OWNER

SCIRA Italy

AWARDED TO

The trophy shall be awarded to the Fleet of the first European skipper.

ENTRY AND ELIGIBILITY

Skippers shall be citizens or residents for at least one year of the country they represent.

OPEN TO

Any SCIRA member for the year of the regatta.

REGATTA CONDITIONS

1. Held on alternate years with the World Championship in waters selected by European National Secretaries.
2. Eight (8) or nine (9) races shall be scheduled.
3. Notice of Race shall include the following:
 - (a) The Rules of Conduct for national and International Championships will apply.
 - (b) The Deed of Gift for European Championship Trophy will apply
 - (c) When less than seven (7) races are scored, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores. When seven (7) or more races are scored, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores excluding the worst eligible score.
4. There must be a separate Race Committee and Protest Committee.
5. The technical committee Chairman shall be certified as SCIRA International measurer.
6. The Organizing Authority provides an adequate number of equally matched boats with good racing capability to loan or charter to competitors who do not bring their own boats.
7. The Organizing Authority hosting shall provide lodging to the following, free of charge: the jury members, Measurement Chairman, SCIRA Representative and Executive Director.
8. Social events shall include, at no cost for the competitors: Opening ceremonies, one dinner during the Championship, and the prize giving dinner.

LANGUAGE

The official language shall be English, both written and oral. The use of other languages, as secondary, can be the prerogative of the Organizing Authority and shall not be used for official communication from the Committees or Organizing Authority.

TROPHY RESPONSIBILITY

The trophy is the responsibility of the Fleet of the winning skipper. The fleet shall see that the trophy is taken care of, guarded and returned to the place designated for the next competition, properly boxed for shipment with all duties and other charges paid by the Fleet. The name of the winning skipper, crew, year, fleet and country shall be engraved at the winner's expense in uniform engraving.

By agreement between the owner and the European National Secretaries.
