drunken grapefruit. My husband, Gene Fleming, remembers being handed one when he crewed for his Uncle Francis as a kid. The competitors also played tricks on each other. At one regatta, two young sailors are rumored to have put heaping handfuls of fiddler crabs in the boat of a lake sailor from Kansas who was likely much more familiar with scorpions than the far less dangerous crabs. As he came out the pass, the crabs moved aft from their hiding place under the bow - causing quite a stir. Much to the amusement of the watching fleet, the besieged skipper proceeded to chase them about the boat with his wooden whisker pole - ultimately breaking that essential piece of equipment. After such thirsty work, I'm sure he was ready for his grapefruit when he returned to the dock.

As you will see from the list of first place skippers that accompanies this article, over the last 75 years, sailors from around the globe have taken first place in the Snipe Midwinters. Several skippers have won the Midwinters more than three times. Francis Seavy of Clearwter, Florida won eight times between 1953 and 1970. Ted Wells of Wichita, Kansas

won 6 times between 1948 and 1954. Augie Diaz of Miami, Florida won 5 times between 1969 and 2004. Jeff Lenhart and Mark Reynolds (both of Mission Bay, California), Dave Chapin (Island Bay, Illinois) and George Szabo (San Diego, California) have each taken first place at the Midwinters four times. Ernesto Rodriquez of Miami, Florida was the first place skipper in the last two regattas – perhaps the start of a new winning streak?

Clearwater Yacht Club is honored to have been associated with the Snipe class throughout most of its history and looks forward to another hundred years of championship sailing in the Gulf of Mexico. While CYC no longer has an active Snipe fleet, and now hosts several other annually scheduled regattas (some of which draw hundreds of entrants each year), as its first and longest running regatta series, the Snipe Midwinters will always hold a special place in the club's history and in its heart. CYC is proud to be celebrating the 75th anniversary of the first Snipe Midwinters Regatta in its Centennial Year. The

ARGENTINIAN NATIONALS AND PAN-AM TRIALS

The national Championship of the Argentinian Snipe Class took place in the "Cabra Corral Dam", in the province of Salta from October 7^{th} to 10^{th} , with 33 boats from all the country.

In this new place where no major Snipe Regatta was held before, surrounded by mountains, the fleet from Salta produced a 5 star Regatta, with international judges, luxury dinners, TV coverage, and great races.

In the first day, with 10-14 knots from a gusty and shifty NE, 3 races took place. At the end of the day, the lead was in the hands of the very consistent Augusto Amato and his wife Constanza with 8 points (2-5-1), followed by 3 boats really close Benavidez-Morlachetti (1-5-4) & Guille-Lipszic (4-3-3) with 10 points and defending Champions Soubie-Granucci with 12 (9-1-2).



The second day start with a nice 8 knots wind that grew up to



a 16 knot breeze around the lake. Race were very close with the fleet exchanging positions all the time due to the shifty conditions. Soubie-Granucci overcome from a 9th position the first day to win the 4th race and become 2nd the 5th and take the lead with 6 points with the first discard. Amato-Alvarez has a 2nd and a 10th and were 2nd with 10 points, and Guille-Lipszic with a 6th and a 4th where 3rd.

The last day of racing started

with no wind at all and after 4 hours of delay the last race of the Championship took place. The battle for the Regatta was rough, with Soubie, Amato and Guille fighting one to another without looking the fleet since nobody

could get them in the scores. So Soubie took Amato to the end of the fleet and Amato took Guile, finishing 10th, 12th and 22th, resulting in Luis Soubié-Cecilia Granucci as National Champions for the 2nd time in a row, Augusto Amato- Constanza Alvarez 2nd and Nicolas Guille-Diego Lipszic in 3rd.

A few weeks later, on 23th to 31st October, the Pan-Am trials took place in Buenos Aires during the Semana de Buenos Aires Regatta



with 15 boats. The first weekend 6 races took place, with Soubie-Granucci winning all of them. The second weekend all activity was cancelled because of the strong 35 knots wind from the W, so Soubie-Granucci won the Regatta and the trials and get their place to attend to the Pan Am games again, since their participation at 1999 Winnipeg.

Classic Snipes in Italy

We had two events about the Classic Snipes in Italy

The first one is an exhibition in Trieste ("La città della vela") called "I disegni del Mare

The author of the exibition is Franco Pace, a famous Italian sailing photographer. In the nice "Salone degli Incanti" in Trieste famous old dinghies are shown. Among them a famous Snipe: *Portorose*, built by Danilo D'Isiot (see photos this page). This boat, in 1955, won the Italian Nationals and the World



Championship in Santander with Mario Capio as skipper and Lorenzo Podestà as crew. In the exibition you can also read a short history of the Snipe Class and look spectacular photos taken by Franco Pace.

The Vintage Snipe in Italian is "Beccaccino d'Epoca"! In Italy the interest for classic dinghies is significantly increasing year by year and the AIDE - Associazione Italiane Derive d'Epoca - Classic Dinghies Italian Association - organized big nationwide events in the last years in locations like Portofino, Lago d'Orta and in the Adriatic Sea. When the effort of Alessandro Rodati - the past National Secretary - and Alberto Perdisa our current National Secretary - met the passion for the classic boats of the AIDE, the idea of an event dedi-





cated exclusively to our Snipe Class rose interest. It came to success at the Yacht Club Sanremo, elegant location between Cote d'Azur and Genoa last 18-19 September with the organisation provided by the Commodore of the club Beppe Zaoli and his sister Gina: the event was named "Ist Coppa Italia Beccaccini d'epoca e classici". By chance the Vice Chairman of AIDE, Nicola Rugarli, is the lucky owner of a classic Snipe ("Veloce") and along others, Zaoli brought back in operations 3 old Snipes ("*Mia*", "*Tua*" and "*Eolo*"), while one ("*Nin V*") has been refurbished by Perdisa himself with the help of friends. Classic Snipe Found in Great Britain

Back in October, the SCIRA office was contacted by Lynda Bennett who stumbled across a very old Snipe. After an exchange of photos, research and collaboration with John Rose, our resident historian of Snipes in the US, we have determined that Lynda has Snipe 2447 - originally named "Wonda." Wonda was built in 1937 and was originally from the Midland Sailing Club in Birmingham, England. Alan Birch has also assisted and further wrote: ."From the early 1930's until the second world war the Club sailed Snipes. Lynda has written to the Club to state that she has just bought 2447 Wonda, which has a measurement certificate, dated Jan.23rd. 1938. I'm not sure whether this was for the boat or the genoa and main. The boat was measured, or was it the sails, by William K. Etchells, a Midland member, who presumably also had a Snipe. When I joined the Club in 1953 there was still one left racing and I saw one, Scud, burned! The remainder were dispersed during the war and I think Wonda was one of those."






Lynda continues her research on Wonda through the British Snipe Class and we await further news.

The most surprising find with *Wonda* was a spinnaker! Spinnakers were tried on various Snipes over the years and eventually abandoned. *Wonda* came with a complete spinnaker and Lynda sent the dimensions along. Enjoy this passage back through time.
