Hayward Western Hemisphere Trophy Deed of Gift

EMBLEMATIC OF

DONOR

Commodore John T. Hayward, Tulsa, Oklahoma, USA

AWARDED TO

The Fleet of the winning skipper.

ENTRY & ELIGIBILITY

All skippers shall be citizens or residents for at least one year of the country they represent and each must present credentials signed by the National Secretary from the country he/she represents attesting that he/she is the entrant.

OPEN TO

Any SCIRA member that meets the requirements of eligibility in the year of the Championship.
Five qualified teams from each country in the Western Hemisphere & Asia.

ADDITIONAL ENTRIES

Entries not included in the 5 qualified team quota as follows:

1. The current World Champion skipper (providing it represents a WH&A nation)
2. The current WH&A Champion skipper
3. The current North American, South American and Asian Champion skippers (providing each represents that continent)
4. The current top Junior skipper from: North America, South America and Asia Championships
5. The current top woman skipper from: North America, South America and Asia Championships.
6. Reallocated entrants, as follows, will not count against, nor limit, the initial per country allocation.

REALLOCATION

In the event that the total entries do not meet a total of 50 boats:

1. The Notice of Race will be posted, at least, 6 months before the first day scheduled for equipment controls.
2. The registration period starts with the posting of the Notice of Race and ends a minimum of 90 days prior to the first day scheduled for equipment controls.
3. "Registration" is defined as a skipper who has satisfied requirements outlined in 2. above and has paid to the regatta organizing authority the full registration fee and charter fee (if applicable) as specified on the Official Regatta website or via equivalent means.
4. If 90 days prior to the first day scheduled for measurements, countries in good standing with SCIRA have not registered 5 eligible boats, and the number of registered entrants has not reached 50 boats, unassigned entry slots will be reallocated to a pool of qualified entrants. The number of entries available for reallocation will be the difference between the fleet limit of 50 and entries registered during the initial registration period.
5. SCIRA shall post, within 7 days of the close of the initial registration period to the Official Regatta website, or equivalent means, the number of additional entries available and the assigned allocation to those countries requesting additional entries.
6. Those countries eligible for additional entries (which registered their 5 teams) will have from the time of posting until 60 days prior to the first day scheduled for equipment controls to register additional entries.
7. Any unfilled reallocated entry not registered 60 days prior will then be made available on a "first come" basis only from a received valid registration.
8. The Regatta Chairman or National Secretary and the General Secretary of the WH&A will oversee the allocation.

REGATTA CONDITIONS

1. Held on alternate years with the World Championship of SCIRA at the venue selected by the Western Hemisphere & Asia National Secretaries.
2. Nine (9) races shall be scheduled.



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3. The Notice of Race shall include the following:
 - a) The Rules of Conduct for National and International Championship Regattas will apply.
 - b) The Deed of Gift for the Hayward Western Hemisphere Trophy will apply.
 - c) When less than six (6) races are scored, a boat's scores will be the total of her race scores. When six (6) to eight (8) races are scored, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores excluding her worst eligible score. When nine (9) races are scored, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores excluding her two worst eligible scores.
4. There must be a separate Race Committee and Protest Committee.
5. The Organizing Authority of the regatta shall make available at least two (2) boats for charter to each country participating.

LANGUAGE

The official language shall be English. The use of other languages, as secondary, can be the prerogative of the Organizing Authority and shall not be used for Official Communications with competitors from the Committees or Organizing Authority.

TROPHY RESPONSIBILITY

The trophy is the responsibility of the Fleet of the winning skipper. The fleet shall see that the trophy is taken care of, guarded and returned to the place designated for the next competition, properly boxed for shipment with all duties and other charges paid by the Fleet. The name of the winning skipper and crew, year, fleet and country shall be engraved at the winner's expense in uniform engraving.
